Looking back over a period of twenty-five years, we may say that it was a blessed experience. Perhaps we have gained more than we have given. The writer hereby wishes to acknowledge the friendly spirit of our missionaries, their kind co-operation and helpful suggestions. We tried to do our best. It is our sincere prayer that the new editors will have the same experiences. We know that the DEAF LUTHERAN will continue to bring to its readers the unadulterated Word of God and Luther's doctrine pure, upon which our salvation and eternal happiness are based. Lutheran Deaf Man Honored

Leo Kuehn Is Industrial Leader

Recognition comes to the president of Our Savior Lutheran Church of the Deaf in Detroit,

Mr. Leo Kuehn. Several weeks ago Mr. Kuehn received the award of merit of the President's Committee on Employ-the-Handicapped Week from Governor Williams at a ceremony in the Michigan Unemployment Compensation Commission office. Mr. Kuehn is a graduate of Lutheran Institute for the Deaf, Detroit. In 1933 Mr. Kuehn, who is totally deaf, launched his own machine shop with \$300, some borrowed machinery, and seven employees, all of whom were handicapped. Today his plant is worth over a hundred thousand dollars. Mr. Kuehn's daughter, a graduate of Valparaiso University, is now training to teach the Deaf. His son is attending Concordia College, Fort Wavne, Ind. Both Mr. and Mrs. Kuehn are very active in our Detroit congregation. We feel sure that the Lutheran Deaf all over the U.S.A. rejoice with Mr. Kuehn and wish him the Lord's continued blessings. N. E. B.

Lutheran Deaf Give Pastor Car Help Detroit Shows Good Spirit

A pleasant surprise was in store for the pastor of the Detroit congregation of the Deaf last August, when the congregation decided to help him buy a much-needed car. The help amounted to seven hundred dollars. Of this amount the Ladies' Aid donated two hundred dollars and the congregation five hundred. But it was decided to ask all the Lutheran Deaf in the Detroit field to help in this project by a special envelope collection. It was made very plain in a letter to all the members that none of the budget moneys should be used for this purpose and that they should not let this interfere with their regular donations. Over half of the entire amount has been gathered already.

The members felt that, since their pastor uses his car more than half the time for church work, serving the congregation and mission stations, they should also help pay for the car. This feeling won, especially since the pastor had purchased three cars during his ministry and had received no outside help.

The pastor gratefully accepted the offer, and the new car was delivered on September 2.

Indianapolis, Ind. — The mission festival on October 29 was a successful event. Vicar Luther Russert preached an inspiring sermon in which he impressed upon us the great blessings which we Christians have. No matter what happens, we have a sure and a near Friend in Jesus. We are never really lonely with Him at our side.

At your last congregational meeting in Indianapolis a plan was drawn up whereby all Deaf who are interested in doing mission work among the unchurched Deaf in Indianapolis can help. We have written the names of all the Deaf we know, who do not attend church, on separate slips of paper. Now anyone who wants to work for Jesus and go to visit someone who does not know about the Friend of sinners can get one or more of these slips from the pastor. As far as possible, the names on the slips will be of people who live near the person who goes to visit. The purpose of the visit of course will be to talk to the unchurched person about his soul, to tell him about Jesus, the Savior from sin.

Everyone who helps in doing this visiting will be called a "mission worker." Every so often these mission workers will meet with the pastor and discuss the results of their visits. At these meetings the pastor will teach the worker how to talk to the different kinds of people they visit, how to answer their questions, etc.

Great blessings will surely come to our church if our members will pray for this and then with God's help join zealously in this plan.

But if you know Jesus and His Gospel, the good news of salvation by faith in His blood, then the new year will have only good things in store for you, for God says: "All things work together for good to them that love God," Rom. 8:28; and it will be a year of joy and peace and hope.

May these Bible Readings in the Word of God help make it such a blessed year to you!

SUNDAY, JANUARY 7 — Read Luke 1:56-63 The Newborn Savior Brings a Happy New Year

Mary and Elisabeth rejoiced in the Savior to be born of Mary. Mary stayed with Elisabeth for three months and then returned to her home with a heart filled with singing and thanksgiving. So also our homes should be full of joy and thanksgiving because a Savior is born for us. That should make our hearts rejoice all through the year.

Now Elisabeth's full time was come, and she gave birth to a son as God had promised. And her neighbors and cousins heard how the Lord had shown great mercy unto her, and they came and rejoiced with her. Wonderful mercy indeed that God gave her and Zacharias a son in their old age! SUNDAY, JANUARY 14 — Read Luke 1:64-66 The Lord's Hand Be with You in 1951

Zacharias could not speak for a long time, about nine months, because he did not believe the angel's message that his wife Elisabeth would have a son. According to the angel's words Zacharias would not speak until the child would be born. And now the day had come, and he began to speak; his mouth was opened, and his tongue was loosed. And the first words that he spoke were words of praise unto God. God had heard their prayers and given them a son. For this he praised the Lord, but chiefly because his son was to prepare the way for the coming Savior. So the first thing we should do every day of the new year is to praise God for this salvation and for the many good things we receive every day in and through this Jesus. SUNDAY, JANUARY 28 — Read Luke 1:76-80 Our Great Blessings in the Promised Savior

In his song Zacharias then spoke wonderful things of his son, John. He was to be the prophet of the Highest and to speak the Word of God. By doing that he should prepare the way for the coming Savior and give the knowledge of salvation to His people by the remission (forgiveness) of their sins. And all this through the tender mercies of our God. Indeed, "the Lord is merciful and gracious, slow to anger, and plenteous in mercy" (Ps. 103:8). Wonderful things John was to bring to God's people. And by that the Dayspring (dawn) from on high visited the people. It was the beginning of a new and glorious day when that Savior came with this Gospel of grace. He is the Light of the world and should give light to them that sit in the darkness of sin and in the shadow of death, always in danger of death. Then they need no more fear sin and death. And as John did, so let us go out and speak to all people about sin and God's great love in Christ.

SUNDAY, FEBRUARY 4 — Read Luke 2:1-7 Jesus Rules All the Earth for His Church

Kings, emperors, presidents, and other rulers reign over their lands and countries. But the Lord God is over them all. In the Psalms David so often sings: "The Lord reigneth." Wise King Solomon says: "The king's heart is in the hand of the Lord, as the rivers of water; He turneth it whithersoever He will." This we learn also from our lesson today.

The Roman emperor Caesar Augustus sent out a decree (law) that all the world should be taxed, that is, have their names enrolled in their home city. And all went. And this was the first taxing (enrollment), ordered when Cyrenius was governor of Syria. This was of God. And why did God want that to be done? Because Jesus was to be born in Bethlehem as God had foretold by His Prophet. Joseph, a man of Galilee, of the city of Nazareth, went to be enrolled in the city of David, called Bethlehem, because he was of the house and lineage (family) of David. And with him was Mary, his espoused (promised) wife. And she was great with child, was to be a mother. And while they were in Bethlehem, it was time for the Babe to be born. And she brought forth her first-born Son, wrapped Him in swaddling (baby) clothes, and laid Him in a manger. Born in a barn, why? Because there was no room in the inn (hotel). Thus because this Babe, our Savior, was to be born in Bethlehem, and not in Nazareth, therefore the Roman Emperor had to send out a decree that caused Joseph and Mary to go to Bethlehem and the Child Jesus to be born in that city. "The Lord reigneth."

Surely, this is sweet comfort for us in this troubled world, a world of war and rumors of war, a world of great suffering and sorrow, of pain and death. God rules all the world for the good of His Church. We need not worry. He will lead all things for His Church so that His name be hallowed, and His kingdom come, and His will (wish) be done.

PRAYER: Thanks, dear Savior, for ruling this world for our good and the good of Thy Church and the glory of Thy name. Thou wilt do all things well. Amen.

Women of the Bible

Mary — the Mother of Jesus. — Luke 1:26-38 Luke 1:42: "Blessed are you among women"

Mary, the Mother of Jesus, is honored where the name of Jesus is believed. She waited for the promised Savior, never dreaming she would be His mother. The angel came to Mary, saying: "God gives you special grace. You are blessed among women, because your Son will be the Son of God."

Mary was puzzled, because she was unmarried. The angel told her that the Holy Ghost would come on her. Her Son would be God's Son. Seven hundred years before Isaiah the Prophet wrote: "Behold a virgin shall conceive and bear a Son and shall call His name Immanuel (God with us)."

God told Joseph to marry Mary so that no shame would stain the name of His Son. Mary gave birth to Jesus and laid Him in a manger. So God kept His promise to Adam and Eve.

We will never know what Mary thought when she saw her Son nailed to the Cross. Perhaps she remembered the words of the shepherds and the Wise Men. Perhaps she remembered the Boy Jesus in the Temple who must be doing His Father's business. Perhaps she remembered Him changing water into wine, or His sermons. Now the sword was cutting through her soul. Jesus, God's Son and her own Son, was dying.

Mary's father came from the family of King David. Mary was born in sin like all other people. Jesus never told us to pray to His mother; instead, He says: "When you pray, say: 'Our *Father* who art in heaven.'" Mary needed faith for forgiveness of sins. Acts 1:14 says: "They all continued together in prayer ... with Mary, the mother of Jesus." Jesus shall rule forever. He needs no help from Mary.

PRAYER: O Holy Spirit, help me believe Thy holy Word and live a good life, because of all that Jesus Christ did for me. Amen. C. R. G.

Studies in Luther's Catechism

Sixth Chief Part --- The Lord's Supper

Responsive Reading for Pastor and People Before Celebration of the Lord's Supper, or the Holy Communion Rev. F. L. Neebe, Ph. D.

Pastor: Today we meet to come to the Lord's Table.

People: Here we receive with the bread and the cup the true body and true blood of our dear Lord and Savior Jesus Christ.

Pastor: As we prepare to attend an earthly feast, we should also prepare our hearts for a happy and helpful coming to the Lord's Supper.

People: St. Paul, by inspiration [in-breathing] of God the Holy Ghost, tells us: "Let a man examine himself, and so let him eat of that bread and drink of that cup. For he that eateth and drinketh unworthily, eateth and drinketh judgment unto himself, not discerning [believing] the Lord's body."

Pastor: "Blessed [happy] is he whose trangression [law-breaking] is forgiven, whose sin is covered."

People: "I acknowledge [make known] my sin unto Thee, O God, and mine iniquity [guilt] have I not hid."

Pastor: "I said: I will confess my transgressions unto the Lord; and Thou, O Lord, forgavest the iniquity of my sin."

People: "Blessed is the man unto whom the Lord imputeth [blames] not iniquity."

Pastor: We have sinned against Thee, O most holy God.

People: Thy people, Lord, have not been perfect. Pardon us.

Pastor: "Create in me a clean heart, O God, and renew a right spirit within me."

People: "Cast [throw] me not away from Thy presence [nearness], and take not Thy Holy Spirit from me. Restore unto me the joy of Thy salvation; and uphold me with Thy free [good wish] Spirit."

Pastor and People: O Christ, Thou Lamb of God, that takest away the sin of the world, have mercy upon us, and grant us Thy peace.

Pastor: We are all the children of God by faith in Christ Jesus (Gal. 3:26).

People: We have been baptized into Christ and have put on Christ (Gal. 3:27).

Pastor: But we daily sin much and indeed deserve [earn] nothing but Thy wrath [anger] and punishment.

People: But Thou in Thy abundant [much] mercy and for the sake [because] of the sufferings and death of Jesus Christ wilt [will] have mercy upon us and keep us as Thy children.

Pastor: Lord Jesus, Thy sacred [holy] body was given into death for our sins. Thou didst shed Thy blood in our place and in our behalf [stead].

People: "The cup of blessing which we bless, is it not the communion of the blood of Christ? The bread which we break, is it not the communion of the body of Christ?" (1 Cor. 10:16.)

Pastor: Today we would receive the blood of the New Testament.

People: We would receive the seal [guarantee] of the forgiveness of our sins.

Pastor: We would receive that which made our salvation possible.

People: We would humbly receive that body which hung upon the tree in our stead. We would humbly receive that blood which was shed for us.

Pastor: We would boldly [with trust] confess [announce] Thy name among human beings [people].

People: We would show forth the Lord's death till He comes to judge the quick and the dead (1 Cor. 11:26).

Pastor: We would walk in the way of Thy Commandments.

People: "Thy Word is a Lamp unto my feet and a Light unto my path" (Ps. 119:105).

Pastor: "Look upon me, and be merciful unto me, as Thou [in the past] usest to do unto those who love Thy name."

People: "Order [lead] my steps in Thy Word; and let not iniquity [sin] have dominion [power] over me."

Pastor: "Make Thy face to shine upon Thy servant." People: "And teach me Thy statutes" (Ps. 119:135).

Pastor: Glory be to the Father, and to the Son, and to the Holy Ghost.

People: Praise to the Triune God.

Pastor: Praise to the Father

People: For His great and undeserved [unearned] love to us poor [sorrowful] sinners.

Pastor: Praise to the Son

People: For His suffering and death in our stead.

Pastor: Praise to the Holy Spirit

People: For bringing us to the knowledge of our sins and to faith in Jesus as our only Savior from sin.

Pastor: Give praise to the Father and to the Son and to the Holy Ghost.

People: To the Father, who hath loved me with an everlasting love; to the Son, who in time hath died in my stead and hath risen; to the Holy Spirit, who through the Gospel hath brought me to Christ and will keep me with Him — to the Triune God be honor and glory now and forever. Amen.

Pastor: To the Triune God alone give glory.

People: Amen.

The Memorial Home project is gleaming in a new coat of paint, which is the work of Mac-Allister, Springer, and Lanier. A new heating system has been installed at the church, which was a matter delayed by lack of funds when we took over the property. Mr. Gage Hinman, a carpenter of unusual abilities, attends to repairs with punctuality; and the fine piece of property on this prominent corner, across from a city park and the hub of transportation, is a credit to the Deaf.
