Studies in Luther's Catechism

THE FIRST PETITION OF THE LORD'S PRAYER "Hallowed be Thy Name"

God's name is hallowed "when we, as dear children of God, lead a holy life according to His Word." For this we pray: "Hallowed be Thy name." But with this prayer we ask God also to preserve us from living otherwise than God's Word teaches.

Many Live Not as God's Children

Many call God their Father but do not walk as God's children. Many call themselves Christians, but live in sin, neglect their Bible and prayer, go to church very little, love to do evil, and live not as God's dear children. When children disobey their parents, lie, steal, and do many other wicked things, they surely bring not honor but shame upon their parents. These must feel ashamed to say: "This is our son. That is our daughter." So many people have the name Christian and are church members, but by their wicked life bring shame upon God's holy name and His Church. The world points at them, saying: "See, the Christians are not any better than we are," and God must feel ashamed to say: "These call themselves by My name."

Pray that God Keep You from Sin

Yes, we need this prayer. We still have the Old Adam in us. Our old wicked heart always wants the things that are evil and tries to stop us on the good way, Rom. 7:18-25. We still are in this world. The wicked people hate Jesus and all them that love His name. They try to lead us to the way of sin, John 15:18-21. Then there is the devil, who as a roaring lion walketh about, trying to make us fall, 1 Pet. 5:8. Oh, every day pray: "Hallowed be Thy name. Keep us from evil. Help us that we do not walk in sin and do not bring dishonor and shame upon Thy name."

THE BREAD OF LIFE

Bible Study for June Acts 5:1-11

A certain man named Ananias, with Sapphira, his wife, sold a possession, and kept back part of the price, his wife also being privy to it, and brought a certain part and laid it at the Apostles' feet. But Peter said, Ananias, why hath Satan filled thine heart to lie to the Holy Ghost and to keep back a part of the price of the land? Whiles it remained, was it not thine own? And after it was sold, was it not in thine own power? Why hast thou conceived this thing in thine heart? Thou hast not lied unto men but unto God. And Ananias, hearing these words, fell down and gave up the ghost, and great fear came on all them that heard these things.

In the beginning of this fifth chapter of the Acts, upon which our Bible lessons are based, we shall do well to ask, "What is the main purpose, or the chief lesson, of the Book of Acts?" Dr. Martin Luther has explained it clearly in the words: "St. Luke wishes to teach all Christians to the end of the world that we all must be justified by faith in Jesus Christ alone and not by the deeds [doings] of the Law. The Book of Acts is not intended to show the personal good works of the Apostles. Even St. Augustine thought that it was the best example of the Apostles because they had all their possessions in common." But that is not the important part of Acts. Let us continue our study, then, remembering how often the verses encourage us to accept by faith the salvation which Jesus has prepared for us.

The Bible lesson teaches us that Ananias and Sapphira sold some of their property and brought a part of the money to the Apostles. They had made plans to make it appear as if they were giving everything to the Lord (see v.8). This fraud, their lies and their actions, proved that they were not giving this money for the love of the Lord; they were not doing this because they wanted the Word of Jesus to be preached more and more in the world. Ananias and his wife were not giving this for the support of the "preachers," the Apostles, not for charity to help other Christians. No. Ananias and his wife in their selfishness were perhaps thinking only of living in comfort and ease from the returns of this fund in future years. Their actions not only show fraud, but also a shameful distrust in God's power to give them all necessities of life.

Vv. 3 and 4. We learn that no one had encouraged them or compelled them to bring the "price" to the common treasury. The entire matter was their own plan. Their offense was against the Holy Ghost and His soul-saving Word and work, for whose progress and expansion (the preaching of the Gospel) these first Christians had organized. That these two people tried to deceive the Holy Spirit, that was what made the offense so serious. Therefore God punished them with immediate death.

It is unfortunate that human passion and greed for money brought this sad chapter into the history of the early Christians. So far the Apostles had performed miracles of mercy, but here is a miracle of judgment and punishment upon the guilty.

This lesson has an earnest thought for us. V-E Day has come to us by God's mercy. From Peace Thankoffering booklets and sermons you have learned how many millions of people in Europe need the Gospel. Sixtyseven million Americans and seventeen million (U.S.) children are not yet touched by the Gospel. Will you, dear reader, help to bring these people to Jesus, the Savior? May this study encourage you. A. E. F.
