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EDITORIAL.

Christianity Is the Truth.

Your conscience and common sense tell you that there is a God. Even the devils do not deny God's existence. St. James says in his epistle, chap. 2, 19: "Thou believest that there is one God. Thou doest well; the devils also believe and tremble." Only a fool, God tells us, says in his heart there is no God, Ps. 14, 1. In our universe we see the effects of God's acts, His wisdom and power. Nature does not explain to us God's person and purpose. These mysteries are explained to us in the Bible, God's letter of introduction to man.

The Creator of the universe and the Giver of human life speaks the truth in the Bible. All false religions are fabrications of the human mind. Their deities are man-made. There is no wisdom in them superior to human reason. All false religions, including those of the most intellectual heathen nations, such as the Egyptians, Greeks, and Romans, direct man to salvation through his Buddhism, Mohammed, and Conown efforts. fucius also follow this line of reasoning. God's Word, on the contrary, tells man to rely upon the merits of the Savior, Jesus, for salvation. It teaches wisdom above that of the human mind. It gives to the human heart the peace and comfort which all false religions and the material things of this world cannot give; it alone has true consolation to offer to a terror-stricken soul at the time of death.

God furthermore gives the human soul proof for the truth of His promises in the Bible. Proof for the Christian religion we find in the fulfilment of the prophecies.

No one is able to look into the future. God alone knows all things. He predicted future events through His servants, the prophets. He foretold the entire life of our Savior, His virgin birth (Is. 7, 14), His nativity (Gen. 49, 10), His

place of birth (Micah 5, 2), His life and His miracles (Is. 35, 5), the betrayal by a friend (Ps. 41, 9), etc. All these prophecies were fulfilled to the letter in Jesus. Jesus Himself always reminded the people of these prophecies and told them how they were being fulfilled before their eyes. No other religion has such proof that its teaching are the truth.

Jesus lived a holy life and performed wondrous deeds, such as raising the dead, calming the wind and the sea, to prove the truth of His teachings. Others have performed tricks and deluded the public, but Jesus deceived no one. He performed His wondrous deeds by a mere command before thousands of witnesses.

In addition to these proofs, Jesus rose from the dead as He had foretold to His enemies. That fact is the real center of Christianity. Jesus appeared to His disciples on various occasions after His resurrection during the following forty days. He ate with them. He explained His suffering and death to them. Through His resurrection the disciples were convinced of the truth of His doctrines and became brave men, cheerfully facing the ridicule and enmity of their government. The resurrection of Jesus has sufficient witnesses to make it a fact in history.

Finally Christianity gives proof of its truth in the experience of individuals and nations. It has brought a civilization unknown before the Christian era. Nations which accepted Christ's teachings were raised to a high level of culture. See the difference to-day between Christian nations such as those in Europe and America and those of heathen lands, for instance, China and India.

The power of Christianity has also been experienced in the lives of individuals. It has given men the power to hate and avoid sin and to love God and their fellow-men. It has brought peace, contentment, and happiness to human hearts. It is therefore the truth, and we ought to accept it.

The above proofs are sufficient to show that Jesus is willing and able to help all sinners. He asks only that you feel your need of Him and by the grace of God receive Him. He is to be found in His Word and Church. Accept Him if you wish to be happy in life and in death. He alone is able to give you joys and treasures that will not pass away. O. C. S.

Studies in the Chief Teachings of the Bible and the Catechism.

Jesus Christ, the One Great Prophet and Teacher unto the End of the World.

Jesus Christ is the Prophet that should come. Moses spoke of His coming. He is come and has taught the world, and He still is the great Prophet whom all the world should hear. And he that will not hear that Prophet shall be destroyed from among the people, Acts 3, 23.

You ask, But did not Jesus ascend into heaven, and does He not sit at the right hand of the Father as Lord over all? Yes, but He still is the Prophet whom we should hear. And how can we hear Him? Some of His last words to His disciples were: "Ye shall be witnesses unto Me," Acts 1, 8. And they went and at all times taught the words of this great Prophet. They brought His Word to Jew and Gentile, to all the world. And they that heard them heard Jesus, for He Himself said: "He that heareth you heareth Me, and he that despiseth you despiseth Me," Luke 10, 16.

These disciples of Christ indeed are no more

with us, but the Word of this great Prophet and of His disciples we still have in our dear Bible. And these words His Christians, His Church, should bring to all the world in His name; for, before He went up into heaven, He said: "Go ye therefore and teach all nations . . ., *teaching them* to observe [keep] all things whatsoever I have commanded you; and, lo, I am with you alway, even unto the end of the world," Matt. 28, 18—20. Therefore the Christian Church to-day still preaches the Word of Jesus, and only His Word, and calls upon all people to listen to this great Prophet Jesus Christ. Oh, come, let also us hear His Word!

And what is that Word that the Church of Jesus Christ still preaches to all the world? Jesus Himself tells us in these word: "Repentance and remission [forgiveness] of sins should be preached in His name among all nations," Luke 24, 47. He gave the Church power to forgive and to retain (not to forgive) sins with these words: "Whatsoever ye bind [forgive not] on earth shall be bound in heaven; and whatsoever ye shall loose [forgive] on earth shall be loosed in heaven," Matt. 18. And then He also gave the two Sacraments, Baptism and the Lord's Supper, to His Church. And in and by these Sacraments the Church, and Jesus Christ through the Church, offers, brings, and seals to the sinner forgiveness of all sins.

The Church does all this through its ministers, whom the same Jesus gives to it. Eph. 4, 10 we read: "And *He gave* some, *apostles*; and some, *prophets*; and some, *evangelists*; and some, *pastors and teachers.*" The Church calls these ministers in His name, and therefore Paul writes: "Jesus Christ has given us the ministry of reconciliation [peace]. Now, then, we are ambassadors [ministers] for Christ, as though God did beseech you by us; we pray you in Christ's stead [place], Be ye reconciled to God," that is, Accept this peace through Jesus Christ. 2 Cor. 5, 18. 20.

And of this work of the Prophet Jesus through His Church and its ministers our Catechism speaks in the Office of the Keys. It tells us of the power which Christ has given to His Church on earth to forgive the sins of penitent (sorrowful) sinners unto them, but to retain (forgive not) the sins of the impenitent (not sorrowful) as long as they do not repent (turn from sin to God). It also tells us of the ministers of Christ who deal with us according to His divine command. Thus through His Church and its ministers Christ still is the one great Prophet.

Come, hear this great Prophet Jesus Christ speaking through His Church and His ministers! He has a great message for you, good news of great joy. Especially now, during the Lenten season, we learn of His suffering and death for our sins and hear the call of this Prophet: "Come unto Me, all ye that labor and are heavy laden, and I will give you rest," Matt. 11, 28. And "whosoever believeth in Him shall receive remission [forgiveness] of sins," Acts 10, 43. Then also rejoice in your baptism, in which Jesus, the great Prophet, has sealed His forgiveness to you. And often come to the Lord's Table for the strengthening of your faith in Him and His forgivenes.

Bible-Studies for Sundays in February, 1932.

"Christ has Given Himself for Us."

February 10 the blessed Lenten season will begin. Lent leads us to the cross of Jesus and says: Behold the Lamb of God for sinners slain. Every one of us should learn to say: Yes, for me and my sins. Oh, do you know your sin? Do you know that you daily sin much and deserve nothing but punishment? And do you know that you cannot save yourself from sin and everlasting punishment? If you do, then you will cry out: Oh, I am lost! What must I do to be saved? Oh, come to the cross of Jesus and behold Him whose blood cleanses from all sins! Believe in Him and sing "unto Him that loved us and washed us from our sins in His own blood," Rev. 1, 5. May also the February Bible-studies bring you closer to Him who alone can save!

Study for Sunday, February 7.

"Beware of false prophets [preachers], which come to you in sheep's clothing, but inwardly they are ravening [hungry] wolves," Matt. 7, 15.

Bible-Lesson: John 10, 1-10.

"Verily, verily, I say unto you, He that entereth not by the door into the sheepfold, but climbeth up some other way, the same is a thief and a robber. But he that entereth in by the door is the shepherd of the sheep. To him the porter openeth, and the sheep hear his voice, and he calleth his own sheep by name and leadeth them out. And when he putteth forth his own sheep, he goeth before them, and the sheep follow him; for they know his voice. And a stranger will they not follow, but will fiee from him; for they know not the voice of strangers. This parable spake Jesus unto them; but they understood not what things they were which He spake unto them. Then said Jesus unto them again, Verily, verily, I say unto you, I am the Door of the sheep. All that ever came before Me are thieves and robbers; but the sheep did not hear them. I am the Door; by Me if any man enter in, he shall be saved and shall go in and out and find pasture. The thief cometh not but for to steal and to kill and to destroy; I am come that they might have life, and that they might have it more abundantly."

Jesus here speaks of His sheepfold, or His Church, and says: "Verily [truly], verily." He wants us to listen to these words. A sheepfold is a place where the shepherds keep their sheep during night. Every fold for the sheep has a door. Now, if a man goes to the sheep, not through the door, but some other way, that man is a thief and a robber. But he that comes through the door is the shepherd, and the porter (doorkeeper) opens the door for him, and the sheep hear his voice. And he calls them by name and leads them out. And when he takes out his sheep, he goes before them and leads them, and they follow him, for they know his voice. If a stranger comes and calls the sheep, they will not follow him, but flee (run away) from him; for they know not the voice of strangers. The shepherd knows his sheep, and the sheep know their shepherd.

This parable Jesus spake, but the disciples and the people did not understand Him, and therefore He explained it to them and to us. The sheepfold is His Church here on earth. The door is Jesus Himself; for He says: "Verily, verily, I say unto you, I am the Door." All who come through the door, that means, all teachers who come to the Christians through Jesus and with His Word, they are the true shepherds or pastors; but they who come not through this Door, who come with their own word and wisdom and not with the Word of the Cross, they are thieves and robbers, that is, false teachers and preachers, as were the Jewish teachers and leaders who came before Jesus and whom the sheep did not hear. True pastors come to Christ's sheep through the Door, that is, they lead people to Jesus and His salvation. False preachers lead people away from Jesus and steal men's souls and destroy them. Beware of false teachers! Many teachers and preachers to-day want to take Jesus and His blood from the Bible. If you are a sheep of Jesus, you will not follow

them who come not with the Word of Salvation by faith in Jesus' blood; but you will follow only them who always point to the Lamb of God which takes away the sin of the world.

Jesus is the Door to salvation. Therefore they who enter in by Him, that is, they who believe in this Jesus, shall be saved and find pasture (food) for their souls and have life, and have it more abundantly (richly and even more than they need). The thief, the false preacher, comes only to steal and to kill and to destroy. Therefore happy are you if your pastor leads you through the right Door to salvation. And blessed are you if you go through this Door, for then you will be saved and live forever.

Read this Bible-lesson again and answer these questions in writing: 1. Who are the true pastors? 2. What will you do and not do if you are Christ's sheep?

Prayer: Lord Jesus, the only Door to salvation, give us pastors who will come to us with the preaching of Thy Cross and help us that we believe in Thee and Thy blood and so be saved and live forever. Amen.

Study for First Sunday in Lent, February 14.

"Behold the Lamb of God, which taketh away the sin of the world," John 1, 29.

Bible-Lesson: John 10, 11-21.

"I am the Good Shepherd. The good shepherd giveth his life for the sheep; but he that is an hireling and not the shepherd, whose own the sheep are not, seeth the wolf coming and leaveth the sheep and fleeth, and the wolf catcheth them and scattereth the sheep. The hireling fleeth, because he is an hireling and careth not for the sheep. I am the Good Shepherd and know My sheep and am known of Mine. As the Father knoweth Me, even so know I the Father; and I lay down My life for the sheep. And other sheep I have which are not of this fold; them also I must bring, and they shall hear My voice, and there shall be one fold and one Shepherd. Therefore doth My Father love Me because I lay down My life, that I might take it again. No man taketh it from Me, but I lay it down of Myself. I have power to lay it down, and I have power to take it again. This commandment have I received of My Father. There was a division therefore again among the Jews for these sayings. And many of them said, He hath a devil and is mad; why hear ye Him? Others said, These are not the words of him that hath a devil. Can a devil open the eyes of the blind?"

To-day, on the first Sunday in Lent, the Lord Jesus comes to us with these words: "I am the Good Shepherd. The good shepherd giveth his life for his sheep." Let us memorize these words and think upon them every day during the Lenten season.

A good shepherd will not flee (run away) when the wolf comes, but he will stay with the sheep and gladly give up his life for them. A hireling, a hired man who works only for money, will not do this. He is not the shepherd, and the sheep are not his own, and he cares not for the sheep and therefore leaves the sheep and flees when he sees the wolf coming. He cares not for the sheep, but only for himself. Then the wolf comes, catches the sheep, and scatters them. But Jesus is the Good Shepherd. He gave up His life on the cross for us, His sheep, and saved us from that terrible wolf, the devil. Let us thank Him who gave His life for us.

Again, the good shepherd knows his sheep, and they know him. So Jesus knows His sheep. He knows all their sorrows and weaknesses and sins. And His sheep know Him. They know His love and kindness and forgiveness. He and His sheep know each other as the Father knows the Son and as the Son knows the Father. He knows the Father's wish, and therefore He laid down His life for you and me. And now we need not die in our sins and be lost forever. Oh, no; the Son gave His life for us, and for His sake the Father forgives us. And He did this not only for His people, the Jews; for He says: "Other sheep I have which are not of this fold" (the Jewish Church). He has sheep among all peoples and nations, and of them He says: "Them also I must bring, and they shall hear My voice, and there shall be one fold and one Shepherd." Among all nations there are believers in Christ and His Cross, and these are that one fold, or Church, under the one Shepherd. Are you His sheep, my friend? Then come and help to bring more and more sinners to this Good Shepherd, so that they hear His Word and with us believe in His blood and be saved.

And because He laid down His life for His sheep on the cross, the Father loves Him and all that believe in Him. The Father gave Him this commandment. The Father sent Him to do this. And He did it gladly. No man could take His life from Him, but He laid it down of Himself. He had power to lay down His life, and He had power to take it again. Willingly He went into death for us, and then, by His own power, He rose again from the dead. Oh, trust in this mighty Savior! He can save from death.

When Jesus had spoken these wonderful words, there was a division among them. Again there were two parties. Some said: "He has a devil and is mad [insane]; why hear ye him?" Others said: "These are not the words of him that hath a devil. Can a devil open the eyes of the blind?" Some believed, some believed not. So, if people during Lent hear the Word of the Cross, there again will be two kinds of people, believers and unbelievers. And they that believe not will die in their sins and go to everlasting punishment; but they that believe in the Cross of Jesus have forgiveness and everlasting life. Oh, come, believe in the Good Shepherd and live for Him who gave His life for you!

Read this Bible-lesson again and answer these questions in writing: 1. How did Jesus show that He is the Good Shepherd? 2. Why need we now not die in our sins and be lost forever?

Prayer: Jesus Christ, Thou Good Shepherd, Thou hast loved us and given Thyself for us. Oh, grant that by Thy Holy Spirit we all trust in Thee and Thy blood and so be saved from all our sins, from death, and from the power of the devil. And may we live for Thee and bring others to Thee and Thy Cross for the glory of Thy name! Amen.

Study for Second Sunday in Lent, February 21.

"The Son of God loved me and gave Himself for me," Gal. 2, 20.

Bible-Lesson: John 10, 22-31.

"And it was at Jerusalem the Feast of the Dedication, and it was winter. And Jesus walked in the Temple in Solomon's porch. Then came the Jews round about Him and said unto Him, How long dost Thou make us to doubt? If Thou be the Christ, tell us plainly. Jesus answered them, I told you, and ye believed not; the works that I do in My Father's name, they bear witness of Me. But we believe not because we are not of My sheep, as I said unto you. My sheep hear My voice, and I know them, and they follow Me; and I give unto them eternal life; and they shall never perish, neither shall any man pluck them out of My hand. My Father, which gave them Me, is greater than all; and no man is able to pluck them out of My Father's hand. I and My Father are one."

That Jesus who died on the cross is the promised King, the Son of God, yes, the true God. This we learn from the words of our Lord Jesus to-day. We see Him in the Temple, the house of God. It was the Feast of Dedication, and it was winter. Therefore Jesus walked in Solomon's Porch, a part of Solomon's Temple that had not been destroyed. And here the Jews came round about Him and said: How long do you make us doubt? If you are the Christ, the promised King, tell us plainly. But He had not made them doubt. He had told them again and again and had done many wonderful works in His Father's name. These words and works showed that He was the promised King and Savior. So to-day people need not be in doubt. They can read His wonderful words and see His many works in the Bible. People have no excuse if they do not believe and are lost.

And why did the Jews, and why do so many now, not believe? Because they are not of His sheep. They do not belong to His sheep. For of His sheep He says: "My sheep hear My voice, and I know them, and they follow Me." Are you His sheep? His sheep hear His Word. They read it at home and learn it in church. And they follow Him as sheep follow the shepherd. Happy are all the sheep of Jesus. He says: "I know them, and I give unto them eternal [everlasting] life; and they shall never perish [be lost], neither shall any man pluck [take] them out of My hand." Sin, death, and the devil cannot hurt them, for their Shepherd is stronger than all. In His hands they are safe. And His Father gave Him His sheep; but they are still also in the Father's hands. And of His Father He says: "He is greater than all, and no man is able to pluck them out of My Father's hands." He and His Father therefore are one. They are one in saving and keeping the sheep unto everlasting life. Christ's sheep therefore are sure of their salvation. For their Good Shepherd, who gave His life for them, and the Father, who gave Him the sheep, are one. Oh, that suffering Savior on the cross is one with the Father, the true God! He is mighty to save. Daily go to His cross with your sins and say: ----

> Nothing in my hand I bring, Simply to Thy Cross I cling.

Read this Bible-lesson again and answer these questions in writing: 1. How did Jesus show that He was the promised Savior? 2. Why can Christ's sheep be happy?

Prayer: Jesus Christ, true man and true God, Thou art mighty to save, and Thy precious blood can wash away all our sins. In Thy hands and the Father's we are safe now and forever. Thou wilt keep all Thy sheep to life everlasting. All praise to Thee here on earth and there in glory. Amen.

Study for Third Sunday in Lent, February 28. "Truly, this was the Son of God," Matt. 27, 54.

Bible-Lesson: John 10, 32-42.

"Jesus answered them, Many good works have I showed you from My Father; for which of those works do ye stone Me? The Jews answered Him, saying, For a good work we stone Thee not, but for blasphemy, and because that Thou, being a man, makest Thyself God. Jesus answered them, Is it not written in your Law, I said, Ye are gods? If He called them gods unto whom the Word of God came, and the Scripture cannot be broken, say ye of Him, whom the Father hath sanctified and sent into the world, Thou blasphemest, because I said, I am the Son of God? If I do not the works of My Father, believe Me not. But if I do, though ye believe not Me, believe the works, that ye may know and believe that the Father is in Me and I in Him. Therefore they sought again to take Him; but He escaped out of their hand and went away again beyond Jordan, into the place where John at first baptized, and there He abode. And many resorted unto Him and said, John did no miracle; but all things that John spake of this man were true. And many believed on Him there."

When Jesus had said these words "I and My Father are one," He in plain words said, I am the true God. The Jews also understood Him and therefore took up stones to throw at Him. Jesus answered: "Many good works have I showed you from the Father; for which of these works do ye stone Me?" And they answered Him: "For a good work we stone Thee not, but for blasphemy" (speaking against God). And what was this blasphemy? "Because that Thou, being a man, makest Thyself God." Indeed, Jesus made Himself God when He said, "I and My Father are one." But the Jews would not believe. Also today so many will not believe, and say: Jesus is not God, and so they make Him a liar. Friend, that Jesus on the cross, suffering for our sins, is the true God. If He were not God, He could not save from sin. Praise God for this mighty Savior!

Jesus then showed them from their Law that He was not speaking blasphemy. He said to them: "Is it not written in your Law, I said, Ye are gods? If He called them gods unto whom the Word of God came, and the Scripture [Bible] cannot be broken, say ye of Him whom the Father hath sanctified [separated unto Himself] and sent into the world, Thou blasphemest, because I said, I am the Son of God?" If the Bible, which cannot be broken and is true in all things, calls them gods to whom the Word of God came, it surely is not wrong if He whom the Father separated unto Himself and sent into the world says: I am the Son of God. They did not want to believe that He is God. So in our days many will not believe it. But He is God; for the Bible says so, and the Bible cannot be broken. Every word is true.

And if people will not believe His words, they should at least believe His works. He said: "If I do not the works of My Father, believe Me not. But if I do, though ye believe not Me, believe the works." He did the works of His Father; from this, people may know and believe that the Father was in Him and He in the Father. And now, because He said these words, they again sought (tried) to take Him; but He escaped out of their hands. They could not hold Him. Also to-day many do not believe His works and wish to take this Jesus and His Cross out of this world. But they cannot do it. The work of Jesus will go on, and many will believe on Him, as many did beyond Jordan, in the place where John at first baptized. Jesus went there and abode (stayed) there. And many resorted (came) to Him and believed in Him. Come, let us also go to Him who suffered and died for our sins on the cross and believe in Him!

Read this Bible-lesson again, answer these questions, and then send all your answers to your pastor: 1. Which words of Jesus show that He is true God? 2. What does He say about the Scriptures (Bible)?

Prayer: Dear suffering Savior, Thou true God, may we believe Thy Word and Thy works and trust in Thee as our only Savior, who alone canst save us from all sin, from death, and from the power of the devil with Thy holy precious blood and Thy innocent suffering and death! MISSION NEWS.

Texas Mission.—The work among the deaf in Texas was officially begun on November 29, 1931. On the evening of that day the newly called missionary was ordained by the Rev. G. H.
