Studies in Luther's Catechism

THE SECOND ARTICLE

"Jesus Christ . . . Obedient unto Death . . . Highly Exalted"

Jesus Christ Obedient unto Death

In our last studies we learned how Jesus humbled Himself and became obedient unto death, even the death of the cross. And why did He thus humble Himself? For you and me. We confess in the explanation of the Second Article: "He has redeemed [saved] me, a lost and condemned creature [person], purchased [bought] and won me from all sins, from death, and from the power of the devil, not with gold or silver, but with His holy, precious blood and with His innocent suffering and death, that I may be His own." Memorize these precious words! Make them your daily prayer and confession of faith and your hope and stay in your last hour.

Jesus Christ Highly Exalted (Set on High)

Is the work of salvation really finished? Crucified, dead, and buried! It seems sin, death, and devil have won the victory. Oh, no, my friend, they have not. In our Creed we are taught to confess also: "He descended into hell; the third day He rose again from the dead; He ascended into heaven and sitteth at the right hand of God the Father Almighty; from thence He shall come to judge the quick and the dead." And in the explanation of the Second Article we therefore confess with Luther: "That I may live under Him in His kingdom and serve Him in everlasting righteousness, innocence, and blessedness, even as He is risen from the dead, lives and reigns to all eternity. This is most certainly true." Our Savior, who went into death for us, now is Lord over all. "God hath highly exalted Him and given Him a name which is above every name, that at the name of Jesus every knee should bow of things in heaven and things in earth and things under the earth, and that every tongue should confess that Jesus Christ is Lord, to the glory of God the Father," Phil. 2:9-11. And Eph. 1:20-22 we read of Him who died for us: "God raised Him from the dead and set Him at His own right hand in the heavenly places, far above all principality and power and might and dominion and every name that is named, not only in this world, but also in that which is to come; and hath put all things under His feet and gave Him to be the Head over all things to the Church." Yes, He has won the victory - He is Lord over all!

Rejoice in This Lord over All

The words of our Creed "He descended into hell... to judge the quick and the dead" urge every believer at all times to rejoice: "My salvation is sure! It is finished! I know I am saved!" In order that we shall rejoice more and more, we shall study these words of the Creed in several articles. May God grant us this joy, which no man can take from us!

Bible-Study for August

"Christ also suffered for us," 1 Pet. 2:21

Bible-Lesson: Mark 15:6-15

"Now, at that feast he released unto them one prisoner, whomsoever they desired. And there was one, named Barabbas, which lay bound with them that had made insurrection with him, who had committed murder in the insurrection. And the multitude, crying aloud, began to desire him to do as he had ever done unto them. But Pilate answered them, saying, Will ye that I release unto you the King of the Jews? For he knew that the chief priests had delivered Him for envy. But the chief priests moved the people that he should rather release



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Barabbas unto them. And Pilate answered and said again unto them, What will ye, then, that I shall do unto Him whom ye call the King of the Jews? And they cried out again, Crucify Him! Then Pilate said unto them, Why, what evil hath He done? And they cried out the more exceedingly, Crucify Him! And so Pilate, willing to content the people, released Barabbas unto them and delivered Jesus, when he had scourged Him, to be crucified."

The chief priests and the elders of the Jews had taken Jesus before the Roman governor, Pontius Pilate, and had accused Him of forbidding to pay tribute to the Roman emperor and of establishing a rival kingdom among the Jews. Therefore they demanded of Pilate that he condemn Jesus to death. When Pilate, however, questioned Jesus about the charges which the priests and the elders had made against Him, he soon realized that Jesus was innocent and that the priests and the elders had delivered Him for envy. Therefore Pilate, not willing to condemn an innocent man, sought to set Jesus free.

A welcome opportunity to set Jesus free now presented itself, so Pilate thought. Pilate had the custom to release to the people at the Passover one prisoner, whomsoever they desired. And at this time the people reminded him of this custom and demanded that he set free a prisoner of their choice. Pilate had a notorious prisoner, a rebel and murderer, called Barabbas, who had committed murder in an insurrection (rebellion) which had occurred in the city. And Pilate offered the people the choice between Jesus and the murderer Barab-

bas. He felt certain that the people would ask for Jesus rather than for the murderer Barabbas. But the chief priests and the elders persuaded and moved the multitude to ask for the release of Barabbas.

When Pilate asked the multitude, "What will ye, then, that I shall do unto Him whom ye call the King of the Jews?" they answered, "Crucify Him!" And when Pilate appealed to them again, saying, "Why, what evil hath He done?" they cried out the more exceedingly, "Crucify Him!" Pilate, although convinced of Jesus' innocence, now yielded to the demands of the people. The innocent Jesus was scourged (whipped) and delivered into the hands of His enemies to be crucified.

Jesus was delivered unto death that we, the guilty ones, might be set free. By condemning Jesus to death, the Jews and their priests and elders meant to do away with Jesus, to silence Him forever. But God the Father, whose ruling hand we cannot fail to see amidst all this wickedness, meant to put Him to death that mankind might be redeemed.

My friend, think of what the boundless love of God has done for you! The holy Son of God was condemned that you might be set free. $E. E_N.$
