Pastor W. Uhlig Installed at Los Angeles

Sunday, September 20, Pastor W. Uhlig was installed at Grace Lutheran Church, Los Angeles, by the Rev. O. W. Wismar, assisted by Rev. H. Borchers and Rev. T. Schoessow. An attendance of over 100 deaf attended the installation service, which was interpreted by the undersigned. Since July the Los Angeles field was served alternately by Prof. E. Wolfram, who was visiting in Los Angeles, and the undersigned, who came down from Oakland. The church attendance throughout the summer was very high, reaching eighty, and the co-operation and spirit was one which made working there a pleasure. After the installation a reception was held for the new pastor and his wife, luncheon was served, and plans for the next services agreed upon. Pastor W. Uhlig was well received, and the impression his bride of one week made upon her California friends by replying to the welcome with the manual alphabet is going a long way to assure her happy surroundings. Plans were discussed to solve the problem of the smaller preaching stations, and by all appearances the new pastor should have a large and profitable field. The members showed their appreciation to the undersigned for the various trips made to Los Angeles by presenting him with a splendid Bible and the traveling expenses. Redeemer Church of Seattle and the San Francisco and Oakland missions extended their well-wishes through Mr. C. Torell. In behalf of the Board of Missions at St. Paul and the Los Angeles deaf a joint vote of thanks is expressed to the members of Grace Lutheran Church, Pastors O. Wismar, H. Borchers, and T. Schoessow for the co-operation which made another day of the Lord a joyous one.

Rev. Walter Uhlig comes well equipped for

the work. He has inherited the interest in the deaf from his grandfather, Mr. Herman Uhlig, from 1875 to 1905 teacher at the Lutheran Deaf Institute at Detroit and from his father, the missionary to the deaf at St. Louis. While studying at Concordia Seminary at St. Louis, he learned the sign language from the sainted Rev. F. Hischke. After graduation, in 1938, he served in the Deaf Missions, supplying the Spokane and Montana field one year and serving the Memphis and Southern field two years. Last year he studied at Wash-

THE THIRD ARTICLE

"I believe in the Holy Ghost"

Forgiveness of sins is the greatest blessing on earth. Have you this blessing? You need it, "for all have sinned," Rom. 3:23.

Pacific Northwest Mission. — August 16 marked the twentieth anniversary of the building of a church and parsonage in Seattle, Washington, for the deaf of the Pacific Northwest. This memorable occasion was observed with a fitting celebration, rededicating these

church facilities of the deaf to the service of the Redeemer.

Since the arrival of the new pastor for this field, nine souls have been added by the rite of confirmation and by Baptism. In Seattle, Mrs. Victoria Smith and Mr. Glen Clark were welcomed as members by a group of forty deaf attending the service. In Tacoma, Mr. and Mrs. Bowlen, Mrs. Hale, Mrs. Hollenbeck, Miss Latshaw, and Mr. and Mrs. Maxson became members by their promise to remain faithful unto death. Fortyfive deaf witnessed this service, in which also five children were baptized, three of them deaf children, Evelyn, Shirley, and Robert Dixon; Elda Ellen Smith and Elsie Bowlen. Naomi and Ronald Boesen had been baptized a few weeks before.

In consequence of war conditions and war production many deaf from the Middle West are moving into this territory, especially from North Dakota. We have received transfers for five members from North Dakota. Mrs. Glen Clark, Robert Phinney, Alwyn Matthews, Mr. Lindermoen, and Randall Stavee.

In the near future, Red Cross first-aid classes will be open to the deaf. These classes will be taught by the pastor of the deaf. A great deal of interest in this project has already been aroused. Although none of the wartime emergencies have interfered with any church activities or the civilian life of the deaf, it is good to be prepared for any eventuality as the war zone stretches ever nearer.

The missionary has also been asked to take charge of a Sunday school conducted by a hearing lady for a group of about fourteen children. These young folks attended a lip-reading school and present quite a problem as some are unable to read lips well enough to get along. Another young man is partially blind, and it is almost impossible to converse with him, as he has no knowledge of the signs or manual alphabet. The long absence owing to trips to Montana have made it difficult to find a solution to the problem of caring for this group. A. J.
