STUDIES IN THE CHIEF TEACHINGS OF THE BIBLE AND CATECHISM

Born of the Virgin Mary

"That which is conceived in Mary is of the Holy Ghost," the angel said to Joseph when he was minded to put her away. Jesus Christ, the Son of God, conceived in a woman! O how Jesus humbled Himself!

And then He was born of a woman! When Joseph had gone to Bethlehem with Mary to be taxed, "so it was that while they were there, the days were accomplished that she should be delivered (give birth to the child)." Luke 2, 5.6. Jesus Christ, the God-man, was born of a mother as other children. The angel said to her: "Thou shalt conceive in thy womb, and bring forth a Son, and shalt call His name Jesus," Luke 1, 31. The prophet Isaiah spoke of this in the Old Testament, saying, "Behold, a virgin shall conceive, and bear a son, and shall call His name Immanuel," Is. 7, 14. See also Matthew 1, 22. 25. And we therefore sang with the Prophet Isaiah on Christmas Day, and still sing it today, "Unto us a child is born," Is. 6, 9.



And He was born a very poor child. Luke tells us: "And she brought forth her firstborn son, and wrapped Him in *swaddling clothes*, and laid Him in a *manger*, because there was no room for them in the inn." Luke 2, 7. This child was born in a barn and lay on hay and straw in a manger! Therefore Paul says: "Though He was rich, yet *He became poor*." 2 Cor. 8, 9.

A poor little child, and yet the Son of God, yes, the Lord of lords. In Gal. 4, 4 we read: "God sent forth His Son, made of a woman." To Mary the angel said, "The holy thing which shall be born of thee shall be called the Son of God." Luke 1, 35. And He was born at the time which God foretold by His prophets. Old Jacob waited for this salvation, and of it he spoke when blessing his sons, saying to Judah: "The sceptre shall not depart from Judah, nor a lawgiver from between his feet, until Shiloh come." Gen. 49, 10. The Shiloh, or Savior, should not come until the Jews had lost their kingdom. And so it happened. Jesus was born when the Romans ruled over the land of the Jews. Another prophet spoke of the place of His birth! In Micah 5, 2 we read: "Thou, Bethlehem Ephrata, — out of thee shall He come forth unto Me that is to be *ruler in Israel.*" Therefore when the wise men came to Jerusalem, seeking the new-born King of the Jews, and King Herod

demanded of the chief priests and scribes where Christ should be born, they answered. "In Bethlehem of Judaea: for thus it is written by the prophet." Matth. 2. A poor Child, but a wonderful Child! It is Christ the Lord, as the Christmas angel said. O see how He humbled Himself!

He humbled Himself and was made under the law; He was circumcised the eighth day; He was subject to His mother and Joseph; He fulfilled all righteousness; He came not to do His own will, but the will of the Father, and He delighted to do this will; and He was tempted in all points as other men, yet without sin. Indeed, a holy thing was born of Mary, coming in the form of a servant and in the likeness of men, Phil. 2, 7. And why all this? Paul answers: "To redeem them that were under the law, that we might receive the adoption of sons," Gal. 4, 4, 5, or as Jesus Himself says: "God so loved the world that He gave His only begotten Son, that whosoever believeth in Him should not perish, but have everlasting life." John 3, 16.

Rejoice, for "unto us a child is born, unto us a son is given," Is. 9, 6. And this child is ours for the new year! God's Son became our Brother, and His promise to us is: "Lo, I am with you always." Matth. 28, 20. Thanks and praise unto God for His unspeakable gift, 2 Cor. 9, 15.

INFORMATION OF GENERAL INTEREST

In taking further steps looking forward to the education and christianization of the Chinese deaf we have had occasion to write Miss Anita Carter, superintendent of a school for the deaf in Chefoo, China. Very recently we had a letter from Miss Carter, also some reports which give an insight into all the work being done among the deaf in China at this time.

Miss Carter states that "there are thousands of little deaf children in China who are not in schools. China's resources are not sufficient to enable her to provide educational facilities for them. There are only seven schools for the deaf in the whole of China and these are small owing to inadequate support and lack of trained teachers. Less than two hundred deaf children are in school at the present time."

The Chefoo school was the first school for the deaf in China and was founded in 1887 in Tengchow by Mrs. Annetta T. Mills. The school is supported by the Presbyterian Board of Foreign Missions in the U. S .A. and by private subscriptions. The latest available report shows an enrollment of forty-four children.

In a previous article on this subject we ventured the belief that support for a Lutheran School for the Deaf in China would not be lacking. In addition to the contributions already acknowledged we wish to thank the following donors: Mrs. O. Krauss, St. Paul, \$5.00, Mrs. J. Voight, Wheaton, Ill., \$10.00. November 17, 1930, we received one dollar in an envelope postmarked St. Paul without a single word or name accompanying it. This we have taken the liberty of adding to the "School for the deaf in China Fund." The total received for this purpose is now \$78.00.

We are heartily thankful for these evidences of interest and trust that others may be inclined to assist in this noble cause.

"God is my salvation"

Or, will you have both good and evil days, which? O blessed are you if you can say at the beginning of the new year: God is my salvation." Then you need not fear, nor be afraid. And Jesus will say to you: "Let not your heart be troubled: ye believe in God, believe also in me."

Yes, believe also in Jesus! Only in Him God is our salvation. And to this Savior the Bible Studies also for this month will lead you. Read them, one for every Sunday, and you will sing in good and evil days: "God is my salvation. I will fear no evil."

Study for Sunday, January 4

"Jesus Christ the same yesterday, and today, and forever." Hebrews 13, 8

Bible Lesson: John 1, 15-18

"John bare witness of Him, and cried, saying, This was He of whom I spake, He that cometh after me is preferred before me: for He was before me. And of His fulness have all we received, and grace for grace. For the law was given by Moses, but grace and truth came by Jesus Christ. No man hath seen God at any time; the only begotten Son, which is in the bosom of the Father, He hath declared Him."

John bears witness or spoke of Jesus, crying with a loud voice, "This is He of whom I spake." John again and again spoke of this Jesus, for Him he should prepare the way. So every true minister will speak of Christ, and of Him alone. And what did he say of Him? "He that cometh after me is preferred before me, that is, has received greater honor than I, for He was before me." This Jesus came after John, but He received greater honor because He was before John. You ask: "How can Jesus be before John, when He was born after John?" Friend, Jesus is also God's Son, the true God. As God He is before John and before all things, but He became man and came after John. Jesus Christ, true God and true man!

And why did He come? John tells us that He is come to bring fulness of grace, the unearned favor or forgiveness of God for us all. John says that he and the other Christians have received of His fulness, grace for grace, much grace and everlasting grace. This grace or forgiveness is for all. He has grace for you, grace for me, grace for every one! Have you received this grace? Yes? Then a happy new year is yours!

This grace or forgiveness a man can receive only by Jesus Christ. "The law was given by Moses," but this law cannot give grace to the sinner. Moses gave the Law or the Commandments, which show us our many sins and God's wrath and curse. Grace and truth, that is true grace and forgiveness, came only by Jesus Christ. Only He can bring peace to a sinner's heart, for he perfectly kept all the commandments and paid for our sins with His blood.

And why can grace and truth come only by Jesus Christ? Because "no man hath seen God at any time," but only the Son, and therefore He only can tell us the truth about God and His love for sinners. He is the only begotten Son, and always is in the bosom (breast) of the Father or with the Father, and He has declared (told) to us the Father and His wonderful love of which we sang during the happy Christmas days. Come, trust in this Jesus Christ, and you will have grace and forgiveness, enough, for every day of the new year. And at last his grace will bring you to the Father and you will be with Him forever as Jesus Christ, the only begotten of the Father!

Again read this lesson and answer these questions in writing: 1. Jesus was born after John, how can He be before John? 2. Why did the Son of God become man?

Prayer: Jesus Christ, Thou everlasting God, Thou hast brought grace, enough grace, for all the world. Only by Thee can a sinner receive grace and forgiveness. We need this grace every day of the new year. Grant that we trust in Thee and receive this grace and then also bring this grace to other sinners for their salvation and Thy glory. Amen.

Study for Sunday, January 11

"Whosoever shall confess that Jesus is the Son of God, God dwelleth in Him, and He in God."

1 John 4, 15

Bible Lesson: John 1, 19-28

"And this is the record of John, when the Jews sent priests and Levites from Jerusalem to ask him, Who art thou? And he confessed, and denied not; but confessed, I am not the Christ. And they asked him, What then? Art thou Elias? And he saith, I am not. Art thou that prophet? And he answered No. Then said they unto him, Who art thou? that we may give an answer to them that sent us. What sayest thou of thyself? He said, I am the voice of one crying in the wilderness, Make straight the way of the Lord, as said the prophet Esaias. And they which were sent were of the Pharisees. And they asked him, and said unto him, Why baptizest thou then, if thou be not that Christ, nor Elias, neither that prophet? John answered them, saying, I baptize with water: but there standeth one among you, whom ye know not; He it is, who coming after me is preferred before me, whose shoe's latchet I am not worthy to unloose. These things were done in Bethabara beyond Jordan, where John was baptizing."

When people heard and saw John, they thought: "Perhaps this is the Christ, the promised King and Savior, who should come." And the Jews sent priests and Levites from Jerusalem to ask him, "Who art thou?" And this it his record, his testimony or confession. John now could have had great honor. He only need say: "Yes, I am the Christ." But he came to speak of that Light of the world, and therefore confessed, and denied not, but confessed, "I am not the Christ." The Jews believed that before Christ will come the prophet Elias of the Old Testament will come, and therefore they asked him: "Art thou Elias?" He said, "I am not." And again the Jews waited for the great prophet of whom Moses spoke, and therefore asked: "Art thou that prophet?" And he said, "No." He did not seek honor and glory. So we should always confess the truth, and not seek glory for ourselves.

They then asked him: "Who art thou? What sayest thou of thyself?" And he said as the Prophet Esaias had foretold in the Old Testament, that he is "the voice of one crying in the wilderness, Make straight the way of the Lord." John was in the wilderness to prepare the way for Jesus, he should prepare the hearts for the Savior.

Therefore he always spoke to people of their sin and pointed to Jesus. Of this Savior he spoke also to those who had come to him and asked, "Why baptizest thou (you) then, if thou be not the Christ, nor Elias, nor the prophet?" He then told them of One standing among them, whom they knew not, and this One is the Christ. And to Him all honor should be given. Therefore he again said: "He it is, who coming after me is preferred (is higher) before me," and then adds these words: "Whose shoe's latchet (strap) I am not worthy to unloose." So we should always seek the glory and honer of our Lord Jesus Christ. As John so let us lead people to our Lord and show them that He is the mighty Savior come from heaven, and so seek His glory always and humble ourselves.

These things were done in Bethabara beyond (on the other side), Jordan, where John was baptizing. This is the place which we should remember, for here John boldly confessed the truth before the enemies of Jesus and wanted honor for Him alone. And we should do the same in every place.

Again read this lesson and answer these questions in writing: 1. For whom should John prepare the hearts of the people? 2. Why should we remember Bethabara?

Prayer: Dear Savior Jesus Christ, grant that I as John boldly confess Thee before all Thy enemies and fear them not, so that Thy name be glorified and people learn to know Thee, the only Savior of the world. Amen.

Study for Sunday, January 18

"We know that this is indeed the Christ, the Savior of the world."

John 4, 42

Bible Lesson: John 1, 29-34

"The next day John seeth Jesus coming unto him, and saith, Behold the Lamb of God, which taketh away the sin of the world. This is He of whom I said, After me cometh a man which is preferred before me: for He was before me. And I knew Him not: but that He should be made manifest to Israel, therefore am I come baptizing with water. And John bare record, saying, I saw the Spirit descending, and remaining on Him, the same is He which baptizeth with the Holy Ghost. And I saw, and bare record that this is the Son of God."

The next day John again spoke of this Jesus. And wonderful words he said of Him! We ought to remember these words and memorize them. Which are they? He saw Jesus coming to him and said, "Behold (see) the Lamb of God. which taketh away the sin of the world." Do you know these beautiful words? In the Old Testament the Jews had to bring lambs for their sins, but these offerings could not take away sin. But here we see the true Lamb of God, and He takes away the sin of the world. You and I belong to the world, and therefore this Lamb of God takes away also our sin. Will you accept Him? Or will you not let Him take away your sin? Then, my friend, you shall be lost. Let Jesus take away your sin! Believe in Him, and your sins are gone!

And can this Jesus take away the sins of all people? Yes, John tells us that Jesus is not only man, but that He was before him (John). Jesus was born after John, but He was preferred (received greater honor) before him. And why? Because He was before John, He is from everlasting before all things, the true God. John at first did not know Him as the Savior, but he came baptizing with water to make manifest (known) to Israel (the Jews) this Savior, he should prepare the hearts of the people for His coming. But now he knew Him, for he saw the Spirit of God descending (coming down) from heaven like a dove, and it abode (stayed) on Him. And God had told him that on whom he would see the Spirit come down, that this would be the One who shall baptize with, or give, the Holy Spirit. And now John knew Him and said: "I saw, and bare (gave) record (testimony) that this is the Son of God." This Lamb of God is the Son of God, a mighty Savior, who surely can take away the sin of the world. But so many will not believe that Jesus is God's only Son. They have no Savior. Let us be careful that the devil and the false teachers take not this mighty Savior from us. Let us trust in this only Savior and ask people to trust in Him who takes away all sin!

Again read this lesson and answer these questions in writing: 1. Which beautiful verse tells us that Jesus saves from all sin? 2. How do you know that Jesus can take away the sin of the world?

Praver: Jesus Christ, Thou Lamb of God, to Thee I come with all my sin! Take them away, for Thou art the Lamb of God which takes away the sin of the world. And Thou canst take them away, for Thou art the mighty Son of God. All thanks and praise to Thee. Amen.

Study for Sunday, January 25

"Ye know that ve were redeemed with the precious blood of Christ, as a lamb without blemish (fault) and without spot."

1 Peter 1, 18.19

Bible Lesson: John 1, 35-39

"Again the next day after John stood, and two of his disciples; and looking upon Jesus as He walked, he saith, Behold the Lamb of God! And the two disciples heard him speak, and they followed Jesus. Then Jesus turned and saw them following, and saith unto them, What seek ye? They said unto Him, Rabbi, (which is to say, being interpreted, Master,) where dwellest Thou? He saith unto them, Come and see. They came and saw where He dwelt, and abode with Him that day: for it was about the tenth hour."

Again the next day John stood, and two of his disciples or followers, Andrew and John, were with him. John had followers who with him waited for the coming Savior and always were with him and helped him. And now he saw Jesus walking, and he said to his disciples: "Behold the Lamb of God !" He wanted to tell them that this is the true Lamb of which all the lambs offered to God in the Old Testament were a pic-This Lamb of God now was here, the ture. Lamb which should die for the sins of the world! Behold it, my friend, and follow! The two disciples of John did this. They heard the word of John about this Lamb of God, the only Savior, and the Holy Spirit by this word urged them to follow. We cannot by our own reason (mind) or strength believe in our Lord Jesus Christ or come to Him, but only by the word and Spirit.

Jesus knew they were following Him, and He turned and said to them: "What seek ye? What are you looking for?" Jesus asked in a kind and friendly way, and they answered: "Rabbi

(teacher), where dwellest (live) Thou? We want to come to you and be with you!" And if anyone comes to Jesus, He will not cast (throw) him out, for He said to them, "Come and see;" "And they came and saw where He dwelt (lived) and abode (stayed) with Him that day: for it was about the tenth hour." John who wrote this cannot forget the hour when they came to Jesus and heard Him. That was a blessed hour! They enjoyed to be with Christ that day, just as we Christians enjoy to be with Jesus in His word. He lives in His word, and He always says to you: "Come and see!" You will find Him in the Bible! O go and see Him! Read the Bible and you will find Him. Go to church, but only to a church in which the minister as John tells you of the Lamb of God which taketh away the sin of the world, and you will see Him who loved you and died for you, and forever you will sing unto the Lamb "that loved us, and washed us from our sins in His own blood"!

Again read this lesson, answer these questions in writing, and then send all your answers to your pastor: 1. Where can we find Jesus Christ, the Lamb of God? 2. Therefore what should we daily read and where should we love to go?

Prayer: Thou Lamb of God, help that we follow Thee and daily look for Thee in Thy holy Word, our dear Bible, and also gladly go to the house of God where we learn to know Thy blood which cleanseth us from all sin. Amen.

MISSION NEWS

St. Louis Mission-On November 20 we laid to rest in Concordia Cemetery the mortal remains of Miss Mary Kellermann, one of the oldest members of our St. Louis congregation, who fell asleep in Jesus on Monday, November 17, at the age of 74 vears. Miss Kellermann was born in Germany on June 20, 1856, and with her parents came to America when about 3 years of age. Soon after her birth she was made a member of the Holy Christian Church by the sacrament of Holy Baptism but, as she was born deaf and, after coming to this country, was never taught to read or to write, she remained ignorant of the great blessings which God had bestowed on her at her baptism until about twenty years before her death, when, by means of the sign-language, she was instructed in the Word of God. At her confirmation on December 22, 1908, she renewed her baptismal covenant, and since that time was a regular attendant

at our services for the deaf, whenever her health permitted her to come. Some years ago she had almost become blind but a successful operation on both of her eyes restored her eyesight and she could again "see' the preaching of God's Word in the signlanguage. As her parents had died years before, her relatives after the operation brought her to our Lutheran Convalescent Home where she remained unto the day of her death. About two months before her death she was confined to her bed and could no longer attend our services. She very much deplored that whenever the undersigned called on her, but she also confessed her faith in Christ and said that she prayed to him daily About two weeks before her death she partook of the Lord's Supper and said that she trusted wholly in Christ her Savior. On November 17, the day of her death, the undersigned was called to her bed-side and on arriving found her quite conscious but, realizing that her end was near, asked her whether she would be pleased if Christ would soon send His angels to bring her to heaven, and she at once responded in the affirmative, and then she gave close attention and repeatedly nodded in assent to what we continued to tell her of the Savior and the heavenly home He prepared for us, until she quietly fell asleep. At the funeral service, which was attended by a number of deaf and hearing friends of the deceased, the Rev. W. D. Peters, pastor of the relatives, delivered a short address and Mrs. Peters sang two appropriate hymns, and the undersigned preached orally and in the sign-language on John 10, 27.28.

We wrote this lengthy obituary, because during the last illness of Miss Kellermann and especially in her last hour we again realized the great value of the sign-language for the deaf, and because the comments of several hearing friends after the funeral gave evidence of the fact that they also praise God for this wonderful gift.

From Indianapolis, Ind., we received the sad news of the death of Mrs. Draeger, mother of our members, Mr. Fred Draeger and his sister, Mrs. Mary Moellering, on November 13.

May God comfort all that mourn her death with the precious promises of His Holy Word.
