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The Way of Salvation.

The free Gospel way of salvation, as set forth in the Bible, is foolishness to the worldly wise and a stumbling block to the self-righteous. For in human nature there is deeply implanted the thought, that eternal life can be obtained only by tears and good resolutions and our own works and our own righteousness. Many an awakened sinner, instead of accepting the assurance of forgiveness through the finished work of Christ, thinks about God with distrust and suspicion and fear, and tries to make himself better before simply believing in Jesus. Yet all over the Bible it is written, as if with a sunbeam, that the sinner wishing to be saved has nothing to do, because all the doing was done when Jesus bowed His head on the cross and rose again for our justification.

Referring only to the New Testament, its language is: "The Son of man is come to seek and to save that which was lost," Luke 19, 10. "For God so loved the world, that He gave His only-begotten Son, that whosoever believeth in Him should not perish, but have everlasting life," John 3, 16. "He that heareth my word, and believeth on Him that sent me, hath everlasting life, and shall not come into condemnation; but is passed from death unto life," John 5, 24. "To Him give all the prophets witness, that through His name whosoever believeth in Him shall receive remission of sins," Acts 10, 43. "By Him all that believe are justified from all things," Acts 13, 39. "Believe on the Lord Jesus Christ, and thou shalt be saved," Acts 16, 31. "To him that worketh not, but believeth on Him that justifieth the ungodly, his faith is counted for righteousness," Rom. 4, 5. "The gift of God is eternal life through Jesus Christ our Lord," Rom. 6, 23. "There is now no condemnation to them which are in Christ Jesus," Rom. 8, 1. "Christ hath redeemed us from the curse of the Law," Gal. 3, 13. "Accepted in

the Beloved; in whom we have redemption through His blood, the forgiveness of sins, according to the riches of His grace," Eph. 1, 6.7. "By grace are ye saved through faith; and that not by yourselves; it is the gift of God; not of works, lest any man should boast," Eph. 2, 8.9. "Not by works of righteousness which we have done, but acording to His mercy He saved us," Tit. 3, 5. "Once in the end of the world hath He appeared to put away sin by the sacrifice of Himself," Hebr. 9, 26. "Forasmuch as ye know that ye were not redeemed with corruptible things, as silver and gold, but with the precious blood of Christ," 1 Pet. 1, 18. 19. "The blood of Jesus Christ His Son cleanseth us from all sin," 1 John 1, 7. "Thou wast slain, and hast redeemed us to God by Thy blood," Rev. 5, 9. "Whosoever will, let him take the water of life freely," Rev. 22, 17.

Such is a hurried illustration of the teachings of the Bible as to the way of salvation. Salvation is given for nothing. It is by grace through faith in the finished work of Jesus, the Savior of sinners. This teaching gives all the glory of our salvation to God alone. It is humbling to the pride of the heart, and therefore offends human nature and feeling. But it is the only true way of salvation; for salvation is in Jesus only—a full and free salvation. "Neither is there salvation in any other; for there is none other name under heaven given among men, whereby we must be saved," Acts 4, 12.

AMONG OUR DEAF.

Milwaukee.—Emanuel Congregation recently purchased from the American Bible Society the New Testament in American Braille for our blind deaf. The latter of course rejoice over this fact and come to church at every possible occasion, thus setting a good example to others, who have in a way become tired of Gospel sermons. Usually, too, some deaf friends in the audience interpret the sermons for our blind visitors.

The Ladies' Society on Easter Sunday had our chapel most beautifully decorated with palms and lilies. After the sermon the infant child of Mr. and Mrs. Herm. Schewe received Baptism. The attendance at this service was exceptionally good as also that on Good Friday evening, when Holy Communion was celebrated.

Oshkosh and Sheboygan.—Since the introduction of the envelope system by Ephphatha Mission, Oshkosh, and Faith Mission, Sheboygan, their contributions to our mission have been trebled. Messrs. H. Wesenberg of Oshkosh and O. Hermann of Sheboygan have been chosen treasurers respectively.

St. Louis, Mo.—We clip the following news article from the "Deaf-Mutes' Journal" of March 30th. "On Friday, March 24th, occurred the natal day of Rev. Chas. Schubkegel. On that day he was treated to a genuine surprise, when a large package containing a fine lot of groceries was sent to his home. He informed the driver that there was a mistake somewhere and that neither he nor his family had ordered such a whole lot. But the reverend gent was informed that the goods were all paid for and that there was nothing to do but accept them. In some way he learned that his deaf friends had sprung a surprise on him. He secured a list of names of the donors and expressed his gratitude for their thoughtfulness." In explanation of the above we state that Pastor Schubkegel's deaf friends chose this unique way of a birth-day surprise because they could not assemble at his house on account of its being still quarantined for scarlet fever. At this writing, however, all members of Pastor Schubkegel's family are well again, and, the house having been fumigated, the pastor and his family will be pleased to have their deaf friends call on them at any time.

On Palm Sunday, at 8 P. M., a joint service for both deaf and hearing people was held in the Luth. Trinity Church in which Mr. Louis Moegle, after being examined in the chief parts of the Christian doctrine, was confirmed by Pastor C. Schubkegel. After the examination and the singing of an appropriate hymn by the "Trinity Octet," Pastor Schubkegel delivered an address to the catechumen, based on Rev. 3, 11: "Behold, I come quickly; hold fast that which thou hast, that no man take thy crown." Before and after the address, the hymns: "Baptized into Thy name most Holy," and "Let me be Thine forever," were rendered in signs by Mr. Moegle, Miss Gerling and Mrs. Kugelmann, with voice and organ accompaniment. More than forty deaf attended the service and the collection taken up for the benefit of our mission amounted to \$22.51.
