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EDITORIAL

The Ascension

STUDIES IN THE CHIEF TEACHINGS OF THE BIBLE AND CATECHISM

The One, Unchanging, and Everlasting God

We have learned that the Father is God, and the Son is God, and the Holy Ghost is God. Now some one may think that the Father is one part of God, another part is the Son, and the Holy Ghost the third part. But God cannot be parted. "The Lord our God is one Lord," Deut. 6, 4. And this one God said unto Moses, "I Am that I Am: and He said, Thus shalt thou say unto the children of Israel, I Am hath sent me unto you," Exod. 3, 14. God is the "I Am." Therefore we also read, "God is Love," 1 John 4, 16. And Jesus also says: "I and My Father are one," John 10, 30, and "he that hath seen Me hath seen the Father," John 14, 9. You cannot therefore find only a part of God here and another part there, no, the one true God with all His justice and righteousness, with all His love and mercy is with me as well as with you! May this keep us from sin and be our comfort in everything!

And this God always is the same. Of this world we must say: "Change and decay in all around I see." Therefore David also writes of heaven and earth: "They shall perish, but Thou shalt endure (stay): yea, all of them shall wax old like a garment; as a vesture (dress) shalt Thou change them, and they shall be changed," but of God he says: "Thou art the same," Ps. 102, 26-27. Man changes, but not our God. To-day you may find a man kind and loving, to-morrow cruel and revengeful; to-day he is your friend, to-morrow your enemy, but "with God there is no variableness (change)," James 1, 17. He always is the same God who hates sin and must punish, but also the same "merciful and gracious God, who is slow to anger and plenteous in mercy," Ps. 103, 8. He always is "not a God that hath pleasure in wickedness," Ps. 5, 4, but a God that "pardoneth iniquity" in Christ Jesus and "delighteth in mercy," Micah 7, 18. You can always depend upon Him and His promises. A man makes a promise to-day, only in order to break it to-morrow, but God will "not lie or repent: for He is not a man, that He should

repent," 1 Sam. 15, 29. He is the "I Am," "the same yesterday, to-day, and forever." May we fear to sin against this God and firmly trust in Him and His mercy who says: "I change not," Mal. 3, 6.

And with this wonderful God there is no here and no there. When Solomon dedicated the temple he prayed: "Will God indeed dwell (live) on the earth? behold, the heaven and heaven of heavens cannot contain Thee," 1 Kings 8, 27. But then Jesus also says: "If a man love Me, he will keep My words: and My Father will love Him, and we will come unto him, and make our abode (home) with him," John 14, 23. This our God fills heaven and earth, and still He lives in the heart of a little child. Men can be only in one place at one time, but this our God is everywhere. Nobody can hide himself in secret places that He shall not see him, Jer. 23, 24. May this keep us from sin, for wherever we are we ever must say: "Thou God seest me," Gen. 16, 13. But then let us also comfort ourselves with this precious truth, for wherever we are we have the promise of our risen and ascended Savior: "Lo, I am with you alway, even unto the end of the world," Matth. 28, 20.

And with this God there also is no sooner and no later. He says: "I am the first, and I am the last," Is. 44, 6. Peter therefore writes of Him: "One day is with the Lord as a thousand years, and a thousand years as one day," 2 Pet. 3, 8. Man is to-day, and to-morrow he is not, but our God is the "everlasting God" (Is. 40, 28), the "King eternal" (1 Tim. 1, 17), and "His years shall have no end" (Ps. 102, 27). Therefore it is a fearful thing to fall into the hands of the living God (Hebr. 10, 31), for He must cast them that believe not in His Son to everlasting fire (Matth. 25, 41). But, oh! what comfort to know that the mercy of the Lord is from everlasting to everlasting upon them that fear Him (Ps. 103, 17), and that they who trust in His mercy in Christ Jesus shall ever be with the Lord (1 Thess. 4, 17).

HISTORY OF OUR LUTHERAN MISSION FOR THE DEAF

Minneapolis

(Continued)

From Rev. Salvner's report for 1926 we glean the following facts to illustrate the present status of Grace Congregation in Minneapolis: Communicant members 51, voting members 20, average attendance at services 31, total of free-will offerings \$395.26. When we compare this report with the report of the first services and difficulty of gaining deaf for instruction and confirmation, we must say that the Word of God has indeed born fruit, and we heartily join in the statement of our veteran missionary, "the Lord hath done great things for us; whereof we are glad." But there are several items of special interest in the history of Grace Congregation, Minneapolis, to which we would call attention before passing on to review the mission work done in St. Paul and other cities of the Minnesota fields.

Not great in numbers, but great in spiritual benefit to the deaf was the organization of a Bible Class in Minneapolis in 1918, which is attended by an average of 10 deaf every week. The class began by studying "Prophecies and their Fulfillment in the New Testament,' 'then the book of Acts and other books of the Bible were taken up for study. Those deaf who took part in these Bible Class meetings must have derived much benefit from systematic study of the Bible under direction of the pastor. We wish that every deaf-mute congregation would have such Bible classes and that every member would attend them regularly, what a blessing that would be for everyone and the mission in general!

Another prominent fact of great interest is the instruction and confirmation of deaf-blind by the Minneapolis missionary. We were privileged to be present when Rev. Salvner confirmed his first blind-deaf catechumen on April 27, 1913. This man learned to read the American Braille type for the blind, and our missionary was also obliged to study this method of writing out his lessons for the blind man; direct personal instruction was given, like the confirmation, by spelling into the hand of the man, who by feeling of the missionary's hand understood what was said to him. Instructing this man was a slow and laborious process, but we have divine assurance that the angels rejoice over every single sinner who confesses his faith in the Savior Jesus Christ, and surely the angels sang their heavenly praise to the Lord when this man was confirmed. And three such deaf-blind have been confirmed by our Minneapolis missionary!

A new thing of interest from Minneapolis is the Sunday School for pupils of the Minneapolis Oral School for the Deaf. A dozen deaf are attending this oral school this year. On last Ephphatha Sunday (1926), on the 25th anniversary of Rev. Salvner's ordination and installation as missionary to the deaf, he had the joy of baptizing and confirming his first oral-deaf convert. The outlook for future success is good, may God grant His blessing.

We cannot speak of the Rev. Salvner's mission work among the deaf in Minneapolis without stating that he preached regularly also to the deaf in St. Paul, beginning in 1901 until our Mission Board called a missionary to St. Paul, who then also took over part of Rev. Salvner's preaching stations in the Minnesota field. A more detailed discussion of the St. Paul mission will come in a separate article about that station and the present congregation. We shall next direct the reader's attention to the work of Rev. Salvner among the deaf of Minnesota outside of the Twin Cities, which work was carried on by the missionary through personal visits to various cities and sometimes through correspondence. A. C. D.

MISSION NEWS

Milwaukee Mission - There are three deaf and blind women in Milwaukee receiving regular spiritual attention from us. Miss Eva May Hollida, communicant member of our church, enjoys a good home with her parents and supports herself by sewing and weaving. Miss Hollida does not use the sign language and is therefore unable to join in our church services but the missionary visits her personally about once a week for an hour or more spelling into her hand a sermonette and review catechetical instructions. Miss Anna Johnson has been suffering in a hospital for about three months from a fractured spine and a bad case of anemia. Miss Johnson was a member of our church until several years ago, but gladly permits the present missionary's pastoral care for her. Miss Johnson has a lower limb amputated, has undergone eight or ten operations, and has suffered much from ill health. But in spite of her tremendous handicap in life she has managed to support herself and acquire a college education. Miss Minnie Dunck was also a member of our church until a few years ago and is now mentally ill at the State Hospital in Wauwatosa where we have been visiting her and trying to make her understand the main things of our salvation.

A number of years ago these three women were confirmed at one time in our local chapel and we hope to bring the two back again to the true and saving faith and the assurance of a better life in the hereafter. E. C. B.

Minneapalis Mission-Easter day was a day of joy also for our Minneapolis deaf. The altar was beautifully decorated with flowers, hymns were signed by some of our ladies and also by the whole congregation, and the pastor had the blessed privilege of preaching to 55 deaf from Matth. 28, 1, 10, urging them to "Rejoice, for the Crucified One Is Risen Again." Thirty-five partook of the Holy Supper and had their faith in the Risen Savior strengthened by eating and drinking the body and blood of Christ given and shed for them for the remission of sins. The Easter collection amounted to \$15,27. In the afternoon nine attended our oral Sunday-school. Also to them was given the blessed Easter message and they rejoiced with us. The Easter offering amounted to \$3.47. - On Monday Easter services were held with five deaf in Gaylord where four came to the Lord's Table and \$3.00 were given as an Easter Offering. The other stations also will have their Easter services in the course of the next weeks. May God bless this precious word of the Risen Savior and His finished salvation in the hearts of J. L. S. all!

Cleveland Mission—Milton Herbert Crittle, the son of Mr. and Mrs. Henry Crittle, was received into the Church recently. Mr. and Mrs. Henry Crittle travel by bus fourteen miles to attend our services and are numbered among our most faithful members.

In the past few months we have received a number of invitations to address hearing congregations upon the subject "Our Lutheran Missions for the Deaf." We hope to accept some of these in the near future. O. C. S.

Kansas City Mission—A patient sufferer from this vicinity, who "reckoned that the sufferings of this present time are not worthy to be compared with the glory which shall be revealed in us," (Romans 8:18) was called to his eternal rest shortly before the dawn of Easter Day. Mr. Charles Curtis of Lawrence, Kansas, is the deceased who now without a doubt sees Him, in whom he has believed. He faithfully believed in Jesus, the Savior of sinners. Mrs. Curtis mourns the loss of her husband. Our hearty sympathy goes out to the bereaved.

In our Easter services in Kansas City, Estelle Laughlin, the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. T. Laughlin, was received into Christ's kingdom through the act of Holy Baptism. Our adult class was not confirmed on Easter Day, but will be ready about Pentecost Sunday.

2,240 people attended Lutheran Noon-day Lenten services in Kansas City during Holy Week. These services were held in the Shubert Theater of the downtown district. We saw many hundreds of strangers in the audience. One man alone brought twelve employees of the First National Bank, after he had heard Monday's sermon. These Noon-day services are financed by the Lutheran Publicity Association of Greater Kansas City. In an endeavor to help save souls by reaching the unchurched, eight members of Pilgrim have also joined this Association.

At last we can report that Kansas City and vicinity Lutheran deaf have pledged about \$8.00 as their monthly contribution, or part payment, of the missionary's salary. However, not all pledges have been returned.

When our deaf friends find it impossible to come long distances to our services, we bring the Gospel right to their homes. Such is the case with deaf of southwestern Missouri, and northeastern Oklahoma. A special rush is on among the miners and so these people cannot come the usual thirty-five miles on Sundays, to services at Joplin. Therefore, we worship in the home of deaf either in Picher or Commerce, Oklahoma. On March 27th twenty friends attended services at the latter station. Twelve of these were miners. Although some of these men work more than four hundred feet beneath the surface of the earth, they faithfully maintain that God's protecting hand is with them just as much there as it is anywhere else. Correct they are, for God's promise to all people and also all deaf states that "His mercy is on them that fear Him from generation to generation" Luke 1, 50. A. E. Ferber.

Los Angeles Mission-On the evening of April 3rd the installation services of Rev. G. Ferber took place at Trinity Lutheran Church. The newly appointed pastor for southern California was graduated from Springfield Theological Seminary, served charges in Canada and lately in Oxnard, California. It is of interest to note that he is the third brother to enter our missions for the deaf. His other brothers are serving at Duluth fields and the Kansas City Mission. Between 60 and 70 deaf attended the installation services. Rev. E. Eichmann who instructed the missionary in the sign-language, was appointed by the Board of Missions to install Rev. G. Ferber. Rev. E. Eichmann preached on the words of 1 Corinthians 1, 21-24. Basing his chief application upon the central words "But we preach Christ crucified," he said in part: "The Christ of the Cross is a stumbling block unto many even to this day. Even in the church there are such which would remove the salvation by faith in the Lord and set up a doctrine of morals and good works. But we shall all the more preach Christ and Him crucified. The Lutheran Church can truthfully say this for God has granted her such men who are not offended in the Cross of Christ. Therefore this day must be a day of rejoicing unto the Church, for it is able to send such a pastor to the deaf. This must be a day of rejoicing unto the deaf for they are to receive a preacher of the Cross of Christ. In the three parts of his sermon which followed he followed these thoughts: We preach Christ crucified. This is the message the new missionary is to bring. It is

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the message the deaf are to hear, and third, this is the work the church is to support."

After the sermon Mrs. F. Kuhn, a former member of the Seattle church signed hymn 488 "Lord, pour Thy Spirit from on high, and thine ordained servant bless." Then followed the installation proper in which the Revs. A. Michel, G. Witte, W. Faulstich assisted. The installed pastor announced the benediction and concluded the services with the common

Doxology. The entire services held in conjunction with a large hearing audience were interpreted by the writer. A liberal offering was made and consecrated to this mission work of the Lord.

The missionaries from Portland and Seattle spent a few days at Los Angeles looking for former acquaintances amongst the deaf and were delighted to again see people as the Kuhns, Larson, George, Hollinger. And amongst the former Los Angeles Lutherans, Wittwers, Moeller, Andersons. The missionaries looked up the deaf clubs and were cordially welcomed by all the deaf. Mr. C. Burson of the A. C. D. assisted us very kindly. From what we have seen and heard we have every right to believe that the kingdom of God can flourish amongst the deaf of Los Angeles. God grant it so. G. W. G.

Seattle Mission—Easter Day we are confirming Mr. and Mrs. N. C. Garrison and Mr. J. Adams. We

had also hoped to have Mr. and Mrs. R. Pickett complete their instruction of the Catechism until that time but their confirmation will take place a few weeks later. By confession of faith we received into our midst Mr. and Mrs. C. Wood. At present we are continuing with another instruction class of four to be confirmed in the summer months. Attendance has been excellent at our services this year. We followed a series of sermons based on the Old Testament Characters. These were until the season of Lent based on such men as Enoch, Noah, Abraham, Isaac, Jacob, Joseph, and three sermons on Moses. With fourteen members lacking steady employment and occasional illness our financial standing suffered in the first quarter of the year. Yet upon figuring the actual number of contributors we found that we still had done a bit better than the former year. At present we must regret to report the illness of Mr. W. E. Brown at the County Hospital, may the Lord be his strength. In some of the recent publications of the church Mrs. E. Eaton noticed that the Synod was eager to gather information on missions and fields. She has a complete edition of the Deaf Lutheran and many other publications which contain historical information of our work in the West. She is at present preparing an historical album which will be presented to the church and which we will be proud to possess. An excellent spirit in church work has been shown by L. Rasmussen and J. Adams. They always succeed in finding the tourists and newcomers to Seattle. On repeated occasions they have brought in strangers and the Lord has blessed such efforts. The deaf do well in following such examples for it is impossible for the traveling pastor to be posted on the arrivals. Ancortes, Wash., hitherto served once a month will be served each first and third Sunday. The response has been so heartily there that additional services have been found necessary. This will allow us to have an additional hour at Everett, Wash., which we can serve on the return trip from Anacortes. With services twice a month at Anacortes, the deaf of Bellingham will be able to attend on one or the other occasion. Our Victoria, B. C., field has a small flock of eager people. Our chief difficulty there is the division amongst the deaf caused by two systems of sign-language. This problem will solve itself in time when the deaf become united with one language. At Aberdeen, Wash., we will start a preaching station in the coming month. 14 deaf have found work there and have requested services. A class of three is being prepared for confirmation at Tacoma. Our deaf there will possibly merge their building activities with St. John's Church. This church plans on a building a parochial school and center for its people. Since their location is so ideal for the deaf, we have thought of uniting our forces and contribute towards the building of a unit in their school as a chapel for our purposes. Should this plan materialize a long felt need will be met in a simple and money saving manner. G. W. G.
