Rochester, N.Y., Hail!

Sunday, November 22, 1953, will not be forgotten in Rochester, N.Y. That was the day when Alpha Lutheran Church of the Deaf dedicated its fine chapel and parsonage to the greater glory of God and the salvation of precious souls. The DEAF LUTHERAN is glad to present to its readers in this issue in word and picture a little of the story of Alpha Congregation and its lovable pastor, the Rev. Herbert Rohe. The picture on the cover shows us the fine property in which the congregation now worships, located at 1369 East Avenue at Hawthorn in Rochester.

On that Sunday in November nearly 400 Deaf and hearing gathered for three services of dedication and praise. After the opening ceremonies the Rev. J. L. Salvner, D. D., Executive Secretary of the Mission to the Deaf of The Lutheran Church — Missouri Synod, preached on Psalm 84:4: "Blessed are they that dwell in Thy house; they will be still praising Thee." He also interpreted the fine message of the President of the Eastern District of The Lutheran Church — Missouri Synod, the Rev. C. A. Behnke, D. D., in the afternoon service. Dr. Behnke is pastor of St. Mark's Lutheran Church, Rochester. In the Sunday

school hall of St. Mark's the Deaf have been conducting their services hitherto. Another Rochester pastor, the Rev. Herbert Plehn of St. Matthew's, preached a very striking and appropriate sermon in the evening service. Basing his message on St. Paul's words in Romans 12:2: "Be not conformed to this world, but be ye transformed by the renewing of your minds," he pointed to the fact that as Alpha Church had taken a house built for the purposes of this world and had transformed it into a house of God, so we should in heart and mind here be drawn from worldly things to the things of God. Rev. Rohe, who had officiated at the opening ceremonies and had been the liturgist in the other services, interpreted Pastor Plehn. Long will Alpha remember those inspiring services of November 22, 1953.

We are happy to state that the photographers were busy that day and were good, and so we can present a number of pictures in this issue which amplify the word pictures of the story. Particularly we thank the Rev. Paul Voigt, pastor of Concordia Lutheran of Brockport, N.Y., who is the official photographer of the Rochester Pastoral Conference. His picture, taken at the afternoon service, shows Doctors Behnke and Salvner, preacher and interpreter, and Pastor Rohe, the liturgist, and gives us a good view of the altar and chancel of the church. Among the various other pictures we do not find a single one that shows a sober face, but it is evident all hearts and faces were filled with joy and gratitude that God had given His Deaf children one more place where He records His name and will come to them and will bless them. That is as it should be.

God has been good to Alpha. He gave Rochester a faithful pastor in Rev. Rohe. Many trips had he made from Pittsburgh to Rochester over the years. His health has not always been the best, but the good Lord gives strength to those that look up to Him. When some time ago Pastor

Rohe was transferred to Rochester. the years and months of quiet work vielded a visible return. Alpha Church numbers some fifty communicant members, and twenty-five of these were added in the last year. What a great blessing! On the Sunday following the dedication a class of five new members was welcomed into the church by confirmation. These had been waiting since October for their official acceptance as members, but had awaited the dedication in order to have the joy of being received in the place they had helped to get ready. Alpha has a staff of interested and active officers, pictured also. Mr. C. Leary is president, Mr. G. McGhee is vice-president, Mr. C. Heffernan is secretary, Mr. H. Altemoos is treasurer, Mr. A. Heinz is trustee, Messrs. D. McGhee, W. Johncox, L. Van Vechten, and R. McNeil served as ushers November 22.

The church is situated upon a plot of ground 190 by 300 feet. The building is a large brick house. The chapel seats 80 people. The chapel

and other educational and social rooms are on the first floor. The pastor's family lives in a nice sixroom apartment on the second floor, where the pastor's study and office is located. The property was purchased for \$30,000 but is valued at \$66,000. The Board of Directors of The Lutheran Church — Missouri Synod made a grant to Alpha Congregation from the "Conquest for Christ" collection, and a \$10,000 loan was made for a term of one year, completing the purchase. The Christmas picture gives one a good idea of the beautiful and stately interior of the building.

Pastor Rohe conducts a service on Sunday evenings for the uppergrade Protestant children at the Rochester School for the Deaf. He gives a sermonet and presents visual aids, and the children take care of the readings, hymns, and prayers, thus participating extensively in the worship. About 35 children usually attend these services.

At the Central New York School for the Deaf in Rome, N.Y., where Rev. Rohe has instruction for Lutheran children, he conducts a serv-

ice on the third Monday of the month for all Protestant children. One hundred to 125 attend this service.

Thus we sang while visiting several of our fields. Our first stop was Rochester, N. Y., where we were scheduled, on Sunday, November 22, to preach at the dedication of a chapel-parsonage newly acquired by Alpha Congregation with the help of our Board. They now have a beautiful chapel for worshiping their God and Savior and also sufficient room for social purposes. On the second floor the pastor's family has six rooms, which make fine living quarters for them. The Deaf had arranged three services of praise and thanksgiving. In the afternoon Dr. C. A. Behnke preached the sermon, and in the evening Pastor H. E. Plehn. Both pastors and their congregations have done much for our Rochester flock during the past years. Thanks was expressed to them. Through the efforts of Dr. Behnke they obtained an altar, lectern, and baptismal font from the State Hospital. The Deaf were busy till late Saturday night in order to have everything in good shape for dedication day. We addressed Alpha Congregation also on Thanksgiving Dav. November 26.

Then we went on to see **Pastor Donald Boerner**, our new man for the New England States. We were happy to be with him for ten days. During his seminary days he did some work among the Deaf in Delavan, Wis., and Jacksonville, Ill. We thank God for this new worker who knows the sign language and is very much interested in the work. This field has suffered greatly because of the fourteen-month vacancy. However, with the help of God and His blessing it shall be built up again. We went with him to Springfield, Hartford, and Worcester and preached in every place, also in Boston. We also visited the three schools with him in which he conducts religious classes for the Deaf. God be with him and bless his work unto the glory of our Savior's name and the eternal welfare of many Deaf.

Our next destination was Jackson, Miss. On the way we stopped off in **Memphis** to see Brother D. Thies and his family for a few hours and to take a look at the parsonage recently purchased by our Board. It surely is an ideal home for the Thies family. We thank God for it. The work is progressing nicely in the entire field under the rich blessings of God.

The following day we went on to Jackson. There we met Vicar Drachenberg, who for the last six months ministered to the spiritual needs of the Deaf in the Jackson area. Also the newly called pastor, the Rev. Marlin Sampson, was there to meet us. At Watonga, Okla., his former charge, we had given him

some training for the work. We were surprised to hear that he preached his first sermon to the Deaf November 29. We visited the State Hospital with him and preached to several of the patients there, and in the evening of the same day we addressed eighty very attentive deaf boys and girls in the school for colored. Sunday morning we addressed the assembly in the school for white children and in the afternoon in the school for colored. In the evening service Pastor Sampson was commissioned in Redeemer Church to serve as pastor and missionary to the Deaf in the Jackson tield, comprising stations in Mississippi, Alabama, Louisiana, and Florida. Pastor N. R. Gardels of Redeemer Church was the liturgist, and he and Vicar Drachenberg assisted in the commissioning. Redeemer Ladies' Guild held a reception for the Sampson family before the service for which hearty thanks are due them. Fourteen Deaf attended. May our dear Lord be with our new worker and grant that he be a blessing unto many.

TABLE OF DUTIES

What Hearers Owe to Their Pastors

In our Bible pastors and preachers are called laborers. They labor, work, in the word and doctrine (teaching), 1 Timothy 5:17. They preach the Gospel; they comfort poor sinners; they bring cheer to the sick; they go after the lost; they prepare the dying for a blessed end. They give themselves continually to prayer and the ministry of the Word, Acts 6:4. Christian friend, your pastor labors for you!

Laborers Worthy of Their Hire

Jesus says: "A laborer is worthy of his hire." Therefore also pastors are worthy of their hire (wages) because they labor. They should "eat and drink such things as they (the hearers) give." As a man gives his hired man food and drink or pays him that he may buy things necessary for this life, so Christians should do to their pastors. God says by His Apostle Paul in Galatians 6:6 that Christians should share with their pastors and teachers all good things. They should pay their pastor not as little as possible, but share all good things with him. Gladly we ought to do this, for our pastor comes to us with the greatest blessings: forgiveness of all sin. life. and salvation. Therefore Paul writes: "If we have sown unto you spiritual things (things for the soul), is it a great thing if we shall reap your carnal things (things for the body)?" 1 Corinthians 9:11. Whatever we pay our pastor is not charity, but his hire (wages). We never can pay him in full for his work. A doctor seeks to keep our body well and alive, and we pay him for it. But our pastor keeps not only our body, but also our soul unto life everlasting by the preaching of the Cross.

Pastors, Preaching the Gospel, Should Live of the Gospel

Someone perhaps will say: "Why should we give for the pastor's support? He works only a few hours. preaching on Sunday and making a few sick calls. The other days of the week he can do some other work and so make his own living." Yes, he could as did St. Paul. But listen to God's Word. In 1 Corinthians 9:14 we read: "Even so hath the Lord ordained that they which preach the Gospel should live of the Gospel." This means, pastors should get all they need for body and life from them to whom they preach the Gospel. The pastor must have time to study and to prepare for his sermons. For that he must have much time. To young Timothy St. Paul writes: "Meditate upon these things; give thyself wholly to them." 1 Timothy 4:15. A faithful pastor has no time for other work. The Apostles could not take care of the poor. Therefore they asked the congregation in Jerusalem to appoint other men for this work, saying: "We will give ourselves *continually* to prayer and to the ministry of the word." Acts 6:4.

God Wants This

Paul writes: "Even so hath the Lord ordained (decided) that they which preach the Gospel should live of the Gospel." The Lord commands: "Give your pastors food and drink; share all your good things with them." God wants you to learn His Word, which makes you wise unto salvation by faith in Christ Jesus. Therefore He sends a pastor to you with His soul-saving Word and asks you to give him what he needs for body and life. Are you doing this? Are you perhaps spending much money for the wisdom and the joys and pleasures of this world? How much are you giving for the support of your pastor, who by his teaching brings you true happiness here on earth and everlasting pleasures in heaven? Paul savs: "Be not deceived: God is not mocked." Galatians 6:7. We mock God if we give nothing or very little for the support of His ministers. Paul therefore goes on saying: "Whatsoever a man soweth, that shall he also reap." If a man sows much, he will reap much; if he sows little, he will reap little. So he who gives much will reap great blessings; and he who gives little shall receive little blessings.

If you value a faithful pastor then you will do as your Savior wants you to do and gladly and thankfully give for your pastor's support who ever directs you to the "Lamb of God, which takes away the sin of the world." John 1:29. J. L. S.

Sunday, February 14 Read Luke 19:39, 40

Welcome Jesus with Praise!

Not all people welcomed this Lord Jesus. In the crowd we see also Pharisees, proud people who thought themselves righteous before God and therefore not in need of a Savior. Also today not all people will welcome this Jesus and praise God for Him. There are Pharisees also today among God's people. They are proud and think they can save themselves by doing good. Thev think they need no Jesus.

The Pharisees therefore said to Jesus: "Teacher, rebuke (scold and stop) Thy disciples." They did not want to hear people welcoming Him with joy and praise. They did not believe in Him. They believed Jesus was a teacher, but not the Savior and King. So people today do not want us to rejoice in the Christ Child in the manger and in Him who died on the cross. They think it all foolishness that we with the Wise

Men worship the little Lord Jesus. They laugh at us because we say with Paul: "Christ the Son of God loved me and gave Himself for me."

But Jesus was pleased with the songs of joy and praise. He answered: "I say unto you that if these be silent, the stones will cry out." His disciples must not be silent. They must sing praises to Him. Also today Jesus is pleased when we welcome Him with songs of praise. Let us sing and praise. We must not let the wicked world stop us.

PRAYER: Welcome, dear King and Savior Jesus! Come, make Thy home in my heart, and make it sing praises to Thee. Amen.

Sunday, February 21 Read Luke 19:41-44

Turn from Sin to Jesus, and Be Saved

Because so many people and the Pharisees would not accept Him and be saved, He cried when He came near the city. And He said: "Oh, I wish you had accepted Me and My peace!" He came to save all people. Therefore it makes Him sad when He sees so many who care not for Him and His salvation. A mother's heart is full of sorrow when her son turns from her and goes on the wrong way. So Christ's heart is full of sorrow when He sees so many despising His love and going upon the way of sin. Are you making Him sad or full of joy?

Jesus cries also because He sees great trouble coming upon the city. Enemies will come around it. They will kill the people and their children. They will not leave one stone upon another. The city and all its people will be destroyed. And why? Because they knew not the time when God visited them with His grace and forgiveness. Surely, also today Jesus has reason to be sad and cry because so many people know not the time of God's grace and forgiveness. They will be lost forever. God will come on Judgment Day, and they must go away from Him to everlasting fire in hell. Also we should be sad and cry when we see people who do not care for Jesus, do not come to church, who despise this good word of forgiveness and walk upon the way to everlasting hell and will be lost forever. How terrible! Let us work and pray that they turn from sin to Jesus, the only Savior.

Sunday, February 28 Read Luke 19:45-48

Go to Church to Pray and Worship

Jesus went into the Temple. There He saw things that did not please Him. People were selling in the Temple, not thinking of God, but only of themselves. Jesus is not pleased when people go to church for business, or to meet friends, or for other things, and not for the things of God.

He showed from the Bible that this was not right. "It is written," He said. And that is written also for us today. And what is written? "My house is a house of prayer; but ye have made it a den of thieves." People should come to church for prayer, not to rob God of His honor and not to rob people of their heavenly blessings. These people were in the Temple, but God was not in their heart. Some people come to church not for God, but make it a den of thieves. For what purpose is the Temple, or the church? To pray and to worship the Lord Jesus and to hear His Word. Jesus went into the Temple to teach and to preach the Word of God. But the Pharisees and the Hebrew teachers did not want such teaching. Therefore they made plans to kill Him. But they could not find how to do it. Many people had come from far and listened to Him very attentively. So in our churches we must preach the word of salvation by faith in the blood of Jesus, and nothing else. Some will not like this preaching, but that cannot, and should not, stop us. As the people in our lesson, so let us attend to this glorious Gospel of salvation, and gladly hear and learn it.
