The Reformation and Bible-Reading

The Gospel shows the Father's grace, Who sent His Son to save our race, Proclaims how Jesus lived and died That man might thus be justified. May we in faith its tidings learn Nor thanklessly its blessings spurn; May we in faith its truth confess And praise the Lord, our Righteousness!

What led to the Reformation of the Church? In the last analysis it was Luther's diligent Bible-reading. Luther had for several years zealously read the Bible, when, in 1512, he finally began to understand and to believe rightly that we are saved, not by our good works, but by grace, through faith, in Christ as God's Son and the Savior from sin. The Holy Ghost enlightened his heart, so that the Holy Scriptures were opened unto him.

As Luther continued to read the Bible, he grew in the grace and knowledge of Christ; he grew in courage, boldly opposing error and sin within the Church; he grew in love, confessing the saving truths of the Bible. His faith in Christ and his faithful confession of the truth by the grace of God brought about the Reformation of the Church. Hence we can trace our present spiritual blessings, the fact that we have the true doctrine, back to Luther's private and diligent Bible-study.

Dear reader, when on October 31 you think of Luther and the reformation which he accomplished, ask yourself: Do I, like Luther, diligently read my Bible at home? Do I believe the chief truth of the Bible that "the blood of Jesus Christ, His Son, cleanseth us from all sin"? 1 John 1:7. Do I believe that I am saved, not by works, but by faith in Jesus Christ? If the Holy Ghost has through the Gospel kindled this faith in your heart; if you believe that you can be saved through Jesus alone, are you also trying to be a blessing to your fellow-men? The Lord says in the Bible: "I will bless thee, and thou shalt be a blessing." Gen. 12:2. If God has blessed you with true faith in Christ, you should become a blessing to others by leading them to Christ.

First of all, dear reader, you must believe in Christ unto the saving of your soul. Then you must also confess Christ before men and earnestly try to win souls for your Savior. But to become such a blessing within the Church, continue to read your Bible daily and with a prayer to the Lord that He may give you an ever better understanding of it.

Studies in Luther's Catechism

THE FIRST ARTICLE

"I believe that God — still preserves me."

"He Richly and Daily Provides Me with All"

When we think of the many good things God gives us to preserve, or keep, us, we must furthermore say with Luther: "I believe that He *richly* and *daily* provides me with all that I need to support this body and life." "Richly" we are taught to say. After Jesus had fed the five thousand with five loaves of bread and two small fishes, the disciples took up twelve baskets full. And so in our homes there is something left upon our tables after every meal. And that God does "daily." He gave the Israelites bread from heaven every day, and every day we, too, have food upon our tables, all that we need and more.

"He Defends Me against All Danger, Guards and Protects Me from All Evil"

Then there are so many dangers in this world of ours, and there is so much evil. We never would know how to escape all these dangers and all this evil if God did not find a way for us. He always is as a mighty wall between us and all the dangers and evil, as the pillar of cloud came between the camp of the Egyptians and the camp of the Israelites, so that the one came not near the other all night. Read Ex. 14: 19-31. And He can guard and protect you even in the lions' den and in the fire. Daniel spent a night in the lions' den and suffered no harm. And he praised God for it, saying to the king: "My God hath sent His angel and hath shut the lions' mouths that they have not hurt me." Dan. 6: 22, 23. When King Nebuchadnezzar threatened to throw the three men into the midst of the burning fiery furnace because they would not worship his golden image, they answered, "Our God is able to deliver us." And He did, as you may read Dan. 3.

"Against ALL Danger, from ALL Evil"

Our Catechism teaches us to say, "He defends me against all danger, guards and protects me from all evil." Is that true? Do not Christians often take sick, become deaf or blind, and are they not in accidents and meet with other mishaps? Yes, and still they can truthfully say these words. Joseph was a servant of God, and his brothers sold him into Egypt, Potiphar cast him into prison, and he had to stay there for two years, although innocent; yet he said to his brothers: "Ye thought evil against me, but God meant it unto good." So we Christians should count everything that befalls us as a blessing from on high and in childlike trust say with Paul: "We know that all things work together for good to them that love God," Rom. 8:28.

"Cast (Put) All Your Care upon Him"

Indeed, "He still preserves me," you and I must say. And therefore we need not worry. All our cares and worries we should put upon Him. And joyfully we should do it, for it is He who so loved us that He gave His onlybegotten Son to die for us. Therefore Paul says: "He that spared not His own Son but delivered Him up for us all, how shall He not with Him also freely give us all things?" Rom. 8:32. Therefore "cast all your care upon Him, for He careth for you," 1 Pet. 5:7.

THE BREAD OF LIFE

Bible-Study for October

"Thy Word is truth," John 17:17

Bible-Lesson: Mark 11:27-33

"And they come again to Jerusalem; and as He was walking in the Temple, there come to Him the chief priests and the scribes and the elders and say unto Him, By what authority doest Thou these things, and who gave Thee this authority to do these things? And Jesus answered and said unto them, I will also ask of you one question, and answer Me, and I will tell you by what authority I do these things. The baptism of John, was it from heaven or of men? Answer Me. And they reasoned with themselves, saying, If we shall say, From heaven, He will say, Why, then, did ye not believe him? But if we shall say, Of men, they feared the people; for all men counted John that he was a prophet indeed. And they answered and said unto Jesus, We cannot tell. And Jesus, answering, saith unto them, Neither do I tell you by what authority I do these things."

On Tuesday morning of Holy Week Jesus and His disciples returned to Jerusalem. Jesus immediately went to the Temple and "taught the people in the Temple and preached the Gospel." While He was walking about in the Temple, the chief priests, the scribes, and the elders (the Jewish teachers and rulers) came to Him with the question, "By what authority doest Thou these things, and who gave Thee this authority to do these things?" Their purpose in asking Jesus this question was not to learn the truth but rather to find fault with Him and to discredit Him in the eyes of the people, so that the people would no longer follow Him. If they were successful in turning the people against Jesus, they could then also carry out their plan of putting Him to death. Already they had decided that He must be put to death; they were only seeking an opportunity of putting their plan into effect.

Jesus was perfectly willing to give them an answer to their question and to tell them by what authority He preached and taught and performed miracles, but only under one condition. They should first tell Him whether the baptism of John the Baptist was from heaven or of men. In other words, they should tell Him whether John preached and baptized by the authority of God or that of men.

The priests, scribes, and elders realized at once that by answering this question they would be caught in their own words. For if they admitted that John was a prophet of God, then they also had to admit that they had sinned by not receiving him as God's prophet. If they answered that John was not a prophet of God, their life would be in danger, for the people believed "that he was a prophet indeed." So they answered Jesus, "We cannot tell." They knew the truth, yet were not willing to answer truthfully. Therefore Jesus also does not answer their question. Nor was this necessary. By His preaching, teaching, and miracle-working He had shown that He was the promised Savior and that all His works were performed by authority of God the Father, who had sent Him.

As in the days of Jesus, so even today many refuse to acknowledge, and bow to, the authority of Jesus and His Word. They will not accept Him as their Savior. They have hardened their hearts against Jesus and His Word.

May God keep us ever faithful to Jesus and His Word! E. En.
