Christ our Hiding-Place.

"A man shall be as an hiding-place from the wind, and a covert from the tempest." (Isaiah 32, 2.) The man of whom the prophet speaks is none other but The Man, Christ Jesus. Of Him the prophet says, He is a hiding-place, a covert, a refuge. Yes, Christ our Savior is a hiding-place and a covert, a safe refuge in all the storms of life, in the tempest of sin, in the storm of divine anger. He who hides in His Savior Jesus Christ is safe and need fear no evil.

But a shelter is nothing if we stand in front of it. The main thought with many a wouldbe Christian is his own works, feelings, and

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attainments: this is to stand on the windy side of the wall, by putting self before Jesus. Our safety lies in getting behind Christ, and letting Him stand in the wind's eye. We must be altogether hidden, or Christ cannot be our hiding-place.

Some people hear about the hiding-place, but never get into it. How great is the folly of such conduct! It makes Jesus to be of no value. Even the Man Christ Jesus, though ordained of God to be a covert from the tempest can cover none but those who are in Him. Come then, poor sinner, enter where you may; hide in Him who was evidently meant to hide you, for He was ordained to be a hiding-place, and must be used as such, or the very aim of His life and death would be missed.

A joint service for both deaf and hearing had been arranged and, although the weather had turned very cold towards evening, 40 deaf and a great number of hearing people were in attendance. After the singing of a hymn by the congregation, and the reading of a Scripture passage, the choir, under the direction of Mr. J. D. Barthel sang the anthem: "Bow down Thine ear, O Lord, and hear me," which closes with the words of the Lord's Prayer. For the benefit of the deaf present Pastor Schubkegel rendered this anthem in signs.

Then the Rev. L. J. Siek preached a sermon on Holy Baptism based on Matth. 28, 18—20, which was also interpreted. After the sermon Mrs. Crusins, Mrs. A. Kugelmann and Miss M. Gerling beautifully rendered in signs the hymn sung by the congregation: "Baptized into Thy name, most Holy," whereupon Pastor Schubkegel examined Mrs. Crusins on the chief parts of the Christian doctrine and, as the questions and the answers were given both orally and in the sign-language, all people present were able to see that Mrs. Crusins has learned the way of life and is well able to examine herself before going to the Lord's Supper. After confessing her faith and vowing faithfulness thereto unto death, Mrs. Crusins was baptized in the name of the Triune God. Then the entire congregation joined in a devout prayer for this new member of God's family and this memorable service was closed with the Benediction and the singing of the Doxology.

Evansville, Ind.-On Nov. 20th Mr. Adam Werner of Fort Branch, Ind., after being examined on the chief parts of the Christian doctrine and having vowed faithfulness thereto unto the end, was confirmed by Pastor Schubkegel. Indianapolis, Ind.—On the evening of Dec. 4th. Pastor Schubkegel conducted services for the deaf here. After the sermon Holy Communion was celebrated with three communicants. Two others who had intended to partake of the Lord's Supper could not come.

Chicago .--- Mrs. Jennie Stoecker of Iowa, a widow and a former scholar at our North Detroit School for the Deaf, was instantly killed by an unnoticed street-car, Nov. 23rd, while crossing the street. Her remains were taken to Iowa for burial by her 3 grown children. On the following Sunday, Pastor Reinke in a memorial address showed what lessons were to be drawn from the suddenness of her death, bearing witness also of her remarkable and childlike faith, as well as of her Christian life. Dec. 5th Mr. Fred Matz, aged 68 years and 7 months, died of pneumonia. He was confirmed many years ago in Germany. Pastor Reinke prepared him for Holy Communion and for the hour of death. His was a strong faith, professed by natural gestures and very beautiful and edifying to behold. He had found the "one thing needful." Blessed is he, for he "died in the Lord."

Nov. 27th, the 10th anniversary of their wedding, Pastor and Mrs. Reinke were surprised by many deaf, who presented the couple with a ten dollar purse. Luncheon was served.

We are glad to report that our parishioners have cancelled 200 dollars of the church debt, have contributed 200 dollars to the treasury of our Mission for the Deaf, have expended 100 dollars for the painting of our church's exterior, not considering the meeting of other necessary expenses, and all this during 1910. In this respect, at least, have we improved upon each of the previous years of our existence. We add, however: "All glory be to God who made us willing and enabled us to do so."
