Christ Ascended for Us.

First of all we must remember that before departing from this earth and ascending into heaven, Jesus promised His abiding presence to His people. To His disciples Jesus said: "Lo, I am with you alway, even unto the end of the world." We must never think of Jesus as now being confined to some far-away space nor imagine that His work is limited; but He is constantly with us here on earth to lead us heavenward.

For us! In the night before His death, Jesus said: "In My Father's house are many mansions. ... I go to prepare a place for you." By His holy, precious blood He purchased a place for us in His Father's house, winning heaven for us, and by His ascension He took possession of heaven for us, that we might follow Him and be with Him in everlasting glory. What a comfort! Had He not entered into His heavenly kingdom, how could we ever expect to go there? With Christ's ascension God has given us a pledge assuring us that all who believe in Jesus shall also reach the heavenly mansions.

For us! "Christ, at the right hand of God, also maketh intercession [prays] for us." We are poor sinners; we sin daily, and with every sin we deserve eternal damnation. The Law curses us because we do not keep it perfectly; Satan accuses us; our own conscience condemns us. But we know that Christ, our Mediator, is always with the Father, pleading for sinners. We Christians therefore need not fear death and Judgment Day because we know that "Christ is for us"; so "who can be against us?"

For us! As He ascended, so Jesus will come again visibly upon earth on the Last Day and take us, His believers, to that place of true joy and peace where He reigns forever.

It is but a little while, and Jesus will take us home; so let us abide in His Word unto the end.

Studies in Luther's Catechism.

THE SIXTH COMMANDMENT.

"Thou shalt not commit adultery."

"Commit adultery," what does that mean? Our Bible tells us of David, who committed adultery by taking another man's wife to be his wife, 2 Sam. 12, 9. To commit adultery therefore means to break holy marriage. In order to guard and protect holy marriage and a person's husband or wife, God has given the Sixth Commandment: "Thou shalt not commit adultery."

Marriage Is Instituted and Blessed by God.

Marriage is a blessed gift of God. He Himself instituted it. When He had made Adam, He said: "It is not good that a man should be alone." And then He made woman and joined them together as husband and wife and bestowed His blessing upon them. Read Gen. 1, 27. 28 and 2, 18. 21. 22. Also read John 2, 1—11. God instituted it, He blessed it, and therefore we rightly call it holy marriage.

A Christian Engagement.

Before two persons live together in marriage, they are engaged, or promised, to each other. Scripture tells us that Mary, the mother of our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ, was espoused, or engaged, to Joseph, Matt. 1, 18, and they had not yet come together, were not yet publicly married. Nevertheless the holy writer calls Joseph the husband of Mary, v. 19, and Mary is called the wife of Joseph, v. 20. Before God an engaged couple is husband and wife. Therefore every one taking such a step should first ask the Lord for His Furthermore, because God commands blessing. young people to honor their father and mother, they should also consult them concerning such an important step and ask them for their consent and blessing when intending to take it. This is an engagement pleasing to God.

A Christian Marriage.

Man and woman, as said above, are joined together already by their engagement; but this must be made known to the world. Therefore a license must be obtained from the State, and the marriage ceremony must be performed by one authorized to do so by the State. And then the two should live together as husband and wife, the husband loving his own wife, as Christ loved the Church and gave Himself for it, and the wife being subject to her own husband, as the Church is subject to Christ, Eph. 5, 23. 24, both worshiping the Lord Jesus Christ together and living unto Him who died for them and rose again, rearing children in the fear of the Lord, and walking together on the way of life till death do them part. This is a marriage pleasing to God.

All This Makes for a Blessed and Happy Home.

Such an engagement and marriage will assure a happy home. What a blessed world it would be if all people would bear all this in mind and enter into an engagement and holy matrimony according to the Word of God! May God grant us many such happy marriages! Bible-Study for May.

"Jesus of Nazareth . . . went about doing good." Acts 10, 38.

Bible-Lesson: Mark 6, 53-56.

"And when they had passed over, they came into the land of Gennesaret and drew to the shore. And when they were come out of the ship, straightway they knew Him and ran through that whole region round about and began to carry about in beds those that were sick, where they heard He was. And whithersoever He entered, into villages or cities or country, they laid the sick in the streets and besought Him that they might touch if it were but the border of His garment; and as many as touched Him were made whole."

The disciples had just witnessed a great miracle. They had been on the Sea of Galilee in the midst of a storm and had not been able to make any headway. Then they saw Jesus walking on the water; and when He entered the ship, the wind ceased at once. In a little while they were to see many more miracles, each one of them proving Jesus to be the Son of God with power.

With Jesus in the ship, they soon crossed the sea and brought their ship to shore in the land of Gennesaret. When Jesus stepped ashore, straightway (at once) they knew Him; they knew that He was Jesus of Nazareth, who had performed so many miracles and had just recently fed the five thousand. They knew His power to heal and His willingness to help all who came to Him. They had faith in Him.

What did these people do when they knew

Jesus was in their midst? At once they sent messengers through the whole country round about, telling every one that Jesus was there and urging them to bring their sick relatives and friends to be healed. And wherever Jesus went, into the villages, the cities, or the country places, they brought the sick and laid them in the streets where they knew Jesus would pass, so that they might touch the hem of His garment as He walked by. They firmly believed that by touching the border of His garment they could be healed from their diseases. And their faith was not in vain. As many as touched Him were made whole.

Is your faith in Jesus as strong as that of these people in the land of Gennesaret? Jesus is the Lord that heals, not only from sickness, but also from sin. Trust Him and His promises and thank Him for the many blessings which you receive from His hands. E. EN.
