#### New York Gets Third Telecast

On Nov. 20, 1949, Lutheran work among the Deaf floated on the air waves for the third time in one year. This puts New York one jump ahead of Kentucky, where Pastor Kosche has had two telecasts this year. Lutheran Friends of the Deaf, Inc., a company to start the new Lutheran School for the Deaf on the Atlantic Coast, and the American Lutheran Publicity Bureau were given one full hour on Station WPIX again.

#### Need for School Shown

According to the radio script, the program showed how one school in Detroit is not enough. There are many Protestant boys and girls whose fathers and mothers want a *daily* program of *Christian training*, in addition to Readin', Ritin', and Rithmetic. So a group of Lutherans started to work for such a school near New York. They called on Mr. John A. Klein, director, Ev. Lutheran Institute for the Deaf, Detroit, for advice and help. He and Pastor Possehl, Executive Secretary of the Lutheran Friends of the Deaf, made trips between New York and Detroit to get things started.

#### **Property Described**

Pictures of the large estate in Mill Neck, Long Island, were shown next. This 86-acre estate, worth \$2,000,000, was bought for \$200,000 by the Lutheran Friends of the



Deaf, Inc. The main building is stone and fireproof. It has large rooms, which can be easily changed into schoolrooms. The living room will be turned into a chapel. The superintendent will also have a private home on the campus. A large servants' house and garage will be made into the vocational building, where regular trades will be taught to the pupils. #### \$500,000 More Needed Now

Pastor Kraus and his five Oral Sunday School pupils showed how the Deaf child is taught the Bible. He used the lessons of the "Creation Story" which he and Mrs. Kraus wrote and drew. (They are good, too; we have tried them out. — ED.) Then he asked Protestant people to remember the New York Lutheran School with their prayers and also with their gifts. (See story on page 3.)

St. Matthew's Deaf Choir signed hymns on the program.

#### THE LETTER OF JUDE

(A modern translation by the Rev. George Kraus, St. Matthew's Lutheran Church for the Deaf, Jackson Heights, N. Y., to help the Bible reader understand the meaning of the King James Version [1611 A. D.] language.)

Verses 1-2: Jude a slave of Jesus Christ and a brother of James — to the people whom God the Father loves, and to the people He has called and kept in Christ Jesus. Let Him multiply grace, peace, and love to you.

Verses 3-4: DEAR FRIENDS:

With all zeal I began to write to you about our salvation, which belongs to us all. But then I understood that I must write to you and urge you: — fight for the faith which God once and for all gave the saints. Because some people have entered secretly. (A long time ago God wrote their names for this verdict.) They are people without fear of God. They change the grace of our God to sinful living. And they deny our Lord and Master — Jesus Christ.

Verses 5-7: I want to remind you of something you already know: First, that the Lord saved His people from the land of Egypt. But afterwards He destroyed those people who did not believe. Secondly, that the angels who did not keep their first rule (but left their true home), He keeps [them] in eternal chains in darkness until the judgment of the Great Day. Likewise [also], Sodom and Gomorrah and the cities near them stand before us as a warning example: they gave themselves up to sexual sins and unnatural vice [crime] and suffer the punishment of eternal fire.

Verses 8-10: In the same way these dreamers make the body filthy with sin. They don't care about His rule. They speak shamefully against His glory. But Michael, the archangel (when he argued and debated with the devil about the body of Moses), did not dare to call [name] the devil a blasphemer. But Michael

only said, "The Lord judge you." But these men speak evil things they cannot understand. Physical [bodily] things are all they understand. (Animals without reason know such things also.) In these physical things they destroy themselves.

Verses 11-13: Woe [awful trouble] to them! Because they go in the way of Cain. They give themselves to the error [mistake, wrong idea] of Balaam for wages. And they die in a rebellion like Korah's. These are filthspots feasting in your Christian feasts. Without fear they feed themselves. They are clouds without water. The wind carries them around. They are autumn trees without fruit. They are twice dead. They are pulled up by the roots. They are wild waves of the sea, and they cast up their shameful sins as foam. They are wandering stars. God keeps the blackness of darkness for them eternally.

Verses 14-16: Enoch (the seventh from Adam) prophesied about them. He said: "Look, the Lord comes with His holy thousands. He will judge all. And He will convict [judge guilty] all people who do not fear God because of all their works against God (they did these with hate against God). And He will judge all the hard things these godless sinners spoke against Him." They are never satisfied, but complain. They follow their sinful wishes. Their mouths speak boasting words. They flatter people for profit.

Verses 17-19: But you — dear friends — remember the words of the Apostles of our Lord Jesus Christ. They spoke these words before. Remember what they told you: "At the end of time, mockers will come. They will follow their own sinful wishes because they have no fear of God." They are the ones who make divisions. They are worldly people. They are without the Spirit.

Verses 20-23: But — dear friends — build yourselves by your most holy faith. Pray in the Holy Spirit. Keep yourselves in the love of God. Wait with hope for the mercy of our Lord Jesus Christ, for eternal life. And correct some people — those who argue; and save them — snatching them from the fire. Pity some with fear. And hate even the clothes filthy with sin.

Verses 24-25: Now to the One who can keep you from stumbling and make you stand before His glory without blame, in joy; to the only God, our Savior, through Jesus Christ our Lord, glory, honor, power, and rule — before time began, now, and to all eternity. Amen.

#### The New Lutheran School for the Deaf

The picture on page 1 is the new Lutheran School for the Deaf at Mill Neck, Long Island. Mill Neck is just a few minutes' drive from New York City. This fine, stone, fireproof building will be dedicated next September as the first Lutheran School for Deaf children in the East. The 86 acres surrounding the school will afford ample grounds where the children can play without the dangers of a big city.

The Lutheran Friends of the Deaf, Inc., will help them find employment and in many cases will establish shops which eventually the Deaf will own themselves. The organization will also assist the Deaf in establishing churches exclusively for the Deaf.

This splendid program is worthy of your generous support. The new school was purchased at the price of \$216,000. This amount will be raised by securing members for the Lutheran Friends of the Deaf, Inc. The more members we get, the more service we can offer to the Deaf people. Each person who becomes a member will receive a membership certificate showing that he has helped to establish this school. We need your help; so won't you fill in the blank today? By Feb. 1 we will need \$60,000 to meet a payment on the building. We are asking our Deaf people throughout the country to show their loyal support by raising \$15,000 this month. This is a lot of money, but we can do it. Remember to pray for the success of this new venture, and also ask God to open your heart so that you will be willing to give generously. F. F. P.
