HISTORY OF OUR LUTHERAN MISSION FOR THE DEAF

The Minnesota Field

II.

In December, 1914, Rev. Salvner visited the North Dakota School for the Deaf at Devils Lake, and found over 50 Lutheran children there. During that year the missionary instructed 32 school children and in May, 1015, confirmed 3 adult deaf, the following year 6 children were confirmed. Miss Olga Anderson, an instructor at the school, kindly assisted Rev. Salvner with his classes among the children. Our missionary serves this station to-day, and a trip with him to the institution of North Dakota should interest our readers.

Rev. Salvner leaves Minneapolis at 5 o'clock on Friday, and arrives in Devils Lake Saturday at noon, for classes from 1 to 5 o'clock. The children are divided into three classes according to their age. Miss Anderson would meet the children every Sunday and explain the Bible lessons which were sent to them by Rev. Salvner. Upon his arrival, the missionary would instruct his three classes in rotation: catechetical instruction for the I class, catechetical instruction and Bible stories for the II class, and memorizing of the Commandments and short Bible stories for the III class. Briefly, we cannot go into details, this gives you an idea of the missionary's efforts to establish some Biblical knowledge in the minds of the youngsters for later instruction in the chief things of our Christian faith. This among the North Dakota deaf.

In South Dakota Rev. Salvner preached to the deaf of the city after a woman in Duluth had asked for services, claiming there had been no services for the deaf in two years. In 1918 the missionary began his services there. Children from the State School for the Deaf came to services in increasing number (30-40), and the superintendent asked for services at the school. Now our missionary is able to reach all of 70 children at the school. - In Watertown and Mitchell, South Dakota, services are also conducted monthly after deaf had been located there. This is the opening blossom of our mission work among the South Dakota deaf, may it bloom a full and precious flower in the future.

Other services for the deaf in recent years by the missionary from Minneapolis we must condense and call attention only to a few things of special interest. Over thirty deaf are served in the newer preaching stations of southern Minnesota, — Mankato, Northrop, Ortonville — and Dawson and Fergus Falls, farther south. At Fergus Falls the missionary devotes his pastoral attention to 3 deafmutes in the insane asylum (one of them blind also). At Patzau, Wis., a deaf couple was found with one hearing child and three deaf children (deaf children of deaf-mute parents are an unusual thing). The father had been baptized in the Catholic Church. Rev. Salvner baptized the rest of the family, and later was able to confirm the parents and three of their children. Instruction and services were held quite regularly, monthly, in the log hut in which these people lived. To-day this family is on the Duluth missionary's list.

Since September, 1926, Rev. Salvner, upon request of former members of his Minneapolis congregation, has held monthly services for the deaf in Faribault, Minn. Now he also is working among the children of Lutheran parentage in the school at the request of parents and pastors of those children. Very probably this station will require bi-weekly services in the future. — At Fargo, N. D., services are conducted at a fairly central place for a tri-city group of deaf: Sabin, Baker, Kindred, towns in Minnesota.

Running hurriedly over a list of stations which have been served by Rev. Salvner, from Minneapolis, in addition to his work in his home city, we find that the missionary should be well known in Minnesota, having preached quite regularly in about 20 cities of Minnesota and the Dakotas, and having preached occasionally or explored nearly a dozen other cities (to our knowledge, including even two cities in Michigan, which Brother Salvner looked over when on a vacation). We have not said too much in a previous article when we stated that Rev. Salvner had traveled much, and preached often. But our greatest boast is this: He preached Christ crucified, comfort and salvation to sin-stricken souls. And we must rejoice with gratitude toward God that our missionary's labor in the Minnesota field has been so blessed that more men were needed to carry on the work, which one man could not continue alone. In our next article we shall turn to the fields of those men. A. C. D.

STUDIES IN THE CHIEF TEACHINGS OF THE BIBLE AND CATECHISM

The All-Knowing God

When the risen Lord asked His risciple Peter: "Lovest thou Me?" He received this answer: "Lord, Thou knowest all things." And Jesus Himself tells us: "He that hath seen Me hath seen the Father," John 14, 9. Therefore these words of Peter fully describe the knowledge of our God. He knows all things, 1 John 3, 20. First of all only He knows Himself, for "no man hath seen God at any time," John 1, 18, and "the things of God knoweth no man," 1 Cor. 2, 11. Therefore "the only begotten Son, which is in the bosom of the Father, He hath declared Him," John 1, 18, and "the Spirit searcheth all things, yea, the deep things of God," 1 Cor. 2, 10. Therefore if you would know God you must learn it from the word of the Son and of the Spirit.

Then, only God knows man and the heart of man. Solomon prayed: "Thou, even Thou only, knowest the hearts of all the children of men," 1 Kings 8, 39. When Jesus said to the man sick of the palsy, "Son, be of good cheer; thy sins are forgiven thee," behold, certain of the scribes (Jewish teachers) said within themselves, "This man blasphemeth." 'And Jesus knowing their thoughts said, Wherefore think ye evil in your hearts?" Matt. 9, 4. Therefore David says Psalm 139, 2: "Thou knowest my downsitting and mine uprising, Thou understandest my thought afar off." He knows whether you love Him or not, you cannot hide your thoughts from Him, He knows the thoughts of your heart right now, my friend! "He that covereth his sins shall not prosper," Prov. 28, 13. Therefore turn unto God with sorrow for your sin and trust in Him who came to make peace with God for us by His blood. "Whoso confesseth and forsaketh his sins shall have mercy," Prov. 28, 13.

And so He knows all things, for "all things are naked and opened unto the eyes of Him with whom we have to do," Hebr. 4, 13, and "the eyes of the Lord are in every place, beholding the evil and the good," Prov. 15, 3. Therefore it is true as Jesus says, "The very hairs of your head are all numbered," Matth. 10, 30. He knows it if one of our hairs falls to the ground. O blessed are we! God knows all our troubles and tribulations, our sorrows and griefs. Only trust in Him who knows all things, He will not leave thee, nor forsake thee, Hebr. 13, 5.

God knows all that has been and all that is, and He knows also all that is to come. God challenges the false gods with these words: "Show the things that are to come hereafter, that we may know that ye are gods," Is. 41, 23. He declares the end from the beginning, Is. 46, 9-10. Study the things that God has foretold in the Old Testament, and see how all has been fulfilled! Or take only the things that have been foretold concerning the One who was to come, and then read the Gospel according to St. Matthew and you will see how wonderfully all things are fulfilled in our Lord Jesus. Our God knows al that is going to happen unto the end of the world. All is light before Him. Therefore we Christians need not fear those things that are to come, for our heavenly Father knows them all and He will direct everything for the good of them that love Him.

Our God knows all things, therefore our Catechism teaches us to say in the First Article: "He defends me against all danger, and guards and protects me from all evil." Joyfully we can look into the future and pray in the third petition of the Lord's Prayer, saying: "Thy will be done." And when it speaks of confession it tells us, "Before God we should plead guilty of all sins, even of those which we do not know, as we do in the Lord's Prayer," and then teaches us to trust in Him who, although He knew it before, went into that bitter suffering and death on the cross for us.

Indeed, "great is our Lord and of great power: His understanding is infinite (without end)." Ps. 147, 5. J. L. S.

MISSION NEWS

Detroit Mission—On April 24th Harold Christensen and Anna Paetow, both members of "Our Savior's Church of Deaf" of Detroit, were united in holy wedlock in the bride's home church in Romeo, Michigan. After the service in Toledo on May 1st the pastor visited Mrs. M. Bartow at her home. Mrs. Bartow had been sick with heart trouble for some time, but has shown some improvement of late. At her home we privately celebrated Holy Communion with her. The two Riehm brothers, Perry E. and George Jr., are continuing the study of Luther's Catechism. We also regularly have Miss Rosa Kraft, formerly of Findley, Ohio, with us in Toledo.

At the Easter service our treasurer, Mr. Wm. C. Pearce, was given a real surprise. After the service he was called to the front by the pastor, and the trustees of the church gave Mr. Pearce a pen and pencil set and letter opener in token of his faithful services for a number of years as treasurer. Pen, pencil, and opener are extremely necessary for the treasurer's work; being inscribed with his name, they make a fitting memorial of our esteem.

Mrs. John Anderson is still in North Dakota and has written us of the passing of her mother. We extend our hearty sympathy. They informed the public through the daily papers that 80 per cent of deafness among the 3,000,000 children in the United States suffering impaired hearing, can be cured. They advise careful examination of the conditions of the ears after any contagious disease, such as measles, scarlet fever, or continued cold, and recommend treatment at local ear clinics. O. C. S.

A pleasant surprise we had in our April services at Mitchell. Rev. F. C. Gade of Delmont had come and was ready to preach a sermon to our Mitchell deaf. He had studied the book of signs by Dr. J. S. Long, now and then assisted by Mr. and Mrs. E. S. Hanson of Armour. He had never seen him sign before, and were greatly surprised to see him step up before the deaf and preach. He delivered a Good Friday sermon based on the words of Christ, "It is finished," and then the pastor followed with an Easter sermon. He sees the great need of Gospel preaching among the deaf, and that has prompted him to study the sign-language. May God who has led him to do this grant that he before long will be glad to give all his time to missionary work among the deaf!

The Word of God indeed is a power of God unto salvation. In our April services at the South Dakota School we could preach to 44 deaf. After the services three boys came unto us and asked us whether they could get a copy of our monthly Bible Studies. One of them had received a copy from one of the confirmed boys and found them so interesting that he was anxious to have a copy of his own. One of these three is an Indian boy. Gladly we took their names and put them on our list. A few days later a letter arrived from one of the girls who attended our services. She wrote that she attended the services in which we spoke to the pupils about the Savior. Then she also told us that she is not yet baptized and would like to receive Holy Baptism and become a member of the Lutheran Church. We have sent her a Catechism and are preparing her for the Sacrament of Holy Baptism. Let us always abound in the work of the Lord, forasmuch as we know that our labor is not in vain in the Lord! J.
