Some are unwilling to make a sacrifice for Him who "for your sake became poor," 2 Cor. 8:9. Some fear they will not be accepted, but Jesus invites all men. He promises, "Him that cometh to Me I will in no wise cast out," John 6:37. Some are too busy with their everyday problems, but Jesus, the Mouth of all wisdom, asks, "What shall it profit a man if he shall gain the whole world and lose his own soul?" Matt. 16:26. Some refuse to think on these things now, but God admonishes them thus: "Boast not thyself of tomorrow, for thou knowest not what a day may bring forth," Prov. 27:1. Some trust in their own imperfect virtues and good deeds, but the Bible teaches, "The Blood of Jesus Christ, His Son, cleanseth us from all sin." "Believe on the Lord Jesus Christ, and Thou shalt be saved," 1 John 1:7; Acts 16:31. "I believe in the Holy Ghost"

Join the Church that continues in the Word of Jesus! Our dear Lutheran Church does that. It is the Bible Church!

The Lutheran Church Is Built on Christ

One perhaps will say: "You call the Lutheran Church the Bible Church. Why, then, the name Lutheran? This name seems to show that your Church is built upon Luther." The name Lutheran does not and should not say that. This name was given to Luther and his followers by the enemies. Luther did not want this name for the Church. He said: "I beg that my name be passed in silence and that people do not call themselves Lutherans, but Christians. . . Do it not; let us put away party names and bear the name of Christ, whose doctrine we hold." And in the year 1517 Luther nailed the Ninety-five Theses to the church door at Wittenberg. These theses he began not with these words, "I say unto you," but with the words "Our Lord Jesus said." Luther wanted only the Word of God, not any man's word, to rule in the Church. Take any of the teachings of the Lutheran Church, and you will see that it is the teaching of the Bible. The Lutheran Church is the Bible Church!

Not the Name Lutheran, but Only Faith in Jesus Saves

Perhaps another will say: "Will only members of the Lutheran Church be saved?" Friend, we did not say that. We have learned from the Word of God that only believers are members of Christ's Church and that only faith in Christ's blood will save sinners. Mere membership in the Lutheran Church or in any other Church, will not open the gates of heaven to anyone. A man may be a member of the Lutheran Church and still go to everlasting punishment in hell. We do not say: "Only Lutherans will live with Christ," nor, "All Lutherans will be saved," but we do say: "The Lutheran Church teaches the Word of God in all its truth and purity." Do as the Bereans did, Acts 17:11. Compare the teachings of the Lutheran Church with the Bible, and, we are sure, you will confess, "Yes, the Lutheran Church is the Bible Church."

Believe in Jesus and Join the Bible Church

First, we must be members of the holy Christian Church. The first question we should ask ourselves is, "Do I believe in Jesus Christ as my Savior?" And the next question should be, "Does my Church continue in Christ's Word in all of its teachings?" If it does not, we must leave it; if it does, then let us work for this Church, pray for it, support it with our time and money. And as we will not accept impure food and drink, so let us not listen to false teachings nor support a Church with such teachings in any way. Our Lord says: "Beware of false prophets!" and, again, "Avoid them!" and, "Come out from among them!" (Matt. 7:15; Rom. 16:17; 2 Cor. 7:17.)

O grant that in Thy holy Word We here may live and die, dear Lord; And when our journey endeth here, Receive us into glory there. Amen.

THE BREAD OF LIFE

Bible-Study for August

Bible Lesson: Acts 2:14, 16, 17, 21

"Peter, standing up with the Eleven, lifted up his voice and said unto them, Ye men of Judea and all ye that dwell at Jerusalem, be this known unto you, and hearken to my word... This is that which was spoken by the prophet Joel, And it shall come to pass, saith God, I will pour out My Spirit upon all flesh; ... and it shall come to pass that whosoever shall call on the name of the Lord shall be saved."

We know that the Holy Spirit gave the apostles wisdom to speak in clear language. Their words were clear sentences and not confused words. The people testified that they could understand the apostles, for in verse 11 they said that they "could hear them speak the wonderful works of God." But some of the people who saw the disciples refused to believe this miracle of God and spoke wickedly against the disciples. But the disciples were now filled with the Holy Spirit; they had courage, and so Peter arose to deliver a sermon. Peter knew the language of the people at Jerusalem a long time, but Peter was not always in the past brave enough to tell the people that Jesus was their only Savior. Perhaps, while Peter was talking, some of the other disciples continued to talk to the other people of different nations in their own language. But Peter did not have an easy task. Look who his audience was: "Ye men of Judea and all ve that dwell at Jerusalem." Without a doubt these were some of the people who before this had scoffed and mocked or had also taken a part in the trial of Jesus to condemn Him to death.

Now Peter asks the people to listen while he tells them a message from God, a message that will bring them closer to heaven. Peter also warns them not to listen to the scoffing of the scribes and the Pharisees, because their teachings will only take them farther away from God. But he makes it clear that here is a message from the Lord, by whose Holy Spirit a new faith will be started in their heart.

"It shall come to pass. . . . I will pour out My Spirit upon all flesh." The speaker wishes the audience to know that now the Spirit of grace and pardon is distributed over a greater territory than ever before. The name of a prophet in the Old Testament is mentioned

(verse 16), which is meant to explain that the prophets of the Old Testament had the gift of the Holy Spirit, but now the Spirit of the Lord shall be poured out upon all men, also upon the Gentiles, who were not Hebrews.

"In the last days" — that is, when the Messiah (Jesus) has come and has completed the work of the redemption of sinners, "the Lord's house shall be established, and all nations shall flow unto it," Is. 2, 2.

It will be a glorious day when these miracles are performed by the Lord (v. 20), and "it shall come to pass that whosoever shall call upon the name of the Lord," in the true faith and trust in Jesus, "the same shall be saved," Rom. 10:13. To you of the New Testament times comes this Word of the Lord, the Bread of Life. Pray to this Lord Jesus; trust in Him alone to help your soul, "and you shall be saved." A. E. F.

Minnesota Pastor Shows Missionary Zeal

A few quotations are hereby given from a letter received recently by Dr. J. T. Mueller of Concordia Seminary from Pastor N. W. Zellmer of Hill City, Minn.

"Upon entering this charge, I found one deaf man as a member of the Remer congregation, who had been receiving his spiritual food only by the written word. And, as he later told me, 'I have not seen a pastor who knew my language for the past ten years.' His unlimited appreciation gave rise to my promise of signing the service while I spoke it to the rest of the audience. But before three weeks had passed, the names of some twenty other deaf were already written in my notebook and were visited as soon as time permitted. Out of these visits a preaching station arose at which the attendance varied from the high of twenty to the low of seven. Those deaf whom we visited told many different stories concerning their former church connections, their family life, their hunger for the Gospel, their joy of meeting a pastor who could, and was willing to, serve them."

A more detailed account of the interesting tales told by these deaf is contained in the letter; however, lack of space will not permit us to print all of them.

Surely, this Lutheran pastor has shown great love and zeal for bringing God's saving Word to all blood-bought souls within his reach, and we know the Lord will grant His divine blessing upon this work.

Rev. Zellmer, while at Concordia Seminary in St. Louis, took up the study of the signlanguage, and from his experiences mentioned above we know he will never regret having had the opportunity to learn this language of the deaf. May God therefore also bless abundantly the instruction classes in signs given the students at the Seminary by Pastor N.P. Uhlig. E. M.

In our own country Leo Kuehn of Detroit and his deaf friends are doing good work for Henry Ford, and Rev. Gaertner reports that sixty deaf are working in defense plants in Oakland on the Pacific Coast. Even the blind are rendering service in the defense of their country. A home teacher in London, England, tells us in a letter: "I am writing to thank you for your Lutheran periodicals for the blind. In these days of strain, being able to read embossed type is such a help to blind people. I am glad to say that the blind in my area are cheerful and brave. Many of them are knitting for the forces, and others have found some way or another in which they can help." We are always happy to read in these letters from the deaf and the blind that they find the Word of God a real help, light, comfort, and inspiration in these difficult times.
