Studies in Luther's Catechism

THE SACRAMENTS

We have learned to know our sins from the Ten Commandments, which we have not kept. Then we learned the wonderful story of Jesus and His love. And during the last months we studied the Lord's Prayer and learned how to pray in everything. But so easily doubts arise in our hearts, and we ask: "Did Jesus really pay for my many sins? Have I really peace with God through this Jesus? Will He hear my prayers?" In order to make strong our faith in Him and His promises, He comes to us with His Sacraments.

What IS a Sacrament?

The word *Sacrament* we find not in our Bible, just as the word *Trinity* is not found in the Book. But these and other words the Church uses for doctrines taught in the Book of Books. A Sacrament is a holy work and has to do with most holy things of God. It therefore is not invented by man, but given of God and must be commanded by Him. The Church cannot make new sacraments, such as confirmation, marriage, etc., which are not means of grace.

A Sacrament must have not only God's command, but also an outward sign or signs, as water in Holy Baptism and bread and wine in the Holy Supper. And with them must be connected a precious promise of God. "In a Sacrament there are two things, a sign and the word, the promise of grace." Therefore confirmation, marriage, etc., are no sacraments, as some say. For in these there are no outward signs and no promise of forgiveness. Nowhere in our Bible do we read: "If you are married or if you are confirmed, then you have forgiveness." A Sacrament therefore is a holy act in which we find God's command, certain outward signs, and God's promise of grace and forgiveness.

How Many Sacraments Are There?

Our Catechism tells us of two: the Sacrament of Holy Baptism and the Sacrament of the Altar. They are commanded of our Lord Jesus. Of Baptism He says: "Baptize all nations," and of the Lord's Supper: "This do in remembrance of Me." In both we have outward signs: water in Holy Baptism and bread and wine in the Holy Supper. And in both we have God's promise of forgiveness. In Baptism He says: "Be baptized, and wash away thy sins," and in the Lord's Supper: "Take, eat and drink, this is My body and blood, given and shed for you for the remission of sins." Our Bible, and therefore also our Catechism, know of only two such Sacraments — Holy Baptism and the Lord's Supper.

Thank God for These Two Sacraments

Holy Baptism and the Lord's Supper are seals of God's forgiveness and make us sure of our salvation in Christ Jesus. Let us thank God for them. J. L. S.

In Memoriam

Sorrowfully we note the death of one of the outstanding charter members of Emmanuel Congregation for the deaf at Milwaukee - Mr. Paul Krueger, who fell asleep in Jesus the early morning of July 31, after a most serious operation, at the age of 72 years. He was the first president of the congregation, founded 49 years ago, a position he held many years. He is mourned by his faithful wife, one son and two daughters, as well as the deaf community throughout Wisconsin and beyond. The congregation loses a very active and faithful member of Christ's Church Militant, who always stood up for Jesus with a view of leading other deaf to know their Savior.
