# Gyle Commissioned for Florida

The Deaf of Miami will long remember Sunday, March 30, 1952. On that day, after so many years of prayer and planning, the Deaf of Florida received their first resident Lutheran pastor, the Rev. Francis G. Gyle. The Rev. C. F. Kellermann, President of the Florida-Georgia District of The Lutheran Church --- Missouri Synod, read the commissioning service. The Rev. Lawson F. Knight, pastor of Faith Lutheran Church, Hialeah, was the liturgist. The Rev. Delbert Thies, pastor of the Memphis Deaf Lutheran Church, preached the commissioning sermon, basing his text on 1 Corinthians 4:1-2. Assisting in the commissioning ceremony were Pastors Wyatt A. Kimberley, Harold E. Lindeke, Benjamin F. Schumacher, and George Schuster, all pastors of Miami Lutheran churches. The Rev. Theo. DeLaney, pastor of the Deaf in Texas and Oklahoma, was the interpreter for the service. The choir of Bay Shore Lutheran Church made the service more beautiful, singing parts of Stainer's The Crucifixion. (Continued on page 33)-

# TRINITY SUNDAY, JUNE 8 Read Luke 10:13-16

#### Praise the Triune God for the Saving Word

How terrible if people despise and will not receive that great salvation which the Triune (Three-in-One) God has prepared for us! The Father gave His only Son into death for us. The Son gladly and willingly laid down His life for us. The Holy Ghost by His Word brings us to Jesus, and through Jesus to heaven. But so many despise God's Word. Many have seen the wonderful grace and forgiveness of God in Christ Jesus, but do not want it. Woe to them!

We learn about three cities in Galilee where Jesus did so many wonderful works and preached words of forgiveness. The three cities were Chorazin, Bethsaida, and Capernaum. Wonderful things He did in these cities, but people would not turn from sin to Christ. Especially Capernaum was greatly honored, was even lifted up to heaven, because Jesus made this city His own city. But they would not turn to Him and believe in Him. # You Are Happy if You See Jesus' Things

## The Law Cannot Save Us; Only Jesus Can

What is the most important question in this world? This: "What must I do to be saved?" And do you know the right answer? A lawyer, a teacher of the Law of God, came to our Lord Jesus with this question. But he did not really want to know the right answer from Jesus. He tempted Him, wanted to find something against Him. Jesus had a question also for him, saying: "What is written in the Law? How readest thou?" If you want to know the right answer, you can find it in the Bible. The lawyer knew an answer. He said: "Thou shalt love the Lord thy God with all thy heart and with all thy soul and with all thy strength and with all thy mind; and thy neighbor as thyself." Yes, he who loves God with all his heart and soul and strength and mind, and then also loves his neighbor as himself, he shall get everlasting life. Therefore Jesus said: "Thou hast answered right; this do, and thou shalt live." It is not enough to know the Law. We must do it.

Jesus wanted the lawyer to confess: "But I cannot do it. How, then, can I be saved?" However, he did not say that. He wanted to justify himself; he wanted to say: "I am all right. I am not a bad man." He did not want to confess his sin. If we try to do these two great commandments, we shall quickly see that we have not this love. We have not loved God with all our heart and all our soul and all our strength and all our mind, and we have not loved our neighbor as ourselves. People who do ALL that is written in the Law have eternal life, but we must confess that we have not done it, and therefore must die. Oh, cry out to Jesus and say: "I have sinned and deserve punishment now and forever! What must I do to be saved?" Jesus and the whole Bible answer: "Believe on the Lord Jesus Christ, and thou shalt be saved." Jesus perfectly kept the whole Law for us, and then paid for our sins with His blood. Thank Him, and love Him and your neighbor more and more.

PRAYER: Dear Father in heaven, let me learn from the Law to know my sin; then let me trust in the sweet Gospel, which tells us of Jesus and His love and His salvation for all sinners. Amen. J.L.S.

After the service, Pastor Knight introduced many important visitors to the assembly of Deaf and hearing. The Rev. Utten E. Read, retired Methodist minister of the Deaf, spoke briefly concerning the history of missionary work among the Deaf in Florida. Mrs. John Gibbens brought greetings from Superintendent Settles of the Florida School for Deaf and from the Baptist churches which had been trying to serve the Deaf of Miami during the time past. Then Mrs. Gibbens gave a word picture of the story behind the commissioning service of Pastor Gyle. She showed how the Deaf of Miami had tried again and again to get a resident pastor for themselves . . . a man that would preach the Gospel to them in their own language. She gave thanks to God that now such a man has come to them through The Lutheran Church — Missouri Synod.

In the evening, a special mission service was held in Bay Shore Lutheran Church. This is the place of services for the Deaf in Miami (Biscayne Blvd and 50th Terrace). Pastors Thies and Gyle were the liturgists. Pastor DeLaney preached on Mark 16:14-20.

Pastor Gyle is well known to most of the readers of the DEAF LUTHERAN. He has served as an editor of this paper for over two years. He is editor of *Life and Light*, the devotional booklet for our Deaf readers. A long biography of Pastor Gyle was printed in the August, 1951, issue of the DEAF LUTHERAN. Many of our readers know him personally. He has worked in the California and Maryland Schools for the Deaf and served as lay reader in California and Maryland for the Episcopal Church. As a Lutheran pastor, he has served the Deaf in the St. Louis field, the Memphis and Gulf Coast fields, and now Florida.

Pastor Gyle has an able assistant in his wife, the former Alice Mauger. Mrs. Gyle has taught in State and city schools for the Deaf in New York, Maryland, California, and Missouri for eight years. She is a graduate of Adelphi College, Garden City, N. Y., and has her M. A. from Teachers College of Columbia University, New York.

Pastor and Mrs. Gyle have three daughters: Emma Jane (6), Julia Ann (4), and Isabel Josephine (1). Their parsonage is located at 930 N.E. 138th St., North Miami, Fla.

## Field Gleanings

*Florida: Gainesville*, home of the University of Florida. Here we meet the seven Deaf residents for a monthly service. They have asked for question sheets so that they can study their Bibles together between church services. We are giving them Dr. Salvner's Catechism and the questions that go with it, first. Mrs. R. E. Kelly sews altar hangings for churches, as does Miss Irene Allmandinger in St. Louis. Mr. and Mrs. Kelly have church services in their home now, until our new Lutheran church is built in Gainesville. The Kellys are our Priscilla and Aquila there.

Homestead, 30 miles south of Miami, with very poor bus service, has eleven Deaf residents. We will have services there monthly, as Rev. Philpott used to.

Jacksonville, Florida's second-largest city, has Florida's second-largest Deaf population and a large club. We began services there in March with only twenty-two names; but the Deaf gave us fifty more names for April. We also have the name of one Negro Deaf lady to visit in April; so we can begin services for the Negro Deaf there in May or June.

Miami, the nation's vacation spot, is our headquarters. We have had Deaf of Massachusetts, Ohio, New York, and West Virginia visiting our services in one month! Most of the residents moved here from some other State. Our two Lutherans came from Pastor George Kraus's congregation in New York; they are Mr. and Mrs. George Bilenky. Weekly Bible class is held, and preaching services are on the second and fourth Sunday evenings, at Bay Shore Lutheran Church, Biscayne Boulevard (U.S. Highway No.1) at 50th Terrace. Average attendance at Bible class in March was ten. At five preaching services till March 31 average attendance was 29 Deaf. Easter services drew 48 Deaf. We have the name of one Negro Deaf lady in Miami also, and a Negro friend at Boulevard Cafeteria, across from our church, is looking for more; he can spell and sign.

We wish to thank the Deaf of Miami for a cash gift presented to the Pastor at his installation. And thanks to Mrs. John Gibbens of Coral Gables for getting things ready for our services in southern Florida during the past two years. Also thanks to the Miami Hearing Society for their hearty welcome and for trusting us with the job of advising their Hard of Hearing young people every Friday night. May the Lord give us strength for all the work that needs to be done in Florida! Tampa, the Gulf Coast city, has more Florida natives than the other towns, in its Deaf population. In three monthly services we have had an average of 41 Deaf. We also have ten or fifteen friends of Zion Lutheran Church worshiping with us and six children of the Deaf. Our five members here are all Yankees, three of them transfers from Pastors Mappes and Rohe, the other two confirmed in Florida by Dr. Salvner in 1951. Mr. George Harmening is distributing Catechisms now, for all who want them. The Negro Deaf of Tampa attend the services at Zion. There are only three Negro Deaf ladies in the city, as far as we know.

Leaving the small towns and the big cities we go to the medium-sized cities.

St. Augustine, oldest city in the United States, was the place where the first Lutherans were put to death, in 1565. Today the United Lutheran Church has the smallest chapel in town. There we meet with about 20 of the local Deaf. It is interesting to see that about one half of the Deaf there who go to church are school teachers. We are grateful to God to find a community here, like some other towns we know, where the teachers not only tell their pupils to go to church, but also go to church themselves. It makes us feel joyful to see Deaf teachers giving their pupils examples of Christian life to follow, off the campus and outside the classroom. Our prayers have long since gone up for the many States in which Deaf teachers do not go to church.

In St. Augustine we also find eleven Negro Deaf. We meet for morning service in their homes, after speaking to the students in chapel at the White Deaf school. Then we go to Jacksonville and return for evening services. On Monday we speak to the Negro Deaf and Blind pupils at the school. Altogether we address more than 225 Deaf souls in this city, once a month. Dr. C. J. Settles, superintendent of the school, invited Pastor Gyle to Florida in 1947, at Fulton, Mo.

West Palm Beach is a small but mighty flock. Mrs. Helen Salmond, a transfer from Detroit, is our one Lutheran member there. The average offering at this little station is \$1.95 each, for the first three months of 1952, almost \$2 per month for each person! Mrs. Madge Deibert of this city met us at West Frankfort, Ill., in 1950. At that time she invited Pastor Gyle to Florida, saying he would be surprised at the offerings. He was! In 17 services between January 1 and March 31, the offerings total \$159.99, almost \$9.50 at each service! And remember, wages for Deaf people are lower in Florida, and living costs are higher, than in many other places! Four years without a preacher gives people new ideas about giving in thanks to God.

Winter Haven, center of Polk County, will also be the meeting place for monthly services. About thirty Deaf people live in Polk County. Twenty used to attend the monthly services in Winter Haven. In this county lives Mr. Khaleal Kalal, whose brother, Mitchell Kalal, met Pastor Gyle in 1949 at Atlanta, Ga. At that time also, an invitation to move to Florida was extended by Mr. M. Kalal. He told us there were 100 Deaf people in Miami; now, three years later we find 150 in the Miami area and 50 Deaf in near-by towns.

Other towns: The Rev. Mr. Philpott had 20 towns in his circuit. We will not have that many, because more Deaf people have automobiles today than in those days, and they do drive long distances to church. We will go wherever we find out that people want church, and as long as they come to church. But larger groups need us the most. So Miami gets the best service as long as its people want it.

St. Louis, Mo. — On March 9 the Ladies' Aid of Holy Cross met at Mrs. Bertrand Keim's newly decorated home. They voted \$10 to the Lutheran Hospital at St. Louis, \$5 for the local Red Cross, and \$25 for the "Conquest for Christ" (Missions and Schools). On May 7, Light of the World Club (Bible Class) members will bring postage stamps saved from letters and parcels. These stamps will be sent to the Lutheran Hour office and sold; the money will go for missions.

Jackson, Miss. — Our Jackson church office has many names of Deaf people in both Alabama and Mississippi who have no church service now. Several towns over the State of Mississippi have already been visited, and the Deaf are eager to hear God's Word there. One major city with 24 Deaf citizens has no preacher, another with 12 and a third with 18 Deaf also would welcome us. Several hundred Deaf in Alabama, Mississippi (and southern Georgia — ED.) as well as parts of Louisiana are still without God's Word and Sacraments in regular services. L. L.

(ED. NOTE. — Members of the Dixie Lutheran Conference and others who did pioneer work in the South fields are continually praying that our Lutheran Church will not drop its work in these States, and their schools.)

Omaha, Nebr.— Bethlehem Church. — Some improvements have been made during the past few weeks. A new gas furnace has been installed, and also new ducts, heat outlets, and registers have been placed in order that the entire basement may be heated more easily and made more comfortable. The cost of the entire job, labor and material, amounts to \$1,030. (ED. NOTE: Add \$432 for "Conquest!")

A very beautiful wedding took place at Holy Cross Lutheran Church in Omaha on the evening of March 15, when Miss Dolores Margaret Dearden was wed to Mr. Charles Elwood Higgins of Independence, Mo. The maid of honor was Miss Barbara Dearden, and the best man was Mr. Harold Finley of Kansas City, Mo. Mr. and Mrs. Higgins are living in Independence, Mo., at 10805 Truman Rd. We wish this fine couple God's richest blessing in their wedded life together.

Edson Lee is the name of a newcomer at the home of Mr. and Mrs. Bruce Smith of Fremont, Nebr. The little gentleman was born on March 14. We congratulate these proud parents. — Mr. and Mrs. Smith moved to Fremont from Seward, Nebr., recently, and Bruce is pleased with his present job at Fremont. We saw the Smiths at the service in Fremont on April 6, and we hope to see them often.

Mr. Preston Best of Fremont had the contract to lay all the tile in the new school of Trinity Lutheran Congregation. This included a number of classrooms, the halls, and the
