a man of faith in word and deed.



U. C. Jones has spent his entire life in service to God and his people. Born in Cartwright, Kentucky, he started school at the age of ten after the death of both his parents. Supporting himself since that time he was able to attend and graduate from Gallaudet College in the year 1924. Since that time he has given his life to deaf young-people and to his church.

"U.C." was printing instructor and classroom teacher at the Idaho School for the Deaf (1924 - 1928); classroom teacher and printing instructor at Mississippi School for the Deaf (1928 - 1936) where he was editor for the Deaf Mississipian and an editor for the Tennessee Observer (1936 - 1971) at the Tennessee School for the Deaf where he was printing instructor for ten years and vocational principal for twenty-five years.

Active in many civic, scholastic and church affairs throughout his life "U.C." received his Master's Degree from the University of Tennessee in 1943, and after that became Vocational Principal for the Tennessee School. He continued in that post until his retirement.

After retiring "U.C." took up full time church work as he became the first elected president of the International Lutheran Deaf Association and took up the work of editing and managing the *Deaf Lutheran*. He completely revised the format of that magazine, added new sections and expanded readerships participation before failing health caused him to stop that activity. In the ILDA he gave strong leadership and helped the board to begin to realize the scope and the potential of the work God has put in thier hands before doctors required that he give up this work and seek a more restful life-style.

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DR. DEAN MILLER ON PHYSICAL FITNESS

Dr. Dean Miller received his B.S. ans M.S. degree from Nebraska and Ph.D from the University of Southern California. He served in the 82nd Airborne Division and retired a Lt. Col. from the National Guard.

Dr. Miller has coached for eleven years at the high school level, was Associate Proffesor at San Jose State College for three years. His Cross country teams were second in NCAA Championships in 1961 and National Champions in 1962 and 1963. He never lost a dual cross country meet and lost only two track dual meets in fourteen years of coaching. He has a football coaching record: 47-17-1 and was foted NCAA of the Year 1963.

He spent nine years as Director of Physio-Logical Research in Bio-Astronautics for NASA and Developed the exercise program used in the Apollo Space Shots. He served for ten years as President of American Physical Fitness, and worked with the conditioning of the U.S. Olympic teams in 1968 and 1972. He spent 20 years studying the effect of exercise on the human body and developed the Isokinetic priciple of exercise. He is now National Director of Physical Fitness Institute of America.

Dr. Miller is one of the most sought after lecturers on physical fitness. He has flown over 1,750,000 miles lecturing in all the 50 states, as well as many foreign countries.

PASTOR CHARLES MUELLER ON SPIRITUAL FITNESS

The Rev. Charles Mueller graduated from Saint John's College, Winfield, Kansas and Concordia Seminary, Saint Louis, Missouri. He has served as pastor of Bethlehem Lutheran Church in Jacksonville Beach, Fla., and Saint Andrews Lutheran Church in Silver Spring, Maryland. During his pastorate at Saint Andrews Pastor Mueller twice served as Vice President of the Southeastern District, and has served as District President of the Southeast ern District since 1970. An author of several books Pastor Mueller has written, God's Wonderful World of Words, A Christian Family Prepares for Christmas, Strategy for Evangelism, and most recently What's This I hear About the Church?

Pastor Mueller will speak at our banquet on the theme "NEW LIFE: The Soul".

PASTOR WILLIAM LUDWIG

"NEW LIFE: THE SOUL!"

Pastor William A. Ludwig was born in Winner, South Dakota, on February 29, 1932. Soon after birth he became gavely ill. The illness resulted in the loss of his hearing. Upon advice of two pastors he went to the Lutheran School for the deaf in Detroit.

Upon his graduation from that school he went to and graduated from the Colorado School for the Deaf, Colorado Springs, Colorado. From there he went to Gallaudet College and received his Bachelor of Arts Degree.

Mr. Ludwig applied to Concordia Seminary, in Springfield, Illinois,

but the school did not want to admit him because he was deaf. three pastors, the Reverends Nathanael Uhlig, John Salvnef and Walter Westerman, came to his aid. They persuaded the Seminary to accept him and he entered Concordia Seminary. At first the Seminary Registrar wanted to admit Bill as a special student, but because Bill did so well that was changed and he went on to win a Bachelor of Divinity Degree, and become the first deaf student ever to enter and graduate a Lutheran Seminary. In all of his work Bill had to make up for the missed lectures by extra reading and by copying his classmates' notes.

Mr. Ludwig vicared in the Saint Paul/ Minneapolis Deaf Field in 1957 - 58. During that time he met an Estonial yourg, deaf girl by the name of Sigrid Ellram. She had fled Estonia with her mother and brother after the Russians killed her father, a Mojor in the Estonial army. They married on June 29. Today they have three children.

Since his ordination Pastor Ludwig has served Holy Cross Lutheran Church of the Deaf and the Central Ohio Field (1959 - 71); and now serves the Western Washington Field covering Seattle, Tacoma, Everett, Bremerton, and Yakima. In addition he is Regional Advisor for the Northwest Region.

We are happy to welcome Pastor Ludwig and we pray God will bless him in his ministry, and bless us through him.



HISTORY OF ILDA (1968-1972)

Early in the 30's (1934) and the 40's Pastor Theodore Frederking first proposed a national gathering of the LC-MS deaf. However, his suggestion was not implemented until twenty years later in 1961 at Ephphatha Conference when he, together with Pastors Wayne Bottlinger and August Hauptman, was delegated to serve on a committee which was to study the proposal, provide cost estimates, and suggest ways and means of meeting the cost. They were to report to the Conference in 1962.

Again, nothing came of the study until several years later. In 1965 the convention of the Synod passed resolutions adopting the Mission Affirmations and merging the several Boards for Missions into a single Board. Following these actions (which terminated the old Board for Missions to the Deaf, Jan. 1, 1966) the church's Ministry to the Deaf came under special review with the proposal that the North American Districts of the Synod become responsible for the administration and subsidy of local deaf congregations.

The 1967 convention of the Synod in New York City (Memorial 1-09) designated the Regional Advisors as an Ad Hoc Committee to study the matter of administration. Part of the materials produced by the Ad Hoc Committee contained seventeen (17) basic concerns in Ministry to the Deaf. One of the concerns stated was that the deaf congregations remain united. If the North American Districts were to administer the work, the national unity of this ministry would be threatened. Thus, at the November 1-2, 1968, meeting of the Board for Missions, the Secretary for Ministry to the Deaf, H. W. Rohe, proposed several measures resulting from the Ad Hoc Committee study, namely: 1) that the Board for Missions continue to sponsor the Ephphatha Conference as an official pastoral conference (thus assuring

and perpetuating unity among the workers in this ministry); 2) that as a means of developing lay-leadership in the work among the deaf, the Board for Missions establish an International Lutheran Deaf Association (thus maintaining and assuring a national unity, visibility, and selfdetermination among deaf congregations, see attachment #1, Minutes of the Board for Missions meeting, November 1-2, 1968, page 17, item 252 (c)"development of lay-leadership in the work among the deaf;" 3) that the Synod in 1969 observe the 75th Anniversary of the work among the deaf.

Early in 1969 the action of the Board for Missions was announced in The Deaf Lutheran. Pastor Rohe also reported this to the Regional Conferences and Ephphatha Conference in 1969. In his report, "What's New for the Deaf in the '70's?" (April 15, 1969). These measures also came before the Denver Convention in 1969.

However, when Resolution 1-18 was defeated, the resolution regarding ILDA did not come up for a vote. However, in the following months the Board for Missions steadfastly held to the establishment of an ILDA. The Constitution of ILDA was drawn up and proposed to the Ad Hoc Committee, to the Board for Missions (September 15, 1969), and Ephphatha Conference. The Board for Missions revived the Seventeen Concerns of the Ad Hoc Committee and again proposed the establishment of ILDA. All the regions were urged to study the Constitution of ILDA and in the fall of 1969 the Regional Advisors again met to study it. In December of 1969 the Board for Missions' staff again approved for the Board for Missions the policy statement regarding district administration, guidelines for Ministry to the Deaf, and regions and Regional Advisors.

In 1970 the proposed Constitution (dated April 29, 1970) was sent to

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all congregations. On June 22 and 23, 1970, the Regional Advisors met with lay representatives from each region at Concordia College, Milwaukee, Wisc. (prior to Ephphatha Conference) for a planning meeting. Plans were laid for a constituting convention in Chicago, July 16-18, 1971.

Present for this historic meeting were the following:

Rev. Wm. Ludwig and Mr. Clarence Schulz, representing the Great Lakes Region; Rev. Wayne Bottlinger and Mr. Ted Brighton, representing the Northwest Region; Rev. Clark Bailey and Marion Van Manen, representing the Pacific Region; Rev. Wm. Lange and Mr. Bob Baker, representing the Midwest Region; Rev. Martin Kosche and Mr. Warren Riege, representing the Central Region; Rev. Donald Leber and Mr. Billy Fitzgerald, representing the Dixie Region; Mr. Gary Schlub, representing the Eastern Region; and Rev. Herbert Rohe representing the Board for Missions.

Visitors attending this meeting were Rev. Martin Mueller, Mr. Robert Schneider, and Mrs. Doris Myhre of Milwaukee, Wisconsin, and Mrs. Judy Miller of Miami, Fla.

Two days were spent revising the proposed Constitution for ILDA. Each region was given specific assignments in preparation for the Constituting Convention the next year, and pro tem officers were elected for the ILDA as follows:

Each congregation was requested to support ILDA with a contribution of \$125.00 in 1971.

On August 21, 1970, H. W. Rohe sent a letter to the Regional Advisors and the regional representatives calling for a planning meeting on Sept. 6-7, 1970, at Hotel Sheraton, Michigan Avenue, Chicago, Ill. Rev. Charles Jones made arrangements with the Hotel Sheraton for the meeting and hosted the meeting. Each region had been given convention program assignments which were to be implemented at the September Chicago meeting. All pastors and congregations received copy of the ILDA Constitution in the fall of 1970 (September-October). On October 3, 1970, the Regional Advisors' meeting in St. Louis, Mo., received a bulletin and letter from Trinity Lutheran Church of the Deaf, Pittsburgh, Pa., with copy of the letter to all deaf congregations urging ILDA convention be postponed 'til 1972. This request was repeated again on December 7, 1970, when the pastor of Trinity congregation in Pittsburgh sent a letter to Pastor Ludwig, Regional Advisor of the Great Lakes Region, with copy to all pastors, to be considered by the Regional Advisors in their meeting in February of 1971. However, in spite of these pleas to the contrary, the overwhelming concensus to continue the planning for convention in 1971 prevailed.

Thus, on July 16-19, 1971, the convention was held at O'Hare-Hyatt House in Chicago, Ill. "Forward with Christ" was the theme of the convention. The ILDA convention emblem was adopted at this meeting via a concest conducted by the Midwest Region. The emblem submitted in the contest by Mr. Archie Marshall of St. Louis won the contest and was, therefore, adopted as the ILDA emblem.

Dr. Wm. Kohn, Executive Secretary of the Synod's Board for Missions, was the keynote speaker at the opening sessions of the convention on Saturday morning. Mr. Robert O. Lankenau, president of the National Association of the Deaf, was the guest speaker at the banquet on Saturday night. Dr. J.A.O. Preus, president of the LCMS, was the guest preacher at the Sunday a.m. closing rally service.

On November 11-13, 1971, the first meeting of the ILDA Board was held in St. Louis, Mo. All officers and regional representatives were present except Pearl Goff and Warren King. Mr. Warren Riege, former treasurer pro tem, was also present. Plans were made for the 1973 convention in Kansas City, Mo. The theme, "Sharing Love in Christ," was selected and program assignments were given to each of the several regions in preparation for the convention.

In 1972, due to lack of funds, it was not possible for the ILDA Board to meet. However, on November 3-4, 1972, the Executive Committee of ILDA met at the Muehlenbach Hotel in Kansas City, Mo. In addition to the officers of the Board six visitors from the host Midwest Region attended the meeting.

In addition to continuing plans for the 1973 convention, revision of the Constitution was given considerable time at the Executive Committee meeting, and several matters proposed by the Board for Missions were considered. On February 10-12, 1972, the Board for Missions passed a resolution requesting ILDA to assume responsibility for LCMS membership on the Board of COSD, effective upon ratification of the ILDA convention in 1973. President Van Manen and Gary Schlub as alternate were designated as the first representatives of ILDA to be proposed to the 1973 convention for ratification.

In September 21-23, 1972, the Board for Missions passed a resolution asking ILDA to consider becoming responsible for the publishing, editing, and business management of The Deaf Lutheran with subsidy from the Board for Missions on a declining scale until ILDA could pick up on its own.
