PREFACE

In 1894, 16 deaf people gathered for the first Lutheran Church service for the deaf conducted by Rev. August Reinke of Bethlehem Lutheran Church in Chicago.

Two years later Rev. Reinke was preaching regularly in Chicago, Milwaukee, and St. Louis. At the synodical convention of 1896, he asked Synod to take over the growing "Mission to the Deaf."

The mission has grown to a staff of 41 full-time pastors, 9 lay workers, and 5 parish workers. It numbers over 5,300 communicant members and serves the Deaf throughout North America. Foreign work among the deaf has been begun in Hong Kong, Japan, Taiwan, the Phillipines, and Brazil. Truly the mission has become "international."

Now we return to Chicago in this our 75th anniversary year. We have gone into all the world, and Lutheran Deaf Christians want to have fellowship in the International Lutheran Deaf Association. Now is the time for the deaf to assume more of the administration of their own church work locally, nationally and internationally.

As we meet in Chicago these days to draft a constitution for the International Lutheran Deaf Association, the question with which we must wrestle is "what is the privilege and responsibility of deaf Lutherans in planning, administering, and doing the work of their mission in the years ahead?"

THAN WORDS

- URBANISSIMO. This is a cartoon about what happens to our world when cities begin to grow too large and greedy. What can you do about that?
- THE STINGY PAWNBROKER. When his wife died, the Pawnbroker became bitter and loveless to his own child and friends. One day something happened in his store that made him understand he was wrong.
- THE WALL. Here you will meet the People-User. He sits back lazily while other people work; then he hurries to use what other people have done.
- THE STRING BEAN. A little, old Parisian lady owned nothing except her precious bean plant. When she could not take care of it any more, she quietly planted it in the Royal French Gardens with surprising results.
- THE REFINERS FIRE. The Christian sometimes acts differently than the world acts, and the world hates him for that. Following Jesus means giving up everything--even our lives.
- BAPTISM. Look at a little boy without beauty, without a home, and without a family. He needs to belong, and through someone showing mercy and love to him, he can belong to a family.

ILDA - CHALLENGE AND OPPORTUNITY FOR THE DEAF

The most important decision in the history of ILDA was made in October of 1969, when the seven regional pastoral advisors, and Rev. Herbert Rohe, Secretary for Ministry to the Deaf, agreed that ILDA should be an organization of, by, and for the deaf. This decision implemented the resolution of the Board for Missions (Sept. 1969) regarding a national deaf organization. In June of 1970, with a proposed Constitution in hand, seven deaf delegates and the regional advisors began planning our present ILDA organizing convention. Many more meetings were held both nationally and locally to plan and organize our convention this weekend and coordinate the ongoing work of the Association.

One aspect of ILDA's ongoing work involves the administration of Deaf Missions in the Lutheran Church. Various proposals have been suggested, but they all have one thing in common. ILDA will participate in and strengthen the structure of Deaf Missions in the future.

The need for the deaf to have a voice in the planning of their mission is not new, nor is the concept of a National Lutheran Deaf organization. The concept of ILDA was proposed more than thirty years ago by a very enthusiastic Rev. Theodore Frederking. He is the real "father of ILDA." ILDA is a great challenge and wonderful opportunity for the Lutheran deaf. ILDA is their organization, and it will be run by deaf laymen rather than by pastors and Synodical officials.

Therefore, everyone--deaf and hearing, laymen and professional--must pray unceasingly and work enthusiastically for the success of ILDA. We pray that ILDA will be used by the Lord to help bring people (both deaf and hearing) to know and love their Savior Jesus Christ.
