The Rev. Ernest C. Mappes

A Sketch of His Life and Work

The Apostle St. Paul wrote to the Christian church at Corinth: "Now there are diversities of gifts, but the same Spirit" (1 Cor. 12: 4). While the Savior bestows His Spirit upon all true ministers of the Gospel, yet it is well for church members to bear in mind that He does not supply all with the same aptitudes.

The Rev. E. Mappes has received the gift of making the study of the chief doctrines of our blessed religion clear and interesting to the young. He has achieved outstanding success with Lutheran scholars at State schools for the deaf, having confirmed 304 pupils in the past $26\frac{1}{2}$ years. Among this group was a record class of 35 catechumens in 1947. Pastor E. Mappes was born Feb. 21, 1898, in St. Clair County, Ill., near East St. Louis. In 1908 his parents moved to Norman, Okla. Following his graduation from St. John's College, Winfield, Kans., and Concordia Seminary, St. Louis, Mo., in 1921, he was ordained by the Rev. A. H. Kuntz in Milwaukee, Wis., on July 10, 1921, and began his work the same



year at Omaha, Nebr. Arriving in Nebraska, he served for a brief period also Kansas City, Mo., Topeka, Kans., and the Kansas School for the Deaf at Olathe, Kans., as well as stations in South Dakota during the years 1928—1938. In the States of Nebraska and Iowa he opened several new stations and in the past 26½ years organized the following deaf congregations: Bethlehem Congregation in Omaha in April, 1924; Peace Lutheran Congregation, Sioux City, Iowa, in 1945; Faith Lutheran Congregation, Fort Dodge, Iowa, Calvary Lutheran Congregation, Des Moines, Iowa, and Grace Lutheran Congregation, Lincoln, Nebr., in 1947.

After the purchase of three lots in Omaha in 1931 a church building and parsonage were constructed and dedicated to the service of the Lord on Feb. 20, 1938.

Pastor E. Mappes learned the sign language while attending the Seminary in St. Louis from the sainted Rev. C. Schubkegel and his members and was led into this work by his association with the deaf there and the Rev. J. L. Salvner.

Since 1944 Pastor Mappes has been chairman of our Lutheran Ephphatha Conference of Ministers to the Deaf, and since 1939 he has been co-editor of our official periodical, THE DEAF LUTHERAN.

Mrs. E. Mappes, a Christian deaf lady, is likewise genuinely interested in the spiritual welfare of the deaf; she assists her husband very ably in his important work. May God give our mission to the deaf many such faithful and sincere workers! O. C. S.

THE SACRAMENT OF HOLY BAPTISM

Whom Should We Baptize?

Whom should we baptize? Old and young. Should we baptize also little children? Many people will answer: "No, babies must not be baptized." Let us learn what our Lord Jesus says about this.

Jesus says: "Baptize All Nations"

Jesus wants all nations to be baptized. Now, who belongs to a nation? How old must a child be before it can join a nation? You will answer: "I joined the American nation when I was born." That is correct. Children are members of that nation in which they were born. Therefore we surely obey Christ's command when we baptize not only the old, but also the young, yes, also infants. Salvation is also for babies, and we should bring it to them. This we do in Holy Baptism. Come, let us do this because our Lord Jesus commands: "Baptize all nations."

The Apostles Baptized Families

Someone perhaps will say: "But the Apostles did not baptize babies." How does he know? There is not one word in our Bible which tells us that the disciples would not baptize children. But we do read that they baptized whole families. In Acts 16:15 we read that Lydia of Thyatira was baptized, and her household. Acts 16:33 tells us that the prison keeper of Philippi was baptized, and all his. Never do we read that the Apostles did not baptize children.

Also Children Need Holy Baptism

People often tell us: "Children are innocent and holy, and therefore need not Baptism." The Bible does not say that. In Psalm 51:5 David says: "Behold, I was shapen in iniquity, and in sin did my mother conceive me." And our Lord Jesus says to Nicodemus: "That which is born of the flesh is flesh," John 3:6, that means, they that are born of sinful parents likewise are sinful. And because of sin also children are under God's wrath as Paul says Eph. 2:3: "We were by nature (birth) children of wrath." Therefore also children need forgiveness.

John Ludvig Lauby was born March 10, 1877, at Duluth, Minn., where he was baptized. He attended school at the Minnesota School for the Deaf at Faribault, Minn. On April 27, 1913, he was confirmed in Minneapolis by Pastor J. L. Salvner.

His body was laid to rest in Chrystal Lake Cemetery, Minneapolis, on April 17. A large group of people attended the funeral service. Pastor Salvner chose John 10:27-28 as the text for the funeral sermon. This had been Mr. Lauby's memory verse at his confirmation. This text was well chosen. Mr. Lauby was one of Jesus' sheep who loved to hear his Shepherd's voice. Although he was blind and had to depend upon friends to take him to church and sign the service for him, he seldom missed church services. He loved the Word of God and placed his hope for salvation in his Savior. He was also given to much prayer for his Church, for the deaf, for his pastor, and gladly he contributed for the Lord's work.

May the Holy Spirit comfort the survivors, his brother, Oscar, and his nieces and nephews, and all his friends, with the glorious hope that Jesus has given to him eternal life! And may the Lord teach us all to be prepared always for death by faith in Jesus, that we may enter into eternal glory.
