LESSON 3 Waiting

Now that the Apostles and followers of Christ in Jerusalem began to understand that Jesus is also for non-Jews (Gentiles), they act on an opportunity share their able helper, Barnabas, with a new growing church 300 miles north in the Gentile city of Antioch.

The Antioch church started because Saul persecuted Jewish believers all over Israel. Those believers moved to safer places to get away from Saul. And as they moved, they told people about Jesus. Now look whom Barnabas recruits to help him shepherd the Antioch church.

Read Acts 11:19-30.

Back in Acts 1:8 Jesus told His disciples that in the Holy Spirit's power, they will tell people about Him to the whole world. In Acts 9:15 Jesus said that Saul will carry His name to Gentiles and their kings. This is the beginning of that mission story.

But the day came when Paul and Barnabas disagreed so strongly, they decided to separate.
