Our Work in St. Louis

In November the writer held a meeting with Holy Cross Congregation in St. Louis for the purpose of calling a pastor. The St. Louis field has been divided, and Pastor N. P. Uhlig has moved to Jacksonville, Ill., to work chiefly in Central Illinois. May the Lord be with him and continue to bless his work. Jointly with the Board of Missions the St. Louis congregation is extending a call to Pastor E. Eichmann of Trinity Church, Portland, Oreg. For about nineteen years Pastor Eichman ministered to the deaf in the Portland field and therefore has had considerable experience and thus is well equipped to take over the St. Louis field. And not only that, but he is well fitted also to take over the work at our St. Louis Seminary, preparing young men for the biessed, soul-saving work among the deaf. May our great need for workers among the deaf urge him to accept the call unto the glory of our Savior's name among the deaf. During the vacancy Mr. F. Gyle is vacancy vicar, while the writer is vacancy pastor.

While in St. Louis we visited the sign classes, and we were very favorably impressed. There are two classes: an advanced class of nine, including Mr. F. Gyle, who is leading the classes for the time being, and then a beginners' class of eleven. These classes put in two hours every week in class work. Then they also do field work. Every Saturday two members of the advanced class go to the City Sanitarium to minister to deaf and deaf-blind patients. We accompanied them on Saturday, and it filled our heart with joy to see these two young men so eagerly trying to bring the Gospel to these deaf and deaf-blind. These two also go out regularly taking care of several preaching stations during the vacancy. They also intend to do some canvassing in St. Louis. A large number of other students work with hearing patients.

On Sunday morning we visited the Sunday school for orally taught children of the Gallaudet school. Two members of the beginners' class are teaching them. We admired their patience. In the afternoon we went with another student who was to preach to our colored group, the writer taking care of the order of service. This young man had put in only $9\frac{1}{2}$ hours in class work and then studied some privately, and we surely were pleased with his signing.

These classes also twice have visited the Gallaudet school. Principal Grace lectured to them on the History of the Education of the Deaf. They have a standing invitation to visit classes. And Principal Lane of the Central Institute of the Deaf also has invited the classes to visit the school. Thus these young men have an excellent opportunity to get acquainted with the work. We thank the Lord for creating such a lively interest in their hearts for the Lord's work among the deaf. May our Lord Jesus bless them in all their efforts and make them willing to serve in this blessed work also upon graduation, either as full-time or part-time workers. J. L. S.

THE THIRD PETITION OF THE LORD'S PRAYER "Thy Will Be Done on Earth as It Is in Heaven"

We Pray These Words to Our Heavenly Father

Our heavenly Father's will, or wish, should be done. And it is a good and kind wish. A father wants only good things for his children; so, above all, our heavenly Father wishes only the best things for His children. Though children have not earned or deserved anything from their parents, nevertheless a father is kind and gracious to them and does not expect any pay from them for his goodness and kindness. So, although we daily sin much and indeed deserve nothing but punishment, our heavenly Father is good and kind and merci-Boldly and without fear we therefore ful. pray: "Thy will be done," knowing that it is a good and gracious will.

The Father's Will Is Our Everlasting Salvation

Paul writes 1 Timothy 2:4: God "will (wishes) have all men to be saved and to come unto the knowledge of the truth." And Peter tells us: God is "not willing that any should perish, but that all should come to repentance," 2 Peter 3:9. God wants the salvation of all, also your and my salvation.
