THE SECOND PETITION OF THE LORD'S PRAYER "Thy Kingdom Come"

God's kingdom comes when our heavenly Father gives us His Holy Spirit, so that we believe His holy Word and lead a godly life.

We Ask Him to Do This "by His Grace"

That we believe and live a holy life is all of God's grace, that means, not of debt, not of works. God owes us nothing; we have deserved nothing except punishment, for we daily sin much. Behold the wonderful grace of God toward us! By His free grace He gives us His Holy Spirit, who by the Word works faith and holiness in us. Every Christian is a wonder of God's grace. Therefore we boldly go before Him and ask: "Thy kingdom come," knowing that He is gracious and will give His Holy Spirit. Only ask; graciously He will give. Read Luke 11: 13.

We Ask This for "Here in Time"

His kingdom should come not only for one or two days, or perhaps for one year, but always. If He will not give His Word and Spirit every day "here in time," then His kingdom will not come, then people will stay in darkness and not come to faith, and if they have come to faith, they will not stay with Jesus. Every day we need His Word and Spirit if His kingdom should come also among the deaf. Therefore He teaches us to pray every day for His Kingdom of Grace, saying: "Thy kingdom come." Friend, daily pray this petition.

We Ask This Also for "Hereafter in Eternity"

We need His Word and Spirit so that at last we enter the Kingdom of Glory and then "live under Him in His kingdom and serve Him in everlasting righteousness, innocence, and blessedness." For this Kingdom of Glory we wait and hope and pray. We pray for that day "when the Son of Man shall come in His glory, and all the holy angels with Him," Matt. 25:31; for that day when "the Lord Himself shall descend from heaven with a shout, with the voice of the archangel, and with the trump of God; and the dead in Christ shall rise first, and we which are alive and remain shall be caught up together with them in the clouds to meet the Lord in the air; and so shall we ever be with the Lord," 1 Thess. 4:16. Daily let us pray for this Kingdom of Glory and say: "Thy kingdom come." "Even so, come, Lord Jesus." J. L. S. Rev. 22:20.

THE BREAD OF LIFE

Bible Study for December Acts 5:17-21

Then the high priest rose up, and all they that were with him (which is the sect of the Sadducees) and were filled with indignation, and laid their hands on the Apostles and put them in the common prison. But the angel of the Lord by night opened the prison doors and brought them forth and said, Go, stand and speak in the Temple to the people all the words of this life. And when they heard that, they entered into the Temple early in the morning and taught. But the high priest came and they that were with him and all the senate of the children of Israel and sent to the prison to have them brought.

At the close of our last Bible Lesson we found the Apostles preaching the Gospel in the Temple, and believers joined with the Lord, and the sick were healed. However, every time the Gospel is preached, Satan tries to hinder its progress. How often does Satan put into the heart of the enemies thoughts to interfere with Gospel-preaching! In our lesson this month we find that the high priest, Annas, as well as Caiaphas, feared that he would lose his power and tyranny and wealth if the doctrine of Jesus would gain ground among the people. They laid their hand on the Apostles, arrested them, and put them in the "common prison," which was the place for the worst lawbreakers.

But the Apostles were not afraid. They believed the words of the Lord: "I will never forsake thee." They were to see the fulfillment of the Psalmist's words: "He shall give His angels charge over thee, to keep thee in all thy ways." (Ps. 91:11.) And behold! into that dark prison cell during the night comes the shining figure of an angel. This angel led them out through the opened doors, then closed the bars again and said to the Apostles: "Go, stand and speak in the Temple all the words of this life." They are again not to work for the Lord in secrecy, but publicly. Most important of all — the Lord's message is not changed. Speak the words of life — that is their task! Let us speak the Word of Life now and about the miracle (the escape) later.

In the early morning, before the high priest "and all they that were with him" were fully awake, the Apostles were again busy in the Temple, preaching. About the "words of this life" which they spoke Peter at one time said to Jesus (John 6:68), "Lord, Thou hast the words of eternal life." Now these Apostles had the opportunity to preach it to other people. Now they could tell the people more and more about the eternal life which Jesus has purchased and won for us with His holy, innocent blood and His death on the Cross. That message can save people. Peter and John knew that it is the most important message in the world.

Since the Gospel-messages in all our church services are the "words of life" (Luke 10:16), let us take the courage and faith never to let ANY worldly things keep us away from worship. Or if it ever should happen that there is "opposition," dear reader, to your attendance at God's House, may this Bible Lesson about Peter and John encourage you to faithfulness.
