# Great Lakes Region to Have All-Deaf Conference in 1952

Fort Wayne, Ind., October 16—17. — Seven Lutheran pastors to the Deaf met at St. Paul's School to lay plans for the first all-Deaf Lutheran conference of the Great Lakes area. Present at the meeting were Pastors Borchardt, Frederking, Mackensen, Rische, Scheibert, Schroeder, and Simon.

Two sessions were held, one in the afternoon of October 16, and the other in the morning of the 17th. Each opened with Scripture reading and prayer. On the evening of the 17th was the regular monthly church service for the

Do I,need to ask God to forgive my Christmases? Do I need to ask God to forgive the way I celebrate Christmas today? Is it just a day for me to look at gifts, eat a big dinner, visit with friends? If that is all I do on Christmas, I'd better ask God to forgive me.

No, Christmas is Christ—mas. That means Christ worship. Why is December 25 a holiday? Because it is Jesus' birthday! We are off work on Christmas; why? to have more time to think about what it means that Jesus was born; to have more time to thank God for sending His Son into the world.

What happened that first Christmas seemed very simple. A woman in a little town in Palestine had a Baby. It was a Boy. He was not even born in a house or a hospital; He had no crib or basket for a bed. His mother made a little bed for Him in a manger. All very simple.

But now, almost 2,000 years after, we still remember that Baby's birthday every year. All over the world people know about Him. The world's calendar is numbered from the year of His birth. Why? Because that Baby was, and is, God Himself; because on Christmas "God was manifested in the flesh"; because God came from heaven to earth to save us, so we could go from earth to heaven. Let us be glad and thankful to God because it happened!

### Bible Readings for December, 1951

For the Christmas season think of these precious words: "God so loved the world that He gave His only-begotten Son, that whosoever believeth in Him, should not perish, but have everlasting life," John 3:16. These words of our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ will give you true Christmas joy and peace.

For the new year think of these words of Jesus: "Lo, I am with you alway, even unto the end of the world," Matthew 28:20. These words will take away all fears and worries and fill your heart with joy and hope. And you can say: "I will fear no evil: for Thou art with me," Psalm 23:4.

May these Bible Readings give you joy and peace and hope through Christ Jesus!

### SUNDAY, DECEMBER 9 — Read Luke 7:29-30 Accept God's Way of Salvation

Many people and also publicans, called sinners by the Jews, had gathered around Jesus. He had told them of John the Baptist and his greatness and his work. They then said that God did a right and good thing in sending John to prepare the way for the coming King and Savior. So we have learned that God sent His Son, for whom John prepared the way, and laid upon Him the sin of the whole world. Then we know also that the Son of God laid down His life on the Cross for all and did the Father's wish. And we must say, God is good and right in doing this. And we who have been baptized into Christ have accepted His salvation by faith.

Our lesson tells us that the Pharisees and the lawyers did not want the plan of God toward them and were not baptized. The Pharisees were proud people and thought they were better than other people. They thought they would be saved by doing good. So they needed not John's Baptism nor the Lord Jesus, for whom John prepared the way. The teachers of the Law thought the same. They taught people that they could save themselves from sin and the devil by doing the commandments of men.

So today we see many proud people that think they are better than others, and need not our Savior Jesus Christ. They are not baptized and come not to church. Then there are men who teach this in church: "Do good; try your best, and you will go to heaven." So many people care not for Baptism and for Bible teaching. They shall be lost! Without Jesus there is no salvation. Therefore listen not to these people!

PRAYER: Dear Savior Jesus Christ, teach me to know my sin, so that I trust not in my doings, but only in Thee, the one and only Savior. Amen.

### SUNDAY, DECEMBER 16 — Read Luke 7:31-35 Jesus Is the True Wisdom for Sinners

Some people never are pleased. Preach about sin, and they do not like it. Preach about Jesus and His Cross, and they do not want that either. So it was during the days of Jesus. John the Baptist came not eating bread and not drinking wine, and they said: "He has a devil." Jesus came eating and drinking with publicans and sinners. They called Him "a gluttonous man," a man who eats and drinks too much, and "a winebibber," a man who drinks much wine and loves it, and "a friend of publicans and sinners." John could not please them, and Jesus likewise could not.

Jesus said: "What are these people like?" He said that they are like children in the streets playing. They call one another, and say: "Let us play wedding." Others answer: "We do not want to play that." And if they say: "Let us play funeral," the others again answer: "We do not want that." And the first children must say: "We have piped (played the flute) unto you, and you have not danced; we have mourned (cried and acted sad) unto you, and you have not wept." So today if we tell people: "Turn to God with sorrow for your sin," many will not do it. If we tell them: "Come, rejoice in Jesus and His salvation," many also do not want that.

But always some will turn from sin to God and accept Jesus as their Savior. Jesus therefore says: "Wisdom is justified of all her children." This wisdom is Jesus and His Word. He is the true Wisdom. The wicked world thinks it all foolishness, but the children of wisdom, they that believe this Word, "justify" it, they rejoice in it and say: "That is good and right." Do you belong to these people? God grant it.

PRAYER: Dear Jesus, Thy word makes wise

unto salvation. Come, help us to accept Thy wisdom, this Word of forgiveness, and be saved forever. Amen.

### SUNDAY, DECEMBER 23 — Read Luke 7:36-39 Christ Is Come for Sinners

A few days more, and the happy Christmas Day will be with us again. That always is a day of joy, for it brings good news to us, the good news about the Savior for sinners. Therefore it is good news chiefly for sinners. We learn that He receives sinners and blesses them with forgiveness and peace.

One of the Pharisees invited Jesus to eat with him. Pharisees thought they were right with God by doing good and keeping the commandments of men. They were proud people. Jesus went and sat down to eat. A woman whom all people knew as a bad woman heard that Jesus was in that man's house. And she brought a very precious box of ointment. She stood at His feet. She cried and washed His feet with her tears and wiped them with her hair. She kissed His feet and poured ointment upon them. And why did she do this? She knew that Jesus was come for sinners, for her, too. She wanted to show her love for Him and His salvation. So let us remember that Jesus was born for sinners, for you and me. Let us show our love by working and doing all we can for Him.

But because Jesus loves sinners, many people do not want Him. The Pharisee said in his heart that Jesus surely was not a prophet of God, because He let that bad woman touch Him. But he was wrong. Jesus is a great Prophet. He knew that this woman was a sinner, and He was glad to have her come to Him with her sorrow for her sin and to trust in Him. For sinners He was born on Christmas Day and came into the world. Sinner, thank God for this Savior!

PRAYER: Thanks, heavenly Father, for sending Thine only Son into the world for sinners like me. Help me rejoice in this Savior now and forever. Amen.

# CHRISTMAS DAY, DECEMBER 25 Read Luke 7:40-43

#### Love This Savior of Sinners

Are you rejoicing today in the Child of Bethlehem? Are you thanking God today for

this Savior born for you? Do you love Him much or only a little?

Our lesson tells us that Jesus was in the house of a Pharisee for a dinner. This man did not believe in Jesus, because He let a bad woman touch Him. So today many believe not in this Jesus because He invites sinners. To this man and to these people Jesus speaks about a certain creditor who had two debtors. The one owed him five hundred coins, and the other, fifty. And when they had nothing to pay, the man forgave both of them. Now Jesus asks this question: "Which of them will love him most?" And the man answered: "I suppose that he to whom he forgave most." And Jesus said: "Thou hast rightly judged." So the woman in our lesson had many sins, and Jesus forgave her. Therefore she loved Jesus much. The Pharisee thought he had only a little sin to be forgiven, therefore he loved Jesus only a little.

Today, on this happy Christmas Day, God comes in Christ Jesus and forgives us all our sins. And we ought to love Him much, for we have many sins. We daily sin much in thought, word (speaking), and deed (doing). And the Christmas angel says to every one of us: "Unto you is born a Savior." Thanks be to God, we have a Savior from sin. Oh, love Him much, because He forgives all your sin. It should be a Merry Christmas for you!

PRAYER: Thanks, dear Father in heaven, for this Thy Christmas gift of Thine only-begotten Son and for the Christmas blessings of forgiveness of sin, peace, and everlasting life. Amen.

SUNDAY, DECEMBER 30 — Read Luke 7:44-50 Your Many Sins of the Old Year are Forgiven

The old year is almost gone. When we look back upon the old year, what do we see? Oh, we see so many sins! Of us Jesus must say, as He said of that woman in our lesson: "Her sins, which are many." And we must answer: "Yes, dear Jesus, we have very many sins. We cannot count them all." We must close the old year with great sorrow and say: "I said, I will confess my transgressions (sins) unto the Lord."

But rejoice! We can close the old year and begin the new year with joy. Jesus says of us as He said of that woman: "Her sins, which are many, are forgiven." Our sins are forgiven, our many, many sins of the old year. Jesus says to us at the close of 1951 and at the beginning of 1952: "Thy sins are forgiven." Indeed, it will be a happy new year for us. Let us do all we can for Him, work for Him and serve Him, and give ourselves and all we have to Him. Then it will be a blessed new year.

### NEW YEAR, JANUARY 1, 1952 Read Luke 8:1-3

Give Yourself to Jesus During the New Year

### SUNDAY, JANUARY 6 — Read Luke 8:4-40 Trust in Your Savior

### Studies in Luther's Catechism

### Sixth Chief Part — The Lord's Supper

#### What Is the Good of This Supper?

One perhaps will say: "Eating a little bread and drinking a little wine, how will that help me?" Remember, it is not only a little bread and a little wine, but in and with the bread and wine we eat and drink the true body and blood of our Lord Jesus. But the question will arise even then: "How will that help a person?" Let Jesus Himself give the answer.

#### In Christ Jesus We Have Forgiveness

Our Catechism asks: "What is the benefit (good) of such eating and drinking?" Answer: "This is shown us by these words: 'Given and shed for you for the remission (forgiveness) of sins." His body and blood He gave and shed on the Cross on Good Friday. He did it not for Himself (He had no sin), but "for you for the remission of sins." Therefore Paul writes in Ephesians 1:7: "In Christ we have redemption (salvation) through His blood, the forgiveness of sins."

#### The Lord's Supper Seals Forgiveness to Us

Jesus invites His Christians to the Lord's Table and gives them bread, saying: "This is My body, which is given for you." He gives them wine, and He says: "This is My blood, which is shed for you." The Christian then asks: "Dear Lord, why did you on the Cross give your body and shed your blood that we now eat and drink?" Jesus answers: "For you for the remission (forgiveness) of sins." Jesus offers, gives, and seals forgiveness of all sins to everyone that comes trusting His Word, to the Holy Supper. What a comfort! We daily sin much; the devil blames us; the world and our wicked heart tempt us. And now Jesus comes to us in the Holy Sacrament and gives us His body to eat and His blood to drink and says: "For you for the remission of sins." Surely, that ought to strengthen our faith and keep us in the true faith unto the end!

#### Come Often and Receive This Blessing

Let us not despise this Holy Supper! Let us not carelessly go to the Lord's Supper! At the Lord's Table we get the greatest blessing upon earth, the forgiveness of all sins! Come often, and rejoice in this blessing! J. L. S.

only the Deaf became evident. Throughout the State of Wisconsin the Deaf desired pastoral ministration, which resulted in the founding of 11 regular preaching stations, in addition to serving the Deaf-Blind of the State as well as the Deaf of St. Paul, Minn., St. Louis, Mo., Saginaw and Bay City, Mich.

Under Pastor Wangerin's leadership Emmanuel Congregation for the Deaf in Milwaukee was organized in 1898, and in April, 1901, the first chapel for the Deaf was dedicated at 1717 W. Meinecke Ave. From this small beginning he saw, during his lifetime, the number of workers among the Deaf increase to nearly 35 ministers serving stations from coast to coast, from border to border, and the number of chapels to 18.

In 1914 he was sent to the West Coast in the interest of Deaf Missions. From Spokane, Wash., down to San Diego, Calif., he founded preaching stations. Today there are five resident missionaries in this area, serving many stations, of which four have their own chapels.

Pastor Wangerin served as editor of "THE DEAF LUTHERAN" for 15 years. As chairman of Ephphatha Conference he was also instrumental in the founding and publication of the *Lutheran Herald* for the Blind and the Deaf-Blind published in Braille and Moon type.

In the year 1926 he resigned from the ministry for reasons of health and pursued a secular occupation until his retirement in 1942.

In 1897 he was united in marriage with Minnie Boecker of St. Louis. She preceded him in death in April of 1940. He is survived by his daughter, Mrs. Ruth Fritz, two sons, Arthur and Robert, one son-in-law, two daughters-inlaw, four grandchildren, three sisters, one brother, one brother-in-law, and four sistersin-law.

He passed away at the home of his daughter and son-in-law early Sunday morning September 9, 1951, after an illness of about one year. Funeral services were conducted September 12 in Sherman Park Lutheran Church. His pastor, B. A. Maurer, chose as his text 2 Timothy 4:7-8, in speaking words of comfort to the bereaved. Pastor Martin Mueller interpreted for the Deaf and also spoke in behalf of Ephphatha Conference. Traugott M. Wangerin reached the age of 77 years, 10 months, and 19 days. "Blessed are the dead which die in the Lord."

The pastors encouraged one another to urge their Deaf groups to take part in the \$10,000,000 "Conquest for Christ" offering and in the offering for chapel furnishings of the Mill Neck Manor School.
