#### Jesus

# Studies in Luther's Catechism

## THE THIRD ARTICLE

"I believe in the Holy Ghost"

In the Third Article we confess: "I believe in the holy Christian Church." Only believers belong to the Church of Jesus Christ. And because we cannot see faith in the heart of man, we call the Church invisible (not seen). You ask: "Where, then, can the Church be found?"

## The Holy Ghost Works Only by the Gospel

We have learned the Holy Ghost calls, enlightens, sanctifies, and keeps the believer in the true faith, and all this only by the Gospel. Therefore our Lord Jesus in His last command to His Church said: "Preach the Gospel to every creature; he that believeth and is baptized shall be saved, but he that believeth not shall be damned," Mark 16:16. And always the Holy Ghost works and brings sinners to faith wherever the Gospel is preached. That is God's promise. By His prophet Isaiah He says: "My Word shall not return unto Me void [empty], but it shall accomplish [do] that which I please, and it shall prosper [succeed] in the thing whereto I sent it." Is. 55: 11.

## Preach Not the Gospel, and the Church Is Not There

If you wish to find the Church of Jesus Christ, do not think that you must look for it in a large, beautiful church building, or in a church where the wise and mighty and noble men of this world gather, or in a church where you can hear a deep thinker and great speaker. Chances are that there you will not hear the Gospel of Jesus Christ, but a Gospel without the cross and blood of Christ. In every church where the good news of salvation by faith in Christ Jesus and His blood is not preached, there you will not find believers, just as you cannot gather grapes of thorns nor figs of thistles.

#### Preach the Gospel, and There Is the Church

If you want to find the holy Christian Church, look for the Gospel. Wherever you hear the Word of Christ and His blood, be it in a large, beautiful church or in a lowly hut, there you will find believers. Whenever you enter a church and you hear the minister preaching of Him who died for us and the people singing of Him who saved us, there is the holy Christian Church. Wherever you hear the plain preaching of sin and the wrath to come and then of the Lamb of God that takes away sin, there sit down and listen. There the Holy Ghost is working and calling sinners to repentance. There is the Church of Jesus Christ.

## Not All who Hear the Gospel Are Believers

Not everyone who hears the Gospel is a member of Christ's Church. You will find hypocrites, or false Christians, among the believers, just as there was a Judas among the Twelve. Jesus makes this very plain in two parables: the parable of the Tares among the Wheat (Matt. 13:24-30) and the parable of the Net Cast into the Sea (Matt. 13:47,48). As there are tares (weeds) among the wheat and bad fishes among the good, so there are false Christians among the true. Be not surprised if you find a false Christian in the church!

# Stay with the Church that Preaches the Gospel

Beware of churches that do not preach Christ and Him crucified! There you will not find the Church of Jesus Christ. Always look for the preaching of the Gospel. Only there is the one holy Christian Church. J. L. S.

## THE BREAD OF LIFE

#### **Bible Study for June**

#### Bible Lesson: Is. 55:1, 6, 7

"Ho, every one that thirsteth, come ye to the waters! And he that hath no money, come ye, buy, and eat; yea, come, buy wine and milk without money and without price. . . Seek ye the Lord while He may be found; call ye upon Him while He is near. Let the wicked forsake His way and the unrighteous man his thoughts; and let him return unto the Lord, and he will have mercy upon him, and to our God, for He will abundantly pardon."

#### "Seeking the Lord"

Christians everywhere have observed Pentecost Sunday a few days ago. As we read in the second chapter of Acts about the sudden ability of the disciples to speak in different languages, languages other than that in which they were born, we understand again that this was for a purpose of God. This heavenly advertising was done by God Almighty to call the attention of all people to His wonderful grace, in that He did not cast sinners into everlasting punishment but sent His only-begotten Son that whosoever believeth in Him should not perish but have everlasting life. The summary of the message of Pentecost is salvation for lost sinners by the redemption of Jesus Christ.

Unto this very day it is the duty of the Christian Church to repeat God's message of grace over and over. Our Lutheran Church and its pastors confess that this is our most important duty and task.

The text before us is one of the many in the Bible which emphasize the grace and loving-kindness of our Lord. Look at the worldwide invitation "Every one . . . come ye to the waters!" Not only the Jews, who first heard these words, but also the Gentiles; not only the wealthy, but also the poor and unfortunate. It is an offer of grace and mercy: "Come, buy wine and milk without money and without price." The free invitation of the text shows that no money is charged for this free gift of God.

Let us notice the substances which Isaiah mentions — wine and milk. He does not say water, because this only quenches the thirst for a short time. But the wine and milk mentioned will nourish the body and quicken the spirit. Certainly that which we buy and eat is altogether made our own. It is more our own than the things which we buy and only use. "Whosoever will, let him take the water of life freely," Rev. 22:17.

The question may still arise in the mind of some reader: "But what must be my personal qualification, or merit, to be included among those to whom this free salvation is offered?"

The inspired writer Isaiah again gives the answer: "Every one that thirsteth, come ye to the waters." All are welcome to the Gospel grace. Those that feel dissatisfied with themselves and feel lost, they are "thirsty" for the forgiveness which is in Christ alone.

Let us, then, go to church every time that we have an opportunity. Let us study the Bible, the Bread of Life, in our homes to learn more and more about our Savior, always remembering the Lord's promise "The Holy Scriptures are able to make thee wise unto salvation through faith which is in Christ Jesus," 2 Tim. 3:15.
