STUDIES IN LUTHER'S CATECHISM.

The Second Article.

"The third day He rose again from the dead."

"Hallelujah! Christ is born!" Thus we shall sing again in a few weeks. With joy we shall listen to that old, old story of the Child of Bethlehem, young and old will sing of that Babe wrapped in swaddling clothes and lying in the manger. A poor, humble child! And He came to save, did He? Yes. He came to save from sin. And did He finish His work? Indeed, for we have not only the joyful Christmas Day with its message, "Christ is born!" but we also have the glorious Easter Day with the message, "Christ is risen!" The birth of the Savior considered in the light of the Easter-message will increase our joy and peace and hope on that happy Christmas Day. Let us, therefore, consider these precious words of our Creed: "The third day He arose again from the dead."

During this time of the year, our thoughts naturally love to dwell in Bethlehem, with the Child in the manger. What think you of this Child? Whose Son is He? Paul answers in his epistle to the Romans: "He is declared to be the Son of God with power by the resurrection from the dead," Rom. 1:4. Jesus often spoke of His resurrection to prove that He is the Son of God. To the Jews who had asked for a sign, He said, "Destroy this temple and in three days I will raise it up," John 2: 19. The Bible tells us that He spake of the temple of His body. Mark the words: "I will raise it up." By His power He will arise, and therefore He also said, "I have power to lay down my life, and I have power to take it again," John 10: 18. Oh, if Jesus had not risen, then we could not rejoice in that Child at Bethlehem, for then He would not be the Son of God and would not have the power to take His life again from death, as He said, and He would be no more than any other little child. But He is risen, and therefore the angel could say of this Babe: "Unto you is born a Savior, which is Christ the Lord." And in view of this Risen Lord, also we can sing on Christmas Day:

"Rejoice, you sons of men alway! God comes to you from heaven today; The Lord is born a little child, Of Mary, Virgin undefiled."

He is risen! Therefore His word is the truth. When our Lord spoke to His disciples of His suffering and death, He again and again added these words: "The third day I shall rise again." To His enemies He said: "As Jonas was three days and three nights in the whale's belly; so shall the Son of man be three days and three nights in the heart of the earth," Matth. 12: 40. Indeed, if Jesus had not come out of the grave, then we could not believe one word of His, and then, why rejoice on Christmas Day, if the word of the Christ-child is not the truth? But, fear not! When the women came to the grave early on Sunday morning, they saw the stone rolled away and the angel of the Lord sitting upon it. And he said unto them: "Fear not ye: for I know that ye seek Jesus, which was crucified. He is not here: for He is risen, as He said." Surely, by His resurrection Jesus showed that His word is the truth. This fact increases our Christmasjoy not a little!

But why did this mighty Son of God come into the world? To the shepherds upon the fields of Bethlehem the angel of the Lord said: "Unto you is born a **Savior**." He Himself said, "The Son of man is come to **save** that which was **lost**." And His great Apostle Paul writes: "This is a faithful saying, and worthy of all acceptation, that Christ Jesus came into the world to **save sinners**." To save the world from sin Christ was born in Bethlehem!

And did He wipe out our debt before God? Has He paid for our sins in full? Will God forgive us in Christ Jesus? You need not doubt. In the house of Cornelius Peter preached about this Jesus of Nazareth whom the Jews slew and hanged on the tree, and then added: "Him God raised up the third day, and showed Him openly." God raised Him up, and then sent an angel to roll away the stone, and thereby declared to all the world: "Jesus has fully paid for your sins, and, therefore, I let Him come out of the grave and go free." When you pay a debt, you ask for a receipt to show that you paid in full, so on Easter Day God gave us a receipt by raising up our Lord Jesus. He was delivered for our offences, given into death for our sins, and was raised again for our justification, by His resurrection God declared us just. Rom. 4: 25.

How terrible if Jesus had not risen! Read the 15th chapter of 1 Corinthians and you will learn how necessary the resurrection of Jesus is! In v. 17 Paul says: "If Christ be not raised, your faith is vain; ye are yet in your sins." If Jesus still is in the prison of death and the grave, then your sins are not yet paid for and you cannot rejoice in that Child of Bethlehem, for then it came with good intentions, but could not finish what it set out to do. But, rejoice, the Lord is risen indeed, and we can say, "Who shall lay anything to the charge of God's elect? It is God that justifieth. Who is he that condemneth? It is Christ that died, yea, rather, that is risen again," Rom. 8: 33, 34. Come, dear friend, from the manger look to the empty tomb in the garden, and you will greatly rejoice on Christmas Day in that peace of which the angels sang in that holy night.

But from the manger let us look not only at the empty tomb of our Lord, but also to the graves of our beloved dead and our own. The Risen Lord also says: "I live, and ye shall live also." Listen furthermore to His promise in John 6: 40: "This is the will of Him that sent me, that every one which seeth the Son, and believeth on Him, may have everlasting life: and I will raise him up at the last day." What a glorious hope! Jesus is risen, and now all they that die in His name will rise again. But now if Christ is not risen, then our hope is buried with Him. Paul says, "If Christ be not raised, then they also which are fallen asleep in Christ are perished. If in this life only we have hope in Christ, we are of all men most miserable," 1 Cor. 15:18, 19. Christ is risen, however, and therefore, as in Adam all die, even so in Christ will all be made alive," v. 22. And this Risen Lord came into this world on Christmas Day wrapped in swaddling clothes and lying in a manger. This child has abolished death, and brought life and immortality to light through the gospel," 2. Tim. 1: 10. Come, let us worship this Child of Bethlehem, for He it is that said: "I am the resurrection

and the life: he that believeth in me, though he were dead, yet shall he live: and whosoever liveth and believeth in me shall never die," John 11: 25, 26.

Thus the words, "The third day He rose again from the dead," show that the Christchild brings pure joy, perfect peace, and a blessed hope to all that fall down and worship Him, for this child is also He that rose again from the dead.

"Now let us all with gladsome cheer, Follow the shepherds, and draw near, To see the wondrous gift of God, Who hath His own dear Son bestowed."

ITEMS FROM THE FIELD.

Northwest Pacific Mission. — The Lord has answered our call for help and graciously granted us another worker for the Pacific Coast. Our Board of Missions for the Deaf has called the Rev. J. A. C. Beyer to take up the work at Portland. He is a graduate of Concordia College, Bronxville, N. Y., and Concordia Seminary, St. Louis, Mo. While at the seminary he joined a class in 1915 to study the sign language. A picture of this class appeared in these columns years ago. (We are inserting it once more, as we believe it to be of interest to all.) Of this class five have entered our Mission for the Deaf, the Revs. J. A. C. Beyer and Wm. G. Harms being the last of this class to be called into this work. The time was well spent and had none of these men ever entered this work, they would at least possess a splendid working knowledge of the signs and thus be able to minister among the deaf whenever necessary. We sincerely hope that a class will be formed at the seminary also this year.

Rev. J. A. C. Beyer, our new worker on the Coast, was ordained Aug. 31st at Saratoga Springs, N. Y., and thereupon went to Detroit where he worked with Rev. Wm. Gielow and preached at a number of stations of the Detroit Mission. Oct. 5-7 he attended Ephphatha Conference and then with the writer traveled to the Pacific Coast. Sunday, Oct. 19, the installation took place at Portland in Trinity Lutheran Church. Quite a number of hearing friends and our Portland deaf attended the services. The Lutheran deaf showed their appreciation by a gathering the night before. For our work \$4.67 were given and a number of subscribers were secured.

Rev. Mr. Beyer will serve Portland and temporarily some of the Washington stations while the Seattle missionary will attend to the State Schools. We hope, however, that within a month or two our schedule can be arranged permanently.

To show our readers how abundantly God has blessed our humble efforts and why an-

other missionary was called, we shall give a few numbers. Seattle has 13 confirmed members, Tacoma 2, Spokane 10, Yakima 1, Vancouver 4, Portland 7. Total: 37. At Seattle 4 are under instructions, at Tacoma 1, at Spokane 2, at Yakima 1, at Vancouver 4, at Portland 7. Total: 14. With two missionaries in this field we shall be able to do more intensive work. Nevertheless you will very seldom find the missionary at home, for the four Washington stations will be served twice a month.

In Omaha our deaf have voted to add their bit to the building fund of Rev. Seesko's congregation by subscribing a stipulated amount. Our mission has enjoyed the use of Rev. Seesko's church for years and we are happy to see our deaf show the right spirit of appreciation and gratitude. A Christmas program in which the members will take part is being arranged for Christmas Day. O. C. S.

St. Paul Mission.—"Last but not least," another mission festival report. It was the mission festival of Rev. R. Heidmann's congregation at Arlington, Minn., Sept. 28th, the last of the eight accepted invitations to speak in the

interest of our mission. In spite of the disagreeable weather many had come to hear and see how the Bread of Life is broken also to those, who have neither speech nor hearing. Also our deaf friends, Mr. and Mrs. R. Kuske, were present. The collection, which was for the benefit of our mission, amounted to \$48.90, while 17 subscribed for The Deaf Lutheran. A hearty "Thank you" to all our Arlington friends.

On this same day our St. Paul deaf had the privilege to see the new worker, Rev. Wm. Harms, preach one of his first sermons in the sign language. He seems to have made a very favorable impression upon all who were present. May also the deaf of our Detroit Mission be deeply impressed by the preaching of their new pastor, regularly attend his services, and with a believing heart accept the glad tidings of their Savior!

On Sunday evening, Oct. 12th, the pastor delivered a sermon to the congregation of his brother, Rev. Fred Schumacher, at Louisville, Ky., where he also made use of the opportunity to speak a few words in the interest of our mission. This was an ordinary Sunday evening service, but still a goodly number was present. All seemed to have enjoyed it. Some made special confession of their appreciation by giving a small donation to the mission and by "hitting the Deaf Lutheran trail." Twentyseven new names were added to our subscription list. Accept our hearty thanks! May the words that were spoken for our mission dwell in their hearts for many years, so that in their prayers and deeds they may remember also those, who live in the world of silence. Furthermore, we ask them to mention this to others, so that many more will become interested in this glorious work among the deaf and invite one of our missionaries for a similar lecture and demonstration.

On Oct. 14th the pastor had the pleasure of becoming acquainted with our silent workers at the seminary in St. Louis. All members of the class seemed to be greatly interested in the study of the sign language. If they continue at the rate they are now going, then our mission may look forward to some able and active workers for the deaf. Even if they may not all be called into the mission, still we may trust that at all times they will have the welfare of the deaf at heart and will always be willing to serve the deaf wherever and whenever they can.

On Oct. 22nd the bells of the Lutheran Church at Arlington, Minn., were ringing quite merrily and the organ was sending forth the music of the wedding march quite cheerfully as Mr. Emil Abraham led Miss Helena Arndt down the center aisle to the altar, where they joined hands in holy matrimony. Mr. Abraham is a communicant member of our Gaylord mission, while his wife is preparing herself for membership. The pastor delivered a short address on Joshua 24, 15: "As for me and my house, we will serve the Lord," speaking in both languages at the same time. May these words and the blessings of the Lord guide them through their wedded life into life eternal.

Mr. and Mrs. L. Buschmann, who for many years had lived in Red Wing, have now moved to St. Paul, where he has found better work. Their presence at our services in Red Wing is being missed, but as christians we must rejoice with them, for they now have the opportunity to attend services every Sunday.

In one of the last issues of The Wisconsin Times Mr. Scott Ensign, an attendant at our Eau Claire services, is asking for more deaf to come to Eau Claire to learn the shoemaker trade. A new shoe factory has been opened and is offering a good salary and plenty of work to all, who are able and willing to do the work. We should like to add this: All who come to Eau Claire for work will also have an opportunity to attend services once a month, and to join a confirmation class, which was organized in our last meeting on Nov. 16th. Therefore, if we know of any deaf, who are living in such a small place that they can never attend divine services, then let us try to encourage them to move to Eau Claire. "Seek ye first the kingdom of God, and His righteous-I. SCH. ne," Matthew 6, 33.

Minneapolis Mission.—Grace Congregation held its quarterly meeting on Oct. 21st and elected the following officers for 1920; Jens Hansen, President (re-elected); S. S. Olson, Vice-President; Edw. Bauer, Secretary; C. H. Fels, Treasurer (re-elected); D. Hagerstrom, Trustee for three years. Geo. R. Klatke offered his services as janitor. May God be with us in the new year and grant that His name be hallowed and His kingdom come and His will be done also among us!

On our last visit to the North Dakota School at Devils Lake we met John Mueller of Anamoose, N. Dak. He was confirmed in Detroit by Rev. Gielow in 1918 and now attends the North Dakota School. He has joined our Bible class and with five other deaf partook of the Lord's Supper on the 15th of November. In December we shall, God willing, be in Fargo on the 11th, in Grand Forks on the 12th, and in Devils Lake on the 13th.

Milwaukee Mission.-We forgot in our last report to state that the Misses Frieda Wille of Delavan, and Dorothy Franke of Milwaukee, were confirmed in our chapel on Sunday, September 7th. A large gathering consisting mostly of deaf was in attendance. After the confirmation both girls went back to Delavan to resume their studies at the State School. Mr. Otto Wille, father of Frieda, was formerly a member of our congregation, but moved to Delavan, where he works in the Bradley Knitting Factory. Dorothy's father, Mr. Fred Franke, is also a member of our congregation, whose oldest daughter Lillie was confirmed two years ago. May these catechumens remain steadfast in faith unto the end.

Another class of catechumens has been organized in Milwaukee and we hope to confirm several young men next spring. The Messrs. Roscoe E. West, Walter Tiegs, and Henry Hoeffert were confirmed last summer, Mr. West receiving baptism shortly before his confirmation.

The afternoon of Sunday, October 26th, the Rev. E. Duemling, local city missionary, delivered a lecture to a large gathering of the deaf in the basement of our chapel. Over 100 deaf were present. His lecture covered his missionary work in the state prison at Waupun and the Industrial School for Girls, interpretation being done by your local missionary. For many years our congregation has raised moneys towards the support of the city missionary, and the members heartily welcomed this address. God willing, we shall have more such lectures in the future by missionaries or representatives of various missions.

Miss Nimmer is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. John Nimmer of our congregation and is a hearing lady, but well versed in signs. The couple chose their wedding text from Isaiah 26:3. May their prayer to trust in the Lord always be fulfilled. After the ceremony the event was celebrated with the pastor and a goodly number of the congregation at the newly purchased home of Mr. Goetsch.

SCHOOL LETTER.

"Time flies", is an old and true saying. And last month it flew so quickly, that the date of having the letter in the hands of the Editor came and passed without being noticed. And so it happened that there was no letter from the School in the last month's Deaf Lutheran. If any one has been disappointed, we are indeed sorry, and promise to try not to forget it again.

The work of the School is progressing along the lines laid out. Every hour of the day, and

every day of the week is utilized, and the pupils are taught strenuous working. But on the evening of the 30th of October work was turned into play. Mrs. Ewald, the matron of the School, and Mrs. Standefer, our teacher, who boards in the School, prepared a Hallowe'en party for the children. To this party the teachers with their families, the Board members with their families, and the visiting committee of the Ladies' Auxiliary were invited. The first hall, dining room, and chapel were beautifully decorated with cornstalks, branches of the maple tree, and jack-o'-lanterns of every size and description. A large arch in the first hall, made of cornstalks and intertwined with the lights used on the Christmas tree, deserves special mention. Supper was served, first to the children, then to the guests, who were, mostly, grown-ups, and could better afford to wait for a meal than hungry, healthy children. After the supper, some fancy marching was done in the chapel room, and then various amusements for the children were on the program. Every one had a good time. We closed the celebration about 11 o'clock with the singing of the Lutheran battle hymn, "A mighty Fortress is our God", it being but an hour from the 31st of October, the day on which the Lutheran Church thanks God for the reformation of the church by Dr. Martin Luther.

God always provides for His children. This we have again experienced this fall. Our potato crop at the School was negligible. Yet we have potatoes enough. God warmed the hearts of some to give what we had not. Mr. Budzier, who lives in Fergus, Michigan, and had a boy here some years ago, still retains a warm spot in his heart for this School and made it a point, because he could not collect any potatoes in his neighborhood, to collect cash money, with which we could buy the "spuds." He sent us a money order for fifty dollars. Mr. Volz, a farmer of Pigeon, Michigan, who brought his daughter down last fall, sent us ten bushels as a donation, and bought for us all the potatoes we shall need for the year. To both men we extend our sincerest thanks and wish them God's reward for their kindness. G.
