The sessions were held in the chapel of the state school, all the delegates and visitors being guests of the school. The convention was well attended and gave your missionary a splendid opportunity to become acquainted with many deaf and to champion the cause of our mission on the Coast. A good program provided for a variety of work and entertain-

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ment. On Sunday, June 13, the convention enjoyed an all-day boatride up the Columbia River, "the Hudson, the Rhine, and the Rhone, rolled in one." After eating lunch at the foot of the Multnomah Falls, the return trip was begun, and Rev. Jensen conducted divine services on the boat, preaching on Luke 5; 1-11. to an attentive audience of 80 deaf people. In the evening a session was held in the chapel, and the topic of "Church Work among the Deaf" was discussed by several speakers.

We are looking forward to the visit of the chairman of the Board of Mission to the deaf, who expects to spend the month of July on the Coast and during his stay expects to visit the different mission places so as to get a personal view and understanding of the extended work of mission on the Coast.

The first class, which numbers eleven pupils, has finished the first chief part of the Christian relig-They have ion, the Ten Commandments. learned to know their sin and the need of a Savior. With God's help we intend to have the first class ready for confirmation next year. The second class of twelve pupils also has completed the first chief part. And our little friends from the third and fourth grades, thirteen of them, have memorized the Ten Commandments. All are taking a lively interest in the study of God's Word. Miss Olga Anderson, a teacher of the school who also is being instructed, was of great help to the pastor in advancing the children so far, and hearty thanks are due her. But still greater joy was in store for us, for on the evening of the 16th we had our first confirmation in Devils Lake.

Misses Gudbjorg Oddson, Lydia and Mathilda Donner were confirmed and then partook of the Lord's Supper. Joyfully they answered the questions which were put to them concerning our faith and then vowed faithfulness unto death. The pastor's address was based upon the answer of Peter, "Yea, Lord, Thou knowest that I love Thee," in reply to Christ's question, "Lovest thou Me?" The address set forth why we should love Christ and how we should manifest our love to Him. Before the confirmation, Misses Lydia and Mathilda Donner were baptized in the name of Jesus for the remission of sins. About 35 pupils attended the service which took place in the Lutheran church. May God grant that these new members will continue stedfast in the faith until everlasting life. Our visits to the school during the past year afforded us great pleasure, and with joy shall we take up the work again next fall. Thanks unto God for His grace and blessing; may He abide with us in this our work in the future as He has in the past. We herewith also render hearty thanks unto Superintendent and Mrs. Blattner for their kind hospitality during our stay there.
