#### William S. Knudsen

It is not generally known, but Lieutenant General W. S. Knudsen is an old friend of the deaf. While living in Detroit a few years ago, he presented \$40,000 to the Lutheran School for the Deaf there.

His ability to use the sign language was brought out in a recent press dispatch which follows.

"Big Bill Knudsen did something the other day which amazed even his friends. They had not suspected that he could talk in deaf-mute language.

"Lieutenant General Knudsen was inspecting war plants, accompanied by other Army officers. He dropped in at the Reynolds Metal Company, Louisville, Ky., where approximately 25 per cent of the employees are deaf-mutes.

"By shifting the lunch period, the management gathered all the workers to hear a talk from Knudsen. The foreman told him about the deaf-mutes, adding as a jest, 'You'd better talk to them in sign language.'

"But it was no jest to Knudsen. To the amazement of the foreman and the Army officers, he broke into the sign language and carried on a discourse with his hands. The officers gasped, then applauded.

"Later, individual workers were brought up to meet Knudsen, and he stood around talking with them in the sign language.

"By finding war work for these handicapped workers, Reynolds Metal Company has increased their earnings from \$17 a week to \$40 plus."

#### Studies in Luther's Catechism

#### THE THIRD ARTICLE

"I believe in the Holy Ghost"

The dead shall rise again. This is the plain teaching of our Bible. And our God can raise the dead, for "with God all things are possible," Matt. 19:26.

#### All the Dead Shall Rise Again

In Luther's explanation of the Third Article we confess: "The Holy Ghost will raise up me and all the dead." The Bible teaches that. Our Lord Jesus says: "The hour is coming in the which *all* that are in the graves shall hear His voice and shall come forth." John 5:28, 29. Again He tells us that on Judgment Day "before Him shall be gathered all nations," Matt. 25:32. No matter what you believe, you will rise again.

#### All Will Rise Again on the Last Day

Of the believer the Lord Jesus says: "I will raise him up at the Last Day," John 6:40. Therefore Martha said of her dead brother: "I know that he shall rise again in the resurrection at the Last Day," John 11:24. On that day all will rise again, for Jesus says: The hour is coming, in the which all that are in the graves shall hear His voice and shall come forth," John 5:28,29. All will rise again in the same hour, not some today and the rest one thousand years later. At the Last Day all the graves will be opened and the dead will come forth, the sea will give up the dead that are therein, and death and hell will deliver up the dead which are in them, Rev. 20:13. The believer and the unbeliever will arise at the same time.

# Some go to Everlasting Life, Some to Everlasting Punishment

On the Last Day all will rise and go before Christ's judgment seat. And He will separate them from one another, as a shepherd divides his sheep from the goats; and He will set the sheep on His right hand, but the goats on the left. Those on the right hand He will invite to go with Him to everlasting life and those on the left hand He will send away to everlasting fire. Read Matt. 25: 31-46.

## Believe in Him Who Died and Rose Again and Live Forever

Jesus promises: "He that believeth in Me, though he were dead, yet shall he live; and whosoever liveth and believeth in Me shall never die. Believest thou this?" John 11: 25, 26. ## **Bible-Study for April**

**Bible Lesson: Acts 2:42** 

And they continued steadfastly in the Apostles' doctrine and fellowship and in breaking of bread and in prayers.

When God the Holy Spirit makes people Christians, the new members are not immediately transferred to heaven. One of the reasons why God lets Christians remain in this sin-filled world is that He has work for Christians to do. Jesus says: "Let your light so shine before men that they may see your good works and glorify your Father, which is in heaven," Matt. 5:16. It was so with the first Christians from Pentecost Day. The Bible lesson says: "They continued steadfastly in the Apostles' doctrine." This doctrine which the Apostles were teaching and preaching was what they themselves had first learned from Jesus. The teaching was not an idea of the Apostles. Jesus had given it to them, and now the Apostles by the power of the Holy Ghost preached this doctrine of salvation to the people, and the people "continued in it," that is, they accepted it in true faith. They continued in this teaching "steadfastly." They gave their complete, constant, and continual attention to the soul-saving thing which they had learned.

Secondly, the Lesson teaches, "they continued in fellowship." This refers to the fact that the early Christians in peaceful agreement met and listened and learned more about God's Holy Word. In faith and love and charity they also brought of their possessions. They met together; they worked together. What an encouragement to us all!

"They continued in the breaking of bread." They celebrated Holy Communion as Jesus Himself had instituted it for their benefit. Confessing that they were *not* perfect, but were sinners, who needed the forgiveness of Jesus, they often received the Holy Sacrament. "They continued in prayers." This indicated that they often used that privilege which we have to take our needs to the Lord in private prayer and in public worship.

Continue; be steadfast — that is the key word of this lesson. This is the month of Palm Sunday and Good Friday and Easter. It is a time for Christians to thank their Lord. At the same time we cannot forget that many in the past on Palm Sundays joined the Lord's Church only to drift away later. May you, dear reader, follow the example of the faithful Christians of the lesson. Rev. 2:25.
