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# "Be Not Conformed to This World."

# Rom. 12, 2.

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# A Useless Member.

"Yes," said Aunt Sarah, looking at her bandaged wrist, "the doctor says it's a bad sprain; and the minister says, I know now how the church feels in not having the use of all its members. The minister didn't mean that just for a joke, either; he looked at me as if he wanted to see how I'd take it. I had sense enough, too, to feel I deserved to have him say it to me. A word like that comes home pretty straight when one of your own members is useless, and worse.

"I've never thought just what being a member of the church meant before, though I've been one for thirty-five years. I've never felt obliged to do what the church wanted done. I felt it was a favor, my doing it at all, and half the time I let some one else do it instead. When I was through with work at home, and with what things I liked to do outside, then I was willing to do something in church—if it was that kind of work that suited me. I guess I've been about as useless a member to the church as the sprained hand is to me, all stiff and crippled, and refusing to bend more than an inch or two.

"There's lots of things I need to do, but I can't use this member to do them—that's certain. That's the way the minister felt about me, I guess. I've been a useless member for thirty-five years, that's the long and short of it; and, if the rest of the members had been like me, the church would have been as paralyzed as old cousin Josiah Jones, who can't move hand nor foot. I'm ashamed of myself—I truly am—and things are going to be different from now on," and Aunt Sarah nodded her head with a firm determination, as she looked at the church spire from her window.—L. M. A Brooklyn magistrate, Judge Lewis L. Fawcett, says: "Approximately 2,700 cases have been brought before me in my five and a half years of service on the bench. During all this time I have never had to try a man who was at the time of the alleged offense, or ever had been, an active member of the Church."

## AMONG OUR DEAF.

Milwaukee. — Public confirmation services were held in Emmanuel chapel on Sunday, Sept. 1st. After due instructions in the Catechism, Miss Myrtle Holverson of Delavan, Wis., renewed her baptismal covenant in the presence of a large congregation, after which she took her first communion with 24 other deaf. The confirmation address was based on the words of Jesus, which He addressed to Peter after His resurrection, John 21, 15-17: "Lovest thou Me?" Miss Holverson was accompanied by her mother, Mrs. A. Holverson. Both made their stay with Rev. and Mrs. T. Wangerin during their visit in Milwaukee.

Watertown, Wis.—At Watertown last month Rev. Wangerin invited the local deaf to a service which was held in the residence of Mr. Uttech. All the deaf, five in number, were present and were overjoyed because of the event. Four of them have had no one to preach to them for three and five years respectively. The missionary preached to them on the true way of salvation. Long after the services this little gathering remained together for a social conversation.

Merrill-Wausau. — On Ephphatha Sunday Rev. Wangerin of Milwaukee delivered two sermons and two addresses to the deaf and hearing in the interest of our mission. In the morning he gave a detailed report to Trinity congregation. After the usual sermon in the signlanguage in the afternoon he reported on our work among the blind-deaf, and in the evening preached to the deaf at Wausau. The attendance in every service was good, and the collections lifted on that day went into the treasury of our mission. In the evening of the same day also Rev. Kissling of Merrill spoke in the interest of our mission.

In the past month we have gained 30 new subscribers to the Deaf Lutheran, 25 of whom are in Nebraska. Thanks!

**Plymouth, Nebr.**—The Lutheran congregation at Plymouth, Nebr., celebrated its annual mission festival on August 18th. Rev. Jensen preached the afternoon sermon to an audience of almost 1,000 people and set forth the necessity and the success of our mission among the deaf. A part of the collection was given for the support of our cause, and twelve new subscribers were gained for "The Deaf Lutheran." We thank our many friends in Plymouth for the interest shown in our work.

**Gaylord, Minn.**—On the 4th of August Pastor Salvner held services for the deaf and our hearing friends at Gaylord. Five deaf were present and also a large gathering of our hearing Christians had assembled for this occasion. First a short confessional service was held with two deaf who afterward partook of the Lord's Supper. Then the pastor preached a sermon to the deaf on Acts 16, 30. 31, answering the question, "What must I do to be saved?" Thereupon a sermon was preached also to the hearing on Mark 7, 31-37, urging one and all to support more and more earnestly the blessed work of our Lord and Master among the deaf. The choir sang the two hymns, "Rock of Ages" and "Jesus, Lover of my soul," which the pastor rendered in signs for the deaf. A collection for our mission was lifted in this service which amounted to \$29.68. We also secured a few new subscribers to our paper and quite a few renewed their subscriptions. For our church fund several friends gave us \$3.00. We thank all for the interest they are taking in our mission for the deaf and hope they will continue to help in bringing more deaf to Jesus, the friend of sinners, also of deaf sinners.
