### HOW I.L.D.A. WAS ESTABLISHED IN 1971

In 1965 the Lutheran Church-Missouri Synod restructured its Board for Missions. In that change, Deaf Ministry became part of NorthAmerican Missions. Even though Deaf Ministry had regional meetings prior to that time, ministry was very dependent on the national board. Ephphatha Conference and various regions became more aware of the need for a national organization for deaf ministry which was a truly deaf Lutheran organization.



### In 1969, members of Ephphatha

Conference and representatives from the regions met and decided to establish the *International Lutheran Deaf Association*. The date for the first meeting was set for 1971. Because Deaf Ministry began in Chicago, it seemed right to have the first meeting again in that city, and Our Savior Lutheran Church of the Deaf volunteered to be the host for the first *ILDA*. 1971 was the 85th anniversary of the organization of that congregation, which is the oldest Lutheran deaf congregation in the United States.

Each region contributed \$125 as a start up fund for the first convention, and Our Savior hosted many fundraising events in order to help make the first event a success. The first two tasks were to set up a local convention committee and the second was to select a hotel. The local committee was chaired by Henry Niemeyer, President of Our Savior. It included his wife Evelyn, Arlene and Bob Arman, Alice Gober, Carl and Esther Heyer, Bill and Elizabeth Maiworm, and Betty Raskin. Pastor Charles Jones and Lay ministry Bob Oettel also helped the committee.

In deciding on a place for the first convention, the committee believed it should be close to O'Hare airport. At that time, the hotels on River Road were not built (except the Holiday Inn); so, Pastor Jones and Henry Niemeyer put on construction hard hats and walked through the Hyatt Regency O'Hare Hotel as it was being built. They selected meeting space only based on concrete and drawings. There were many meetings with the hotel people to arrange for the convention, and we all prayed that the hotel would be finished in the time for the convention. It happened that *ILDA* was the third convention held at the newly opened hotel in 1971, and the room rate was about \$40. When the first *ILDA* was held, they were still finishing part of the hotel, but it was beautiful, the food was excellent, and the glass elevators were exciting.

### HISTORY OF THE HOST CHURCHES OF NORTHERN ILLINOIS

1) Our Savior Lutheran Church of the Deaf is the oldest organized Lutheran Deaf Congregation in the United States, and according to our investigation it is the first congregation organized by the deaf. It's original name was THE EVANGELICAL LUTHERAN DEAF MUTE CONGREGATION OF OUR SAVIOR IN CHICAGO.

The congregation was started by Rev. August Reinke. He began preaching to 15 deaf people in 1894, and in 1896 it became an organized congregation. Pastor Reinke served the church until 1902, when his son Arthur took over and he served until approximately 1909. The third pastor served Our Savior until 1918, and while he was pastor they purchased a church on Crystal St. in Chicago.

In 1918, Rev. Dahms accepted the call to Our Savior and with that call came preaching stations. The pastor of Our Savior also served Western Michigan, Northwestern Indiana, and Northeastern Illinois. Pastor Dahms was also responsible for beginning the mission among the black deaf on the south side of Chicago. In 1922 a chapel with fellowship hall and parsonage was built at 1400 N. Ridgeway Ave. in Chicago.

In 1936, Rev. Dahms accepted a call to a hearing parish, and Our Savior called Rev. Ernest Scheibert as their pastor. Pastor Scheibert served Our Savior and most of the preaching stations until 1966 when he retired.

Our Savior was without a pastor from September, 1966 until June, 1967. They were served by Pastor Leroy Mason who was called to serve Ephphatha Congregation on the south side of Chicago in 1961. After issuing many calls, the congregation called a seminary candidate and Rev. Charles Jones was installed as the 6th pastor of Our Savior. In the summer of 1970, the members of Our Savior voted to sell the building they had built in 1922 and relocate on the northwest side of the city. The congregation met in a gymnasium for several years while they sought funds to get another building. In 1970, Our Savior issued a call with the **N**orthern **I**llinois **D**istrict (**NID**) to Mr. Bob Oetell - a lay ministry to serve the deaf in the Chicago area.

In 1971, Our Savior congregation had the honor of hosting the founding convention of the International Lutheran Deaf Association (I L D A).

In 1972, Pastor Jones accepted a call to Eastern New England, and Our Savior called Rev. John Nickerson to be their 7th pastor. Under Pastor Nickerson's guidance the congregation tried several different locations for worship in an effort to get greater involvement in church life. During that period Our Savior was involved in a period of team ministry while Mr. Oetell and Deaconess Grace Jewitt-Baranski worked with the two pastors in the Chicago area. Pastor Fred Allen was serving Ephphatha congregation at that time.

In 1978, Our Savior began worshipping at Our Lady's Lutheran Church on Gunnison Ave. in Chicago. They remained there until 1984, when they accepted the invitation of Mt. Calvary Lutheran Church in Franklin Park.

Our Savior congregation has been without a full time pastor since 1982.

Pastor Charles Jones accepted the call from the NID as a missionary-at-large and later on, Pastor Donald Friedrich assumed the position after Pastor Jones left. Also, Deaconess Laura Herman (Now Budzynski) joined the NID Deaf Ministry. In 1986, Pastor Friedrich accepted a call to Dallas, Texas.

In 1987, Pastor Carl Bassett was called by the NID as missionary-at-large until 1988 when he accepted a call to Calvary Lutheran Church of Wood Dale. Shortly, Pastor David Johnson accepted the call from Mt. Calvary and Our Savior as the pastor.

In 1989, after Pastor Johnson left Mt. Calvary and Our Savior, the members of Our Savior accepted the invitation from Calvary of Wood Dale to worship in their building.

In 1990, Pastor Mark Anderson accepted the call from the NID as a pastor-at-large. He currently serves Our Savior of Wood Dale, Rockford and Holy Cross of Cary.

2) Ephphatha Evangelical Lutheran Church of the Deaf as church records indicate, "Lutheran Missions to the Deaf (now known as Ephphatha) began in April, 1956 under the leadership of Rev. Richard Borchers. Lutheran Missions to the Deaf (LMD) held regular worship services at St. Phillips, Lutheran Church, which is the oldest black Lutheran congregation in the city of Chicago.

Records show that LMD began with nine (9) members. These nine founding Christians, all have memberships beginning in the church records of April, 1956. Presently, Mrs. Katie M. Brown, is the only one of the original nine members who is still among us on this earth.

When Pastor Borchers left, vicar Rodney R. Rynearson came to serve LMD in 1957. That year some 30 new people became members of LMD. After vicar Rynearson left, vicar Lee Roy Mason, served the church. After vicar Mason, the vicar W. Marten, served the church.

In 1959, LMD organized and became a congregation of the Lutheran Church Missouri Synod adopting the name of Ephphatha Evangelical Lutheran Church of the Deaf. Upon ordination Rev. Lee Roy Mason, became the pastor of Ephphatha and encouraged Synod to build a church building for the deaf.

On January 29, 1965 with over 300 people in membership, Ephphatha Evangelical Lutheran Church of the Deaf, at 7956 South Martin Luther King Drive, opened it's door for their first worship service.

In 1969, Rev. Mason left Ephphatha and shortly there after the Rev. Charles Jones became the vacancy pastor. Mr. Robert Oetell served as Lay Ministry during this vacancy.

In 1976, Ephphatha Evangelical Lutheran Church of the Deaf called The Rev. Fred H. Allen, the first and at that time the only black pastor serving the deaf. Pastor Allen served Ephphatha until May 1984.

On September 16, 1984, The Rev. Prentice D. Marsh, became the pastor of Ephphatha Evangelical Lutheran Church of the Deaf and holds this position to this day.

3) Rockford Lutheran Church of the Deaf as about the year 1945, Rev. Clarence Bremer, who did ministry work with deaf children and deaf adults in Delevan, Wisconsin, was the first pastor to set up a worship in Rockford, Illinois. He came once a month. Richard Nelson's mother wanted Richard to attend this service so that he could understand God's word through signs. Richard remembered a young man, Mr. Robert Case (possibly a trainee) helping Rev. Bremer for a short time.

After Rev. Bremer left, Rev. Schibert, from Chicago, took over. He came once a month to St. Paul Lutheran Church on Horsman and Locust. After Rev. Schibert, we did not wait very long before Rev. Mackenson who received a call doing ministry work in Delevan, Wisconsin, came to Rockford once a month and preached for about 3-4 years. He got a call to preach in another state with a hearing congregation.

After Rev. Mackenson left, Rev. Martin Kosche received a call to work in Delevan doing the same as former pastors. Rev. Kosche came to Rockford twice a month to preach in the afternoon, still at St. Paul's. In about the year of 1960, we moved to Concordia Lutheran Church in Loves Park, Illinois. Our members were not happy with Loves Park being so far away, so we looked for a more centrally located church in Rockford. We found Redeemer Lutheran Church on 8th Avenue and 16th Street. This was favorable with our members. It has been our church location since then.

Rev. Kosche was with us for 21 years. Policy changed and our church was placed under the Northern Illinois District (NID). That was when Rev. Ron Friedrich came in as our pastor, as well as pastor in Chicago, and Aurora, Illinois. Rev. Friedrich stayed with us for seven years, during his tenure in Illinois, we had a vicar, named John Fritz. Rev. Fritz is now pastor in Aurora. After Friedrich, we had no pastor for awhile, but Rev. Fritz and Rev. Waite of Madison, Wisconsin, came once in awhile to help.

Rev. Charles Jones came around the year 1984 as Missionary-at-large, the same as former pastors. Vicars Darrel Kois, and Mike King also helped Rev. Jones. Rev. Kois is a pastor in Des Moines, Iowa now. They preached in Rockford, Franklin Park, and Arlington Heights. Rev. Jones stayed a few years and left us. Not long after Rev. Jones, Rev. Carl Bassett took over. But, he stayed about one year, as he accepted a call at Wood Dale, Illinois as pastor of it's hearing congregation. He still is there and also hosts Our Savior deaf congregation, alternating with Rev. Mark Anderson.

Rev. Anderson came to our area as our first deaf pastor, about five years ago. from New Jersey. He lives in Sterling, Illinois with a family of four children. Rev. Anderson comes to Rockford twice a month and he also conducts bible studies with our members after worship services.

We have a deaconess, Laura Budzynski, who lives in Rockford, Illinois. She has been our deaconess since 1985. She does bible study every Monday, and goes to DeKalb, Illinois to interpret for a few deaf people who live there. She alternates interpreting in DeKalb and our church with Redeemer's hearing congregation, while Rev. Anderson goes to Wood Dale. Laura also helps a lot with interpreting for some of our members who need help in hospitals, doctors' offices, etc.

In 1990, we officially organized as a congregation of the Lutheran Church-Missouri Synod.

From 1945 to now, we went through seven or eight pastors, 3 or 4 vicars and three church buildings. We truly feel very blessed as those pastors who patiently preached and taught us all we needed to know, God's Word, and Jesus, for about fifty years.

4) Deaf Ministry began at Holy Cross Lutheran Church, Cary, Illinois when Rev. Mark Anderson inquired about using the church facility for deaf services. What followed was a joy to be-hold!

God has led the deaf and the hearing at Holy Cross into a real partnership in the Gospel. As brothers and sisters in Christ they worship together every second, fourth, and fifth Sunday at the interpreted 10:45 a.m. service. Deaf services are conducted every first and third sunday at 1:00 p.m. by pastor Anderson.

Since deaf ministry began, Deaf Ministry has expanded by leaps and bounds. As members of the congregation, the deaf members have established a Deaf Ministry Board which includes both the deaf and the hearing. Joint membership on the board not only bonds both deaf and hearing together, but typifies what Deaf Ministry is all about. It is about reaching out to the deaf and the hearing with the common goal of sharing the good news about Jesus Christ.

"We really are happy with Deaf Ministry and with the Deaf Ministry Board," says the Rev. Robert M. Hess, senior pastor of the congregation. "We want the deaf to make their own decisions," Hess said. "Too often the hearing want to make decisions for the Deaf, even though the deaf are perfectly capable of making their own decisions and deciding how and in what ways they choose to serve the Lord."

The deaf members at Holy Cross are very active. Some hold membership on various boards; others serve as church ushers. Some of the deaf members are members of the finance committee. They have hosted two Easter breakfasts, conducted a most successful Deaf Awareness Week for the deaf and the hearing, held bake sales, and served as church choir as the Singing Hands."

Along with the hearing, they offer a daily telephone ministry to deaf people (708-639-8463). By calling this number, the deaf are able to receive a daily devotion. It is the same message which is recorded for the hearing.

One of the real blessing of Deaf Ministry is the sign language class deaf members conduct. Several classes have already been held. It is the hope of both the deaf and the hearing that these classes will enable better communication between the deaf and the hearing as they reach out together to both deaf and hearing people in the community.

### A SERVANT WHO NEVER GAVE UP

### ...WINNING MANY SOULS FOR CHRIST UNTIL THE LORD CALLED HIM HOME!

The <u>Rev. Franklin Paul</u> <u>Wagenknecht</u>, who began the deaf ministry with a new church building in Pittsburgh, PA died September 14, 1993 at his home in Mathews, North Carolina.

After graduating from Concordia Seminary, Frank Wagenknecht became the pastor of Trinity Lutheran

Church of the Deaf in Pittsburgh, PA. On the 19th of June 1960, Father's Day, his wife, Karen gave birth to their daughter, Lynne at 2:30 am. And he was installed as our pastor of Trinity on the same day: which was a very exciting experience for him.

During his 8 years in the deaf ministry, he was a "circuit rider" in Western Pennsylvania as far as Erie and Eastern Ohio. He had conducted services in many different stations in spite of his tight schedules. He had shared many joys and sorrows with us during his ministry in Pittsburgh. During those years he never gave up trying to win many souls for Christ. Because of his love for the Lord, he confirmed about 120 deaf individuals into the membership of Trinity congregation and other stations under his eight years of leadership.

In 1962 Pastor Wagenknecht knew God gave the growth of membership, he decided to search for the location for a new church for the deaf. Soon after got the help from



the Schumanns, an excellent location was found which is right across from Western Pennsylvania School for the Deaf. Under God, the silent prayers and hopes of "Trinity's faithful Few" were fully answered and on Sunday March 31, 1963 the "Day of Dedication" was held. 500 people thronged into the new

Trinity Lutheran Church of the Deaf to give praise and glory to a gracious God.

In 1968 Rev. Wagenknecht received the call to serve in Clearwater, Florida; where he started the Lutheran Church's first dual ministry for hearing and deaf congregation and during his 17 years at Rogate, a hearing congregation grew from 40 to 600 and the deaf congregation to 100. In 1985 he was called by the Southeastern District as Missionary at large and Resource Specialist in Deaf Ministry for North and South Carolina, and was installed in January 1986 and remained there until his death.

"Yes, our Church members and friends were stunned by his death, but we are most thankful that his work for the Lord has not been in vain or wasted. His faithful service for the Lord has been blessed; he went home with the Lord."

God in his wisdom called Rose to her eternal home on May 24, 1994. "We remember Rose for the nice things she said about everyone, but most important, we remember her trust in Jesus. She faithfully studied God's word and trusted in his promises. The memory of Rose's life will not continue forever on the earth, but we know Rose is living with Jesus in heaven. There, safe in his arms, she will stay forever."

#### Evelyn Jane DeMeyere - 1921-1994
