An Idol-Festival.

A missionary gives the following description of an Idol-Festival which he witnessed in India:

"I once attended an Idol-Festival at Madras which was celebrated in a great temple.

"At sunrise the roads were already lined with wagons and people coming from all parts of the country.

"The first that attracted my attention was an old woman lying in the dust, her face, which had been painted, exposed to the burning sun.

"At a short distance from her lay a man in a hedge fence calling to his idols.

"Farther on I saw six little children sitting in the dust clapping their hands and singing as if praying to a man who stood near them.

"Then I passed a child, whose eyes had been pierced out by the mother, lying on the roadside without any clothing on, also exposed to the burning sun. Near this lay another child in the same state, with its arms and legs broken. Another lay bleeding in a brush-pile, crying pitifully. A little boy, with his feet tied up to his head was another pitiful sight. Passing on I saw many whose eyes had been taken out and their bones broken.

"As I neared the temple I saw many sights like these described, and instead of going on, I took another road and went back to my lodging-place, praying that the light of the Gospel may soon reach the hearts of these people."

AMONG OUR DEAF.

St. Joseph, Mich.—Since June, 1913, services have been conducted every month by Pastor Uhlig and the deaf have all been faithful and regular attendants. On Oct. 22 the missionary was agreeably surprised to find three more deaf who have come to St. Joseph to live and who expressed their determination to be regular attendants. After the service the deaf presented the pastor with an engraved silver loving cup for his infant son showing their appreciation of the fact that they are regularly being supplied with the Word. Nov. 12 the missionary received a card from one of the St. Joseph deaf, reading: "The next time you come to St. Joe, please bring a catechism along for me and make arrangements to give me instruction in God's Word." This is the first request of this kind, and it fills one with joy, as it bears out the statement of the Holy Spirit, spoken by the mouth of Isaiah: "My Word shall not return unto Me void, but shall prosper in the thing whereunto I sent it !" May God continue to prosper His Word here for the good of bloodbought soul and to the praise of His holy name.

Bremen, Ind.—On Oct. 20 Pastor Uhlig preached a sermon to the five deaf of Bremen, Ind., one of whom was a member of our South Bend flock until last year. The service was conducted in the local Lutheran church, Pastor W. Roesener. Many hearing friends had assembled; a collection approaching the \$20 figure was raised for our mission. As the five deaf earnestly prayed for monthly services and as there are prospects of reaching a number of neighboring deaf, the arrangement was made to preach at Bremen every third Wednesday of the month. May this little preaching station serve the purpose of being a recruiting station for soldiers of the Cross!

Milwaukee.—Mr. Hubert Suhr of Hustisford, and Miss Sadie Thomas of Eastman, Wis., were married on Thanksgiving day by Rev. T. Wangerin at the home of the bride, near Prairie du Chien, Wis. In the absence of Pastor Wangerin, the Rev. N. Uhlig of Chicago conducted Thanksgiving services in Emmanuel Chapel.

We are in receipt of several communications from our Pacific Coast Missionary, the Rev. N. Jensen, letters which indicate the necessity of Lutheran missionary work among the deaf along the coast. Here are a few extracts: "Los Angeles was an inspiration to me." "Superintendents of State Schools do all to help our cause along." "Things look brighter than when I first came out here." "This is great territory for our mission. The deaf are very glad that we have finally sent them a man." Good news, indeed! Reader rejoice! and ask God's blessings on the labors of our missionary as well as for the deaf "beyond the mountains."

Oshkosh.—On November 11th, Mr. and Mrs. F. Trowbridge were confirmed in our mission at Oshkosh by Pastor Wangerin. May they advance in wisdom and in favor with God and man. We now have 11 communicants at Oshkosh.

Recently Rev. T. M. Wangerin, for eighteen years missionary among the Lutheran deafmutes, in Milwaukee addressed the Hope Men's Club, giving an exceedingly interesting survey of the soul-saving work of the Missouri Synod among the deaf. His lecture was replete with personal experiences, and was highly commented upon by all present.—Northern Lutheran.

Emmanuel Congregation at Milwaukee will celebrate Christmas with a morning and afternoon service. For the afternoon celebration, which is to be a joint service, a program has been completed in which the children of the members will take an active part. Hymns will be sung, a catechisation will be held, recitations rendered both in the oral and sign-languages, and an address will be delivered by the pastor for the deaf as well as the hearing, which is to be followed by the distribution of gifts. A thorough drill has been gone through with the children, and a good attendance is expected. The collection taken up in this service is for benevolent purposes.

Minneapolis.---Undoubtedly it will fill the hearts of our readers with joy to hear that services have been held with the deaf of two more cities. On the 29th of October your missionary of Minneapolis went to Lake City at the invitation of Rev. Mr. Franzmann. The members of the congregation had been invited and a fair number came to attend this service. At first, a lecture on our work among the deaf and then a service was held with the deaf. Six deaf, two of them from Red Wing, were present in this service. The collection from our hearing friends for our work in Minneapolis amounted to about \$10.00. We also received \$1.85 from the deaf for our mission. After the service the pastor and the deaf were busy talking for a long time. All deaf expressed the wish to have regular services. For the present time the missionary could promise them but one service every two months. It was also concluded to have the next service in Red Wing which took place on the 18th of November in the Lutheran Church of which Rev. J. Baumann is pastor. Again a number of hearing friends had assembled and therefore also here a lecture in the interest of our mission was given. A collection for our mission will be taken up later. After the lecture a sermon was preached to six deaf, two of whom had come from Lake City. The deaf contributed \$2.10 for our mission. Among the deaf in Lake City and Red Wing there are four deaf confirmed in the Lutheran Church. In January services with Holy Communion will be held in Lake City.

We heartily thank the pastors of Lake City and Red Wing and their congregations for their kindness shown unto us during our stay there and hope they will always remember the deaf and their pastor in their prayers.

On the 28th of October a lecture was given in Rev. H. Boettcher's congregation at Gibbon. The service was well attended and it was a great pleasure to us to tell so many hearing friends of our blessed work among the deaf. The collection amounted to \$16.85. We also received several subscriptions. Hearty thanks to pastor and congregation!

We acknowledge with thanks the receipt of \$3.00 for our church fund from Rev. Meichsner's Sunday School and of \$5.00 collected at the wedding of Mrs. Salvner's sister Clara of Saginaw. May God reward the kind givers!

New York.—During the last quarter it was the pleasure of the writer to pay a visit to the deaf at Kingston, N. Y. In the morning he addressed the hearing congregation in German and for the afternoon the deaf had been invited for a service. Kingston and vicinity deaf are comparatively few, but we had the pleasure of meeting 12 of them. For the benefit of the audience the signs were accompanied by spoken words. The afternoon offering was given to the New York congregation for the deaf which they have added to their fund. It amounted to \$17.50. Mr. Winne from Kingston has been a frequent visitor at our services in New York.

This year we are preparing a large number of deaf for confirmation. Distance demanded that they be divided into several classes. Among them are some pupils from the New York State School for the Deaf.
