#### No Salvation by Good Works

That good works bring salvation is the teaching of heathenism. All the pagan wise men of the past ages accepted this falsehood. Mohammed, Buddha, Confucius, teach it; but it is not a Bible truth. Good works are the fruits of a true Christian faith and receive a gracious reward in heaven, but they cannot justify any man before God. Every man's

errors are far greater than his good deeds. Salvation by good works is the religion of a wicked mind which has left the only source of spiritual wisdom, God's own Word, the Bible. It is a misunderstanding of the fact that after salvation is attained "through faith of the operation of God," Col. 2:12, good works follow in faith's wake from thankfulness for salvation through the merits of the Savior. Because most people believe in salvation by good works it does not follow that such belief is truth. It only shows how successfully Satan is deceiving humanity. The Bible clearly states that our salvation is in Jesus only. Rom. 4:5 we read, "But to him that worketh not but believeth on Him that justifieth the ungodly, his faith is counted for righteousness." St. Paul warns the Galatians (chap. 1:8), "But though we or an angel from heaven preach any other Gospel unto you than that which we have preached unto you, let him be accursed."

## **Bible-Study for October**

"Who His own self bare our sins in His own body on the tree," 1 Pet. 2:24

#### Bible-Lesson: Mark 15:20-28

"And when they had mocked Him, they took off the purple from Him and put His own clothes on Him and led Him out to crucify Him. And they compel one Simon, a Cyrenian, who passed by, coming out of the country, the father of Alexander and Rufus, to bear His cross. And they bring Him unto the place Golgotha, which is, being interpreted, The Place of a Skull. And they gave Him to drink wine mingled with myrrh; but He received it not. And when they had crucified Him, they parted His garments, casting lots upon them, what every man should take. And it was the third hour, and they crucified Him. And the superscription of His accusation was written over, The King of the Jews. And with Him they crucify two thieves, the one on His right hand and the other on His left. And the scripture was fulfilled which saith, And He was numbered with the transgressors."

The band of soldiers which had gathered around Jesus to mock and abuse Him now took off the purple robe which they had placed on Him and put His own clothes on Him and led Him away to crucify Him. The cross on which He was to die was laid upon His shoulders. It seems, however, that Jesus, weary from the long night of suffering and agony, collapsed under the burden of the cross and was no longer able to carry it. For when the soldiers met a man coming out of the country, they compelled him to bear Jesus' cross. This man was Simon of Cyrene in Africa, the father of Alexander and Rufus, who no doubt were well-known Christians of later days. What an honor it was for Simon to carry the cross for Jesus!

The soldiers brought Jesus to a place called Golgotha, which means, The Place of a Skull. That was the place of execution, a hill near Jerusalem. And the soldiers gave Him wine to drink mingled with myrrh. This mixture was usually given to the condemned criminals to lessen the pain and suffering of the cross. But when Jesus tasted of it, He would not drink it. He wanted to endure the suffering of the cross to the utmost.

And it was on Golgotha that Jesus, the Son of God, was nailed to the cross. According to the Jewish reckoning of time it was the third hour when they crucified Him, nine o'clock in the morning. With Him they also crucified two thieves, one on His right hand, the other on His left. And so the scripture was fulfilled which saith, And He was numbered with the transgressors.

Jesus, the Son of God, nailed to the cross! As you behold Him on the cross, bear in mind, my friend, what brought Him there. St. Peter tells you in these words: "Who His own self bare our sins in His own body on the tree" (cross). Our sins brought Him there; for our sins He endured suffering and death, that we might escape the curse and punishment which we deserved. Oh, trust in Him who shed His blood for you on the cross, for the blood of Jesus Christ, God's Son, cleanses you from all sins.
