The Power of Christ's Love.

The American missionary, Dr. Chamberlain, tells an experience of his in India:

When we came to the city Hyderabad to preach the Gospel, the people rose against us and threatened to cast us out if we preached about any other god than their idols. I saw them picking up stones, ready at any moment to throw them at us. I begged them to let me tell them a story, after which they might stone me if they desired. At last they consented. As they gathered around me with the stones still in their hands, I told them of the wonderful life of Jesus, and especially of His sufferings and death. While I yet spoke, the people went and threw their stones into the gutter and came back to me, while down the face of the man who had been loudest in demanding my death, flowed tears. I told them again they might stone me if they wished. But they would not, but answered: "We had no idea you would tell us such a wonderful story."

Stand Firm.

Learn from Christ, dear Christian, how to stand firm when you are being tempted by false doctrine. (Matth. 4, 7.) It is a poor excuse for a Christian to say: "There are so many churches, every one of them claiming to be right and saying the others were wrong, one does not know whom or what to believe."

You have the written Word of God, the Bible. Every question of doctrine is settled in that Book. There is nothing to be settled by churches, or synods, or ecclesiastical bodies. God Himself has settled everything once for all in the Bible. Let neither the traditions of men, nor the dictates of human reason, nor the deceptions of your own sinful heart beguile you. Search the Scriptures! Abide by the letter and spirit of the written Word of God; and if this you do, you shall not be deceived by false doctrine, even though men endeavor to support it by Scripture, falsely quoted, even by wonders and signs. Jesus distinctly says: "There shall arise false Christs and false prophets, and shall show great signs and wonders." But if you strictly adhere to the divine Word, you will not be deceived by them.

Our grandfathers knew their Bible far better than we do, and this ought not to be. A man whose memory is well-stocked with Bible texts is by far richer than any millionaire! Let us all give the Holy Book its due.

Many blessings our good Father in heaven bestowed upon us during the past year. Last August we were enabled by the grace of God to organize a Christian congregation in the Twin Cities. Grace Congregation now numbers 11 voting and 34 communicant members. Besides increasing in number our congregation has also grown internally, for most of the members are now taking a very lively interest in church-work. Having introduced the weekly envelope system, the members this year intend to raise \$200 or more for their pastor's salary. Perhaps a few numbers concerning our mission in the Northwest would be of interest to our readers. During 1909, 123 services were held: At Minneapolis 53, St. Paul 38, La Crosse and Winona each 10, and Stillwater 12. Average attendance: Minneapolis 29, St. Paul, La Crosse and Stillwater each 9, Winona 4. Collections and contributions: Minneapolis \$108.01; St. Paul \$31.09; La Crosse \$6.87; Winona \$7.89; Stillwater \$11.80 (including \$5.25 which were collected in a combined service). Communicants: Minneapolis 27, St. Paul 7, La Crosse 3; Winona 4, Stillwater 3. Communed: Minneapolis 55, St. Paul 18, Winona 13, Stillwater 7. The pastor baptized three children in Minneapolis; confirmed three adult deaf in Minneapolis, one in St. Paul, and two in Stillwater; solemnized two marriages at Minneapolis and one at Stillwater.
