Studies in Luther's Catechism

THE SECOND ARTICLE

"Jesus Christ-Descended into Hell"

We have learned how Jesus humbled Himself and became obedient unto death, even the death of the cross. We saw only shame and sorrow and suffering. But now we shall see glory and majesty. This is manifested first by His descent into hell.

The Bible Teaches Christ's Going Down into Hell

In 1 Pet. 3:18, 19 we read: "Christ was put to death in the flesh but quickened by the Spirit, by which also He went and preached unto the spirits in prison." The enemies put Him to death, but on Easter Day He was quickened, that is, He was raised again to life. But before He showed Himself to His disciples and friends, He went to the spirits in prison. This prison is hell. Peter writes: "The angels that sinned God cast down to hell and delivered them into chains of darkness, to be reserved unto Judgment," 2 Pet. 2:4. The devils are in this prison, as also the souls of those who died in unbelief, as the people who lived in the days of Noah. To these spirits in hell Jesus went.

He Went Down into Hell Not to Suffer

Jesus suffered the pains of hell for us on the cross. In 2 Thess. 8:5 we read: "They that obey not the Gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ shall be punished with everlasting destruction from the presence of the Lord and from the glory of His power." On the cross Jesus had to suffer this. God left Him alone, without His presence and power, in utter darkness and suffering, and Jesus therefore cried out, "My God, My God, why hast Thou forsaken Me?" He suffered the pains of hell on the cross and need suffer no more. "It is finished!" He exclaimed when He gave up His ghost.

He Went Down into Hell to Preach

Peter says that Jesus went and preached unto the spirits in prison. That does not mean that He preached forgiveness and salvation to these spirits in hell. Read the story of the rich man and Lazarus in Luke 16. This chapter shows that there is no chance for a man in hell to get even a drop of water, much less the living waters of salvation. It is an everlasting punishment, as Jesus says in Matt. 25:46. Do not think that you and I will get another chance after death.

What, then, did Jesus preach in hell? In Col. 2:15 Paul writes: "Having spoiled principalities and powers, He made a show of them openly, triumphing over them." These principalities and powers are the devil and his mighty angels. Jesus has overcome them, and as the victor He went and preached to the spirits in prison of His triumph over sin and death and devil and of the Judgment to come.

Rejoice in Your Savior who Descended into Hell

Yes, rejoice. Imagine your Savior marching through the gates of hell with the spoils of victory while the devil and his angels and all who died in unbelief fear and tremble. The victory is won. Devil and hell are defeated. Our salvation is finished and sure. Hallelujah!

Bible-Study for September

"I gave My back to the smiters and My cheeks to them that plucked off the hair; I hid not My face from shame and spitting," Is. 50:6

Bible-Lesson: Mark 15:16-19

"And the soldiers led Him away into the hall called Praetorium; and they called together the whole band. And they clothed Him with purple and platted a crown of thorns and put it about His head and began to salute Him, Hail, King of the Jews! And they smote Him on the head with a reed and did spit upon Him and, bowing their knees, worshiped Him."

Pilate finally yielded to the demands of the people to crucify Jesus, although he was convinced of Jesus' innocence. Instead of releasing Jesus, the Innocent One, he condemned Jesus to be crucified and released the murderer Barabbas. This he did, not to do justice, but to content (satisfy) the people, whose hearts were filled with hatred against Jesus.

When Jesus had been scourged (whipped), the soldiers of the governor took Him and led Him into the hall called Praetorium, the courtyard of the palace. And the whole band of soldiers, numbering about six hundred men, gathered around Jesus and began to mock and The soldiers remembered that abuse Him. Jesus had spoken of Himself as the King of the Jews. Therefore they removed His clothing and put on Him a purple robe, resembling the garments worn by kings. Then they made a crown of thorns and placed it upon His head to represent the crown of gold worn by earthly rulers. And they bowed their knees before Him and mocked Him and began to salute Him, saying, "Hail, King of the Jews!" Others took a reed and struck Him on the head, driving the crown of thorns deeper into His flesh; others spit upon Him; still others bowed their knees in mocking worship.

"I gave My back to the smiters and My cheeks to them that plucked off the hair; I hid not My face from shame and spitting," Is. 50:6. These words of the Savior, spoken through His prophet, were here fulfilled to the And when you, my friend, behold letter. Jesus in His misery and shame which He had to endure, remember that He had to suffer these things to redeem you. God would have laid this punishment upon you if Jesus had not suffered it for you. Among these intangible items are countless hours given by you to our boys and girls, hours spent in travel, preparation, and teaching. While we can never know the actual number of hours given by you to us, we do want you to know that they are deeply appreciated. Looking back, it is gratifying to know that all our boys and girls had Sunday-school every Sunday and a service of worship as well. While we can never definitely know how much good was derived from these services, we hope that the inventory of our pupils, as the years pass, will number as treasured possessions some of your contributions. In behalf of the school I do want to say 'Thank you' for all you have done in the past year. It is my hope that our pleasant relationship may be extended into the years to come." Signed: John G.
