WHY A STATISTICAL NUMBER?

"I am not interested in numbers," perhaps several of our readers will say and at once lay aside this number of the Deaf Lutheran. But let us ask you one question: "Does not the Bible also bring numbers?" Indeed, it does. It tells you that Jesus had twelve disciples whom He called to follow Him. Again, after Christ had ascended into heaven, "the number of names together were about one hundred and twenty." And after Peter's sermon on Pentecost Day, "they that gladly received his word were baptized: and the same day there were added unto them about three thousand souls." Futhermore, when the disciples preached in the city, "many of them which heard the word believed; and the number of the men was about five thousand." Thus the Deaf Lutheran comes to you this month with numbers.

And why? Not for this reason that we want to come before you and say: "See, what we have done!" No, men of this world like to tell us in numbers of the great things they have done during the past year. Woe to us, if we bring these numbers in such a spirit. That is of the devil. We read in 1 Chr. 21, 1-2: "And Satan stood up against Israel, and provoked David to number Israel. And David said to Joab and to the rulers of the people, Go, number Israel from Beersheba even to Dan; and bring the numbers of them to me, that I may know it." If we gather these numbers simply that we "may know it," then God will be "displeased with this thing," 1 Chr. 21, 7.

No, as the Bible brings the number of those who were baptized on Pentecost and of those who believed only to the glory of God, so this Statistical Number, by telling you of those who were baptized and confirmed and believe in His name, should help to glorify God.

Therefore, Christian reader, look over this number carefully. See what the Lord has done by His word among the deaf. And then look up to heaven, and with us praise God saying:

> "O Mighty God and Holy, Fount of unchanging grace, Whose mercy ever shineth— The brightness of Thy face; To Thee all praise and glory, Thou God of love and might: The Father, Son, and Spirit— Thou uncreated Light!" J. L. S.

A WORD TO OUR DEAF

tion during the year 1925, how many deaf attended the services, how often the deaf came to the Lord's Table, how many are being instructed, how many have been baptized and confirmed, and how much the deaf have given for the Lord's work, etc. And while we look over these reports, it will be well if every one examine himself and ask: "Did I do my duty during the past year?" For our self-examination let us then ask a few questions.

Did I Always Help My Pastor During 1925?

Your pastor is called to do missionary work among the deaf. And his report shows that he has preached here and there seeking to bring lost souls to the cross of Christ and that he also has gained some for our Lord Jesus and His kingdom. That ought to fill your heart with joy. But, surely, a better report could have been given, if all the members had gladly and eagerly helped the pastor. How about you? Have you always defended your pastor when others criticised him and spoke against him? Did you yourself always speak well of your pastor? One word against your pastor can do great harm. Have you always tried to help him bring others to your Savior Jesus? Have you invited others to come with you to your services, your Bible class, etc.? And, above all, have you daily prayed for your pastor that God bless his labors unto the salvation of many souls? And if you have seen a Christian brother or sister walk on the evil way and perhaps become negligent in attending services or in partaking of the Holy Supper, have you spoken to them? I am sure, every one of us must confess: "I did not always help my pastor as I should have done," but then let every one also promise: "With the help of God, I will work more eagerly with my pastor and help him in his soul-saving work." May God grant it!

Did I Attend Services Regularly?

You have had regular monthly or bi-weekly services, yea, some of you had weekly services. What a great blessing! Regularly you could go to the house of God and see your pastor preach about Him who loved you and washed you from your sins in His own blood. Did you appreciate this? Look at the reports and you will see that the attendance in many places ought to have been better. Indeed. some were not able to attend because of sickness and other circumstances, but now ask yourself: "Did I attend services as regularly as I should have done? How many services were held and how many did I attend? Did I perhaps let the weather, or friends, or pleasure, or other things keep me from the house of God?" Deaf Christian, if you will not regularly attend services and not give a good example to others, how can you expect to win others for Christ and His word? Therefore during 1926 attend regularly, do not let anything keep you from going to the house of God, every service may be your last service here on earth! Jesus says: "He that is of God heareth God's word," John 8, 47, and "Blessed are they that hear the word of God, and keep it," Luke 11. 28.

Did I Often Go to the Lord's Table During the Past Year?

In your services Lord's Supper is celebrated several times during the year. In the Holy Supper the Lord Jesus comes to you and, in, with, and under the bread and wine, gives you His body to eat and His blood to drink, and seals to you His forgiveness, saying: "Given and shed for you for the remission of sins." And then Jesus says: "This do, as oft as ye drink it, in remembrance of Me." Did we, my friends, do it often during the past year as our Lord and Master wants us to? Look at the number of communicants and of those who have communed, and you will see that on the average every communicant came to the Lord's Table twice. Is that often? Yes, some have come often to the Holy Supper, but that shows that some have come perhaps only once during the whole year, or sad to say, not at all. Indeed, if every one of our deaf Christians

would keep in mind the words of our Lord Jesus, then instead of the 2,318 who communed there would be at least four or five thousand." "Jesus did not say, Omit this, or Despise this; but, This do ye, as oft as ye drink it, etc. Truly, He wants it done, and by no means neglected or despised: 'This do you', is His command." Let us often go to the Lord's Table during the new year and receive His rich blessing!

Did I Cheerfully and Gladly Give for the Lord's Work?

Collections are taken up in your services. The report shows that \$5,961.06 were collected by our deaf for our Mission, home purposes, etc., and \$676.44 for other synodical and charitable purposes. What is the amount given after the name of your city? How much have you given of that for the Lord's work? Have you given as much for Christ's work, as you, for instance, spent for pleasure? There are communicants and the collections 1,013 amounted to \$6,683.50, or to \$6.60 for every communicant. How much have you given? Remember, you never can give too much for your Lord and Savior who gave His life for vou. And there is a blessing in cheerful giving. God says: "He which soweth sparingly shall reap also sparingly: and he which soweth bountifully shall reap also bountifully. Every man according as he purposeth in his heart, so let him give; not grudgingly, or of necessity: for God loveth a cheerful giver." 2 Cor. 9, 6. 7. Let us be cheerful givers for the Lord's work during 1926!

In this manner let us study the report of 1925, and we shall receive great benefit therefrom, and, by God's grace, we shall be more zealous and more diligent in our duty to Him who loved us and died for us. May God grant it! —J. L. S.

A WORD TO OUR HEARING FRIENDS

To carry on our work among the deaf we need \$33,000 a year, and therefore our Mission is chiefly dependent upon the contributions and offerings of our hearing friends. Therefore we are sure that also they will welcome a statistical report on our work for 1925.

Seventeen Missionaries

The last report given was that of 1923. What is the progress in our work during these two years? Thanks to God, a steady progress is shown. In 1923 we had 13 missionaries in the field, today we have 17 men engaged in missionary work among the deaf. Just recently a new worker has been added to our ranks. Since July, 1924, the Rev. L. Heinecke has been working with our Cleveland missionary and learning the sign-language, and January 10, 1926, he was installed as pastor of the Pittsburgh Mission.

Fourteen Organized Congregations, 104 Preaching Stations, and Sixteen State Schools

These men serve 14 organized congregations, have 104 preaching stations, and work in 16 State Schools. That is quite a step forward. At the end of 1923 there were 10 organized congregations and 84 preaching stations and 16 State Schools, the report today therefore shows an increase of 4 congregations and 20 preaching stations. God opens one door after another, also in Canada a new station was opened. The congregations number 257 voting members, 72 more than at the beginning of 1924. Two years ago the number of communicants was 802, today there are 1013. During the past year three children were confirmed, 22 adults received Holy Baptism and 88 renewed their baptismal vow. Thus more than 100 were added to the list of communicants during 1925, and still 313 are being instructed and prepared either for baptism or confirmation. And the collections of 1925 amounted to \$1,120 more than those of 1923. Indeed, hearing friend, your money has not been spent in vain. Your labor of love has been richly blessed. Praise Him who gives the increase!

Seven Sunday-schools, Eight Bible Classes

Here and there work is being done with the pupils of oral schools. In many of the cities of our country day-schools are being established, and our missionaries are called upon to minister also to the spiritual needs of some of these children. The Cleveland mission-(Continued on page 15)

ary conducts a Sunday-school with some of these children every two weeks, 22 are enrolled and the average attendance is 14. Twice a month he also has meetings with hard of hearing people. Our Spokane missionary visits the Idaho School at Gooding once a month and holds Sunday-school with 4 deaf and 4 blind children. In Superior the Duluth missionary has three oral pupils with whom he meets every two weeks. In Minneapolis a weekly Sunday-school for pupils of the day school was begun in November, 1925. Ten are enrolled and, on the average, 6 attended. All these Sunday-schools are conducted orally. In other cities Sunday-schools are conducted also in the sign-language. In New York about 20 children come together every week for Sundayschool and instructions, the Sunday-school in Devils Lake, N. D., with an enrollment of 24 children and an average attendance of 19, was referred to in our last number. Our Kansas City missionary has a Sunday-school which meets every two weeks, attended by about 20. Besides some of our workers have Sundayschools for children of deaf parents, in most instances these children are instructed separately. Furthermore, the work in Bible classes must not be forgotten. Such classes are held monthly in Spokane, bi-weekly in Cleveland, Columbus, Detroit, Superior, Omaha, Sioux Falls, and weekly in Minneapolis.

All this goes to show that the word of our God and Lord is true: "My word shall not return unto Me void, but it shall accomplish that which I please, and it shall prosper in the thing whereto I sent it." Isaiah 55, 11. "Therefore, my beloved brethren, be ye steadfast, unmovable, always abounding in the work of the Lord, forasmuch as ye know that your labor is not in vain in the Lord." 1 Cor. 15, 58.
