Studies in Luther's Catechism.

THE THIRD COMMANDMENT.

"Thou shalt sanctify the holy-day."

The First Commandment tells us to worship the only true God; the Second Commandment teaches us to honor the name of this one true God; and the Third and last Commandment of the First Table commands us gladly to hear and learn the Word of God.

"The Holy-Day" of the Old Testament.

The chief holy-day in the Old Testament was the seventh day of the week. It was commanded of God. He said: "The seventh day is the Sabbath of the Lord, thy God." Read Ex. 20, 8—11. The seventh day, Saturday, was to be the holyday of God's people in the Old Testament. God told them: "It is a sign between Me and you," Ex. 31, 13. And woe to that man who did not keep holy this day and did any kind of work therein! He sinned greatly and was to be put to death. Read Ex. 31, 14. 15 and Num. 15, 32—36.

"The Holy-Day" of the New Testament.

Some one perhaps will ask: "Are they not right therefore who say that we must keep the seventh day? And are we who keep the first day not committing a great sin?" No, my friend. The offerings and the Sabbaths and all the festivals of the Old Testament were "a shadow of things to come," Col. 2, 17. And these things are the things of Christ. When He came, then came the true Lamb of God, the true Bread of Life, and also the Lord of the Sabbath, Matt. 12, 8. And who wants the shadow of good things when the good things of Jesus are here?

We need no longer keep the seventh day in the New Testament. Paul says: "Let no man judge you in meat, or in drink, or in respect of an holyday, or of the new moon, or of the Sabbath-days," Col. 2, 16. He wants to say: Let no man say you are doing wrong if you do not keep this or that day. And still there are some who say: "You must keep the seventh day." Where is the word of God in the New Testament which commands this? There is none.

Why do we have the first day as our holy-day? It is not commanded of God. Jesus and His disciples kept the seventh day until He died for the sins of the world on Good Friday. The third day, Easter Sunday, He was raised again for our justification and appeared to His disciples, who were assembled on that day behind locked doors. Seven days later, also on a Sunday, they again had come together, and again Jesus stood in their midst. And ever after, Christians have assembled on this day of victory, and we do it still to-day.

"The Holy-Day," the Day of the Lord.

It is the day on which we particularly remember our risen Lord and His glorious victory over sin, death, and devil. Therefore we should give every holy-day to the Lord and not forsake the assembling of ourselves together, Heb. 10, 25. God wants us to come together regularly for worship; and we may do it any day.

Friend, are you giving the holy-day unto the Lord? Are you in the house of God every holyday to learn ever anew of your sinful condition and of Him who loved you and died for your sins? May God grant it! J. L. S.

THE BREAD OF LIFE.

Bible-Study for October.

"Blessed is he whosoever shall not be offended in Me." Matt. 11, 6.

Bible-Lesson: Mark 6, 1-6.

"And He went out from thence and came into His own country; and His disciples follow Him. And when the Sabbath-day was come, He began to teach in the synagog; and many hearing Him were astonished, saying, From whence hath this man these things, and what wisdom is this which is given unto Him that even such mighty works are wrought by His hands? Is not this the carpenter, the son of Mary, the brother of James, and Joses, and of Juda, and Simon? And are not His sisters here with us? And they were offended at Him. But Jesus said unto them, A prophet is not without honor but in his own country and among his own kin and in his own house. And He could there do no mighty work, save that He laid His hands upon a few sick folk and healed them. And He marveled because of their unbelief. And He went round about the villages, teaching."

After Jesus had performed many great miracles in and about Capernaum, He left it and came into the country where He had grown up, to the town of Nazareth. Also to the people of Nazareth Jesus wished to preach the Word of Life; and when the Sabbath-day had come, He went into the synagog, the place of worship, and began to teach the Word of God. He read a portion of God's Word to those who had assembled there and told them that He was the Savior sent from God to save them. The words that Jesus spoke to them filled them with astonishment, and they wondered where Jesus had received such great wisdom and the power to perform such great miracles of which they had heard. Yet they did not believe in Him; they did not accept Him as their Savior. How could this Jesus who had grown up in their midst, whom they had known as a carpenter, be their Savior! They did not want to have this humble carpenter as their Savior. Even to-day many people take offense at the lowliness and simplicity of the Gospel; they do not want to believe in this Jesus who died on the cross. They are offended at Him.

When Jesus observed that the people in His home city did not believe in Him, He reminded them of the truth of the saying "A prophet is not without honor but [except] in his own country and among his own kin [relatives] and in his own house." Instead of thanking God that one from their own city had received from God such wonderful gifts, they were filled with dislike for Jesus and rejected Him.

Jesus marveled (wondered) because of their unbelief. He had come to offer them His grace, to help them with His almighty power; but He could do no mighty works and wonders there because the people did not believe in Him and did not want His help. Only a few believed and desired His help, and on these He laid His hands and healed them.

The fact that also to-day many people take offense at the preaching of the Gospel and reject the Savior who comes to them should not discourage us, as little as it discouraged Jesus. He went round about the villages and preached. So let us with faith and love continue to spread the Word of Jesus. Always some will believe in Him and be saved. *Prayer*: My Savior Jesus Christ, let me never take offense because Thy Word and Thy Church are despised in this world. Grant that I may always trust in Thee, love Thy Word and Thy Church, and seek to bring others to the salvation which Thou hast prepared for all people. Amen. E. EN.
