Studies in Luther's Catechism

THE SECOND ARTICLE

"Jesus Christ — the Third Day Rose Again from the Dead"

Jesus Christ went into death and the grave, and on Easter Day arose and went down into hell and showed Himself as the Victor over death and devil. Then He came and showed Himself to His friends and disciples as their risen and victorious Lord and Savior in order that also you and I might rejoice in Him.

Christ is Risen; He Is the Son of God

During this month our thoughts love to dwell in Bethlehem with the Christ-child. What think you of this Child? Whose Son is He? In his Letter to the Romans Paul answers: "He is declared to be the Son of God with power . . . by the resurrection from the dead," Rom. 1:4. Often Jesus spoke of His resurrection, which would show that He is the Son of God. The Jews asked a sign of Him, and He said: "Destroy this temple, and in three days I will raise it up," John 2:19. And the same chapter tells us that He spoke of the temple of His body and His resurrection, vv. 21, 22. Mark the words "I will raise it up." By His own power He will arise. Therefore He also said, "I have power to lay down My life, and I have power to take it again," John 10:18. Indeed, if Jesus had not come out of the grave, we could not rejoice in that Christchild. But now He is risen; He truly is the Son of God. Therefore the angel also said of this Babe in the manger: "Unto you is born this day a Savior, which is Christ the Lord," Luke 2:11.

Christ is Risen; His Word Is True

When our Lord spoke to His disciples of His suffering and death for the sins of the whole world, He always added these words: "And the third day He shall rise again," for instance, Matt. 20:19. And to His enemies who asked a sign of Him He said: "As Jonas was three days and three nights in the whale's belly, so shall the Son of man be three days and three nights in the heart of the earth," Matt. 12:40. Oh, if Jesus is not risen from the dead, then we cannot believe one word of His. Why rejoice on Christmas Day if the word of the Christ-child is not true. But now, praise to God, He is risen, and His word is true. When the women came to His grave on Easter morn, they saw the stone rolled away and the angel of the Lord sitting upon it, and he said unto them: "Fear not ye. He is not here; for *He is risen, as He said,*" Matt. 28: 5, 6. Indeed, by His coming out of the grave He made us sure that His word is true.

Christ is Risen! Let Us Rejoice in the Christ-Child!

On Christmas Day we sing: "Rejoice, ye sons of men alway! God comes to you from heaven today." And much more we ought to rejoice on the birthday of our King, when we remember that this Christ-child, born for us, also truly rose again. Indeed, this Child is the Lord, His word is true! Bible-Study for December

"The Son of God, who loved me and gave Himself for me," Gal. 2:20

Bible-Lesson: Mark 15:29-37

"And they that passed by railed on Him, wagging their heads and saying, Ah, Thou that destroyest the Temple and buildest it in three days, save Thyself, and come down from the cross! Likewise also the chief priests, mocking, said among themselves with the scribes, He saved others; Himself He cannot save. Let Christ, the King of Israel, descend now from the cross that we may see and believe. And they that were crucified with Him reviled Him. And when the sixth hour was come, there was darkness over the whole land until the ninth hour. And at the ninth hour Jesus cried with a loud voice, saying, Eloi, Eloi, lama sabachthani? which is, being interpreted, My God, My God, why hast Thou forsaken Me? And some of them that stood by, when they heard it, said, Behold, He calleth Elias. And one ran and filled a sponge full of vinegar and put it on a reed and gave Him to drink, saying, Let alone; let us see whether Elias will come to take Him down. And Jesus cried with a loud voice, and gave up the ghost."

In order to save you and me from God's wrath and punishment, the Son of God, the Righteous One, had to suffer not only the pain and torture of the cross to which He was nailed; He also had to endure the mockery and scorn which was poured out upon Him from every side. The people that passed by the cross mocked Him, shook their heads, and said: "Ah, Thou that destroyest the Temple and buildest it in three days, save Thyself, and come down from the cross!" The chief priests and the scribes also joined in the mocking, saying: "He saved others; Himself He cannot save. Let Christ, the King of Israel, descend now from the cross, that we may see and believe." Even the malefactors who were crucified with Him reviled and denounced Him.

The countless miracles which Jesus had performed were ample proof of His Messiahship, but the priests and the elders and the scribes had rejected Him as the promised Messiah. They had hardened their hearts against Him. Even if Jesus should have come down from the cross, they would not have believed in Him. He could indeed easily have done this had He been minded to do so. With one word He also could have destroyed all those who were heaping mockery upon Him. But He endured the torture of the cross and the mockery of His enemies that the world might be saved. He had come to do the Father's will, and He was "obedient unto death, even the death of the cross."

Yes, on the cross Jesus had to suffer also the torments of hell for our sins. When the sixth hour was come, at noon, the sun was darkened, and there was a darkness over all the land until the ninth hour, until three o'clock in the afternoon. During this time He was forsaken by God, for He cried out: "My God, My God, why hast Thou forsaken Me?" No man can know and understand all that Jesus had to suffer during those terrifying hours of darkness. By this suffering, however, He redeemed us from the power of the devil and from eternal damnation. And we who accept Him in faith as our Savior shall therefore never experience what it means to be forsaken by God. For Jesus' sake God now receives us as His dear children. Oh, let us love Him who loved us and gave Himself for us. E. En.

Chicago, Ill. — On Saturday, October 26, our congregation was saddened by the death of Mr. Walter E. Michaelson, who passed away in firm trust in his Savior in Belmont Hospital after having been confined to his bed for only a little over a week. Although he was given several blood transfusions, he did not recover from what an autopsy revealed to have been a burst blood vessel in the stomach, which caused repeated hemorrhages. He reached the age of 49 years. He had been a faithful member of Our Savior Church since 1911. May the comfort of the divine Word support the family in their bereavement, and may they learn to say with the psalmist, Ps. 94:19: "In the multitude of my thoughts Thy comforts delight my soul," which words formed the basis of the pastor's remarks at the funeral service. At the time of his death Mr. Michaelson was president of the Silent Lutheran Club, and the year previous he had been vice-president of the congregation.

We wish her much contentment and heavenly comfort during the remaining years of her life.
