Lauby's Confirmation.

On the 27th day of April an unusual service took place in Trinity Lutheran Church. On the afternoon of that day our blind-deaf friend John Lauby renewed his baptismal vow. Born deaf he at the age of 16 also lost his sight. In his trials and afflictions the Word of God was his joy and comfort. He is now 35 years of age and during these years he diligently read the Word of God, parts of which he had purchased in the Moon Embossed Type. When he came to Minneapolis he eagerly desired to be instructed and confirmed. Since Luther's

Catechism can be obtained only in American Braille, he also set to work to learn this type and soon he mastered it. Joyfully he now studied and memorized the catechism and quite a number of verses from the Bible. An eager and diligent student he was, indeed! As stated above he was confirmed on the 27th of April. Cheerfully he answered all questions which he understood by placing his left hand upon the right hand of the missionary, and by his answers manifested that he is able to examine himself before partaking of the Lord's Supper. With others he took communion on the 4th of May God keep him steadfast in true May. faith unto everlasting life.

The Minnesota Companion had this to say about Lauby's confirmation:

Sunday afternoon, April 27th, at three o'clock, in the Trinity Ev. Lutheran Church, corner Thirteenth Avenue South and Nineteenth Street, Mr. John Lauby, blind-deaf, was confirmed by Rev. John' Salvner, and there was a large attendance of people hearing and deaf. Rev. Mr. Salvner gave an excellent sermon on the text, "I am the light of the world." -John VIII: 12. Misses Jennie Martenson, Jennie C. Peterson and Alma Saterlund and Mrs. Clara T. Lauby, following the organ, sang "Just as I am" in signs. When money was collected, half for mission work of the deaf and the rest to be presented to John Lauby. Rev. Mr. Salvner interpreted the hymn, "The Word and The Church," to the deaf. Closing the confirmation of John Lauby, Rev. Mr. Salvner and all the deaf signed the "Lord's Prayer." The deaf congratulated John warmly and spoke happy words to him.

AMONG OUR DEAF.

On Pentecost Sunday our New York mission held its first confirmation service in which 10 deaf were confirmed. There were present about 350 people among whom were some 50 deaf. Confirmation among the deaf in New York is nothing new, that being an annual occurrence for two generations. After the examination the ladies of the confirmation class rendered well a hymn in signs. One was so well pleased with the service that he extended an invitation to the pastor and the confirmed to have a festival gathering at his home in memory of the event. Those confirmed are: E. Berg, John Breden, P. Berg, A. Berg, Cath. Christgau, A. Neder, I. Ruge, C. and A. Lindenschmidt, and E. Prims. The following Sunday holy communion was celebrated, 14 deaf partaking. On the 22nd the deaf organized a congregation with 8 voting members and chose the name of St. Matthew's Congregation for the Deaf. Mr. Erich and Adolph Berg were chosen deacons. Some of the deaf received into membership have been previously confirmed, but they attended the instructions in the cathechism. May God continue to bless his work

among the deaf, and may the deaf continue to show increasing interest in our new congregation.
