Bible Study for September

Acts 4:14-16

"And beholding the man which was healed standing with them, they could say nothing against it. But when they had commanded them to go aside out of the Council, they conferred among themselves, saying, What shall we do to these men? For that indeed a notable miracle hath been done by them is manifest to them that dwell in Jerusalem; and we cannot deny it."

In calling His disciples, Jesus had given them the special power to do miracles. Matt. 10:8. Healing the sick was only one of their many miracles. Jesus had given His promise. There stood the healed man! Even the enemies of Jesus could not deny it. As many times in the past, so now it was proof that the Lord's word is just as powerful in the mouth of His disciples as it is in His own. The Lord's Word accomplishes that which He pleases. Is. 55:11. The Lord's kingdom goes forward. His enemies could neither deny nor stop it.

They asked themselves: "What can be done next to stop this preaching about the Savior Jesus?" That was the question the Jews asked among themselves. They did not know what to say next. Therefore they needed a secret conference among themselves. V. 15. They commanded Peter and John to step out of the council room. We can imagine that the Council of seventy elders (note Num. 11:24) had an excited discussion. Every one desired to give his opinion freely. V. 16. "What shall we do to these men?" — that was the question and problem before them. It is plain that the Council was afraid to punish the disciples, because by the miracle so many people now believed in Jesus.

The Council confessed "it was a notable [evident] miracle, and we cannot deny it." This means that Peter and John did the miracle in the name of Jesus and that Jesus Himself had often done miracles like this while He was here on earth. It was an example of the power of Christ and proof of His doctrine. This made Christ's enemies uncomfortable and unhappy. It is still the same today. When you see the Church and Gospel preaching making progress, who is it that always becomes displeased or works against the Church, even in 1944? A. E. F.

THE LORD'S PRAYER

"Our Father Who Art in Heaven"

Field Secretary Visits St. Louis and Omaha Fields

April 14—19 the writer spent with our St. Louis missionary, the Rev. N. P. Uhlig. The evening of the first day the latter interviewed the writer on our work among the deaf over our Radio Station KFUO.

The following day we motored to the Illinois State School for the Deaf at Jacksonville, where Pastor Uhlig conducts classes. We received a hearty welcome at the school, where we stayed during our visit in Jacksonville, for which we extend our hearty thanks. A pleasant evening was spent with Mr. and Mrs. Dettmann, housefather and housemother in the honor building. They expressed the wish that more work be done in the school among our Lutheran children. Pastor Uhlig is not able to give more time to the work here because of his vast field.

Sunday morning we met with about thirty children, all Lutheran, with whom we recited the Ten Commandments, the Creed, the Lord's Prayer, and the words of institution of the two Sacraments. Pastor Uhlig then told the Easter story, asked questions, and gave them work sheets. He could not meet with all classes on this trip. At 9:30 A.M. he preached a sermon on "Faith," basing his remarks on John 20:19-31. Hymns were signed by our deaf boys and girls. About 250 of them attended with several teachers and adult deaf. Thereupon a service was held in Jacksonville with nine adult deaf, the writer preaching an Easter sermon. Then we left for St. Louis to celebrate the fifth dedication anniversary of the St. Louis chapel. The undersigned preached the sermon, setting forth the Christian congregation's rejoicing on its dedication anniversary from Ps. 20:5. Supper was served in the hall, and then an informal meeting was held with the whole congregation, which numbers 58 communicants and had a very good average attendance of four at the Lord's Table during the past year. Furthermore, attendance at regular services, contributions for church work, pastor's salary, and other things were discussed. The meeting lasted one and one half hours, but the writer enjoyed them immensely. We hope that they were enjoyed also by all present. May God richly bless this visit unto the glory of our Savior's

Monday we met with Dr. Streufert, our secretary of all missions, and with him discussed matters pertaining to our missions. We found that he is deeply interested in our work among the deaf and is desirous of seeing it progress and expand more and more. We also met with Rev. W. Beck of the Visual Education Department and conferred with him about material for the deaf. From there we went to the Central Institute for the Deaf and visited classes. Dr. Silberman, superintendent of the school and one who is doing research work, took us through the Institute and showed us the apparatus for making various tests. There we find also a clinic for deaf and hard of hearing. Tuesday we went to Springfield, Ill., where one of our seminaries is located. In the afternoon we met with the sign class. All members are very much interested in the study of the sign language. In the evening the writer preached the sermon and the students of the sign class took over the liturgy and hymns with Pastor Uhlig. Several of the professors, about forty students, and two deaf attended. On Wednesday afternoon we met with the sign class of the St. Louis Seminary, and in the evening we gave an address to some of the students in the interest of our work.

Thus we spent busy days in the St. Louis Field, but it was all joy.

In May the undersigned visited the Omaha Field, of which Pastor Mappes has charge. Sunday afternoon, May 21, a service was held, which was attended by 76 deaf, 58 partaking of the Lord's Supper: 47 members, nine boys and girls from the School, and the two pastors. We preached the sermon on the need of prayer on the part of the congregation and also on the part of the pastor. More prayers, more blessings. After the service a meeting was held with all present. We showed them that Christians are God's people and always should show forth the praises of Him who has called them out of darkness into His marvelous light. This is done by attending services regularly, often coming to the Lord's Table, doing personal mission work, and gladly giving for the Lord's work. We told them of a member in one of our fields who brought 1,750 pennies as a Christmas offering. He is still saving pennies and brings them as a special offering besides his regular contributions. Save your pennies for the Lord! In regard to personal mission work we urged that we should not be as Cain, who said: "Am I my brother's keeper?" but like Andrew, who brought his brother Peter to Jesus. May also this visit redound unto the glory of our Savior's name!

We were also deeply impressed by the work of Pastor Mappes in the Nebraska and Iowa Schools. In the former he has 55 boys and girls under his care. Every Wednesday afternoon he has two classes, every Thursday he meets with the confirmation class, and Friday evenings with the boys. In Council Bluffs he has 155 boys and girls in his classes, 53 of whom are communicant members. Every Tuesday he meets with three classes, and every Friday he instructs the confirmation class. What a grand privilege that he can every week instruct over two hundred boys and girls in God's Word and Luther's doctrine pure. We are thankful for His many blessings. The writer spoke to all the classes in both schools, telling them of the twelve-yearold Jesus or of Mary, who sat at Jesus' feet and heard His Word, and urging them to follow their example.

Thus we could bring good reports from our St. Louis and Omaha Fields to our Board of Missions to the Deaf and Blind. May God's richest blessings rest upon the work of all our missionaries to the deaf in the United States and Canada, and may His name thus be glorified also among the deaf and many souls be won for Christ! Rev. Lutz preached the sermon, both signing and speaking; then Rev. Steffen, a friend of the deaf, ordained and installed Pastor Schleicher, while Rev. Lutz interpreted for the deaf. Rev. Herman Rossow of Sioux Falls also assisted in the service. Two members of the congregation, Mr. Krohn and Mr. Larson, in the name of Trinity Congregation, publicly accepted Rev. Schleicher as their pastor.

A reception with a light lunch was held on the lawn on the north side of the church. The congregation welcomed their new pastor with a gift of money.
