He answers: "The world passeth away, and the lust (the things wicked people wish for) thereof; but he that doeth the will (wish) of God abideth forever." 1 John 2: 15, 17. Therefore blessed are you now and forever if you do the will (wish) of God! His will we learn from our holy Bible, from which our weekly Bible Readings are taken.

May God bless these Bible Readings in our hearts, so that we do not love the world and the things of this world, but love the Word of God and learn to do His will!

SUNDAY, JULY 15 - Read Luke 5:1-3

Love God's Word; Help Bring It to Others

Jesus was standing by the Lake of Gennesaret, also called the Sea of Galilee. And we see the people pressing (crowding) upon Him to hear the Word of God. That we see happen in Japan today. The people of that country now are crowding to services, Bible classes, and Sunday school to learn the Word of Jesus. Do the people in our country press and crowd to churches to hear the Word of God, as did the people in our lesson? Oh, no! In American churches we find empty seats. Many do not come to every service. They have all kinds of excuses. They love the world and the things of this world more than the Word of Jesus. People crowd to movies. We see them standing in line waiting to get in. They crowd to baseball games and other amusements. But we never see people standing in line in front of churches. Forget it not! Jesus and His Word are the one thing needful for every one of us. Only by the Word of Jesus the Holy Ghost will work in our hearts, bring us to, and keep us in, the true faith unto the end. Love to go to church and to learn His saving Word.

And we should gladly help in His work and do all we can for Him. He saw two ships (fishing boats) standing by the lake. The fishermen had gone out of them and were washing their nets. And He stepped into Simon's boat and asked him to take his boat out a little from the shore. Peter and the others then dropped their nets and took his boat off from the shore. Gladly he gave his boat to Jesus for His work. And Jesus sat down and taught the people from it. So let us do all we can to help in bringing the Word of Jesus to people. Let us give ourselves and all we have for this blessed work!

PRAYER: Dear Lord and Savior Jesus Christ, we thank Thee for Thy Word of forgiveness. Let us gladly hear and learn it and help Thee in bringing it to others. Amen.

SUNDAY, JULY 22 — Read Luke 5:4-11 Do Your Work for Jesus

After the disciples and the people had heard the Word of God, Jesus told His disciples to go and do their work. Hearing the Word of God is the first thing, more necessary than any work, or pleasure, or getting a dinner ready. Jesus and His Word always first!

He told His disciples to take their boats out into deep water to let down their nets. Deep water and the time of day were not good for fishing. Nighttime is a good time; but they had been working all night and had caught nothing. But because Jesus told them to do this, they went and did it. Peter said: "At Thy Word I will let down the net."

And a wonderful thing happened! They caught very many fish, and their net broke. And they called their partners in the other boat. These came, and they filled both boats with fish. So in our daily work, let us do it because Jesus wants us to do it. Let us also trust in His Word and blessing. Indeed, we have not deserved His blessings. Peter knew that. Therefore, when he saw the many fish, he was astonished (surprised), as also the other disciples, at the draught (catch) of fishes. And Peter fell down at Jesus' knees, saying: "Depart from me, for I am a sinful man." He humbled himself before the mighty Jesus, who had power also over the fish. So let us humble ourselves before God for His many blessings, and thank Him!

But Jesus told them not to fear, saying to Peter: "Fear not; from henceforth (now on) thou shalt catch men." They now should be fishers of men, catch people, for Him and His kingdom. They should go to people with the Gospel of God's grace (love) in Christ Jesus, and tell them of salvation by faith in Jesus and His blood. So He tells every one of us: "Thou shalt catch men." We should go out and win men and women for Him. That He tells us to do with these words: "Preach the Gospel to every creature." Come, let us do as did the disciples. When they had brought their boats to land, they forsook (left) all, and followed Jesus.

PRAYER: Mighty Savior Jesus, Thou canst save from sin, death, and hell, and hast finished salvation for all people. Help us to go out gladly with Thy Word and catch people for Thee and Thy kingdom. Amen.

SUNDAY, JULY 29 — Read Luke 5:12-15 Jesus Saves from Sin. Tell It to the World

A man full of leprosy (a terrible sickness) came to our Lord Jesus, fell down before Him, and said: "Lord, if Thou wilt (wish), Thou canst make me clean." And He put forth His hand and touched him, saying: "I will; be thou clean." And straightway (quickly) the leprosy departed (left) from him. A wonderful work! So we all have a terrible disease like leprosy. No doctor, no medicine could help lepers in the days of Christ. Our terrible sickness is sin. No doctor, no medicine, can take it away. As did this sick man in our lesson, so let us go to Him with our sin and say: "Lord, if Thou wilt, Thou canst make me clean." Indeed, Jesus is the mighty Son of God. He could cure leprosy, so He also can take away sin. For that He came into the world. He says: "The Son of Man is come to save that which was lost." Matthew 18:11. John writes: "The blood of Jesus Christ, His Son, cleanseth us from all sin." 1 John 1:7. Yes, go to Him, He can save from sin. But you need not pray, as did the leper: "If Thou wilt ... " Only when we pray for bodily blessings, as did the leper, we should pray thus. But for forgiveness and peace with God we need not pray these words, for He always is willing to grant us these heavenly blessings. Paul says: "God will have all men to be saved." 1 Timothy 2:4.

Jesus then told this man not to tell anyone about it, but to go and show himself to the priest and bring an offering as Moses commanded. Jesus did not want honor and glory in this world for His wonderful works. He only wanted to show that He is the One who should come. But the people could not keep silent. The fame (story) of His wonderful work spread more and more, and many people came to hear and to be healed. But Jesus does not tell us not to say anything about His love for sinners and His forgiveness. No, He says: "Preach the Gospel to every creature." We should tell all the world of His great salvation and help to make it known among all people. Will you help?

PRAYER: Lord Jesus, Thou Savior of the world, let me make known Thy good Word of salvation by faith in Thee to all the world, that many may be saved. Amen.

SUNDAY, AUGUST 5 — Read Luke 5:16-17 Pray, and Gladly Hear and Learn the Word of Jesus

Jesus went about teaching and healing the sick. Now Jesus withdrew Himself, He left the people and went into the wilderness, where no people lived. And what did He do there? We read: "And He prayed." Jesus was a Man of prayer. He was always praying. Again and again we see Him praying to His Father in heaven. A good example for us! He wants us to pray much also. Listen to Him, saying: "Ask, and it shall be given you; seek, and ye shall find; knock, and it shall be opened unto you." Matthew 7:7. He teaches us that "men ought always to pray, and not to faint (give up)." Luke 18:1. And by His servant Paul He says: "Pray without ceasing (stopping)." 1 Thessalonians 5:17. And to make us pray more diligently, He gives us many beautiful promises. John 14:13-14 He says: "Whatsoever ye shall ask in My name, that will I do, that the Father may be glorified in the Son. If ye shall ask anything in My name, I will do it." Come, let us pray in everything. Pray for all the Deaf, pray for our pastors and missionaries, pray that God may bless our work among the Deaf for the salvation of many. Pray, trusting in His promises!

Praying and teaching, that was the Savior's work. And it happened on one day, as He was teaching, that Pharisees and teachers of the Law were there from every town of Galilee and Judea and Jerusalem. These were His

enemies. They believed not in Him, but always were trying to find something of which they could accuse Him. Our lesson does not tell us why they came there, but surely they came not to learn the Word of God out of the mouth of Jesus. But He showed them plainly that He was the Son of God and the promised Savior, for "the power of the Lord was present to heal them." From His wonderful works they could learn that He was the One that should come. But they would not believe. So today all people may learn from God's Word that this Jesus is the Son of God and the Savior of the world. However, many will not believe, they do not want this crucified Lord. Oh, come, gladly hear and learn His Word! It is the power of God unto salvation to everyone that believes.

PRAYER: Lord, teach me to pray, and fill my heart with love for Thy Word, which can save our souls. Amen. J. L. S.

Studies in Luther's Catechism

Sixth Chief Part - The Lord's Supper

From the Bible we have learned that in the Lord's Supper we eat the body of Christ in and with the bread and drink His blood in and with the wine. Now for whom is this Holy Supper? Let us learn that from the Bible and our Catechism.

Examine Yourself Before the Lord's Supper

Our Catechism says that it is "for us Christians," that means, for believers. If anyone wants to come to the Holy Supper, the pastor must first know that he, or she, is a Christian. For this reason we have "close" Communion in our Church. We do not invite everyone to the Lord's Table, but only those who have confessed their faith in the Savior and who understand what the Lord's Supper is and what its blessings are. Many churches have "open" Communion, and invite all visitors to the Holy Supper. Now which way is right? Paul says: "Let a man examine himself, and so let him eat of that bread and drink of that cup." 1 Corinthians 11:28. Before coming to the Lord's Table one should examine himself. He should ask himself: Am I a sinner, and am I sorry for my sin? Do I trust only in the Lord

Jesus to be saved? Do I know what I receive in the Lord's Supper? Do I, with the help of God, intend to live a better life? If you can answer "Yes," then you are a Christian, and the Lord's Supper is for you. We cannot let those come who cannot examine themselves.

The Lord's Supper Is for Believers Only

Why is it so necessary that a man examine himself before going to the Lord's Table? Paul answers: "He that eateth and drinketh unworthily (without faith), eateth and drinketh damnation (punishment) to himself." 1 Corinthians 11:29. A pastor therefore cannot let a man go to Communion who knows not his sin, knows not why Jesus came into the world, and understands not what the Lord's Supper is. If he did, he would let such a man eat and drink damnation to himself. Therefore our Church first instructs people in the chief teachings of the Bible and asks them to confess their faith before inviting them to come to the Lord's Table. Furthermore, we ask people to register, to give their names to the pastor before coming to the Holy Supper. It surely is Christ's wish that we have "close," not "open," Communion.

Prepare Your Heart for the Holy Supper

In our Catechism we have "Christian Questions with Their Answers" for a good preparation. Before going to the Lord's Table read these questions prayerfully, humble yourself before God in your sin, ask Him to bless His Word in your heart, then give your name to the pastor, and ask him for his blessing. Then rich blessings shall be yours! J. L. S.

Supper Rally for Deaf Missions

A most enjoyable and successful supper rally highlighted the second day. A gathering of 175 people met in the church hall to enjoy the delicious turkey supper served by the Tabitha Society of First Lutheran Church. Proceeds of the supper helped pay the expenses of the conference. After the supper Pastor Gerhold introduced a number of people from Boston who have been of great help to him in his work. A rising ovation of appreciation was given Misses Martha and Lucy Bruhn, sisters, who have done great service in behalf of the Deaf.

The Boston Lutherans were also given an opportunity to become better acquainted with the visiting pastors and their work. Pastor Possehl spoke of the new Lutheran School for the Deaf which our Church plans to open this fall on Long Island, N. Y. Beautiful Kodachrome slides of the school were shown on the screen. The interest of the people of Boston was evident by the questions they asked about the school. Pastor Westermann spoke about his work in the Washington, D.C., area and at Gallaudet College. The Pennsylvania and Western New York field was described in colored slides by Pastor Rohe. Pastor Kraus concluded the program with an interesting discussion and demonstration on visual aids and their use in training Deaf children.

An Interesting Visitor

When Miss Martha Bruhn visited the conference, it was an event that all who were present shall remember. Miss Bruhn is a Lutheran Deaf lady who has given her life in behalf of the Deaf. She is one of the leaders in speech and lip reading in the world. One of her great works is a translation from the German of a book, Mueller-Walle Method of Lip Reading, which is today a standard textbook on lip reading for the adult Deaf and hard of hearing. Miss Bruhn is also an honorary member of the Board of Directors of the Volta Bureau. She was a personal friend of the late Dr. Alexander Graham Bell and of Miss Helen Keller. In 1903 she began her own school of lip reading in Boston. The school is still at work today.

Although totally deaf, Miss Bruhn's ability to read lips is wonderful. Those who first meet her rarely think her to be a deaf person. She has studied in Germany and France and can read lips and speak in three languages, English, French, and German. The members of conference spoke all three languages to her, and although we skipped from one to the other, she always replied in the language which we had spoken. Her visit and the discussion with her on the various methods of speech among the Deaf was of great benefit to all the pastors at conference. Miss Bruhn is a member of our First Lutheran Church of Boston.

Special thanks is due to Pastor Paul Brauer and the members and societies of First Lutheran Church for the use of their facilities for the conference sessions, and also for the beautiful little chapel which they have permitted the Deaf to use for their regular church services. Also Pastor Gerhold should be commended for his efforts in arranging the meetings. And the visiting pastors and their wives will long remember the wonderful Bostonian dishes prepared and served by Mrs. Gerhold.

Delilah — Money Made Her Betray Judges 16: 5: "We will give you . . . eleven hundred pieces of silver."

God gave Samson great strength to fight the enemies of Israel. For many years these enemies oppressed God's people. Samson had no army. He fought these enemies alone. The enemies did not trust God as Samson did. They prayed to false gods and carried charms. They thought Samson carried some charm, because he was so strong. They were afraid of him.
