Studies in Luther's Catechism

THE SECOND ARTICLE

"Jesus Christ, My High Priest" (Concluded)

Jesus Christ, our High Priest, has brought the sacrifice of perfect obedience for us and also a bloody sacrifice for our sins. But Aaron and every high priest after him not only had to bring sacrifices for the people; they had also another work, of which we shall learn in this study.

Jesus Christ, Our High Priest, Prays for Us

Of the high priest who brought the sacrifice into the Holy Place on the Day of Atonement we read furthermore: "And he shall take a censer full of burning coals of fire from off the altar before the Lord, and his hands full of sweet incense beaten small, and bring it within the veil; and he shall put the incense upon the fire before the Lord," Lev. 16:12, 13. So the high priests and priests again and again had to burn incense also upon the altar of incense. The burning of incense was as coming before God in prayer. David says in Ps. 141:2: "Let my prayer be set before Thee as incense." Now, as the high priests of old, so our High Priest Jesus Christ "appears in the presence of God for us" with the incense of prayer. In Heb. 7:25 we read: "He ever liveth to make intercession [prayers] for us." Sweet comfort indeed, to know that our Lord Jesus in heaven always prays for us.

Jesus Christ, Our High Priest, Prays for the Forgiveness of Our Sins

The Apostle John writes: "If any man sin, we have an Advocate with the Father, Jesus Christ the Righteous," 1 John 2:1. Jesus is our Advocate, or lawyer, before God. When we sin, He speaks for us and holds up His pierced hands and prays for mercy and forgiveness. And because we have such an High Priest we can say with Paul, Rom. 8:34: "Who is he that condemneth? It is Christ that died, yea rather, that is risen again, who is even at the right hand of God, who also maketh intercession [prayers] for us." How Jesus intercedes, or prays, for sinners you may learn from the parable in Luke 13:6-9. Read also the beautiful prayer of our High Priest for His believers in John 17. Oh, when we see how we daily sin much and indeed deserve nothing but punishment, we must rejoice in knowing that our High Priest Jesus stands before the Father's throne in heaven and there pleads with Him for us! Yes, rejoice!

Tell It unto the World!

Friend, you need Him; I need Him; all the world needs Him. Oh, do not let your friends nor any one else live and die without this good word of our Lord and High Priest! THE BREAD OF LIFE

Bible-Study for December

"This do in remembrance of Me," Luke 22:19 Bible-Lesson: Mark 14:17-25

"And in the evening He cometh with the Twelve." And as they sat and did eat, Jesus said, Verily I say unto you, One of you which eateth with Me shall betray Me. And they began to be sorrowful and to say unto Him one by one, Is it I? And another said, Is it I? And He answered and said unto them, It is one of the Twelve that dippeth with Me in the dish. The Son of Man indeed goeth as it is written of Him; but woe to that man by whom the Son of Man is betrayed! Good were it for that man if he had never been born. And as they did eat, Jesus took bread and blessed and brake it and gave to them and said, Take, eat; this is My body. And He took the cup, and when He had given thanks, He gave it to them; and they all drank of it. And He said unto them, This is My blood of the new testament, which is shed for many. Verily I say unto you, I will drink no more of the fruit of the vine until that day that I drink it new in the kingdom of God."

The two disciples whom Jesus had sent into the city to prepare the passover found everything as Jesus had said to them, vv. 13-15; and they made ready the passover.

In the evening of the same day Jesus came with the Twelve to eat the passover. Judas, who had agreed to betray Jesus into the hands of His enemies, was also with them. While they were eating, Jesus said to His disciples, "Verily I say unto you, One of you which eateth with Me shall betray Me." Jesus knew the wicked plans of Judas, and He spoke these words to warn him against carrying out his wicked deed. The other disciples, however, did not know whom Jesus meant, and, trembling at the thought that Jesus might be speaking of them, they all said, one after the other, "Is it I? Is it I?" Jesus did not mention the name of the traitor to them but answered, "It is one of the Twelve that dippeth with Me in the dish."

Judas did not heed the Lord's warning. He was already in the power of Satan. But Jesus again warns him that the curse and punishment of God will be certain to follow upon his wicked deed; for He said: "Woe to that man by whom the Son of Man is betrayed! Good it were for that man [Judas] if he had never been born." Even these words of warning, however, made no impression upon Judas.

And now we are told how the Lord instituted the Sacrament of the Altar, also called the Lord's Supper, or Holy Communion. While they were eating, at the conclusion of the passover meal, Jesus took bread, blessed it, and gave it to His disciples, saying: "Take, eat; this is My body." Then He took the cup, which was filled with wine, gave thanks, and gave it to them; and they all drank of it. And He said: "This is My blood of the new testament [agreement, or promise], which is shed [poured out] for many."

This Lord's Supper we still have today. With the bread and the wine we eat and drink the true body and blood of our crucified Savior. In this Holy Supper we receive the assurance that by His suffering and death on the cross all our sins have been removed, and our faith in His Word and promises is strengthened anew as often as we receive it.

What precious comfort our Savior offers us in this Sacrament! His body and blood were given and shed for us for the forgiveness of our sins. This same body and blood He gives to us as a seal and pledge of the forgiveness of our sins. Oh, let us come often to the Lord's Table to receive the blessings offered us there!

Indianapolis Field. - On September 14 we laid into the earth the body of a communicant member of our flock in and around Farina, Ill., Friedbert Bernhard Lange, who after a severe, painful, lingering sickness died on September 11. Mr. Lange lost his hearing through sickness when he was one year old. At the age of seven he was sent to the Illinois School for the Deaf, where he remained nine years and acquired a good education. After leaving school, the Rev. Wm. Martens, his and his parents' pastor, instructed him in the chief doctrines of the Bible for fourteen months, and our deceased brother was examined, made his confession of faith and fidelity to Christ, and was then confirmed in the presence of the large congregation at St. Paul, Illinois, his one sister acting as interpreter during the whole service. The present missionary learned to know him about four years ago and to value him as a faithful son of God, in whom dwelt the Spirit of the Lord. Knowing himself to be a lost and condemned sinner and to be saved solely by the blood of the Lamb of God, he loved the Word which brought him to Christ and by which he was kept in the faith. Living about fifteen miles from the place of worship, he attended every service up to May of this year, missing only when impassable roads made it impossible to come, and was a constant and devout guest at the Lord's Table. And he did something else, and we praise God for it: he studied faithfully the Word of God at home and attended services in the church of the hearing on Sundays, thus setting a beautiful example for many and showing where his heart and mind really dwelt. By this love of the Word and his home study he had grown much in the knowledge of the Bible doctrines and his Savior's work, in faith, love, and good works. If we once could get people, also our deaf Christians, to see that the Bible and its teachings must be studied and restudied all the time we live; if we could get our confirmed deaf to realize that confirmation is not the end but the beginning of their study of the Word of God; if we then could get them to spend some time every week, if not every day, in relearning what they already have learned and adding new thoughts of God to those they already have, what strong men and women in knowledge, in faith and love, in holiness of life, in zeal for the house of God and His will to bring others to Christ, we should have in our deaf congregations. Our brother, now with Christ, daily devoted some time to his Lord and His Word. Twice, in his last sickness, he desired the body and blood of his Lord Jesus, by which Christ's righteousness became his and he was assured of his eternal salvation and life. Shortly before he died, he signed a prayer in which he confessed his sins and prayed for pardon and remission for Jesus' sake. Then he fell into a coma, and amidst the prayers of his aged God-fearing mother and other relatives his soul winged its way to the heavenly mansions at six o'clock in the morning. Verily, "thou shalt rest and stand in thy lot [place] at the end of the days," Dan. 12:13.

Sincere thanks are due to Pastor Petzoldt of St. Paul's Church, who ministered faithfully unto our deceased brother in his sickness.

Since Pastor Schroeder, who served a number of stations in Northwest Indiana, Kentucky, Tennessee, and Georgia, was put in full charge of our work among the blind people, these stations are being served by the missionary of the Indianapolis field. W. G.
