HISTORY OF OUR LUTHERAN MISSION FOR THE DEAF Introduction

"The Deaf Lutheran" has from time to time brought articles and historical sketches concerning the congregations that our Lutheran Mission has established among the deaf in various cities. The issues of this paper in 1916 and 1917 contained a number of lengthy articles on some of the oldest and largest stations in the Mission, but no attempt has been made to give a complete and detailed account of the beginning and growth and present status of our Mission in all its stations. A complete, but very brief sketch of our Mission as a whole appeared in the "Jubilee Number" of July, 1921, in commemoration of the 25th anniversary of the beginning of our Missouri Lutheran Synod's blessed work of preaching the Gospel among the deaf. Even that short and general survey of the results of our work among the deaf urged us to join the multitude which witnessed the healing of the deaf-mute, and say in praise of our Lord: "He hath done all things well: he maketh both the deaf to hear, and the dumb to speak," Mark 7:37; for to-day many deaf receive the Gospel of Jesus Christ and sing hymns of praise to their Redeemer, indeed not through the organs of speech and hearing, but by means of the deaf-mutes' own language, the pantomimic and expressive sign-language.

For some time the worthy editor of "The Deaf Lutheran" has been planning to furnish the deaf and their friends a full account of our Mission in all its stations between New York and Los Angeles, Winnipeg, in Canada, and St. Louis, Mo. Such a comprehensive history of our Mission is not easily and quickly compiled, the task requires encouragement and assistance from all our missionaries among the deaf. The encouragement was given at the Jubilee Conference of the Lutheran missionaries at Milwaukee in July, 1921, as seen from this report: "The Conference endorsed the plan to publish a detailed history of our Mission in 'The Deaf Lutheran' in monthly instalments, the first instalment to appear in January, 1922." The first instalment is now here, for the assistance was gladly and readily given in gathering information and reports concerning the required details of the history.

Our aim shall be to take the reader to the cradle of our Mission among the Deaf and lead him step by step over the whole field now served by our missionaries. We shall see and appreciate how our Lutheran Synod was led into this work of preaching the Gospel of Christ crucified among the deaf, we shall, furthermore, observe how the Lord opened the doors to new fields for our missionaries and how the deaf joyfully received the Gospel and confessed their Lutheran faith, we may also note difficulties, with which conscientious workers meet in this mission, and occasional setbacks to the cause of Christ's kingdom, among the deaf. With a full view of this we shall be led to praise God for the success of the Gospel among the deaf, as the Christians in Jerusalem did when they heard of Peter's success in preaching the Gospel among the Gentiles. We read they "glorified God, saying, Then hath God also to the Gentiles granted repentance unto life," Acts 11:18. So may our hearts be filled with praise towards our God and Savior, when we rehearse how wonderfully God has led us and tell of the great things He has done for us. His name be glorified! A. C. D.

STUDIES IN LUTHER'S CATECHISM The Sixth Petition of the Lord's Prayer. "And Lead Us Not Into Temptation."

The old year we closed with this prayer: "And forgive us our trespasses, as we forgive those who trespass against us." God's children ended the year with peace and forgiveness from their Father, and with forgiveness in their hearts towards others. But with what prayer should we begin the new year? Oh, the enemies are so strong, and we are so weak; the temptations are so many, and we so easily fall! Surely, we cannot find a better prayer for the new year, than the sixth petition:

"Lead us not into temptation."

Why pray these words to our Father in heaven? Does He try to lead us into sin? You all, dear readers, will answer: "No, no!" No, "God indeed tempts no one." You perhaps will say: "But do we not read in Genesis 22:1 that 'God did tempt Abraham'? And again, do we not read in John 6 that our Lord Jesus proved (tempted or tested) Philip?" Right you are, but if you read these chapters carefully, you will see that God did not tempt them to do evil, but intended to make strong their faith in Him, in His love and power. Thus God often tempts His children for their good, as also Mark 7:25-30 will show you. God's temptations always are for good, but never for evil, therefore "let no man say when he is tempted, I am tempted of God: . . . but every man is tempted, when he is drawn away of his own lust (evil desires)." James 1:13-14.

Again you ask, "Why then pray these words to our Father in heaven? What do we intend to say with these words?" Luther beautifully explains this to us, saving: "We pray in this petition that God would guard and keep us, so that the devil, the world, and our flesh, etc." We ask God to guard and keep us against our enemies who want to tempt and lead us into sin. Who are these enemies? Luther, with the Bible, speaks of three. The chief enemy is the devil. Of him Peter says: "Your adversary, the devil, as a roaring lion, walketh about, seeking whom he may devour (destroy)." 1 Peter 5:8-9. Yes, he walks about, and especially is near the Christians. He came into the garden to Adam and Eve, he came into the wilderness to our Lord Jesus, he is still to-day "going to and fro in the earth, and walking up down in it," Job 1:7. Remember the devil is also near you and desires to lead you into sin. And he is not alone. He has many helpers in his evil work. The second enemy is the world, or "sinners" as Solomon says in Proverbs 1:10. Of this world and its temptations Jesus speaks in

Matthew 18:7, "Woe unto the world because of offences (temptations to wrong)! For it must needs be that offences come." Daily the wicked world comes with pleasant words and invitations, urging men to go with them to their sinful joys and pleasures. And if man refuses, they try to frighten him upon the evil way with their mockery and laughter. Read Genesis 39 and see how the world tempts and invites! And all this would not be so bad, if we had not our own flesh or old Adam with all its sins and evil lusts (desires)! Our wicked heart daily tells us to listen to the devil and the world and to go with them upon the evil and broad way! It urges us on, saying, "O that will not harm! Just do it this one time!" Yes, "every man is tempted, when he is drawn away of his own lust." And these enemies are with us also during the new year. Indeed, when we think of them, we ought to flee to our heavenly Father and pray at the beginning of this year: "Lead us not into temptation."

For woe to us, if they succeed in their evil plans! And what are their intentions? Luther says, they want to deceive us, to give us false things for good things, as they did to Judas. They took away his Jesus and gave him a little money. So the devil and the world often deceive people. These then think they have bread in their hand, and, behold, they have a stone; they think they have peace with God by their good works, and in their last hour they see they have no peace; they think they have heaven, and at last will find themselves in hell. In this the devil and his helpers often succeed by false teaching by which they want to "seduce us into misbelief, or false belief." The devil is ever trying to fill the world with his lies, and the world eagerly helps him, and oh ! so many are deceived thereby. As he came to Eve, saying, "Ye shall not surely die," so he and his followers come and say: "There is no God," or, "Jesus is not the Son of God," or, "The blood of Jesus does not wash us from sin," or, "There is no devil nor hell." They want to take God and His word, Jesus and His blood from us. And when they have deceived us and led us into misbelief, they make us despair and give up all hope, as

they did to Judas. Read Matthew 27: 3-5 and see how the world treated him, after he had given Jesus into their hands. And in other shame and vice (sin) they try to lead us. You know how they made David and Peter fall. David became an adulterer and a murderer, and Peter denied his Lord. And in the same way they will seek to tempt and to lead us into sin during the new year. Oh, what will become of us? And they will come not only once, but again and again as the devil came thrice to our Lord and tempted Him. Come, let us hurry to our Father these first days of the new year and pray: "Lead us not into temptation! Keep and guard us! If Thou wilt let the enemies come near us with their many temptations, then we shall be lost. Come, defend us, heavenly Father!" And while we pray, let us be careful and not sit down with the world like Peter, lest we fall, nor love this world, lest we, like Demas, leave our dear Jesus. Also read Psalm 1:1.

Nevertheless we cannot be entirely free from all temptations. "Offences (temptations to sin) will come," says Jesus. We are still in this wicked world and while we are here. we shall be tempted to sin. The enemies will come to us with their temptations also during 1922. O what shall we do? Pray, my friend, as Jesus teaches us in this petition. Ask Him not to let you fall, but to give you power and wisdom to overcome these enemies and to win the victory. How necessary is this prayer! We are so weak and so easily fall! Therefore, pray, pray, pray, and God will give you the victory. This He wants to do especially by His word. This we learn from Jesus, our mighty Captain and Savior. The tempter came to our Lord three times with his temptations and three times the Lord meets him with the word of God, saying, "It is written," and the enemy must go away. Read Matthew 4:1-11 about this. Therefore be a good soldier of Jesus Christ, taking "the sword of the Spirit, which is the word of God, praying always with all prayer and supplication in the Spirit." Ephesians 6: 17-18. During the new year read the word of God in your Bible every day, meditate in that word day and night, do not neglect your services in

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which you with other Christians learn to use this word against devil, world, and flesh, continue in prayer, and also during the new year God will give you the victory over all enemies.

They were remarkably attractive and beautiful. The speakers showed that the deaf cling to the signs as their chief method of communication. We were also asked to address the gathering and showed that the deaf surely have reason to be grateful for the sign-language, not only because of the temporal advantages of education and material advancement which they derive from it, but also because through the signlanguage they are enabled to receive the full benefits of the church and pulpit just as abundantly as the hearing people.

In the evening of December 4th we were given an opportunity to address the hearing congregation of Rev. H. Zorn of S. Euclid, a suburb of Cleveland. We spoke in the interest of our Mission to the Deaf and wish to thank the pastor and his congregation for the encouragement they gave us. O. C. S.
