# An Important National Convention

From June 21 to 29 a large number of delegates, representing 5,337 congregations and preaching stations with a total of 1,460,203 souls, assembled at Saginaw, Mich., for the 39th national convention of our Lutheran Church, Missouri Synod.

The meeting place was the historic Saginaw Valley in Michigan, where the Franconian

Since these "Pilgrim Fathers" migrated to America approximately one hundred years ago, our Lutheran Church has had, with God's blessing, a remarkable growth in all States of the Union, in Canada, South and Central America, and in other foreign lands. At present our Synod counts 1,007,095 communicants and 214,097 men who govern the congregations in their voting assemblies.

Lutherans of the Missouri Synod are leaders among Protestants in the educational field and have established a nation-wide system of 1,210 private Christian day schools with an enrollment of 73,422 children. Sunday schools number 3,888 with a total enrollment of 268,751 children. Last year Lutherans of the Missouri Synod gave more than twenty-five million dollars for the support and expansion of their Church's work at home and abroad.

At this year's convention the Rev. J. W. Behnken, D. D., of Chicago, Ill., was re-elected to the presidency of our Synod for his fourth term, thus beginning the tenth year in that capacity.

May the Lord guide him and all our pastors, teachers, and members in the enormous task which lies ahead of them, namely, to further the cause of Christ and His Church in this war-torn world and to make adequate plans for postwar progress for the salvation of many souls.

Trapp was confirmed in our congregation; he was instructed by Mr. Helmut Schauland, who has been helping us during the last year and now is concluding his studies at Concordia Seminary. We wish God's blessing to all these new members and pray that many other deaf in the whole United States may also study so carefully the Bible doctrines.

At the seminaries at Springfield and St. Louis, groups are again very busy studying the sign language. The Springfield students have been assisting in every service by signing hymns and lessons and even preaching occasionally. They conducted the service July 16 all alone as well as several services during the last year. Mr. De Laney as well as Mr. H. Rohe and Mr. H. Schauland of the St. Louis seminary are assisting the pastor by relieving him of services, thus enabling him to serve other deaf stations. The work at the seminaries is very important and beneficial.

San Francisco and Oakland. - With the closing of the school term at the California School for the Deaf we are sending to our Los Angeles mission a fine group of young girls, who have faithfully studied their Catechism and learned to know the one thing needful. They are to be confirmed by our missionary, W. Uhlig. These young people are: E. Elmassian, V. De Pew, G. Wade, B. Wilson, and P. Wilson. We also concluded a class of instruction among the adult deaf at the School for the Deaf, and these took out their membership with the mission at Oakland-Miss Bernice Wingett, Loretta Schmidt, Francis Carcolice, and Herman Hutchinson. At San Jose, Wade Geurin was received by the sacrament of Holy Baptism. Our Sunday school enrollment at the State School for the Deaf continues at 40. These children also attend the catchetical instructions each Wednesday afternoon. Our classes run from three in the afternoon until six. This coming year we will introduce for the first time visual religious education at the school. This will be by slide projection of the continuous-story type. The equipment is the donation of friends interested in the deaf child and is the very best. For years now all the books used in our instruction have been the gift of the Oakland and San Francisco members.

We are sorely in need of a chapel here in this crowded Western metropolis. It is hoped that the General Church Extension Fund will help us acquire one of the centrally located churches in the city of Oakland. We have collected some \$6,000 towards this venture. This would enable us to carry on our work more efficiently and more conveniently for all the deaf because of its central location.

We united in holy wedlock three of our ardently working couples: Norman Davis and Loretta Schmidt, Walter Hammerlund and Francis Cracolice, Robert Fromm and Ruby Beem. Norman, who has been with us as a youngster at the School, is an outstanding worker in the church. He has a fine position at the University of California. Walter was the first boy to take religious instructions at the State School, and that training has stood him in good stead, and he has used his gifts in the service of the church. Robert is also a product of the church and even attended our California Concordia College. He served in the Army for over a year. The three weddings were events of the season, and friends packed the church on each occasion. We wish these faithful young people God's richest blessings.

We are facing a problem with tiny ones. What are you to do with so many little ones when you have no church accommodations? We therefore pray that our request for help to receive a chapel in this area will be granted soon. G. W. G.
