#### Minneapolis Mission.

#### REV. J. SALVNER, PASTOR.

On Good Friday evening services were held at Minneapolis to commemorate the death of our dear Lord and Master. The sermon was based upon Matthew 27, 45-54, the theme being, "Christ on the Cross." Miss Hauberg signed the hymn, "O Bleeding Head and Wounded." There was a good attendance, the best we ever had on a Good Friday. Twenty-nine deaf attended, among them being a communicant of our St.Paul Mission and Mr. Partridge of Winnipeg, Canada.—

On Easter-Sunday we again assembled in the Y. M. C. A. to rejoice with our risen Savior. For his text the pastor chose the Easter-narrative, as recorded in St. Matthew. Mrs. H. Bruns and Mrs. J. S. Bowen signed hymns suited to the occasion. Fifty-one deaf were in attendance of whom thirteen partook of the Lord's Supper. The Easter-collection amounted to \$5.09.—Would to God, that such a large number of deaf would attend every Sunday to worship our crucified and risen Lord. The average attendance during the first quarter of this year was 25. God grant that the attendance of our services at Minneapolis continue to grow and increase to the glory of our victorious Savior's name.—

In the afternoon Easter-services were held at St. Paul. On his arrival the pastor found a beautiful plant on the table with Eastergreetings from the little but earnest flock of our Capitol City. Many thanks! Thirteen deaf attended, to seven of whom the Lord's Supper was administered. Miss Cloeser rendered in signs an Easter-hymn. In this service \$2.25 were collected. We certainly ought to render thanks unto God for the blessing which He has bestowed upon us at St. Paul. We well remember the time when we preached to two, three, or four deaf and often felt discouraged, but by the grace of God His Word has not returned void also among the deaf of St. Paul, so that we now have seven communicants in this city and we expect one or two more within the near future. May the risen Savior abide also among this little band of His disciples with His grace and Holy Spirit.-

On Tuesday, April 13, Easter-services were conducted at Winona. In this city, the Holy Supper was administered to three deaf. The collection amounted to 65c. On the following day, an Easter-service was delivered to the deaf at La Crosse. In spite of the disagreeable weather twelve deaf attended the services. In this service \$1.80 were collected.

May our Heavenly Father bless the seed of His Holy Word which has been sowed into the hearts of so many deaf during the glorious Easter-tide and let it bear fruit unto eternal life.

In the third chapter of his first epistle to Timothy, St. Paul speaks of the qualifications of a true minister of the Gospel of Jesus Christ. Among many other things which are required of a true minister we find also this, that "a bishop (minister) must be apt to teach," v. 2. This is one of the chief qualifications. He must "be apt to teach," he must be able to communicate to others the knowledge which sinful man must necessarily know in order to be saved. Whosoever aspires to the office of a minister must be well prepared to do all things this holy office demands of him. If a minister "must be apt to teach" then it is absolutely necessary that the man assuming this office must himself be well instructed in the things of the kingdom of heaven. How can he teach others if he himself has never been taught and never has learned the things he is to impart unto others? Bearing in mind the words of the apostle that "a bishop must be apt to teach" we are surprised to see men entering the ranks of the ministry and "preaching" (!) to the deaf with little or no preparation for this important work, without any theological training. To prattle a number of things, to tell a few stories, to read a chapter from the Bible, is not what the apostle means by stating that "a bishop must be apt to teach."
