Our King and His Citizens

When Jesus, forty days after Easter, visibly ascended into heaven, He did this for several purposes. One purpose was to ascend as our King, to sit at the right hand of God, to rule all things in heaven and earth, especially to rule and guide the Church as its King and Head.

As a king usually lives and rules in the capital of his land, so Jesus ascended to His capital, the heavenly Jerusalem, to live and rule there in glory and majesty. Sitting upon His throne, He rules His citizens, the Christians. He is concerned about their spiritual welfare, which He shows by constantly interceding (praying) for them before the Father. As a true King, who graciously provides for His subjects, He is now preparing wonderful places for us in the mansions which He purchased for us with His holy precious blood. Eph. 1:20-23; John 12:26; 14:3; 1 John 2:1, 2.

Who are the subjects, or citizens, in the kingdom of Jesus Christ? The answer is: All who believe in Him. If you wish to be a citizen of the heavenly King, you must believe that He is the Son of God and the Savior from sin and eternal damnation. If your soul was made alive by the Gospel of Jesus, if you trust to reach heaven only through Christ, then you are a heavenly citizen, as Paul says: "Our citizenship is in heaven," Phil. 3:20 (Revised Version).

True citizens of any nation are loyal and faithful to their king and the laws of the land. If you want to be a true citizen in the kingdom of Jesus, you must be loyal and faithful to Him, hear and believe His Gospel, be a regular attendant at the services and at the Lord's Table, and obey His commandments. When Jesus told Pilate that He is the King of Truth, He added: "Every one that is of the truth heareth My voice," John 18:37. If you believe that Jesus has saved you by His bitter suffering and death, you will love Him and gladly hear His Word and live a life pleasing to Him.

Let us be wise and prepare to meet our God and King. Let us read our King's holy Book every day, hear His Word diligently and with a believing heart, live unto Him who died for us and rose again, and have our faith strengthened by receiving the Sacrament frequently. Let it be our chief desire to live and die as true Christians. T.F.

Studies in Luther's Catechism

THE CREED

"Jesus Christ, our Lord"

At the close of our last study we sang: "Your Brother is th' eternal God." You ask: Is that true? Have we not learned of two Christs, of one who is true God and of another who is true man? There is only one Christ, my friend. Therefore we confess in the Creed: "Jesus Christ, our *Lord*," not Lords. Paul writes 1 Cor. 8:6: "There is *one Lord* Jesus Christ." And in the Athanasian Creed, which we find in the book containing all the confessions of our Lutheran Church, we read: "Jesus Christ, who, although He be God and man, is yet not two, but one Christ."

Jesus Christ, True God and True Man in One Person

The Bible rightly calls this a great mystery. In 1 Tim. 3:16 we read: "Without controversy great is the mystery of godliness: God was manifest in the flesh." In this Jesus, born of the Virgin Mary, God manifests Himself, that is, makes Himself known. Therefore Jesus said to His disciples: "If ye had known Me, ye should have known My Father also"; and again: "He that hath seen Me hath seen the Father," John 14:7,9. Indeed, this Jesus who walked among men "is the Image of the invisible God, the Brightness of His glory," Col. 1:15; Heb. 1:3. Look for God in Christ Jesus. If you know Him, you will also know the Father. He is God and man in one person; therefore Paul says: "The second man is the Lord from heaven," 1 Cor. 15:47. Yes, it is true, "Your Brother is th' eternal God."

In Jesus God was Crucified and Shed His Blood

The Son of Man was nailed to the cross; but, now listen, men killed not only the son of Mary, but "the Prince of Life," Acts 3:15, and "crucified the Lord of glory," 1 Cor. 2:8. The blood shed on the cross was not only that of the man Jesus but also that of God's Son; for we read: "The blood of Jesus Christ, His Son, cleanseth us from all sin," 1 John 1:7. And Paul charges the elders of Ephesus "to feed the Church of God, which He hath purchased with His own blood," Acts 20:28. The Prince of Life and Lord of Glory was killed on the cross for you and me; the Son of God, and therefore God Himself, purchased us with His own blood! Indeed, we are bought with a price! Read 1 Cor. 6:20.

The Man Jesus Is the Eternal God

The man Jesus could say to His enemies: "Verily, verily, I say unto you, Before Abraham was, I am," John 8:58. And because He said this, they took up stones to cast at Him. It is foolishness unto natural man. See 1 Cor. 2:14. The Son of Man is true God; for He said: "All power is given unto Me in heaven and in earth," Matt. 28:18. In the man Jesus who walked this earth "are hid all the treasures of wisdom and knowledge," Col. 2:3. And therefore Peter could say to his Master: "Lord, Thou knowest all things," John 21:17. Therefore do not think it strange if we fall down and worship Him who lay in the manger and died on the cross. And do not think that our crucified Lord is no longer with us because He ascended into heaven; for before His ascension He promised: "Lo, I am with you alway, even unto the end of the world," Matt. 28:20. Therefore John could write: "He dwelt among us; and we beheld His glory, the glory as of the Only-begotten of the Father," John 1:14. My Jesus is the glorious God! As the Son of God He had this glory from everlasting; but now, when the Word was made flesh, this glory belongs also to the Son of Man.

THE BREAD OF LIFE

Bible-Study for May

"Watch therefore; for ye know not what hour your Lord doth come," Matt. 24:42

Bible-Lesson: Mark 13:1-8

"And as He went out of the Temple, one of His disciples saith unto Him, Master, see what manner of stones and what buildings are here! And Jesus, answering, said unto him, Seest thou these great buildings? There shall not be left one stone upon another that shall not be thrown down. And as He sat upon the Mount of Olives over against the Temple, Peter and James and John and Andrew asked Him privately, Tell us, when shall these things be, and what shall be the sign when all these things shall be fulfilled? And Jesus, answering them, began to say, Take heed lest any man deceive you; for many shall come in My name, saying, I am Christ, and shall deceive many. And when ye shall hear of wars and rumors of wars, be ye not troubled, for such things must needs be; but the end shall not be yet. For nation shall rise against nation and kingdom against kingdom; and there shall be earthquakes in divers places, and there shall be famines and troubles. These are the beginnings of sorrows."

As Jesus left the Temple for the last time, never to return to it, one of the disciples called His attention to its great beauty, saying, "Master, see what manner of stones and what buildings are here!" This was the beautiful Temple which Herod had built for the Jews, a building constructed of large white stones and richly adorned with gold, the sight of which filled the hearts of the people with joy and delight.

But Jesus, looking at this beautiful Temple, answered, The time is coming when "there shall not be left one stone upon another that shall not be thrown down." This large Temple with all its buildings would be completely destroyed; nothing would remain of it but a heap of ruins. Jesus, the Son of God, who knows all things, tells the disciples that God's judgment and punishment will come upon the city of Jerusalem with its great Temple and finally also upon the whole world, for rejecting the Savior whom God had sent.

The disciples now ask Jesus, "When shall these things be, and what shall be the sign when all these things shall be fulfilled?"

In answering their question, Jesus speaks not only of the destruction of Jerusalem and the Temple but also of the end of the world. There will be many signs to show that these things will surely come to pass. False teachers will come, claiming to be Christ, the Savior, and with their false teaching will deceive many people and lead them away from the true Savior. There shall be wars and rumors (talk) of wars; one nation shall war with another and one kingdom with another. There shall be earthquakes and famines and troubles.

The words which Jesus spoke about Jerusalem and the Temple have been fulfilled. The city and the beautiful Temple were utterly destroyed; not one stone remained upon the other. And as God's judgment came upon Jerusalem, just so surely it will also come upon the whole world on the Day of Judgment. The signs of the Lord's coming to Judgment have been repeated many times, and we see them today in increasing numbers: false teachers who would lead us away from Jesus; earthquakes, wars, famines, and all manner of troubles. Surely the Day of Judgment is near.

And how can you and I escape this terrible judgment of God? Only by trusting in the Savior whom He has sent. Trusting in Him, we need not fear. To the Christians the Lord's coming and the end of the world will be the day of salvation. E. EN.
