A very special thanks to the deaf man named, Edward J. Pahl, from the Lutheran Deaf School, who wrote a letter requesting the services for the deaf in Chicago. This letter was forwarded to Rev. Augustus Reinke of Bethlehem Lutheran Church, who preached the First Lutheran service for the deaf in sign language on March 4, 1894. His text, "GOD IS LOVE." Attendance was 16.

This is how the Deaf Ministry under the Lutheran Church-Missouri Synod started 100 years ago and ILDA was organized 25 years ago today. Praise the Lord for the opportunity of celebrating such anniversaries together in the same city of Chicago.

Lutheran Church Missouri Synod's 100th Anniversary of Deaf Ministry by Rhoda J. Rynearson

For 100 years now, members of the Lutheran Church-Missouri Synod have helped to support mission work among thousands of deaf people around the world. As a result, we have come to be known as a caring church body throughout the deaf community.

We have done this, by God's grace, not only through our prayers and offerings, but also, thanks to the efforts of many people, through direct service to the deaf; teaching Sunday School, providing transportation, opening up our churches for the deaf to use, and in many others ways.

BEGINNINGS

LCMS Deaf ministry got started when Edward Pahl, confirmed at the Lutheran School for the Deaf in Detroit, wrote a letter to the school's director, Daniel Uhlig, asking why there were no church services for the deaf in his area.

Uhlig forwarded the letter to Rev Augustus Reinke, pastor of Bethlehem Lutheran church in Chicago, since Pahl was a member of that congregation, even though he lived in Michigan City, Ind. Reinke prayed about this request, and the Lord soon led him to decide that he would try to help these people. With Pahl's help, he began studying sign language and , within just two weeks, preached to 13 deaf people at a special service at his church. This was March 4, 1894.

Reinke and his son also a pastor, continued holding such services once a month in Chicago and Milwaukee and every two months in St. Louis. They also preached at least once in Louisville, Cincinnati, Fort Wayne and in smaller towns in Michigan, Indiana, Illinois and Wisconsin. Everywhere they went, they found deaf people eager to hear the Gospel. Not surprisingly, though, they soon also found that their schedules and workloads were becoming unmanageable.

In 1896, Reinke, using sign language, preached at the synodical convention in Fort Wayne, whose audience included 100 deaf people.

As result of watching this service, the convention resolved to establish deaf ministry as a synodical mission and elected Reinke to be in charge of it.

BLESSED BY GOD

After its first century of deaf ministry, the Synod can point to the following figures: There are now 59 LCMS congregations with primarily deaf memberships Total communicant deaf membership in the Synod numbers some 4,000, representing 33 of 35 LCMS Districts and 42 states.

We have six pastors to the deaf who are deaf themselves.

We have about 200 hearing congregations who provide interpreted ministry to 4,000 of their deaf brothers and sisters.

We have two schools for the deaf in the United States;

the Lutheran School for the Deaf in Detroit (now called Lutheran Special Education Ministries) and Mill Neck Manor School for the Deaf in New York.

In partnership with our sister churches, we have schools for deaf children in Brazil, Hong Kong, Macau and India. We also have trained personnel working with deaf in these countries as well as in Canada, Ghana, Japan, Australia, Norway and Finland.

THE FUTURE

God has blessed our church's ministry to the deaf for 100 years; surely He will continue to bless it in the future.

We may go about it in ways different from the ways of the past, but the Lord's saving Gospel will continue to be proclaimed to the 2 million unchurched Americans who cannot hear.

Your prayers and contributions are always appreciated. If so inclined, you might also contact your local deaf missionary to see what kind of help he needs. Perhaps you could volunteer to help find deaf children, teach Sunday School, become an interpreter, or do secretarial work for a deaf congregation.

With your help, and God's favor, the work will continue to flourish throughout its next century.

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What Is The ILDA?



The International Lutheran Deaf Association (ILDA) commenced its ministry during its first biennial convention in Chicago in 1971. The purpose, according to the revised constitution is "to coordinate and strengthen the religious activities and services in our congregations to help promote their growth to the highest possible level in service to their Lord and Savior, to promote the Christian faith and life of Lutheran Deaf people, other deaf individuals and others with whom we associate, and to carry on our ministry throughout the world."

The ILDA shall communicate and convey to the deaf members, the programs, plans and goals of the Lutheran Church-Missouri Synod. It shall support lay-leadership among deaf Lutherans in all areas of faith and life.

In 1975, the members voted on the ratification of the revised constitution. The historic document will help develop the ILDA image and facilitate the operation and administration of the association. The members also supported the goal of recruiting as many lay people as possible and getting them actively involved in ILDA affairs.

In 1987, the aim of ILDA was to carry out the objectives of serving the Lord in His church and to obtain the financial support that would lead to self-sufficiency. It was hoped that many programs and projects for the ministry and mission of the ILDA will become a reality.

Membership in the ILDA is open to all deaf, and is divided into three categories: ACTIVE, ASSOCIATE and SUSTAINING.

The ILDA relies on its official publication, THE DEAF LUTHERAN, to convey information of its activities and services to Deaf Lutherans.

As we near the end of the first 100 years of the ministry to the Deaf, the ILDA boldly faces the challenges of a new century as a completely self-supporting organization in the Lutheran Church-Missouri Synod and will continue its mission of outreach programs wherever such opportunities exist. Our plans call for a Centennial celebration of Deaf Ministry in conjunction with the 1995 convention of the Lutheran Church-Missouri Synod and the ILDA which will be held in Chicago, Illinois.

GOD'S 1,000 CLUB

God's 1,000 Club was established by the ILDA Board of Directors and it aims to continue to grow.

The name "God's 1,000 Club" was chosen because, first of all, the work of ILDA is to get the Good News of God's Son to the Deaf everywhere. 1,000 represented the number of donors or club members, we hope to enlist.

People who become members in God's 1,000 Club are asked to contribute \$10.00 each year thereafter. This is not a part of the regular ILDA dues and it does not pay for a subscription to THE DEAF LUTHERAN. Any donations given to God's 1,000 Club, can only be used to help pay the expenses of ILDA board meetings. * (For details, see the ILDA Treasurer)

ILDA LOGO AND BANNER

The 1981 ILDA Convention Committee from Los Angeles, CA were busy planning and discussing ILDA's official logo to be put on stage to show who we represent as an organization. Since Archie Marshall did such an outstanding job of designing the ILDA Logo from a contest several years before the Los Angeles convention. The convention committee decided to make a banner using Archie Marshall's design and that the banner be passed on biennially to the next convention host. It was also suggested that the ILDA Banner and convention theme banner be on stage at every ILDA Convention.

Mrs. Ferol Hauptman (Rev. August Hauptman's wife) and Mrs. Marion Anderson both have graciously volunteered to make the ILDA Banner. The convention committee helped them to decide what color the banner should be made. At approximately two months prior to the convention, Mrs. Hauptman and Mrs. Anderson completed the banner and brought it to the convention committee for viewing. The committee just loved the banner. So today, the banner continues to be on display from convention to convention.

How ILDA Became a Reality

Early in the 30's (1934) and the 40's Pastor Theodore Frederking First proposed a national gathering of the LC-MS Deaf. However, his suggestion was not implemented until twenty years later in 1961 at Ephphatha Conference when he, together with Pastor Wayne Bottlinger and Rev. August Hauptman, was delegated to serve on a committee which was to study the proposal, provide cost estimates and suggest ways and means of meeting the cost. They were to report to the Conference in 1962.

Again nothing came of the study until several years later. In 1965 the convention of the Synod passed resolutions adopting the Mission Affirmations and merging the several boards for Missions into a single Board. Following these actions (which terminated the old Board for Missions to the Deaf, January 1966) the church's Ministry to the Deaf came under special review with the proposal that the North American Districts of the Synod become responsible for the administration and subsidy of local deaf congregations.

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The 1967 Convention of the Synod in New York City (Memorial 1-09) designated the Regional advisors as an AD HOC Committee to study the matter of Administration. Part of the materials produced by the AD HOC Committee contained seventeen (17) basic concerns in Ministry to the Deaf. One of the concerns stated was that the deaf congregations remain united. If the North American Districts are to administer the work, the national unity of this ministry would be threatened. "Thus, at the November 1-2, 1968, meeting of the Board for Missions, the Secretary for the Ministry to the Deaf, Rev. Herbert Rohe, proposed several measures resulting from the AD HOC Committee study, namely: 1) that the Board for Missions continue to sponsor the Ephphatha Conference as an Official pastoral conference (thus assuring and perpetuating unity among the workers in this Ministry): 2) that as a means of developing lay-leadership in the work among the deaf, the Board for Missions establish an INTERNATIONAL LUTHERAN DEAF ASSOCIATION (thus maintaining and assuring a national unity, visibility, and self-determination among deaf congregations, see Attachment #1, minutes of the Board for Missions meeting, November 1-2, 1968, Page 17 item 252 (c) "development of Lay-Leadership in the work among the deaf:" that the synod in 1969 observe the 75th Anniversary of the work among the deaf.

Early in 1969 the action of the Board for Missions was announced in the Deaf Lutheran. Pastor Rohe also reported this to the Regional Conferences and Ephphatha Conferences in 1969. In his report, "WHAT'S NEW FOR THE DEAF IN THE 70'S? (April 15, 1969) These measures also came before the Denver Convention in 1969.

However, when Resolution 1-18 was defeated, the resolution regarding ILDA did not come for a vote. However, in the following months the Board for Missions steadfastly held to the establishment of an ILDA. The Constitution of ILDA was drawn up and proposed to the AD HOC Committee, to the Board for Missions (September 15, 1969) and Ephphatha Conference. The Board for Missions revived the Seventeen Concerns to the AD HOC Committee and again proposed the establishment of INTERNATIONAL LUTHERAN DEAF ASSOCIATION. All regions were urged to study the Constitution of ILDA.

In the fall of 1969 the Regional advisors again met to study it. In December of 1969 the Board for Missions' staff again approved for the Board for Missions the policy statement regarding district administration, guidelines for Ministry to the Deaf, and regions and Regional Advisors. In 1970 the proposed Constitution (dated April 29, 1970) was sent to all congregations. On June 22 and 23, 1970 the Regional Advisors met with lay representatives from each region at Concordia College, Milwaukee, Wis.. (prior to Ephphatha Conference) for a planning meeting. Plans were laid for a constituting Convention in Chicago, Illinois July 16-18, 1971.

PRESENT FOR THIS HISTORIC MEETING WERE THE FOLLOWING:

Rev. William Ludwig and Mr. Clarence Schulz,	representing Great Lakes R.

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ILDA Challenge and Opportunity for the Deaf and Overseas

The most important decision in the history of ILDA was made in October of 1969, when the seven regional pastoral advisors, and Rev. Herbert Rohe, secretary for ministry to the deaf agreed that ILDA should be an organization of, by, and for the the decision implemented the resolution of the board for missions deaf. (September 1969) regarding a national deaf organization. In June of 1970, with a proposed Constitution in hand, seven deaf delegates and the regional advisors began planning our present ILDA organizing convention. Many more meetings were held both nationally and locally to plan and organize our convention the weekend and coordinate the on-going work of the association. One aspect of ILDA's on going involves the administration of deaf missions in the Lutheran Church. Various proposals have been suggested but they all have one thing in common. ILDA will participate in and strengthen the structure of deaf missions in the future. The need for the deaf to have a voice in the planning of their mission is not new, nor is the concept of a National Lutheran Organization. The concept of ILDA was proposed more than thirty years ago by a very enthusiastic Rev. Theodore Frederking. His is the real "Father of ILDA." ILDA is a great challenge and wonderful opportunity for the Lutheran deaf. ILDA is their organization, and it will be run by deaf laymen rather than by pastors and synodical officials. Therefore, everyone deaf and hearing laymen and professional - must pray unceasingly and work enthusiastically, for the success of ILDA. We pray that ILDA will be used by the Lord to help bring people (both deaf and hearing) to know and love their savior Jesus Christ.

St. Matthew Lutheran Church of the Deaf, Elmhurst, N.Y.

In 1970, the International Lutheran Deaf Association (ILDA) was formed. This group of 1,500 predominantly deaf lay-persons is an outgrowth of the former Lutheran Deaf Mission Society, which was responsible for the establishment of several overseas ministries among the deaf in India, Nigeria, Taiwan, Japan, Brazil and Hong Kong. The ILDA assists with and recruits for LCMS deaf ministries at home and abroad. Today, the church in Hong Kong sponsors Mongkok School, the largest Lutheran school for the Deaf in the world. Concordia School for the Deaf, in Brazil, is a rapidly expand ministry for deaf students. The Lutheran Church in Ghana, assisted by Deaf Lay Leaders, is ministering to deaf people among the Ashanti people of Kumasai, Ghana.

Planning Meeting of 1970 for First Convention

EACH CONGREGATION WAS REQUESTED TO SUPPORT ILDA WITH A CONTRIBUTION OF \$125.00 IN 1971.

FIRST ILDA CONVENTION HELD IN CHICAGO, ILL. JULY 16-19, 1971.

On August 21, 1970, Pastor Herbert Rohe sent a letter to the Regional Advisors and The Regional Representatives calling for a planning meeting on September 6-7, 1970, at Hotel Sheration, Michigan Avenue, Chicago, III. Rev. Charles Jones made arrangements with the Hotel Sheraton for the meeting and hosted the meeting. Each region had been given the convention program assignments which were to be complemented at the September Chicago meeting.

All pastors and congregations received copy of the ILDA Constitution in the fall of 1970 (September-October). On October 3, 1970, the regional advisors' meeting in St. Louis, Missouri received a bulletin and letter from Trinity Lutheran Church of the Deaf, Pittsburgh, Penna. with copy of the letter to all deaf congregations urging ILDA convention be postponed till 1972. This request was repeated again on December 7, 1970, when the pastor of Trinity Congregation in Pittsburgh sent a letter to Pastor William Ludwig, Regional Advisors in their meeting in February of 1971. However, in spite of these pleas to the contrary, the overwhelming consensus to continue the planning for convention in 1971 prevailed.

Thus, on July 16-19, 1971, the convention was held at O'Hare-Hyatt House in Chicago, III. "FORWARD WITH CHRIST" was the theme of the convention.

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The ILDA convention emblem was adopted at this meeting via a contest conducted by the Midwest Region. The emblem submitted in the contest by Mr. Archie Marshall of St. Louis, Missouri won the contest and was therefore, adopted as the INTERNATIONAL LUTHERAN DEAF ASSOCIATION emblem.

Dr. William Kohn, Executive Secretary of the Synod's Board for Missions, was the keynote speaker at the opening sessions of the convention on Saturday morning. Mr. Robert O. Lankenau, president of the National Association of the Deaf, was the quest speaker at the banquet on Saturday night. Dr. J.A. Preus, President of the Lutheran Church-Missouri Synod, was the quest preacher at the Sunday A.M. closing rally service.

Donald Mowl (Richard Crossen) moved that the INTERNATIONAL LUTHERAN DEAF ASSOCIATION is officially organized in the year of 1971 and recorded in the Secretary's book. Passed.

THE BEGINNING OF ILDA BY CLARENCE SCHULZ



During the year of 1968 Rev. William Ludwig had been searching for available men to represent the Great Lakes

Clarence Schulz Chairman of ILDA Great Lakes Area Region of the Deaf and

attend the meeting in preparation of forming ILDA. After narrowing to two men, he chose me to represent at the first meeting in Milwaukee on the weekend of June 22, 1970. I was certainly pleased to be honored to do so. Seven representatives and advisors including one from Canada were at meeting.

We studied the proposed constitution and offered suggestions The constitution was for revision. prepared with the help of C.O.S.D. in cooperation of Missouri Synod Mission Board. The pastoral advisors deserve appreciation for their part in encouraging and the starting foundation of International Lutheran Deaf Association. Without them, I doubt that the meeting could go smooth.

In this meeting temporary officers to conduct the constituting convention were chosen. I was the chairman.

We decided after long and careful consideration to select for the convention of ILDA July 16-18, 1971

in Chicago, III. Chicago, as you know, is always an ideal location for conventions, especially the first one for ILDA. In coincidence, we were to observe the commemoration of the 75th Anniversary of our ministry to the deaf.

Again in the fall of 1970 we were called to Chicago for another constitution. After the meeting on Sunday I was on the committee to tour to locate the suitable hotel for ILDA Convention. However, the site was undecided and left in the hands of Rev. Jones who, being the pastor for the deaf in Chicago, had time to search and located the right side.

The two meetings in Milwaukee and Chicago were no play and good We had some difficult times. questions and some proposed parts of the constitution were weighed carefully. Of course, we did not expect the perfect results of the meetings, but we tried as best as possible to the satisfaction to all of the deaf, even every one of you Excuse my-off beam, some here. of you may heave read the history of how the constitution of America was prepared the hard way, and the delegates, properly chosen, stayed and worked hard in Philadelphia for more than thirty days. As result the constitution was and is acclaimed the best possible. So you must understand that study to and propose the constitution for International Lutheran Deaf Association was no easy matter.

Finally, the convention of ILDA on July 16-18, 1971 was reality and success... You have read the results in "DEAF LUTHERAN", and good pictures were appreciably shown. I need not go any further in details. Some of you were there to observe the first convention. It was a long-awaited fulfillment of a dream. That is why I must be here to keep you fully informed and help building a stronger link of Great Lakes Region and ILDA.

Now the first convention in Chicago went down in history as the milestone for the deaf achievement. You are the voice. You have the rights and demands for recognition which is legally formed organization...INTERNATIONAL

LUTHERAN DEAF ASSOCIATION.

Although the first part of the constitution was approved and adopted, the latter parts have not been approved or changed because of the insufficient time and are now left in the hands of the Board of Please take my advice Directors. that if you want any suggestion to change or add to the constitution, give them to Evelyn DeMeyere, an official vice-president on the board of Directors. She would submit directly the results of any action from Great Lakes Region to ILDA.

In conclusion it is my feeling that to keep International Lutheran Deaf Association well functioning within the constitution for steady growth we need to rely on the pastoral advisors and participants and of experienced course. the deaf leaders who have their knowledge or abilities in their specified fields of the deaf such as National Association of the Deaf or state and local organizations. I hope hence forth the ILDA is and will be recognized a the growing strength of the Deaf Lutherans in America.

I like to repeat, as I said in Chicago as the acting chairman in mv message of introduction. that International Lutheran Deaf Association is our organization of the Lutherans. bv Deaf Deaf Lutherans, and for deaf Lutherans.

The future of International Lutheran Deaf Association depends on everyone of you. May God through our Lord Jesus Christ help us!

The first International Lutheran Deaf Association (ILDA) Convention opening service was held on Friday, July 16, 1971, at 8:30 PM, United Room, Regency Hyatt House in Chicago, Illinois. Rev. Russel Johnson of Detroit, Michigan led the opening worship service which included the commissioning of Whilhelm R. Wegner of Delavan, Wisconsin, and Robert Oettel of Chicago, Illinois as the Lay Ministers to the Deaf. The opening and closing hymns were given by Mrs. Evelyn De Meyere and Mrs. Genevieve The Scripture lessons, Mark Klein. 7:31-37 and Acts 16:105, were read by the Lay Ministers to the Deaf. The commissioning officials were Rev. William Bartling of Franklin Park, Illinois, and Martin Kosche Rev. of Delavan. Wisconsin.

After the special service, we had an informal fellowship.

The first bi-annual meeting of ILDA Convention session was held on Saturday, July 17, 1971, at 8:30 AM at the Rosemont Ballroom, Regency Hyatt House in Chicago.

The opening devotion was given by Rev. Myron Prok. His topic was "Has it happened to You", based on the Gospel of Matthew. The Ohio group choir sand a song, "Oh, For a Thousand Tongues."

Pro-tem President Clarence Schulz opened the meeting session with the comments and thanked to all the pastors and others for the help of getting the ILDA organized, and explained how the ILDA started.

The president introduced the keynote speaker, Rev. William Kohn, the chairman of Division of Missions, The Lutheran Church-Missouri Synod, and he challenged us to proclaim the Gospel, to share in the work of the church, to communicate Christ's love and forgiveness.

The president thanked Rev. Kohn for the speech.

The business meeting opened with the revision of the 1971 ILDA Constitution. The President introduced the pro-tem officers- Vice President Ted Brighton; Secretary Robert Baker; Treasurer Warren Riege; Chairman of Nominations Gary Schlub; Chairman of Displays Billy Fitzgerald; and the Parliamentarian Marion Van Manen. The President explained about the Rules of Order, and time; the Constitution should comply with Handbook the of the Lutheran Church-Missouri Synod, as shown by Mr. Van Manen.

Mrs. Arneson moved that on page 2, Line 42, under article III, strike out the words, "Not conflict", and insert "be in harmony". Seconded by Mrs. Lillian Long. Passed.

Mr. Archie Marshall moved that on Page 2, Line 55, under Article IV, strike out the word "individuals" and insert "active in deaf affairs". A. Arneson seconded. Passed.

Mr. Long moved that on Page 2, Line 60, "active in deaf affairs" be inserted between the words "Lutheran...of", and not to hold office;" on Line 61, after "one vote." Seconded by Elise Berg. Passed.

The Resolution Committee was appointed by President Schulz. The names are Mrs. Rae DeRose, Mr. Uriel Jones and Rev. W.O. Neisch, Chairman.

Adjourned for lunch.

The meeting was resumed after the lunch by the three songs given by Mrs. Evelyn DeMeyere, Mrs. Julie Soncrant, and Mrs. Emma Mappes.

Rev. Charles Jone introduced Mrs. Warneck of DesPlaines, Illionois. She brought greeting from Mrs. Naomi Warth of Brazil. She worked with the deaf children there.

President introduced Mr. Robert Lankenau, the president of N.A.D. and gave a short comment.

We started with the revising of ILDA Constitution on Page 3, Line 85. Mrs. DeRose moved that "deaf and shall be" Seconded by Arthur Anderson. Passed. Mr. Warren Riege moved that "the regional officers shall designate his alternate from among themselves" be inserted after Line 117, on Page 3, "at a meeting..."; and strike out the words, "he shall...of his region: on lines 117 and 118. Bob Mercer seconded. Passed.

Rev. William Ludwig moved that in the last six (6) remaining pages and because of lack of time during the ILDA session, that we tentatively adopt the rest of the Constitution and request the Board of Directors to study and revise it, and present it to the next ILDA Convention. Passed.

Mr. Warren Riege moved that at the next convention we are to have four (4) days of convention, instead of three (3) days, because lack of time and unable to finish our work. Harvey Boldt seconded. Passed.

Mr. Donald Mowl moved that the Nominating Committee be formed with Clarence Schulz as chairman with four (4) names now. Seconded by Richard Crossen. The four names are Dale Paden, Warren Riege, R. Crossen, and Archie Marshall. Kansas City, Missouri has volunteered to be the next host for the ILDA Convention in 1973.

Warren Riege moved that the host city be responsible for the preparation of the program for the next convention. Harvey Boldt seconded. Passed.

Mr. D. Mowl suggested us to have three (3) colors for the ILDA Banner. Ben Beaver moved that we have the ILDA banner of white and blue color with the red for border. Dale Paden seconded. Passed. This was with an understanding that the Board of Directors will make the final decision on the colors of the ILDA Banner.

President Schulz thanked the committee (Dixie Region) for the arrangement of the displays in the exhibition hall.

Warren Riege moved that each ILDA member pay one (1) dollar a year to help the ILDA treasury. Harvey Boldt seconded. Passed.

Archie Marshall amended that we raise the registration fee from one (1) to two (2) dollars. Passed.

D. Mowl moved that the ILDA is officially organized in the year of 1971 and recorded in the secretary book. D. Grossen seconded. Passed.

Mr. Gary Schulb was introduced as Chairman of Nominations for 1971 before voting for the new officers, Gary Schulb gave us the names of each office to vote on. The convention voted by secret ballot. The new officers will be announced at the banquet tonight.

The meeting adjourned at 4:30 PM.

Rev. William Lange gave a closing prayer.

The banquet program was started at 7:30 PM with the dinner in the Rosemont Ballroom in Regency Hyatt House. The Master of Ceremonies was Rev. Herbert Rohe, Secretary for Ministry to the Deaf, The Lutheran Church-Missouri Synod.

With the recognition of pro-tem officers of ILDA, Rev. H. Rohe announced Mr. Marion Van Manen as new President, Mr. uriel Jones as President-Elect, Robert Baker as Secretary, and Gary Schulb as Treasurer.

The banquet speaker, Robert O. Lankenau, President of the National Association of the Deaf, urged ILDA to take an active part in the future of the deaf world and to be active in behalf of the welfare of the deaf.

The musical painting was demonstrated by Mr. John Morsman, of Elgin, Illinois. Each guest receivied a serigraph print copy of this painting at the end of the banquet.

Rev. William Ludwig gave the opening prayer. President Clarence Schulz opened a short meeting on Sunday Morning, July 18, 1971 at United Room (?), Regency Hyatt House, Chicago. He announced the next convention will be at Kansas City, Missouri in 1973.

Rev. Herbert Rohe gave a comment about the Council of Organizations Serving the Deaf (C.O.S.D.) and he thanked to Rev. Charles Jones and the Chicago host committees, laymen and officers for succesful convention.

President Shulz wanted the Resolution Committee to give the resolution before church service:

Whereas, the smooth progress of an organizing convention requires the cooperation of many persons functioning in a variety of capacities, and

Whereas, the blessings of God have attended plans and sessions of ILDA's first convention, for which we give Him praise and thanks with joy:

THEREFORE be it resolved to thank also all persons who helped make this first convention of ILDA a success, namely Dr. J.A. Preus and Dr. William Kohn for taking time in their busy schedule of church work to be with us here, to the Convention Committee for detailed planning, to the temporary officers who served us well, to the members of the Constitution Committee who spent hours writing and rewriting the ILDA constitution, to the Regional Committees, and other contributors as listed on page 15 of your convention booklet, and to the staff of regency Hyatt House who made our stay a pleasant one.

WHEREAS, the first convention of ILDA has been a wonderful experience for the many persons registered:

THEREFORE, be it resolved that we accept the generous invitation to Kansas City, extended by Pastor Al Ferber and the deaf of that area, for the 2nd ILDA convention in that city in 1973.

Rev. William Ludwig was the liturgist, Rev. Rodney Rynearson was the interpreter, Mr. John Riddlebaugh was the Lay Leader, Mrs. Evelyn DeMeyere was the choir director, choir was given by Great Lakes region members, and the installing official was Rev. Herbert Rohe.

FRIDAY, JULY 16, 1971

The International Lutheran Deaf Association held its first convention at the Regency Hyatt House in Chicago, IL., July 16- 18. the opening service was held in the United Room at 8:30 P.M. on Friday, July 16th. The chaplain was Rev. Russell Johnson of Detroit, MI. Hymns were sung by Mrs. Evelyn DeMeyere and Mrs. Geneive Klein. Two layworkers were installed during the service. After the service, there were committee meetings about the constitution and bylaws of the of the ILDA. It was reported that \$3,005.81 was in the ILDA treasury.

SATURDAY - JULY 17, 1971

The meeting opened at 8:30 a.m. in the Rosemont Ballroom. The devotion was given by Rev. Myron Prok of Cleveland, OH., and their choir sang. Chairman (pro-tem) Clarence Schulz talked about ILDA. Then Dr. William Kohn, chairman of the division of missions (LCMS) was the keynote speaker. He expressed joy about ILDA being organized and asked the Deaf to work together and bring Jesus and His love to all the Deaf in the world. He assured the group of the continued support of the Board for Missions. He spoke about 30 minutes and after his speech, Rev. Herbert Rohe spoke briefly about "FORWARD WITH CHRIST".

The Constitution was then discussed. A vote of 37-22 kept the name ILDA. It was decided that Associate members were not entitled to vote or to hold office. Chairman Schulz chose a Resolutions Committee Betty Brocket & Rev. W. Neisch.

After accepting part of the Constitution with minor changes, it was decided to accept the Constitution and By Laws tentatively in order to proceed with the election of officers. The election followed and the following were elected: Marion J. Van Manen of Sunnyvale, CA., - President; Uriel Jones of Knoxville, TN., President Elect; Robert Baker of Kansas City, MO., - Secretary; and Gary Schlub of Lanham, MD., - Treasurer.

Saturday evening the Convention Banquet began at 7:30 P.M. with 378 in attendance. Rev. Herbert Rohe was the Master of Ceremonies. He gave recognition to the Temporary ILDA officers. The banquet speaker was Robert Lankenau, NAD President. For entertainment, Mr. John Mosiman of Elgin, IL., painted two musical paintings. - The Grand Canyon and the Healing Bethesda.
SUNDAY - JULY 18, 1971

Business meeting began at 9 A.M. The convention accepted the invitation of the members of Pilgrim Congregation of Kansas City, MO., to meet there in the summer of 1973. It was decided to meet for four days at that time. Warren Riege made the motion that the host congregation be in charge of all programs for our conventions.

Don Mowl made a motion to have the President choose 4 for the Nominating Committee. Chairman Schulz then chose the following to serve on the Nominating Committee: Dale Paden (chairman), Dick Crossen, Archie Marshall and Warren Riege.

Chairman Schulz thanked all the deaf from Chicago for their wonderful cooperation to make the first convention successful. Rev. Rohe announced about having the new officers to fill the vacancy on the COSD. Rev. Neisch reported for the Resolutions Committee.

Warren Riege of Wisconsin reported that he had received \$125.00 from 26 churches, which is a total of \$325.00 He spent out \$244.19 and has a balance of \$3,005.81. Warren made a motion to have members of ILDA to pay \$1.00 each year through their church and to drop the \$125.00 fee for the congregations. This motion passed 55 to 2.

Don Mowl of Washington, PA., and Richard Crossen of Columbus, OH., made the motion that the ILDA be officially organized. This motion passed with 36 delegates voting in favor of the motion and none opposed.

At 10:30 A.M. the Convention Festival Rally Service was held. The Rev. William Ludwig of Columbus, OH., was the Liturgist Serving as interpreter was Rev. Rodney Rynearson of Rochester, NY. The lay leader was John Riddlebaugh of Columbus, OH. The choir which consisted of members of the Great Lakes Region was directed by Mrs. Evelyn DeMeyere of Detroit, MI., Rev. Herbert Rohe of St. Louis installed the new officers. The sermon was given by Dr. J.A.O. Preus, President of the Lutheran Church Missouri Synod. Holy Communion was celebrated. Approximately 400 were in attendance.

First Meeting of ILDA Board of Directors

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On November 11-13, 1971, the first meeting of the ILDA Board of Directors was held in St. Louis, Mo. All officers and Regional representatives were present except Pearl Goff and Warren King. Mr. Warren Riege, former treasurer pro-tem, was also present. Plans were made for 1973 convention in Kansas City, Mo.

The theme: "Sharing Love In Christ," was selected and program assignments were given to each of the several regions in preparation for the convention.

In 1972, due to lack of funds, it was not possible for the Board of Directors to meet. However, on November 3-4, 1972, the Executive Committee of ILDA met at the Muehlenbach Hotel in Kansas City, Mo. In addition to the officers of the Board of Directors and six visitors from the host Midwest Region attended the meeting.

In addition to continuing plans for the 1973 Convention, revision of the constitution was given considerate time at the Executive Committee meeting, and several matters proposed by the Board for Missions were considered on February 10-12, 1972, the Board for Missions passed a resolution requesting ILDA to assume responsibility for LC-MS Membership on the Board of COSD, effective upon ratification of the ILDA Convention in 1973.

President Van Manen and Gary Schlub as alternate were designated as the first representatives of ILDA to be proposed to the 1973 convention for ratification.

In September 21-23, 1972, the Board for Missions passed a resolution asking ILDA to consider becoming responsible for the publishing, editing, and business management of the Deaf Lutheran with subsidy from the Board for Missions on a declining scale until ILDA could pick up on its own.

Did you know that?

God told Moses 1,500 B.C. that the deaf and other handicapped persons are also His. Therefore, we are not to neglect nor despise these people of God. God's message of Salvation in Christ is to be brought to these people too. In 1893 a deaf man pleaded that Synod recognize the deaf as part of Christ's great Commission "to preach the Gospel to all nations."

The Mission to the deaf was Synods second mission begun in 1896 the Synod has over 200 pastors who served as missionaries to the deaf.

The Mission has grown from 16 communicants in 1896 to over 6,000 in 1994 and in 1896 and there are over 12,000 deaf Lutherans in the world.

Today there are over 760 LC-MS professionally trained pastors, teachers and lay ministers serving the deaf full time and 400 part time volunteers over 200 cities, 43 state schools for the Deaf and over other institutions where there are deaf people.

Our pastors and workers also minister to persons who are doubly handicapped, both deaf and blind 200 members of LC-MS.

Your missionaries conduct over 5000 services each year to total attendance of more than 150,000.

Total communicant deaf membership in the Synod numbers some 4,000, representing 33 of 35 LCMS districts and 42 states.

There are 5 Lutheran Schools for the Deaf overseas.

There are 2 Lutheran Schools for the Deaf in the United States; One in Detroit (now called Lutheran Special Education Ministries) over 143 old and Mill-Neck Manor School for the Deaf in New York which is over 43 years old.

There are 13,000,000 hearing-impaired people in North America; and over 2,000,000 profoundly deaf people of all ages in the United States. Of these 32,700 deaf children and 56,100 hard of hearing children are in the United States schools. There are 6 deaf persons serving full time in our ministry.

The Deaf Lutheran is the major religious bi-monthly paper in the world, published exclusively for the deaf. Its editor and business manager are both deaf Lutherans. It has a bi-monthly readership of over 10,000 with nearly 5000 paid subscribers. It has been published since 1909.

Our deaf Lutheran is the LC-MS contribute over 320,000 annually for the work of the Lord.

The International Lutheran Deaf Association was founded by the LC-MS deaf churches in 1971. This association meets bi-annually in convention.

The Ephphatha Conference is the name of the official LC-MS Annual Conference of workers among the deaf. It has been sponsored by the Synod's Board for Mission services since 1903.

There are 80 LC-MS members in the conference.

The LC-MS Ministry to the Deaf is cooperating with the ALC and LCA in a joint LCUSA sponsored project to develop a registry of all Lutheran deaf persons in the U.S. and Canada.

LC-MS Districts assist Deaf Ministries in their work with support totaling more than \$1,300,000.

Classes for seminary students in training for Ministry to the deaf has been conducted at both seminaries since 1896.

"History of Deaf Lutheran"

The initial request of the deaf to publish their own periodical came as early as 1902. The Board, in concurrence with the Synodical Convention, however, felt that the time was not yet ripe for a separate publication. Instead The Lutheran Pioneer was used for dissemination of information. A separate publication was urged because the deaf were unable to read <u>German Der Lutheraner</u>.

From 1902 until 1908 the PIONEER, as of course, DER LUTHERANER and THE LUTHERAN WITNESS kept the special interests of the deaf in mind.

A farewell editorial in the LUTHERAN PIONEER indicates:

The number will likely be the last issue of this extra edition of the Lutheran Pioneer with "among the Deaf" appended, since it is proposed from January the first next to publish a new paper under the name of <u>DEAF LUTHERAN</u> for the direct benefit of our deaf throughout our various missions. Such a paper has became a necessity for various reasons, and we hope that all who have hitherio subscribed to this extra edition of PIONEER would now become subscribers to the DEAF LUTHERAN. The new publication was, however, in no way to crowd out the PIONEER in its original form, but we hope that, since both follow different lines, readers of the one will be and remain readers also of the other.

In January 1909 THE DEAF LUTHERAN made its appearance, edited from 1711 Meinecke Ave. As you might surprise, T. Wangerin served as the first editor, the publication was launched as a four-page monthly, 10 1/2 X 7 1/2 inches, and remained in that form until the revisions in January 1954.

Already in the first editorial, Editor Wagnerin announced the purposes of the publication. We regret that Volume 1 was not available for this study, since it is not filed at Concordia Historical Institute. We quote from the Dahms series: In the name of God we launch on the sea of enterprise a new periodical which was to be published monthly in the interests of the deaf of our various missions and is known as the DEAF LUTHERAN. It contains articles for the spiritual and moral betterment of its readers as well as news items from the various Lutheran deaf circles, thus keeping its readers in touch and sympathy with each other. It proposes to clear away misunderstandings and wrong notions as to LUTHERANISM. It will show what true LUTHERANISM stands for, what it believes, teaches and confesses in word and deed. It is to be a Christian Hearld, A Lutheran instructor with the object of enlarging and improving the religious and spiritual knowledge of its readers.

Initially the magazine cost only 25 cents per year; January 1921- It was raised to 35 cents and in 1923 to 50 cents per year. During the depression price reduced to 25 cents per year (July 1933) and in December 1950 restored to 50 cents. Another increase occurred in January 1959 to \$1.00 per year. in 1967 to \$2.00. In 1969, under blanket plan, \$1.00 per year. In 1970 to \$2.00. In 1971 it was raised to \$3.00 per year. In September 1980, it was raised to \$3.50 per year. In October 1982 it was raised to \$5.00 per year for individual, under blanket plan, \$3.50 per year.

Another increase occurred in January 1959 to \$1.00 per year. in 1967 to \$2.00. In 1969, under blanket plan, \$1.00 per year. In 1970 to \$2.00. In 1971 it was raised to \$3.00 per year. In September 1980, it was raised to \$3.50 per year. In October 1982 it was raised to \$5.00 per year for individual, under blanket plan, \$3.50 per year.

In November 1983 the price reduced to \$4.00 for individual and for the blanket plan was the same \$3.50 per year. In September 1987 it raised to \$4.50 for the blanket plan and \$5.00 for individual per year.

The publication now launches as eight-page Bi-monthly, 8 1/2 X 11 inches and remains in that form as its present format.

In September 1991 it raised to \$5.50 for the blanket plan and \$6.00 for individual fee per year.

REPORT OF THE EDITOR INTERNATIONAL LUTHERAN DEAF ASSOCIATION Schaumburg, Illinois June 29-July 2, 1995

It is my privilege to present to you, the members of the Executive Council and the Board of Directors, my report for the 11th year of my tenure as the Editor of our publication, <u>THE DEAF LUTHERAN</u>, in its 85th year.

I am pleased to inform you that the paper continues to be on a sound financial footing and at the present time, we are not experiencing any financial problems of the kind we had a few years ago.

What improvement could be made, if it were possible, would be an increase in our readership base. Most churches and congregations no longer subsidize subscriptions as they once did, due to financial constraints. This has cut heavily into the number of subscriptions we have had in the past. It would appear that most readers would enjoy a free paper rather than paying for it.

This truth has been borne out by the difficulty the Business Manager sometimes has with getting churches to send in renewals. As big-hearted as he is, he has in some cases permitted readers to continue to enjoy the paper long after expirations were sent. It is difficult to cancel as long as hope remains that a renewal will come in.

For many years, the Council and the Board has considered plans whereby readers and ILDA members would get the paper free in conjunction with membership dues. For one reason or another, no plan to do this has ever won approval, usually for pecuniary disagreements.

It seems to be human nature that it is much easier to spend five dollars for lunch downtown than to pay the same amount for a year's subscription to a paper that continues to come long after the lunch is gone. Likewise, spending upwards \$500 or more to bowl at a tournament is easier than renewing church membership or supporting it. Perhaps we should not attempt to argue with an instinct.

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Publishing News of Interest to Deaf Lutherans The Lutheran Church — Missouri Synod I would like to encourage everyone here, especially our Regional Presidents, to encourage their churches and membership to subscribe to <u>THE DEAF LUTHERAN</u>, if they are not already doing so. The paper has been in continous publication since 1909 and we hope to see its 100th year come to pass in just 15 more years.

If you have any events that are newsworthy , send the information in. I would also want to remindyou that advertising is free to all ILDA connected events. So send it in.

The life of Uriel C. Jones

Mr. Uriel C. Jones of Knoxville, Tenn. was hired as editor and subscription manger of the Deaf Lutheran by Synod's Board for Missions, January 1, 1972. Uriel came to St. Louis with an excellent background in printing and editing and is well qualified to serve as an editor. A graduate of Gallaudet College in 1924, Uriel earned his master's degree in 1943 from the University of Tennessee. His professional career centered in teaching deaf young people. He was a classroom teacher and printing instructor at the Idaho School for the Deaf (1924-1928); a classroom teaches and printing instructor at the Mississippi for the Deaf (1928-1936) where he edited the DEAF MISSISSIPPIAN; and an editor of the TENNESSEE OBSERVER (1936-1971) at the Tennessee School for the Deaf, Knoxville, Tenn., where he was a printing instructor for 10 years and the vocational principal for 25 years.

His editing experience also included the vocational bulletin of the Convention of American Instructors of the Deaf (1939-1947), a Rotarian Club publication (1960-1966), and numerous school yearbooks. During World War II he worked for the Knoxville, Tenn., Journal as an editorial assistant.

Uriel was well known on the national scene for his outspoken support of the potential of the deaf to succeed in all walks of life if given the education and the opportunity, and he has contributed articles on various subjects to many national publications, including the American Annuals of the Deaf and the Silent Worker. Well read and widely traveled, Uriel has often been called upon to speak at conventions and banquets across the country.

Although retired from active teaching, Uriel held membership in the following national organizations: Gallaudet College Alumni Association, the National Association of the Deaf, the Convention of American Instructors of the Deaf, the National Fraternal Society for the Deaf, and the Alexander Graham Bell Association for the Deaf.

Uriel was married, June 29, 1930, to Evelyn McMullen, whom the Lord has taken home on February 27, 1971. They were blessed with a son, Uriel Jr. of Greensboro, N.C. and a daughter, Barbara, who is now married to a Lutheran Pastor in Stillwater, Oklahoma.

On Thursday morning, February 10, 1977, Mr. Uriel C. Jones went home with the Lord. His daughter, Barbara Ulrich discovered that he died in his sleep. He was 74 years old.
