WHAT IS THE I.L.D.A.?

The International Lutheran Deaf Association was founded in Chicago during the first biennial convention in 1971. The purpose, according to the revised constitution, is "to coordinate and strengthen the religious activities and services in our congregation to help promote their growth to the highest possible level in service to their Lord and Savior; to promote the Christian faith and life of Lutheran Deaf people, all deaf individuals, and others with whom we associate; and to carry on our ministry throughout the world."

The I.L.D.A. shall communicate and convey to the deaf members the programs, plans, and goals of the Lutheran Church-Missouri Synod. It shall support lay-leadership among deaf Lutherans in all areas of faith and life.

In 1975 the members voted ratification of the revised constitution. The historic document will help develop the I.L.D.A. image and facilitate the operation and administration of the association. The members also supported the goal of recruiting as may lay people as possible and getting them actively involved in the I.L.D.A. affairs.

In 1977 the aim of I.L.D.A. is to carry out the objectives of serving the Lord in His church and to obtain the financial support that would lead to selfsufficiency. It is hoped that many programs and projects for the ministry and mission of the I.L.D.A. will become a reality.

Membership in the I.L.D.A. is open to all deaf, and is divided into three categories: ACTIVE, ASSOCIATE, and SUSTAINING.

The I.L.D.A. relies on its official publication, THE DEAF LUTHERAN, to convey information of its activities and services to deaf Lutherans.

God's 1000 Club

God's 1,000 Club was established by the I.L.D.A. Board of Directors and it aims to continue to grow.

The name "God's 1,000 Club" was chosen because first of all the work of I.L.D.A. is to get the Good News of God's Son to the deaf everywhere. 1,000 represented the number of donors or club members we hope to enlist.

People who become members in God's 1,000 Club are asked to contribute \$10.00 each year thereafter. This is not a part of the regular I.L.D.A. dues and it does not pay for a subscription to THE DEAF LUTHERAN. Any donations given to God's 1,000 Club can only be used to help pay the expenses of I.L.D.A. board meetings.

THE REV. WILLIAM (BUD) PALMER AND HIS FAMILY

Pastor William "Bud" Palmer was born in Muncie, Indiana on May 19, 1956. He has lived most of his life in Indiana. He was first introduced to the Lutheran Church (LCMS) in 1978 thru his wife, Jennifer. They both became interested in Sign Language at Concordia Theological Seminary in Fort Wayne, Indiana under Professor George Perry. Bud and Jennifer have two children Luke (3 yrs.) and Eve (2 yrs.). Bud was a vicar at Christ Lutheran in Washington, D.C. and Gallaudet College. Pastor Palmer enjoys all sports, especially wrestling. He was a two time "All Championships, and represented the U.S. in the Toledo World Cup Championships. Both Bud and Jennifer feel very blessed that the Lord has called them to Emmanuel.

ADVENTURE OF FAITH AND COURAGE

As long as thirty years ago the question of relocating and building a new chapel for the Lutheran Deaf of Milwaukee had been discussed. But the implication prevailed that it is more urgent to build chapels in areas where there are none than to replace an old facility, no matter how inadequate. Hence, it became apparent that, unlike in other areas, a new chapel for the Milwaukee Deaf would be the sole responsibility of the local group without subsidy from the usual sources. The small group of Lutheran Deaf in the Milwaukee area have accepted the challenge and over the years have found this a satisfying experience. With a great deal of patience in gathering the necessary funds, for the most part in their own midst, and then by devoting many hours of volunteer labor during the actual construction the completed chapel represents the fruit of faith engendered by Word and Spirit. "Praise God from Whom all blessings flow" and "Not unto us, O Lord, but unto Thy name give glory, for Thy mercy..." is the attitude of a Christian congregation on dedication day.

The question of cost is a natural and interesting one. It is almost impossible to state a figure in dollars. Depending on circumstances and conditions there could be a difference of as much as \$25,000 in identical projects. Much depends on whether or not a strictly commercial yardstick is applied. If a supplier allows a generous discount which he would not allow ordinarily, if the members of the congregation devoted many hours of time and labor in a spirit of personal sacrifice, how is it possible to say the cost amounted to so many dollars! An attempt to answer the question of cost would be to say: The real assets of the congregation consist of a parsonage at 2571 N. Grant Blvd. with an adjoining vacant lot, the site of the new chapel at 44th and North consisting of a 33 foot corner lot and an adjoining parcel encroached upon the rear, a new chapel of 8,000 square feet of usable area. The total valuation of these assets lies somewhere between \$125,000 and \$160,000. On this basis the indebtedness represents a figure somewhere between 30% of the total valuation. In order to retire this debt and operate as a self-sustaining congregation, the 125 Deaf members have assumed an annual budget of \$10,000.

Emmanuel Chapel is the first chapel for Deaf erected without any direct grant or subsidy from Synod or District. The chief sources of funds for the project are the sale of the old chapel and parsonage at 1717 W. Meinecke Avenue nine years ago, a few collections from individual congregations in the District a long time ago, memorial contributions and regular building fund offerings on the part of the Deaf members, and last but not least, the gift of the parsonage and adjoining lot to the congregation nine years ago by Mr. and Mrs. Charles Ortgiesen. Although disappointed that a chapel could not be erected on this site, this generous couple nevertheless rejoices with the congregation upon completion of a house of worship on another site. If it had been possible to overcome the resistance of neighboring property owners, a \$25,000 expense for a site could have been saved if a chapel could have been built on the Grant Blvd. site. The site on North Ave., it is hoped, will serve the needs of the Deaf equally well. To date no adverse factors as to location and type of construction have been noted. Hence with confidence in the future and God's continued blessing, Emmanuel Chapel is dedicated to His glory.
