"I WILL SEND HIM UNTO YOU." John 16: 7.

"Let songs of praises fill the sky: Christ, our ascended Lord, Sends down His Spirit from on high, According to His word: All hail the day of Pentecost, The coming of the Holy Ghost!"

"YE SHALL BE WITNESSES UNTO ME." Acts 1: 8.

These words our crucified and risen Lord said shortly before He went into heaven. The living Savior had shown Himself to His disciples again and again, so that they all rejoiced in the risen Savior. But He was not to stay, no, the work of salvation was done, and He was ready to go unto His Father who had sent Him. Forty days after His victory over death and the grave, the eleven disciples therefore went into Galilee, into a mountain which Jesus had appointed them. There they met their victorious Lord. And these were His last words to them: "Ye shall be witnesses unto Me." And when He had spoken these things, while they beheld, He was taken up; and a cloud received Him out of their sight. Acts 1:9. "Ye shall be witnesses unto Me." Very important words of the ascended Lord Jesus!

And this command He gave to His disciples. They had come together on that mountain in Galilee to get their last instructions from their Master who was about to ascend into heaven and to sit at the right hand of God the Father Almighty. And what did He say? "Ye shall be witnesses unto Me." And these are the words of the ascended Lord to all disciples. His disciples are all they who believe in this crucified, risen and ascended Lord and Savior. Friend reader, are you His disciple? Do you believe in Him and His blood? If so (may God grant that you are), then remember His words to you, "Ye shall be witnesses unto Me." This is your Christian duty to be a witness unto Him.

What does it mean to be a witness unto Jesus? If you should be a witness for any one before court, that means, you should speak for him. So you should go out and speak for Jesus. He Himself explains these words, when He says Mark 16: 16, "Preach the Gospel." This is what the disciples did. They were witnesses for their Lord, they spoke for Him before friends and enemies. Read Acts 2:32; 3:15; 5:32; 10:39; 13:31; 23:11; 26:22. And this every believer should do. You, Christian friend, should speak for Jesus in your home, among friends, in your city, in all the world. Are you doing it? Are you telling others about your Jesus? Are you helping to bring the good news to all people? Oh, let us never forget we should be witnesses for Him, we should go out and speak for our Lord and not be ashamed.

Indeed, we often are ashamed and afraid. It takes courage to step up before the world and speak for Jesus, for the world will laugh and mock. Jesus knows this, therefore He promised the Spirit and power to His disciples, saying, "Ye shall receive power, after that the Holy Ghost is come upon you: and ye shall be witnesses unto Me." This Holy Spirit He sent to His disciples on Pentecost, ten days after His ascension. Then the disciples went forth with great boldness and spoke for Jesus, fearing neither prison nor death. And this Spirit He sent for all disciples, also for you and me. This Spirit comes to us in the Word, tells us about Jesus, fills us with power and courage to be witnesses for Jesus. What a comfort for us Christians! For this we must give thanks unto the ascended Savior, for He says: "If I go not away, the Comforter (Holy Ghost) will not come unto you: but if I depart, I will send Him unto you."

Therefore let us rejoice in His ascension and in the gift of His Spirit on Pentecost. May He evermore fill us with His Spirit, and so make us bold and full of courage to speak for Jesus and be witnesses unto Him!

STUDIES IN LUTHER'S CATECHISM. The Lord's Prayer.

One day one of our deaf-blind friends came to his pastor, saying: "I wish I could again read my Bible and study my Catechism." His pastor, therefore, at once sent for the alphabet of the Moon embossed type for the blind. Having received it, he took it to our deaf-blind friend, who, in a short time, learned the letters by means of the sense of touch. But with the alphabet his pastor had brought another sheet, which he gave to him and asked him to read it. With the left hand the deaf-blind man felt of the letters and with his right hand he spelled to his pastor, as follows: "O-u-r F-a-t-h-e-r w-h-o a-r-t —." Here he stopped, and with his face beaming for joy he signed to his friend pastor: "Oh, it is the Lord's Prayer." It was like meeting a good old friend. Eagerly he then read the whole prayer. So all Christians know and love this prayer, the Lord's Prayer. Christian friend, surely, also you have often prayed it in church and at home.

It is a wonderful prayer, indeed! It cannot be otherwise, for it is the **Lord's** Prayer. Why do we call it the **Lord's** Prayer? Because the Lord Jesus Himself taught us this greatest of all prayers. Luke 11: 1-4 we read, "And it came to pass, that, as He was praying in a certain place, when He ceased, one of His disciples said unto Him, Lord, teach us to pray, as John also taught his disciples. And He said unto them, When ye pray, say, Our Father which art in heaven, etc." The same prayer He taught His disciples also in His Sermon on the Mount, when He says in Matth. 6: 9, "After this manner therefore pray ye: Our Father, etc." Surely, it must be a wonderful prayer, for this Jesus is the greatest teacher, for "in Him are hid all the treasures of wisdom and knowledge," Col. 2: 3. Therefore this prayer which Jesus teaches us must be the prayer of all prayers. Every one who studies it must confess that it is a most wonderful prayer.

Study it, kind reader, and you will find everything mentioned for which man should pray. Are you perhaps concerned about the glory of God's holy name? You pray for it in this prayer. Or, are you interested in missions and do you want to see many more learn to know Him who died for all and arose again? The Lord Jesus teaches you to pray for this in this wonderful prayer. Again, do you see what the devil, the world, and the wicked heart aim at and desire, and do you want to see it broken and hindered? You will find a prayer for this in the Lord's Prayer. You daily need food and drink, it is all mentioned in this precious prayer. You need health, work, good government, etc., Jesus did not forget that. We daily sin much, and indeed deserve nothing but punishment, and therefore He put in a prayer for forgiveness. You perhaps are worried about the many temptations in this world, you need God's help, oh, He also thought of that. Or, have you trouble anywhere? He teaches you to take it all to the Lord in prayer. Yes, it is a most wonderful prayer. Everything you need is mentioned in it. From it we see that Jesus is a teacher come from God. it shows that He knows all the needs of man.

Furthermore, it is so beautifully arranged. It is like a letter. In the first place, He gives you the address. You must know to whom you should send this letter, to whom you" should go with your petitions. Look at the address very closely! It will tell you to whom and whither you should send this letter, this prayer. Then you will find seven petitions, seven little prayers, in which you tell your Father your needs and wishes. He gives you three petitions for things that concern God, and four that concern you. And, finally, you will find a beautiful close for your letter. Yes, a wonderful letter it is! Your Father has sent a letter to you, that is, your dear Bible, and you also send Him a letter, that is, the Lord's Prayer. Now, as you eagerly read a letter from father or mother, so eagerly read this letter from heaven, your Bible, and as you often write a letter to your parents, when away, and tell them of your joys and sorrows, your needs and wishes, so often send this letter to your Father in heaven.

And surely, we often pray it. This prayer is the most widely used prayer among Christians. You can hear it in almost every service, you can hear it in every Christian home. Many pray it when they arise in the morning and when they go to sleep in the evening. Yes, many pray it, although they are not Christians. You can hear it in lodge-meetings, in Christian Science temples, etc. Christians and non-Christians pray it. Therefore it is, as Luther says, the greatest martyr on earth. Many pray it and know not what it means, others use it to make vain repetitions as the heathen do, and, alas! also many Christians pray it so thoughtlessly. Often when a Christian has prayed it, he must confess: Again I have taken God's name in vain and broken the second commandment.

Friend, do you pray this prayer? Do you know it? If not, then take your Bible, open it at Matthew 6: 9-13, and then study and memorize this most beautiful prayer. Every Christian ought to know it. However, he should not only know it, but also understand it. And in order to get a better understanding of it, we shall now take up this prayer in our studies of Luther's Catechism. May God bless these studies and grant that we daily pray the Lord's Prayer in spirit and in truth!

SCHOOL LETTER.

Mr. Editor, life is just one change after another, a continuous going and coming, meeting and parting, entering and leaving. We experience this fact in our daily lives. We experience it also in the work we are doing. Mr. and Mrs. Ewald, who were in charge of the School's household and farm for two years, have left the school. Last evening the Board of Directors, together with members of the School Board, which is also vitally interested in filling the position with the proper people, engaged the services of Mrs. Helen Bartke, mother of Miss Paula, who was confirmed here last June and now is in the ninth grade of the Michigan Deaf School, as matron or stewardess of the School.

A further change was made in this way that the new matron will be directly responsible to the director of the School, and he, not the matron, will be responsible to the Board of Directors. Heretofore stewards were directly responsible to the Board, but experience teaches that it is the wisest and most profitable course to have the responsibility rest upon one man, and that this one man must be one who is in the School and around it every day.

The supervision of the farm, barnyard, and lawn was given into the hands of Mr. Klein, who has been with us for twelve years. On account of having very little land left to work, it was thought unnecessary to hire a special man for it, except in the summer time. All male persons in and around the School, both old and young, will lend a hand that this part of the School's property will be well taken care of.

Mr. Klein, together with the boys, has done very efficient work about the farm and park. And it will not be amiss to publicly acknowledge the sacrificing spirit and labors of our two girls, Miss Koss and Miss Koeppen, both members of our Lutheran Deaf Church of Detroit. They took charge of all the work since Mrs. Ewald left, and have kept everything in splendid condition, and the work has been going on without interruption. The Lord will reward them for their kindness.

The children have been well since the scarlet fever siege, thanks to God. G.
