Christmas

The greatest day in all the history of the world was not the day upon which man produced scientific marvels, such as the radio, aeroplanes and sound pictures, but it was the day upon which Jesus was born.

If we had no Savior our world would be a dark, dead, hopeless, dismal, morally paralyzed and heathen place in spite of all modern improvements and physical comforts. Jesus, through His incarnation and merits, has made it a bright, glad and hopeful world.

Christmas tells us of the incarnation of the Son of God, begotten by the Holy Spirit and born of the virgin Mary. The ancient prophets were not in error when they looked into the future in their day and described this event just as it happened centuries later.

Christmas reminds us of the one stupendous fact that God clothed Himself in human flesh to live a sinless life and to pay the debt of sinful man to the throne of justice. Jesus came to seek and to save that which was lost and in the darkness of despair. Love for us, a world lost in sin, was the motive of His coming. A living faith in the Child of Bethlehem alone can enable a man to go forth out of the sepulcher of sin, death, hopelessness and despair into a world of spiritual gladness and salvation.

By the incarnation of Jesus even death to the Christian is not the termination of a happy state, but merely a translation, for our Redeemer died not only to save us, but also to rule over us. The jazzing, speeding, materialistic children of this world know no love for the greatest name under heaven; their hearts remain cold and indifferent. Eventually they will become bored with the pleasures and treasures of his earth; eternal regrets will be their lot.

Faith in the new-born Child of Bethlehem, however, makes us happy and true to God and our fellowmen; it upholds us in times of peril and affliction; it creates a true state of contentment, peace, hope and progress. Let us therefore remain faithful to our Christian hope in these days of material success and luxurious conditions, just as the early Christians remained true in the midst of persecutions, perils and afflictions! May we ever be able to join sincerely in the hymn of the poet:

"Let us all with gladsome voice Praise the God of heaven, Who to bid our hearts rejoice His own Son hath given.

To this vale of tears He comes, Here to serve in sadness, That with Him in heaven's fair homes We may reign in gladness.

STUDIES IN THE CHIEF TEACHINGS OF THE BIBLE AND CATECHISM

Jesus Christ, Conceived in the Virgin Mary by the Holy Ghost

Christ was to be born of a woman, and this woman was "of a city in Galilee, named Nazareth, a virgin espoused (engaged) to a man whose name was Joseph, of the house of David; and the virgin's name was Mary." Luke 1. In her Christ was conceived, and it was a great wonder! When the angel Gabriel came and said unto her: "Thou shalt bring forth a son, and shalt call His name Jesus," she answered, "How shall this be, seeing I know not a man?" And the angel answered and said to her, "The Holy Ghost shall



come upon thee, and the power of the highest shall overshadow thee; therefore that holy thing which shall be born of thee shall be called the Son of God." Luke 1. And to Joseph who was minded to put her away the angel said: "That which is conceived in her is of the Holy Ghost," and Matthew then writes: "All this was done that it may be fulfilled which was spoken of the Lord by the prophet, saying, Behold, a virgin shall be with child, and shall bring forth a son." Matth. 1, 20-22. See also Isaiah 7, 14.

Jesus Christ, conceived in the Virgin Mary by the Holy Ghost! Therefore the angel said: "That holy thing which shall be born of thee shall be called *the Son of God,*" Luke 1. And the prophet writes: "They shall call His name *Immanuel*, which being interpreted is, *God with us,*" Is. 7, 14 and Matth. 1, 23. And Paul writes: "God sent forth *His Son, made of a woman.*" Gal. 4, 4. Thus God's Son became man and is called "her, the woman's seed," Gen. 3, 15, and Hebrews 2, 14 says that He "took part of flesh and blood."

See how Jesus Christ, the Son of God, humbled Himself. He did not come into this world as a perfect and grown-up man, but was conceived in a sinful woman. Also Mary was a sinner, for also she is among those of whom it is said: "All have sinned," Romans 3. She was sinful, for when she found her boy Jesus in the temple after a search of three days and said to Him, "Behold, Thy father and I have sought Thee sorrowing," He answered, "How is it that ve sought Me? Wist (know) ye not that I must be about My Father's business?" Luke 2, 48, 49. And when she came to her Son at the wedding of Cana, saying: "They have no wine," He said, "Woman, what have I to do with thee?" John 2. In this sinful woman the Son of God was conceived and from her He took His flesh and blood, as we learned before, but without sin. The angel said to Mary: "That holy thing which shall be born of thee," Luke 1, and in Hebrews 4, 15 we read: "He was in all points tempted like as we are, yet without sin."

And now listen in wonder! The Son of God was conceived in a sinful woman, became like unto us "to make reconciliation (peace) for the sins of the people," for us who like David must say: "Behold, I was shapen in iniquity; and in sin did my mother conceive me." Praise and thank God for it!

Indeed, there are many who think this all foolishness. But that is to be expected, for "the natural man receiveth not the things of the Spirit of God: for they are all foolishness unto him: neither can he know them, because they are spiritually discerned, that is, known only by the Spirit." 1 Cor. 2, 14. Let us, however, believe the word of God and confess with our Catechism in the Apostles' Creed: "And I believe in Jesus Christ, His only Son, our Lord, who was conceived by the Holy Ghost," and in the explanation of it: "I believe that Jesus Christ, true God, begotten of the Father from eternity, and also true man, born of the Virgin Mary, is my Lord."

In fact, Mary was now living in a different social circle from what she had in former days.

Joe Hardy, the salesman, visited the city on his quarterly trip. Having interviewed his customers, he decided to stroll about the streets while waiting the supper hour. Mary Bryan and three of her schoolmates had chosen this same street on their way down town from the college campus. And thus it happened that Joe Hardy and Mary Bryan met that day in the city, Joe alone, and Mary in company with three society friends.

"Good afternoon, Miss Bryan." Joe's salutation, spoken in a gentle tone was Mary's first knowledge of his presence. She glanced up quickly, and then without a sign of recognition, she passed on without speaking.

"Was that man speaking to you?" one of her friends asked.

"Yes," Mary replied. "I used to know him back home, but that doesn't mean he has the right to address me now whenever he pleases."

"I should say not," the girls said. "You served him just right by ignoring him."

And this was the man who had saved her life at the risk of his own. The girls made several slighting remarks about Joe, but Mary never opened her mouth to utter one word in his defence.

"An example of base ingratitude," is your verdict toward Mary, and your impartial judgment is correct. There is not the least thing to justify Mary in her conduct on that occasion. But don't neglect to read this next paragraph.

When you were in the stream of sin and rushing onward to eternal destruction, Jesus saved you. You ceased to struggle and trusted your salvation to Him by faith. He placed your feet on solid ground. Do you remember that service, where you stood and acknowledged your gratitude to Jesus Christ for saving you, and you pledged your loyalty to Him? And then do you remember that occasion when in the company of worldly friends, He spoke to you and you refused to recognize Him? Your friends spoke slightingly of Jesus Christ, and you kept your silence. Among Christian friends you took your place on the side of Christ, but when you were found in the

company of worldly friends, Christ had no recognition from you. And He is the One who has saved you. Base ingratitude!

Do you wonder that the heart of Christ is often grieved by those who should show gratitude? It is as true today as it was yesterday, — Christ is being wounded in the house of His friends. Instead of saying, "Here is the One who saved my soul for time and eternity," we say by our actions, "I'd rather not have folks know that I am acquainted with You right now. It will be all right on Sunday, but right now it really isn't convenient for me to recognize You." Yes, you and I have been right there, and it doesn't make us feel good when we think of how we have treated Christ on those occasions.

A day is coming when we want Him to recognize us as belonging to Him. Today is the day when He wants us to acknowledge Him before the Father. -L. L. W.

"God sent forth His Son, made of a woman"

John who wrote this Gospel is not John the Baptist, but one of the twelve disciples, often called "the one whom Jesus loved." He wrote this Book, led by the Holy Ghost, to set forth that the little Child of Bethlehem is the mighty God and Savior. He writes in the Twentieth Chapter: "These are written, that ye might believe that Jesus is the Christ, the Son of God; and that believing ye might have life through His name." Such a Savior we need, only such a Savior can save us from sin, death, and devil! May God bless these Studies in your heart that you in true faith worship this Child in the manger, born for you, and say: "My Lord and my God."

Study for Sunday, December 7

"Jesus said, It is finished." John 19, 30

Bible Lesson: Luke 24, 44-47

"And He said unto them, These are the words which I spake unto you, while I was yet with you, that all things must be fulfilled, which were written in the law of Moses, and in the prophets, and in the psalms, concerning me. Then opened He their understanding, that they might understand the scriptures, and said unto them, Thus it is written, and thus it behoved Christ to suffer, and to rise from the dead the third day: and that repentance and remission of sins should be preached in His name among all nations, beginning at Jerusalem."

Christ is risen! The disciples saw His pierced hands and feet, and He ate before them. Yes, Jesus lives! And the Bible is fulfilled, not one word has failed! Jesus often had spoken to them of this while He was yet with them, that all things must be fulfilled, which were written in the Old Testament, in the law of Moses, and in the prophets, and in the psalms, concerning Him. They wrote that the Christ must suffer and die and rise again. And now it is all fulfilled, and they ought to rejoice, and we with them. Every word of the Bible is true. "Thus it is written, and thus it behoved (was necessary) Christ to suffer and to rise from the dead the third day."

But man with his mind cannot understand these things. God must give light and understanding. Therefore Jesus opened the understanding of the disciples, that they might know the Scriptures, the things written in the Bible. So God must give us His Spirit and understanding. Therefore, when we read our Bible, when we come together in church, let us pray with David: "Teach me, O Lord; give me understanding." Ps. 119, 33. 34.

And why must Jesus suffer and die and arise again on the third day? "That repentance (turning from sin to God with sorrow) and remission (forgiveness) of sins be preached in His name among all nations, beginning at Jerusalem." O if Jesus had not suffered and died on the cross, then we could not preach forgiveness of sins in His name. But now He has died for the sins of the world and is risen again; the Bible is fulfilled and salvation is finished; and now this good news can be preached among all nations and peoples. Friend, we are saved! Let us trust in this Savior and thank God for it!

Again read this Bible lesson and answer these questions in writing: 1. What should we pray when we read our Bible or come together in church? 2. Why must Jesus suffer and die and rise again on the third day?

Prayer: Mighty Savior, thanks to Thee for Thy suffering and death and rising again on the third day! Every word written in the Bible concerning Thee is fulfilled and our salvation is finished. Let us all trust in this Thy salvation and thank Thee now and forever. Amen.

Study for Sunday, December 14

"We will rejoice in Thy salvation." Ps. 20, 5

Bible Lesson: Luke 24, 48-53

"And ye are witnesses of these things. And, behold, I send the promise of the Father upon you: but tarry ye in the city of Jerusalem, until ye be endued with power from on high. And He led them out as far as to Bethany, and He lifted up His hands, and blessed them. And it came to pass, while He blessed them, He was parted from them, and carried up to heaven. And they worshipped Him, and returned to Jerusalem with great joy, and were continually in the temple, praising and blessing God. Amen."

The disciples saw the risen Savior, and we rejoiced with them in His finished salvation. But now He says to them and to every one of us: "Ye are witnesses of these things." The disciples should go out and tell the world of these great things. And so we should bring this good news of forgiveness of sins by faith in Jesus to all people. We should speak to our friends and neighbors of sin and the Savior and gladly we should give our money and help send out men with the saving Gospel to all the world so that many more people be saved with us now and forever. Will you be a witness for Jesus, my friend?

You perhaps will say: "O I am so weak and helpless! How can I be a witness for Jesus?" Surely, the disciples felt the same way. Therefore Jesus said to them: "Behold (see), I send the promise of the Father upon you; but tarry (stay) ye in the city of Jerusalem, until ye be endued ((filled) with power from on high (heaven)." This promise of the Father is the Holy Spirit. Him the Lord Jesus poured out upon His disciples on Pentecost, fifty days after Easter, and they were filled with power and they boldly spake to all. O let us also ask for His Holy Spirit that also we go out filled with power and boldly speak to all the world of sin and the Savior, and so win them for Christ!

The work of Jesus now was done, and He was ready to go to the Father. Therefore He led His disciples out to Bethany, and He lifted up His hands, and blessed them; and while He blessed them, He was parted from them, and carried up to heaven. With a blessing He left them, and this blessing was with them at all times, also still is with His church to-day. Therefore as the disciples so we ought to do this our work for Jesus with joy. We know He is in heaven ruling over all things, and His blessing is upon us, therefore we ought to worship Him with joy. Indeed, they who know this Jesus who was crucified and dead for sinners, and then arose again with the victory over sin, death, and devil, and now is gone to heaven ruling over all the world and blessing His people, I say, they who know Him must worship Him with joy. Do you know Him? Yes? Then like the disciples continually (always) love to be in the house of God, praising and blessing (glorifying) God for this great salvation in Christ Jesus. Amen.

Again read this Bible lesson and answer these questions in writing: 1. What should we do as witnesses for Jesus? 2. Why should we worship Jesus with joy?

Prayer: Blessed Savior, Thou wast crucified and dead for sinners, Thou didst rise again with the victory for us over sin and death and devil, and now Thou art in heaven over all things and dost still bless Thy church. Therefore we worship Thee with joy and praise and glorify Thee and Thy Father and the Holy Spirit for this great salvation forever and ever. Amen.

Study for Sunday, December 21

"Unto you is born this day in the city of David a Savior, which is Christ the Lord."

Luke 2, 11

Bible Lesson: John 1, 1-5

"In the beginning was the Word, and the Word was with God, and the Word was God. The same was in the beginning with God. All things were made by Him, and without Him was not anything made that was made. In Him was life; and the life was the light of men. And the light shineth in darkness, and the darkness comprehendeth it not."

This is the Sunday before the joyful Christmas Day! Why this great joy on this day? Because a wonderful Child was born on that day about 1900 years ago. And who is this wonderful Child? Our lesson for to-day will tell us.

In these verses you read about "the Word." This "Word" is the only begotten Son of God who was made flesh as v. 14 tells us. Therefore for "the Word" you can put the name "Jesus Christ," and then you read: "In the beginning was Jesus Christ, and Jesus Christ was with God, and Jesus Christ was God. The same (Jesus Christ) was in the beginning with God." These verses therefore teach us that the Child of Bethlehem is the true God. He was in the beginning with God, He is from everlasting, and therefore He is God. We therefore sing during the happy Christmas-tide:

> "A great and mighty wonder Our Christmas Festal brings; On earth, the lowly Infant, Behold the King of kings!"

Indeed, many people will not worship this Child of Bethlehem as God. They will not believe that this little Child in the manger is true God. They will accept Him only as a good man and a great teacher. But God's word tells us that He is God. The angel on Christmas Day said to the shepherds: "Unto you is *born this day* in the city of David a Savior which is *Christ the Lord.*" And our lesson furthermore says: "All things were made by Him; and without Him was not anything made that was made." This Child of Bethlehem is the Maker of heaven and earth. Do not let men deceive you with their wisdom about Jesus, but believe His word and sing of this Child:

"'Tis Jesus Christ, my Lord and King, He doth to all salvation bring."

Yes, He brings salvation, for we read: "In Him was life, and the life was the light of men." The whole world was dead in sin and sat in darkness. And now this Jesus came, and He brought life to a dead world and the light of salvation shone into its darkness, and so He has become the light and salvation of men. Therefore the angel's message to the shepherds and to all the world reads: "Unto you is born a Savior." O joy, a Savior for the world! But, how sad, the darkness, the people who sit in darkness and sin, comprehends (receives) Him not. So many will not believe in Him, they love sin and do not want this light, and therefore must go to everlasting death and everlasting darkness. Come, receive this Light as your King and Savior and thank Him for this life and light, His precious Christmas gifts!

Again read this Bible lesson and answer these questions in writing: 1. Who is this wonderful Child of Bethlehem? 2. Why was this wonderful Child born?

Prayer: O Thou Child of Bethlehem, I rejoice in Thee and Thy precious Christmas gifts. I was dead in sin, and Thou gavest me life; I sat in darkness, and Thou broughtest light and salvation to me. How shall I thank Thee? Grant that I always receive Thee as my King and Savior and help to bring Thy life to many others who still sit in death and darkness. Amen.

Study for Sunday, December 28

"I am the light of the world." John 8, 12

Bible Lesson: John 1, 6-14

"There was a man sent from God, whose name was John. The same came for a witness, to bear witness of the Light, that all men through him might believe. He was not that Light, but was sent to bear witness of that Light. That was the true Light, which lighteth every man that cometh into the world. He was in the world, and the world was made by Him and the world knew Him not. He came unto His own, and His own received Him not. But as many as received Him, to them gave He power to become the sons of God, even to them that believe on His name: which were born, not of blood, nor of the will of the flesh, nor of the will of man, but of God. And the Word was made flesh, and dwelt among us, (and we beheld His glory, the glory as of the only begotten of the Father,) full of grace and truth."

"Thy Light is come!" was the message of the happy Christmas Day. Of this Light John the Baptist spoke to the people. He was sent from God to bear witness or to speak of this Light. He came and pointed to this Jesus, the Light of the world. This was the true Light, that lighteth or brings salvation to every man that cometh into the world knew Him not. So many knew Him not while He was in the world, and so many know Him not to-day. Yes, also His own people received Him not. Sorrow must fill our hearts. Here is a Savior for all the world, and many will not believe in Him.

But did all the world receive Him? Did all the world rejoice in His salvation? O no, He was in the world, and He made the world, and the world knew Him not to-day. Yes, also His own people received Him not. Sorrow must fill our hearts. Here is a Savior for all the world, and many will not believe in Him.

O thanks to God that there are some who receive Him. To them who received Him, He gave power or the right to become the sons of God. And who are they? They that believe on His name. Yes, they who believe in Him and receive Him as their King and Savior have become children of God. And how did they become God's children? They were born not of blood, nor of the will (wish) of the flesh, nor of the will of man, but of God. It is not by their reason or strength or any man's will that they have become children of God. No, they are born of God by faith in Jesus, the Word, the true God.

And how did this Word become the salvation of men? Our lesson answers: "The Word was made flesh." This is the Christmas wonder, the greatest of all wonders! God's Son was made flesh, He came into this world as a little Child, and dwelt (lived) among men. This man Jesus truly was the Son of God, for John writes: "We beheld (saw) His glory, the glory as of the only begotten (Son) of the Father." The disciples heard His wonderful words and saw His wonderful works, and again and again they had to confess: "Thou art the Christ, the Son of the living God." And of Him John furthermore says: "Full of grace and truth." This Son of God made flesh brought grace and forgiveness from heaven. He came and spoke the truth about sin and the way to life and salvation. And He is full of grace and truth also unto us. May God help every one of us that we learn the truth of Jesus and by faith in Him receive God's grace and forgiveness!

Again read this Bible lesson and answer these questions in writing, and then send all your answers to your pastor: 1. What must fill our hearts with sorrow? 2. What is the Christmas wonder, the greatest of all wonders?

Prayer: Jesus Christ, Thou Son of God made flesh, help that we believe in Thy name and by faith become children of God and children of light. To-day, on the last Sunday of the year, we thank Thee for Thy grace and truth during the old year and pray Thee, let Thy grace and truth be with us also during the new year. Amen.

Rev. E. Hischke, one of the St. Louis candidates we secured for our work among the deaf, has been with us since September 1, in order to get a better knowledge of the sign-language and the necessary practice. It did not take long before he could also be

of help to us. The last Sunday in September he preached his first sermon in the sign-language in Grace Chapel, and as the deaf testified, was understood by all. Since then he has made several trips for the Minneapolis and St. Paul missionaries.
