Why Go to Church?

Edgar A. Guest said: "To say that I don't need the church is mere bravado. I needed it when my father died; I needed it when we were married and when our babies were taken from us, and I shall need it again sooner or later, and need it badly. I am in good health now, and I could, I suppose, get along very nicely for a time without the aid of clergymen or choir or even prayer; but what sort of man is he who scorns and neglects and despises his best Friend until his hour of tribulation?"

Your conscience and reason tell you there is a God. This God has made Himself known in our Bible and commands you to worship and serve Him. He has commanded His Church to preach the Gospel to every creature, to all nations, Mark 16:15; Matt. 28:19, and says: "He that is of God heareth God's words," and: "He that heareth you [those who preach His Word] heareth Me, and he that despiseth you despiseth Me," John 8:47; Luke 10:16. If you do not attend church services, you disobey God, you hinder the progress of His kingdom, you become a wanderer from His fold and a slacker in His cause. Your wicked example will also tempt others to do likewise.

By God's Word faith, or new life, is begun, kept, and strengthened in you. Rom. 1:16: "The Gospel of Christ is the power of God unto salvation to every one that believeth." Rom. 10:17: "Faith cometh by hearing" of the Word of God. 1 Pet. 1:5: "Ye are kept by the power of God through faith unto salvation." Without God's Word, faith, love, and all spiritual life will decline and finally be lost.

God has given His dear Son into suffering and death to save you from your sins. He has furthermore commanded His Church to tell you about your salvation. There is no greater sin than that of disrespecting your Maker. If you do not believe God's Word, you make Him a liar. 1 John 5:10 we read: "He that believeth not God hath made Him a liar because he believeth not the record that God gave of His Son."

If you say that you are able to please God

without attending the services in the church, you again make God a liar, for Heb. 10:24,25 we read that we should "provoke [urge] one another unto love and good works, not forsaking [leaving] the assembling [coming together] of ourselves together."

Neglecting to attend church services is a sin against God, your Maker and Savior. It leads to everlasting death. For the salvation of your own soul and that of others you ought to attend services regularly. O.C.S.

Studies in Luther's Catechism

THE SECOND ARTICLE

"Jesus Christ Ascended into Heaven and Sitteth at the Right Hand of God the Father Almighty"

After Christ had risen from the dead, He was seen of His disciples forty days, and thus they were made sure that He who had died on the cross surely was risen from the dead. They all had seen the living Lord and boldly went out and preached this crucified and risen Savior, and they gladly went into prison and suffered stripes and death for it.

Jesus Ascended (Went Up) into Heaven

After forty days Jesus met His disciples on the Mount of Olives. He told them to wait for the promise of the Father, that is, the Holy Spirit, and then to go forth as His witnesses into all the world. And when He had spoken these things, while they beheld, He was taken up; and a cloud received Him out of their sight, Acts 1: 4-12. His work of salvation was done.

The Ascended Jesus at the Right Hand of God

Jesus went up into heaven. That does not mean that He now is far away from us and no more with us. Many think so and therefore at times say, "We wish Jesus were still with us." Where is He? Mark writes: "He was received up into heaven and sat on the right hand of God," 16:19. God is a spirit; He has no flesh and bones and therefore no right hand as we have. The right hand of God is the power by which He made heaven and earth. Is. 48:13 we read: "Mine hand hath laid the foundation of the earth, and My right hand hath spanned the heavens." His right hand is His almighty power.

The Ascended Lord Still with Us

Where is the right hand of God? Surely not only in heaven. David says: "If I ascend up into heaven, Thou art there; if I make my bed in hell, behold, Thou art there. If I take the wings of the morning and dwell in the uttermost parts of the sea, even there shall Thy hand lead me, and Thy right hand shall hold me," Ps. 139:8-10. God's right hand, or power, is everywhere. Therefore Jesus is not sitting in one place in heaven but is everywhere. Before He went up to heaven, He therefore said: "Lo, I am with you alway, even unto the end of the world," Matt. 28:20.

The Ascended Jesus Rules over All Things

"He sitteth at the right hand of God." He sits upon the heavenly throne. He is the King of Glory and rules over all things in heaven and earth. Already as a child He had this power, but He did not make full use of it; but now "God has put all things under His feet and gave Him to be head over all things to the Church," Eph. 1:22. Mark the words "to the Church." He rules over all things in the interest and for the good of His Church.

THE BREAD OF LIFE

Bible-Study for February

"By His own blood He entered in once into the Holy Place, having obtained eternal redemption for us," Heb. 9:12

Bible-Lesson: Mark 15:38-41

"And the veil of the Temple was rent in twain from the top to the bottom. And when the centurion which stood over against Him saw that He so cried out and gave up the ghost, he said, Truly, this Man was the Son of God! There were also women looking on afar off; among whom was Mary Magdalene and Mary, the mother of James the Less and of Joses, and Salome, (who also, when He was in Galilee, followed Him, and ministered unto Him,) and many other women which came up with Him unto Jerusalem."

When Jesus died on the cross, the great, heavy veil (curtain) which hung in the Temple was torn into two parts from the top to the bottom. This veil separated the Holy Place from the Most Holy Place, the Holy of Holies, where the Ark of the Covenant with the mercy-seat was kept and where God had His dwelling. The Holy of Holies was shut off from view by the large, heavy curtain. No person was permitted to see this Most Holy Place in the Temple, much less enter into it, save the high priest, and he could do so only once a year, on the great Day of Atonement, to sprinkle the blood of atonement on the Ark of the Covenant. This heavy curtain, shutting off the Holy of Holies, constantly reminded the Jews of the fact that their sins separated them from their God and that they could not come into His presence unless atonement had been made for their sins by the shedding of blood.

When Jesus died, He shed His blood for the sins of the world and thereby obtained salvation for all men. As the way into the Holy of Holies in the Temple was opened when the curtain was torn in two, so now the way to God is open for every sinner through the atoning blood of Jesus. Now every sinner can come to God in Jesus' name and receive mercy and forgiveness. Friend, this way to God is also open for you. Only the blood of Jesus Christ, God's Son, can cleanse you from your sins and open the way to God and heaven for you.

And His blood can save because it is the blood of the Son of God, the Savior whom God had promised. The centurion, the Roman officer who had charge of the soldiers at the cross, realized this when he saw how Jesus died, for he exclaimed: "Truly, this Man was the Son of God!"

At the cross there also stood a number of women, disciples of Jesus, whose hearts were filled with love to Him and who had ministered unto Him when He was in Galilee. They had remained faithful to Him.

So let us who by God's grace have come to faith in Jesus remain faithful to Him all the days of our life and serve Him in willing obedience and love. $E. E_N.$
